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Chancellor Philip R. Day, Jr. Proclaims March as High School Outreach and Recruitment Month

Now more than ever, the citizens of San Francisco need the variety of classes, programs, and services offered by City College. Because of an increased number of graduation credits instituted by the San Francisco Unified School District, more than one-third of high school seniors are in danger of not graduating from high school this coming June. Beginning with the 2001-2002 Academic Year, tenth grade students will be required to pass the California High School Exit Exam mandated by Senate Bill 2X. Students who fail this examination will not be able to receive a high school diploma. Both of these factors have an impact on the graduation rate of San Francisco's high school students.

Through many of our programs which target high school students, namely, Concurrently Enrolled High School Students, Excel (X-L), Summer Bridge, the African American and Latino Scholars Programs, and other special collaborative programs with SFUSD, we know there are many high school students who are quite capable of doing college work. We need to continue to support these efforts by increasing enrollment in City College. This is why I have declared March as High School Outreach and Recruitment Month at CCSF. The following activities have been planned toward this effort:

Potential students will be able to receive **One-Stop Matriculation Services** on these **Saturdays: March 3, March 20, March 17, and March 31, from 8:10 A.M. to 3:30 P.M.** These services will include the following:

- Testing (English or English-as-a-Second Language, Math and/or Advanced Math)
- A Campus Tour
- Lunch
- Instant Test Results and New Student Orientation
- An Individual Counseling Session with a CCSF Counselor
- Special Early Registration
- A College Pak filled with school supplies to help get students started on the right track

CCSF's First Annual Counselors' Conference for counselors who work with high school students will be held on **Friday, March 16, from 8 A.M. to 2 P.M.**

The conference will present workshops on the following topics:

- Admissions and Records and Testing
- Financial Aid and Extended Opportunity Program and Services
- Counseling Services- General, Career Development and Placement Center, Disabled Students Program and Services and Transfer Center Activities

- CCSF Information Tables in the Cafeteria staffed with representatives from various CCSF departments will provide participants with more information about the College

The conference will also feature a panel of CCSF students who will address the statement: *Why I Chose City College of San Francisco.*

Saturday, March 24 is the **CCSF Family Day/Open House**, which will provide an opportunity for prospective students and their families to learn more about the opportunities provided by the College. For the convenience of the participants, presentations will be given simultaneously in English, Spanish, and Cantonese. This group will receive information on the following topics:

Facilities Review Committee

Minutes of the December 21, meeting.

The committee welcomed new student representative "Amy" Sau Man Yau.

Subcommittee Reports:

WORKS OF ART

The Olmsted Mural Restoration Project has been funded as follows:

\$13,500 from the Science Building (BUG)

\$ 2,000 from the Associated Students

An additional \$2,500 in Lab Aide funds is needed for Art Dept. students who will assist with the mural restoration project.

Peter Goldstein indicated that **Stephen Herman** should be able to re-allocate unspent funds from the Fall semester to the Art Dept. for the Spring. The Diego Rivera Mural Project group had a very busy, very successful semester.

PARKING & TRANSPORTATION

The committee received and discussed 8 P & T resolutions and made the following recommendations:

A. Part-time classified working less than 40 hours per week will be issued student parking stickers instead of PT faculty stickers; 20-25 parking spaces on campus will be opened up for faculty and staff. This will take effect Spring 2001.

B. Access to the reservoir should be widened and a pedestrian lane/path should be added. **Jerry DeGirolamo** was directed to review the Parking Fund budget for availability of funds; the Planning and Budget Committee would be approached next, if needed.

C. It was agreed that the dedicated parking space awarded to **James R. Hall** via the SEIU raffle this Fall finally be prepared for the Spring semester only. It was recommended that raffles for reserved parking spaces be discontinued.

D. Research into alternatives to speed bumps on Cloud Circle should be undertaken. The speed bumps are maintenance

intensive (they need paint every six months) and are a constant source of complaints. An additional stop sign on Cloud was recommended across from Creative Arts.

E. A pedestrian path for the B Lot is desperately needed. A study needs to be undertaken to find the right solution for a dangerous situation. Speed limit signs for 5 MPH along the B Lot to Gym road need to be put in place (there are currently 10 MPH signs along the road). Determine if there are adequate funds in the Parking Fund for this project.

F. There is a need for additional Parking Control Officers; however, the recommendation to add six new officers to the Public Safety Office might resolve the problem.

G. Reservoir lighting needs to be improved, especially in the South Reservoir; the recommendation again is to look to the Parking Fund for financial support. The various lighting projects on campus are also eligible for Bond money if the Parking Fund is bare.

