CCSF purchases Evans Avenue campus site

Chancellor Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, has announced City College of San Francisco's successful purchase of the building and land at 1400 Evans Avenue for \$6.1 million. In addition, the college anticipates spending up to \$2 million in seismic upgrades.

Peter Goldstein, Vice Chancellor of Administration and Finance, pointed out, "The Board of Trustees should be congratulated for allowing the District to take on the debt (in the form of Certificates of Participation) necessary to acquire the property. I'm optimistic that the College's next local bond issue will generate the dollars necessary to completely repay this debt. But even if that doesn't happen, it is important for the college community to know that the debt is structured in such a way that we can handle the payments without hurting our budget. In the best case we will save \$500,000 per year (in leasing costs) in our budget."

Goldstein added, "In the event we don't need the full \$2 million amount (for seismic upgrading) the remaining amount will be invested in our computer facilities upgrade project."

Phyllis McGuire, Associate Vice Chancellor of Workforce and Economic Development, noted, "Evans is City College of San Francisco's newest campus. We opened in 1994 with 300 students. As of this year, we have well over 2000 students attending classes in our credit and noncredit programs. The majority of our students attend our

evenings and weekend classes. We provide education and training for entry-level as well as incumbent workers. The goal of our program is to be flexible and responsive in the way in which we deliver education and training as well as partner with other community groups to ensure the success of our students.”

McGuire noted that the first classes offered at Evans in 1994 were in the automotive program. “Since then we have expanded a great deal. We consolidated our skilled trades program. We developed the Garment 2000 teaching factory. We’re also offering courses in Fire Science at Evans and have started to offer vocational ESL classes in skilled trades areas, too.”

In addition, says McGuire, “The Offices of Workforce and Economic Development, Vocational Education, CalWORKS, and Apprenticeship are located at Evans.

“We are the recipient of an Advanced Transportation Technology (ATT) grant.

ATT is working with partners such as MUNI, BART and Amtrak to assess training needs and develop curriculum.”

McGuire continued, “We established the California Resource Center for Occupational Program Design and Evaluation that provides DACUM (developing a curriculum) facilitation for both education and industry.

“We have been the recipient of national, state and local grants that have allowed us to improve the facility.” The first grant allowed us to create a Garment 2000 teaching factory. We have recently completed a remodel that created more classroom space. A second phase, funded with dollars from the Mayor’s Office of Community Development, will develop and create laboratory classrooms for construction and skilled trades programs. These improvements will allow us to better meet the training needs of the residents in the surrounding community.”

Tina Martin to present on Rivera mural

Tina Martin, ESL instructor and the director of the Fund for Instructional Improvement grant for the Diego Rivera Mural Education Project, will give a presentation in Mexico at the Community Colleges for International Development Conference there February 10–13. The theme of the conference will be “Crossing Borders, Building Opportunities.” Martin will be presenting on how instructors across the curriculum and across all borders can use the Rivera Mural of Pan American Unity to increase student success by helping them connect one discipline with another.

Martin will focus on the lessons created by City College instructors on the lesson web site www.hills.ccsf.org/~mural as well as www.riveramural.org and the portable exhibit of the Rivera’s Mural of Pan American Unity.

Monterrey, Mexico, where the CCID Conference will be held, has the largest distance-learning infrastructure in Mexico, perhaps in all of Latin America. Martin will show how the mural can be accessed and used for distance learning while she explores online courses and distance learning options that Monterrey provides. She also hopes to look into possibilities for faculty exchanges and models for study abroad programs.

McClain was nominated for the seventh edition (2000) of the *International Who’s Who of Professional and Business Women*.

Renée Morel earns medal from French Office of Veterans Affairs

Renée Morel who teaches French in the Foreign Languages Department, was awarded a medal by the French Office of Veterans Affairs (Ministere des Anciens Combattants) on January 17 for her services as a (tricolor) flag bearer for many years.

“My father, **Jean Morel**, was in the French Navy during WWII (Marine Indochine 1939–1945) and a prisoner of the Japanese, after they invaded Saigon.

He and other survivors celebrated the 60th anniversary of the French naval victory of Koh Chang over the Siamese fleet — allies of the Japanese — on January 17 in Brest, Brittany.

This was the only French naval victory for all of WWII. As these veterans grew older and weaker, I started to carry their flag at the yearly commemorations. They have thanked me by honoring me with a ‘medaille de porte-drapeau.’”

