<p>Multiple authors (see note below) Last name and initials of first author, '&' last name and initials of second author. (Date). <i>Title</i>. <p>Essay or chapter in a book Author of essay. (Date). Title of essay. 'In' Name of editor (Ed.), <i>Title of book</i> (Page numbers). Place of publication: Publisher.</p>	Adams, J. (1996). Newspapers, Magazines or Scholarly Journals (Print Sources Only)	
<p>Weekly / monthly magazine article Author. (Year, month day). Title of article. <i>Magazine Name</i>, volume number, pages.</p>	Silver, M. (1997, June 16). Would you care for a V or an S with your PG? <i>U.S. News & World Report</i> , 122, 59.
<p>Scholarly journal article Author. (Year). Title of article. <i>Journal Name</i>, volume number (Issue number), pages.</p>	Ortiz, B. (1989). Mount Diablo as myth and reality: An Indian history convoluted. <i>The American Indian Quarterly</i> , 13(4), 457-65.
<p>Newspaper article Author. (Year, month day). Title of article. <i>Newspaper Name</i>, Section Page.</p>	Mifflin, L. (1997, October 25). TV ratings are mired in demand by industry. <i>New York Times</i> , p. A10.

- Double-space all lines. Indent one-half inch after the first line. Examples provided on this handout are single spaced to save space.
- A **Reference List** must be in alphabetical order by author or by title, if author's name is unavailable
- If there are more than 6 authors for a given work, list the first six and separate by commas. Following the sixth author add, 'et al.' Do not use '&.'
- Capitalize significant words in the title of a periodical. Italicize the name of the journal and volume number, but NOT the issue number.
- Capitalize only the first significant word of a book title and subtitle and italicize the book title.

Electronic Books

Author. (Date). *Title of the Book*. Place of publication: Publisher. Retrieval from name of database or URL for book collection

Bloom, H. (1996). *Mark Twain's adventures of Huckleberry Finn*. Broomall, PA: Chelsea. Retrieved from NetLibrary.

Web Pages and Other Web Documents

(Citing an entire web site - is done by giving the site address in the text of the paper. Entire web sites are NOT included in the Reference list.)

Provide the following elements for Web pages

that are not periodical articles if available

1. Name of author, editor or name of organization.
2. Date of publication/last update of web document. Use (n.d.) when date unavailable.
3. *Title*.
4. Name of sponsoring organization.
5. Retrieved from URL of website (or if very long, the URL of the site's search page).

Notes:

- If no author, editor, or organization name is available, begin with the title, followed by date, publication information, etc.
- If the citation ends with a URL, there is NO final period.

Online Periodical Articles

Author, A. A., & Author, B. B. (Date of publication). Title of article. *Title of Journal*, volume number. Retrieved from <http://www.someaddress.com/full/url/>

Articles from Electronic Databases (Gale, Proquest, CQ Researcher)

Electronic Database Articles

Provide the following elements if available

1. Name of author.
2. (Date).
3. Article title.
4. *Journal title*.
5. *Volume* (issue for journals), page number.
6. Retrieved from name of electronic database service.