H. The road between the Library/LRC and the Gyms was to be unpaved for one month; it has been unpaved for nine months. The civil engineer made a serious error in the design of the road and

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there is now a major disagreement between the contractor and the District over the status of the road, and how much it will cost to re-pave it. (Estimates range from \$100,000-\$230,000)

Suggestion from Parking & Transportation: 65% of the funds generated from parking tickets each year (\$100,000-\$150,000) currently return to the District General Fund; both unions include those funds during contract negotiations. If those funds were added to the Parking Fund, many of the issues listed above could be resolved. The committee agreed that it was unlikely that the destination of the parking ticket dollars could be/would be changed.

PARKING FEES

The FRC unanimously recommended that the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee develop a proposal during the Spring 2001 semester regarding charging faculty and staff a per semester parking fee. The fee could be paid via payroll deduction and would be valid for all District locations.

MISSION CAMPUS

Although there has been an EIR, and a lawsuit, and a ruling by the Historic Landmark board, both in favor of CCSE, the preservationists have requested a public hearing on this project. It is scheduled for January 10.

Trustee Milton Marks III plans to hold monthly 'open door' meetings

City College of San Francisco Chancellor Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr., has announced that Milton Marks III, member of the Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Community College District, has expressed interest in setting aside time one hour prior to the Closed Session period of each Board Meeting to meet with students, staff, and faculty members on issues pertaining to the District.

Mr. Marks will be available on a first-come, first-served basis.

The Board regularly meets on the fourth Thursday of each month.

FACILITIES OFFICE

A job announcement has gone out for a replacement for **Chuck Jackson**, who resigned in November. It is hoped that the position will be filled by March 1.

ADMINISTRATIVE REORGANIZATION

Dr. Day has proposed that a new Associate Vice Chancellor position be created. This person will report to Vice Chancellor Peter Goldstein. Buildings & Grounds, Custodial Services and Facilities Planning will report to the new Associate Vice Chancellor. Public Safety will also report directly to Vice Chancellor Goldstein.

CHINATOWN/NORTH BEACH

The lawsuit settlement required a preservation study of the Colombo building site and the recommendations are quite restrictive — all fixtures, toilets and skylights should be retained. Since the skylights are on the top of the existing building, third floor, and there will be multiple stories above the third floor, retention of the skylights will be challenging indeed. The burden is now on the District to determine what can really be integrated into the new building.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

As a result of a request in *City Currents* Peter Goldstein received approximately 30 requests for health and safety upgrades throughout the District. Fort Mason is currently a major health and safety priority for the District.

Noncredit Issues Subcommittee

Minutes of the December 4 meeting.

I. **Jane Sneed** reported on an update from Sacramento that **Leslie Smith** had prepared for her concerning the Budget Rewrite Proposal. The State Chancellor's Office is requesting an additional \$644 per FTES for the first six of the nine non-credit categories eligible for funding under the Education Code Section 84747: Parenting, Elementary and Secondary Basic Skills, ESL, Programs for Immigrants, Adults with Disabilities, Short-term Vocational. The three areas not included are Older Adults, Home Economics, Health and Safety.

II There was a discussion about a new Pre-registration form that was not adopted. The Campus Deans decided it was not workable because the needs of each campus are unique.

III. New Noncredit Application for Admission

A. The principal change to the application is the addition of an inquiry into the students' income level to comply with VTEA (Vocational) funding needs.

B. There were other changes the committee requested that were format changes and changes to enhance the clarity of the document.

C. It was moved to pass the new application form, then Seconded and Passed Unanimously: Resolved: the Noncredit Issues Committee approves the new Noncredit Application for Admission as corrected.

CCSF receives grant from Kurt Weill Foundation for Music

The Music and Theatre Arts Department has received a 2001 Performance Grant to support a production of the **Kurt Weill/Bertolt Brecht** musical *Happy End* this September, it was announced by the Kurt Weill Foundation for Music, Inc. in New York on February 1.

"This marks the fourth Weill Performance Grant received by CCSF, more than to any other college of university in the world," says **Don Cate**, CCSF Theatre Arts Department Chair. "Is this high quality education or what?"

The 1929 musical (rarely performed, this will be the first fully staged production in the Bay Area in over 25 years) has a plot remarkably similar to *Guys and Dolls* (in this case, Chicago gangster falls in love with Salvation Army lass) although it precedes **Frank Loesser's** work by nearly 20 years. Hit songs from the work include "Surabaya Johnny" and "The Ballad of Lilly of Hell."

Other 2001 Grant recipients include Minnesota Opera of Minneapolis, the Spier Arts Trust of South Africa and the Kurt Weill Gessellschaft of Dessau, Germany. College and University Performance Grants also went to The Cornish College of Music in Seattle, Cal State University Fullerton, Dennison University in Ohio and the Lycee Blaise-Cendrars in Switzerland. The University of Virginia received a separate grant to host a Weill Symposium on its campus.

Statewide mentoring program relocates to City College

The California Early Childhood Mentor Program moved to City College on February 1st. The Program, which provides training and financial support to early childhood educators who mentor college early childhood/child development students, started at Chabot College in 1988 with grants from the David and Lucile Packard Foundation and the United Way of the Bay Area. The success of the pilot attracted funding from the California Department of Education which now supports local mentoring programs at 70 California community colleges. The current annual budget of \$2.3 million comes from the Quality Improvement section of the Federal Child Care and Development Block Grant.