Quilting class students help homeless

The “Sleeping Bay Project” provides quilted sleeping bags to the homeless and needy on the streets of San Francisco. The project idea was brought to me by one of my quilt students, **Becky Gordon**. The San Francisco Quilt Guild has worked on many bags. This work, guided by **Eleanor Dugan**, makes up a “kit” consisting of two seven foot squares with batting in between. All the groups need to do is sew and tie the quilt sandwiches into bags. Men’s ties are used for carrying straps. The bags can be distributed by anyone. We connected with “Care Through Touch Outreach” located in the Tenderloin, and coordinated by **Doyle Goodwin**.

On October 27, the John Adams Saturday quilt class met and put together seven sleeping bags, using the kits and making our own seven foot squares as well. Everyone in the class felt good about this service to our community. Mr. Goodwin came into the class and thanked everyone and picked up the bags.

The next day I met him and went out to help distribute the bags. We looked for the really needy, the elderly, women, and children, people who are not able to help themselves. No judgments were made about who gets help from these people. There were two women with us who gave massages to anyone who wanted one. This is the “care through tough part of the program. We drove around South of Market, under the freeways, the Tenderloin. We got out and talked to

Students may also qualify if they are the first in their family to attend college or if their native language is other than English.

people, and gave out socks and bathroom tokens to anybody who wanted them.

The faces, the eyes, the names, the stories of these men and women on the streets of San Francisco. David, that sweet soul, with one of our bags, was standing on the corner of Gough and Van Ness. A young man sleeping near the freeway took a massage. He had to leave quickly in order not to miss a food line. One man, with blood on his face, took a massage. It made him cry. It's his mental illness, and the drugs keep him sane. Many are self-defeated, shy, drugged out, self-medicating, other recycling and scrounging.

"There must be mothers somewhere worried about these lost ones," said one of the massaging women. After I got into my car and started for home, I cried with the emotions that welled up. It was a very emotional experience, It is one that I will never forget.

It comes packaged with Banner for free if the College accepts the advertisements. Without the ads, there would be a site-license cost. He reported that the College can use Campus Pipeline instead of email to broadcast announcements to students and faculty, and that it can be used as an email portal. Using the email portal feature may require the College to supply email accounts for all students.

C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Susan Lopez reported that the Enrollment Management Tools Ad Hoc Committee of the Enhanced Self-Study has been discussing ways to increase communication with students. She noted that it is important to consider as well methods that are applicable to noncredit classes. For example, many noncredit students do not have email.

She reported also that the Schedule of Classes uses the word "Division" to distinguish Credit from Noncredit even though it is a faculty understanding that the divisions do not exist.

Lastly, she reported that meetings of the New Mission Campus Building Committee is having some communication problems, and there has not been much community input, although there are plans to increase that in January. The Chancellor has approved one of the designs the Committee forwarded to him.

D. Secretary

Secretary Frederick Teti attended the Chancellor's Awards Ceremony. The Ceremony featured scholarships presented by the Associated Students' Council,

the Administrators' Association, and the Classified Senate. He felt the Executive Council, too, ought to consider somehow funding a scholarship.

He also raised the question of the currency of the Senate's Disciplines List. Senate member Mueller answered that the List was based on the DCC contract and was last revised in February of 1997.

VI. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Executive Council Goals

Council continued its discussion of Council Goal #1: to review the implementation status of the College's various master plans.

President Clark reminded Council that the Chancellor is already planning the 2002 edition of the Strategic Plan. First Vice President Yee discussed the process by which the departmental Unit Plans are compiled into the College's Annual Plan. Council expressed a desire for more continuity between previous planning documents and any new ones that may be developed, carrying forth items that have not been implemented.

During the discussion it was noted that, because of the changing demographics of San Francisco, the administration should devote more resources to the Older Adults Department.

There was consensus for President Clark to ask Director Gabriner and Chancellor Day for a status report on each of the action items listed in the Strategic Plan.

B. Suggested Organizational Changes

President Clark reported that the Chancellor would be asking the Board for approval of the changes described in his resolution at the December 14 Board meeting.

Council had concerns about the resolution itself, but the overriding concern was the time frame within which they were supposed to consider it.

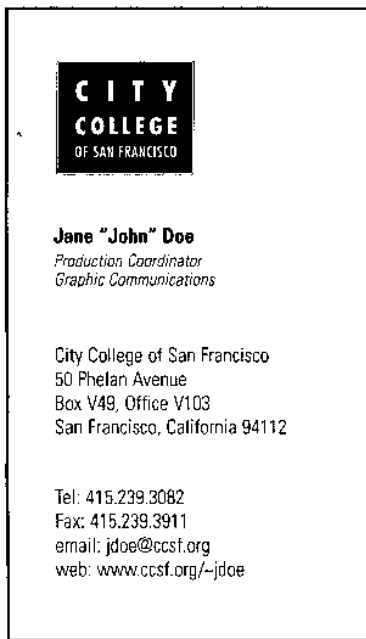
