Chancellor Philip R. Day, Jr., outlines conservation measures to cover increases in natural gas costs

This is a follow-up to my earlier communication regarding energy blackouts and conservation. It appears as though our billings for natural gas are increasing at an exponential rate, which requires us to seriously contemplate some conservation measures that we had not planned on. Specifically, if the rate of utilization continues at the current rate and we have to purchase natural gas at the cost we are now expected to pay, it is likely that the total cost for the balance of the year will exceed our original budgeted amount by \$800 - \$900K. That represents a significant and unexpected hit to our budget.

We are working at the state level with the Board of Governors and the legislature to try to get budgetary relief both for this year and next. Frankly, they are so absorbed with what they view as the larger issues that they aren't giving attention to other areas impacted. So, in the absence of any outside assistance to help us budgetarily, City College is left to sort through this problem on its own.

Accordingly, I am asking for your cooperation and most importantly, understanding. The following steps will be/are being considered in an effort to conserve energy, reduce expenditures, and accommodate the increasing institutional burden associated with California's energy crisis:

1) Thermostats will be lowered to an appropriate level and unfortunately, we are going to have to reduce the use of space heaters because that is presenting another set of challenges;

2) The College is seriously considering a complete shutdown of operations over the spring break (that decision will come shortly);

3) The newly expanded Sunday hours of the Rosenberg Library will have to be eliminated effective the weekend of February 10, 2001. Consideration is also being given to reducing hours on the "front-end" of Saturday (we currently are open from 9 A.M. to 3 P.M.) although that decision has not been made yet because we want to look at the level of student impact and utilization during that time-frame;

4) The level of spending in non-personnel areas will have to be curtailed in order for us to accommodate the budget increases in the energy area until such time as we hear from the State about some sort of "relief plan" for colleges, universities, and the K-12 sector. Expenditures for travel, supplies, and non-essential equipment purchases are

going to have to be seriously reduced, if not frozen. More details on the latter area will be forthcoming as soon as I review the matter in more detail with **Peter Goldstein, James Kendrix**, and the Planning and Budgeting Council later next week.

I hope this communication has been helpful. We are working as best and as diligently as we can at the State level to get some financial assistance. However, in the final analysis, our destiny may be in our own hands and we will have to manage our way through this crisis together.

"As part of this agreement, we are developing a side agreement with AFT to deal with faculty issues that may arise as a result of this change," added Lee.

Minutes of the December 5 meeting.

1. CHAIR REPORT TO THE COLLEGE ADVISORY COUNCIL:

Francine Podenski, the chair of the Communication Committee gave a report to the College Advisory Council (CAC) at its December 1, meeting, emphasizing the following points:

A. DIEGO RIVERA MURAL

At the committee's October meeting **Julia Bergman** recommended to use the Diego Rivera Mural on CCSF letterheads and business card. Francine told the CAC about concern from various constituents of the college, that the Diego Rivera Mural is not inclusive enough, which was also agreed upon by members of the CAC. No action was taken by the Communication Committee or CAC.

B. CCSF HOME PAGE

The new look of the CCSF Home Page was also discussed. Since there were members of the CAC who had not seen the proposed new Home Page yet, the topic was tabled until the next CAC meeting.

2. EATV- CHANNEL 27 UPDATE

John Odell of the Broadcast Electronic

Media Department and his student assistant, **Frederica**, reported on the operation and programming of Channel 27. In the past year, since the Channel has been run as part of the Broadcast Electronic Media Department, the following improvement have been made:

- **More student involvement** in Shooting Promos, Making Documentaries, Bulletin Board, Video Production,
- **More student projects are broadcast** including Promos up to 60 seconds long.

However, in lieu of the CAC's request to look at the Home Page design before it "goes public," the Home Page will not be published before the February meeting of the CAC. In addition, changes were proposed to the Home Page to modernize it.

The Information Technology Policy Committee (ITPC) fully updated the CCSF Computer Usage Policy and Joe Jah presented it to the Communication Committee. The committee members will look at it and bring it back to their next meeting in February.

CCSF Policy on Sexual Harassment

Editor's note: To acquaint new staff members with CCSF policy, each semester City Currents publishes an excerpt from the college's Sexual Harassment Policy. For a copy of the complete policy, see the 2000-2001 CCSF Catalog.

It is the policy of the San Francisco Community College District (SFCCD) to:

A. Prohibit any person in the work or academic setting from sexually harassing any other person in the work or academic setting. The District will not tolerate or condone sexual harassment by or towards its employees or by or towards its students. It is the intention of the district to take appropriate actions to prevent, correct, and if necessary, to discipline behavior which violates this policy.

B. Provide a work and academic environment free of sexual harassment.

C. Investigate allegations of sexual harassment in a timely and thorough way.

D. Take appropriate and timely corrective action with respect to information or allegations that employees or students are being subjected to sexual harassment in the work or academic environment.

E. Provide on-going education and awareness regarding sexual harassment. Sexual harassment is prohibited against members of the same sex as well as against members of the opposite sex.

F. Provide information about how to pursue claims of sexual harassment.

If someone at City College of San Francisco is making sexual advances towards you or is engaging in other forms of sexual harassment and you want that behavior to stop, you can contact one of the following for advice or information about your options:

Technology Learning Center grant will pay for departmental training

The State Chancellor's Office has awarded funding for the training of faculty and staff in the development technology skills. The TTIP/Technology Human Resources Fund supports departmental training activities for full-time and part-time administrative, faculty, and classified employees in the use of technology to improve instruction, services and operations of the College District. A total amount of \$20,000 is available for training projects completed during the period of July 1 to December 20, 2001.

Funding is available for technology training that is not offered by the Technology Learning Center, the Office of Professional Development's Flex program, the Library or ITS. The Technology Department Block Grant proposal can be submitted by an individual, but must benefit the department by offering training for software or equipment that is used by the department. The training may be for a group or an individual, who then will train others in the

department. The grant can be used to cover the costs of a trainer or purchase of tutorials or services that provide self-paced training. Funding may not be used to cover the costs of equipment, software and supplies other than self-paced tutorials.

The THRF Department Grant Application deadline is April 20, 2001, but we encourage early submissions so the TLC Coordinator will have time to review and clarify the proposal before it goes to the grant committee.