The Mentor Program pays annual stipends averaging \$1,700 to upwards of 600 early childhood educators for mentoring and professional development; thus providing career incentives in a profession which suffers from low pay and high staff turnover. City College has participated in the Mentor Program since 1996 under the able coordination of Child Development faculty member **Kathleen White**.

The Mentor Program also receives funding from the state Children and Families Commission (Proposition 10) through UC Berkeley's PACE (Policy Analysis for California Education) to develop innovative strategies for the improved recruitment and retention of early childhood educators.

I, Peyton Nattinger, an emeritus Chabot College early childhood faculty member, came to CCSF as Director of the program. **Linda Olivenbaum**, who has served as Assistant Director since 1996 will continue in that capacity at CCSF. Although temporarily located at 33 Gough St., the Mentor Program will move to the Phelan Avenue campus as soon as a new bungalow facility is complete.

A STATEMENT ON THE CREATIVE PROCESS AND JOURNALS

Creativity through art has been similar to a lifelong virus. I have been interested in the practice of Art and Design and the daily process of living through this method for as long as I can remember. Though other interests in the life such as family, all of the sciences, arts, humanities, computers and health have played a major interest in my life. I have known for as long as I can remember a plan to make fine and applied arts and related technologies a source of inspiration throughout my professional life.

I realized how serious I was about visual art around 13 years of age. I have exhibited, and practiced some form of art and design for the past 40 years but my strongest interest over the past 20 years and the means to support it through teaching at City College of San Francisco and private practice has been through works on paper. This includes a wide spectrum of options and opportunities.

I love the interest in my work that has led to and overlapped the daily process of recording through journals, journal supplements, drawings, illustrations and sketchbooks. These are the foundation for my creative energies. They allow me the chance to form sketches, ideas, develop photographic images and serve as a symbolic library of images that show up in my work. I also realize applaud and respect the chosen professions of all my colleagues in other disciplines. I recognize that their choices are just as important as mine is to me.

For over 30 years I have written or drawn in some form of daily journals. Each is a slice of both my life and the lives of those of whom I live and interact. They are a form of my life and a record of the physical and psychological influences that have inspired me. A wonderful thought is that journals and the multitude of forms of recording or experiences are not limited to the use of art and artists.

The daily process of journals also represent and reinforce my commitment to the creative practice, in drawing, painting, design, science and anthropology. I believe the journals show how the spiritual or the creative process has been nurtured in my life and has affected the life and lives around me.

I try to inspire everyone to become involved with this process because I think it is a very valuable asset to our development. One can regularly experience those moments that are most valuable to me and my family and friends as well as a reminder of what also went wrong or right from time to time. Sometimes this process is just like a mirror.

I believe that the only special talent needed to do this journal or sketchbook keeping experience is the ability to maintain the practice. There is no need to excel. There is only the need to pursue and to

Nomination process for Academic Senate Executive Council explained

Nominations are now open for the 2001-2003 term of office on the Executive Council of the Academic Senate. There are fourteen (14) vacancies, each of which are for two-year terms. Note: if any of the fifteen (15) members whose terms expire in Spring 2002 (see below) resign before the seating of the new Council, their term(s) will be completed by the runners up in this election, starting with the person ranked 15th in number of votes received and proceeding in order of decreasing vote number until all the vacant positions are filled.

Nominations for Council membership are made by petition (over for Petition form). Each petition must be endorsed by three (3) members of the Senate and must include the signed acceptance of the nominee. In addition to the petition, each nominee may include a statement of NO MORE than 25 words to be included with the ballot. Longer statements will be edited or omitted.

The following Council members will serve the second year of a two-year term during 2001-02:

The following Council members have served two consecutive terms and are ineligible to run: **Raymond J. Berard** (Auto/Trade), **Lauri Fried-Lee** (ESL), **Alvin Randolph** (Counseling)

Candidates should be aware of the following provisions of the Constitution.

ART III (Constitution): The Council shall consist of 29 members elected at large, subject to the following provision: that no more than three Senate members from a department, as defined in the Bylaws, shall serve on the Council at one time, except ESL, which shall have no more than six.

ART IV (Constitution): A candidate for membership on the Council must be nominated by written petition of three Senate members and must accept the nomination in writing on the petition. For public information, petitions will be posted at the Academic Senate office on the day they are received. The balloting must be completed at least four weeks before the end of the semester.

If at the time for nominations to close, the number of candidates does not equal twice the number of vacancies to be filled, the Council or the Election Commission shall postpone balloting one week, during which time additional candidates may be nominated upon the written petition of one Senate member and the written acceptance of the candidate. The postponed balloting shall then take place regardless of the number of candidates.
