**Chancellor outlines College's  
response to power outages**

As most of you are aware, PG&E has implemented rolling brownouts across the state. As a result, the District has already experienced some power outages and a warning has been issued that more may occur over the course of the next few days. These outages seem to last between 60 and 90 minutes.

I know many of you are receiving calls from students regarding the status of their classes given a brownout in your area. Because of the temporary nature of these outages, some clear-headed judgment calls will be required. While it is important not to jeopardize the health and safety of our students, staff, or faculty in any way, it is also important to keep in mind that this is the first week of school. To date, these brownouts have not exceeded 90 minutes, which would indicate that one or two classes may have to be cancelled, but that the remainder of the course schedule thereafter should stay intact. If a brownout should exceed 90 minutes, Campus Deans will work with Public Safety personnel to determine a subsequent course of action.

HOWEVER, I want to make a clear distinction between the leniency of these calls during the day — when natural light may make it possible for class to continue — and at night, when total darkness poses additional health and safety issues and concerns. If a rolling brownout occurs after dark, please dismiss any and all classes in session for the duration of the power outage. However, regular staff and faculty members assigned to the evening schedule should be available to continue with their regularly scheduled programs once the power is returned to the buildings in question.

Although all of the elevators in the District are equipped with telephones linked directly to the Police Department

at the Ocean Avenue Campus, I recommend that each Campus Dean be responsible for creating notices to be posted inside and outside the elevators regarding the PG&E outages. It should be recommended that those who are able to use the stairs do so, even though the College is prepared to rescue anyone who is trapped in an elevator at any time, day or night.

I am also strongly recommending that time be taken to back-up computers and check that surge protectors are operational.

Following is a list of campuses and their block number assignments. Unfortunately, for a variety of reasons, warnings will not be issued in advance of specific block outages. However, the outages are being delivered sequentially, so it may be helpful to note, through news broadcasts, the most recent block outage in order to better prepare for any possible shutdowns on your end.

PG&E has stated that there are a total of 14 block assignments. Therefore, it is unlikely that the brownouts will roll beyond block 14. You will note, however,

that several of the campuses are rated at block numbers higher than 14. This is because the power grids for these blocks are tied to some of the city's most vital institutions, e.g. area hospitals, BART, and the Sewer Plant, which will remain fully powered unless the crisis worsens beyond current expectations.

As of this morning, block 5 continues to experience some power failures, although Southeast Campus is currently fully operational.

## Electronic Reference Services Starts at the Library

**Rita Jones**, Dean of Library and Learning Resources, announces that the libraries of City College of San Francisco have inaugurated an Online Reference Service.

**James Lim**, the Coordinator of Reference Services, is leading this effort.

Called eRef, it is an electronic reference service done through e-mail, for students, staff, faculty and registered community users. When you are at home or away from campus or not in a CCSF library you can send a short, factual questions such as: What is the population of Uganda? Who won the World Series in 1955? Does the library offer any periodical databases? Can I access the CCSF course catalog from home? "We don't do in-depth research, answer medical or legal questions, or prepare bibliographies," says Lim. "However, we may provide you with ideas on how to proceed with your research or suggest print and

web resources." To access ERef you need an internet connection. The web address is: <http://www.ccsf.org/Library>. Look for the ASK A QUESTION icon and select it. It's open 24 hours a day, seven days a week except for holidays. "We will try to respond within 48 hours or at least let you know the status of your question—holidays and breaks will extend the response time. ERef is also closed between semesters. If you need a quick answer, it's always best to call the library (452-5541) during its open hours," says Lim, adding, "You will need to enter your bar code number so if you don't already have one, be sure to visit any CCSF library to get a library card or have a bar code attached to your current ID. Community users may obtain a library card by showing proof of San Francisco residency." If you have any questions about the eRef service, telephone (415) 452-5541.

## Encourage students to apply for Asian Coalition scholarships

Asian Coalition of City College of San Francisco will award \$300 scholarships to eight deserving students of Asian and Asian Pacific Islander ancestry. Students must be enrolled in either credit or non-credit courses at any campus of CCSF.

Five of the six scholarships offered honor the memory of **John Yeehall Chin** who served as one of the members of the first board of trustees in the San Francisco Community College District. The sixth scholarship honors the memory of **Victor Chow**, a former faculty member of the Biology Department at CCSF and co-founder of Asian Coalition. Two other donated memorial scholarships are available. Mrs. **Emily Chin**, an ESL Instructor in the Chinatown/North Beach Campus donated a scholarship in memory of her late husband, **Franklin N.W. Chin**. The other donated memorial scholarship honors the late Mary Lin, a retired teacher in the San Francisco Unified School District who volunteered 60 years of service in the former Children's Hospital in San Francisco.

The purpose of the scholarships is to acknowledge the struggles and sacrifices Asian students encounter in pursuing their educational goals and to provide encouragement for their endeavors. Selection criteria include financial need, academic progress, classroom participation, school/community service, potential leadership skills, and evaluations (from teachers or counselors).

Applications are available through the Scholarship Office at the Ocean Avenue campus and the counseling office at each campus. Completed applications, including the teacher evaluation, must be returned to **Debra Liu**, Scholarship Committee Cochairperson, c/o Chinatown North Beach Campus, and received by **Wednesday, March 14**.

The awards will be presented at the Asian Coalition Dinner that will be held in late Spring.
