Electronics program opens doors to Silicon Valley

City College of San Francisco's Electronic Engineering Technology Program, part of its Engineering and Technology Department, is considered one of the top such programs in the area. Students receive training for employment through instruction in digital/microprocessor and communication electronics. Many graduates of the program have become engineers, highly experienced technicians, and teachers.

"Training at CCSF has become invaluable in helping students find jobs in Silicon Valley," says **Ray Lew** a 1971 CCSF graduate, who is a mechanical engineer with Lucent Technologies. "After recruiting and working with dozens of students from City College, I am convinced that CCSF provides a good foundation. It is the fundamental training that enables the students to survive in the industry." Lew attended grade school in Hong Kong and high school in San Francisco before attending City

College. Lew worked 10 years as a technician, and 14 years as a supervisor at Hewlett-Packard, where he also recruited technicians. Two years ago, while working in research on the wireless broadband network, Lew and his department was

acquired by Lucent Technologies. His mission was to rebuild the department, and was responsible for hiring technicians for this purpose. Lew recruited from several area community colleges. "The Industry [Engineering] is usually several years ahead of college programs," said Lew, "yet I observed that students from City College had received training that made it possible for them to survive in the business. Some have become engineers."

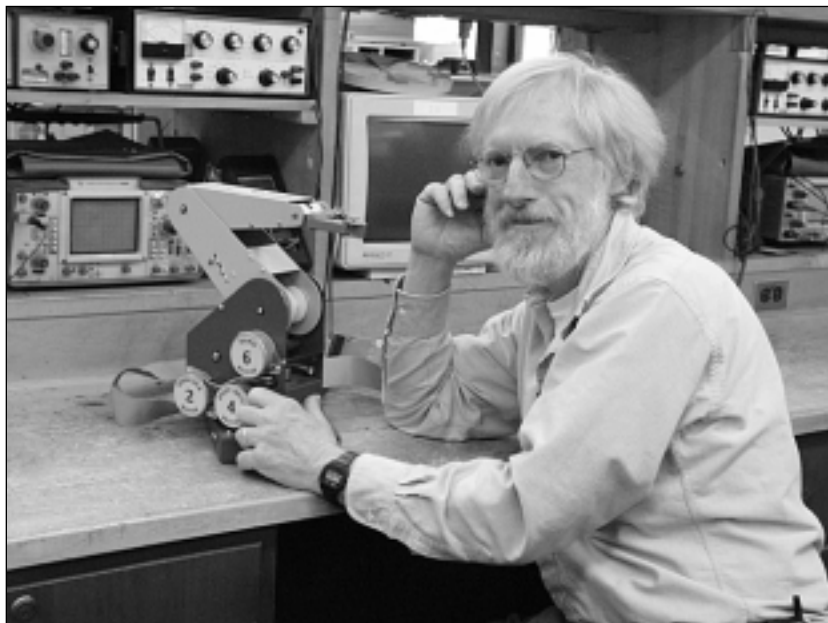

"The Electronics Program at City College is an incredible learning opportunity," says **Hans van Belle**, a recent graduate from electronics technology. Van Belle worked as a waiter at a San Francisco hotel for 18 years. In 1995, he decided to

work part time and devote full time to his college education. Van Belle enrolled in the Electronic Engineering Program at City College. On a class field trip to Hewlett-Packard, he met Ray Lew, and indicated he would like to work there. Van Belle graduated in 2000 with an A.S. and certificates in Analog and Digital Electronics, and secured an interview with the recruiter, Ray Lew for a position at Lucent Technologies. Five hours and five interviews later, Van Belle was

hired. He is presently an Associate Engineer at Lucent Technologies, where he works with Ray Lew on the wireless broadband network project. According to van Belle, the main requirement to complete the CCSF program is a willingness and a desire to keep on learning.

"There are well paying jobs in Silicon Valley for students who complete our program," according to **Rich Brongel**, an electronic technology instructor at CCSF. "High tech is an open field for those with the right skills, and City College can provide those skills."

Brongel also graduated from CCSF in May 1975 with an A.A. degree in Engineering. He received his B.A. degree in Physical Science from San Francisco State University. As

an instructor at City College, Brongel takes his classes on field trips to Hewlett-Packard arranged through his former CCSF classmate, Ray Lew. Brongel has worked in the electronic technology field

Shared governance update

College Advisory Council

1. Reports from the Communication Committee Chairs

Francine Podenski, the chair of the Communication Committee, (CC) gave a follow up report on the status of the "New Look of the CCSF Home Page" on the request of the Council. Podenski explained to the Council the collaboration between CC and the Information Technology Policy Committee (ITPC) regarding the CCSF Internet system. The ITPC is responsible for the architecture of the Internet and the computer user policy, which is more in line of the everyday work of the ITS department. The CC responsible for the web-design which is more in line of the responsibilities of the Marketing Office. **Joe Jah**, member of the communication committee and ITS staff, presented the new CCSF homepage. There were several changes requested to be made to the homepage. Podenski, Jah, and the CC was asked to work out the details of recommendations and improvements so the web page could be presented to the CAC again in April. The current homepage will remain until the final approval from the CAC possibly in May. The Communication Committee was commended for its work on the project.

2. Shared Governance Issues

A. College Diversity Committee

The only appointments for the College Diversity Committee that remained to be finalized were the student appointments. The first meeting of the College Diversity Committee should take place in late February or early March.

3. CCSF Catalog

Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, the chair of the Council asked the council to examine the possibility of having the CCSF Catalog printed every other year. The question that came up during the discussion of the topic was; would every other year pub-

lishing result in savings for the college. To further discuss the topic, **Attila Gabor** was asked to invite the management in charge of the budget of the CCSF Catalog to the next Council meeting.

4. Classified Staff Development Day

Earlier in the semester, the Classified Staff Development Day was offered which focused on issues and topics targeting to the classified staff. **Athena Steff** and **Alice Shvarts**, the two organizers of the event, gave feed back on the activities and participation. The Development Day turned out to be a great success showing that there was a clear demand to continue it.

Phyllis G. McGuire has been appointed Associate Vice Chancellor of Workforce & Economic Development. Under the direction of the Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs, she is responsible for providing leadership to the 100 occupational programs at City College to meet the needs of students whose education must equip them for both the present and future labor markets. Vice Chancellor McGuire oversees the development and strategic planning of current projects in workforce training and economic development. McGuire also heads up the School of Applied Science and Technology and is the Dean of City College's Evans Campus, which includes Administration of Justice/Fire Science, Aeronautics, Apprenticeship, Automotive/Trade Skills Technology, Consumer Arts & Sciences, Environmental Horticulture/Floristry, Hospitality, Hotel and Restaurant, and Labor Studies Departments.

"I've worked with a number of individuals across the country whose jobs are focused on areas of workforce and economic development," says Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, City College Chancellor. "In my judgment, this District has one of the hardest working and enlightened practitioners currently in the field of community college education throughout the United States. Phyllis McGuire is the best of the best."

Prior to accepting the position as Associate Vice Chancellor, McGuire served as CCSF's Dean of the School of Applied Science and Technology and Vocational Education. She also served as Vocational Education Coordinator developing and implementing a vocational education master plan for an urban community college with about 93 vocational programs serving 40,000 full- and part-time students at nine campuses.

During 1989/1990, McGuire served as Chair of the Hotel and Restaurant (H&R) Department, leading a department

Phyllis McGuire received her M.A. in Education Administration from the University of California, Berkeley, specializing in Higher Education for Community College Leaders. Her B.S. in Education is from Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan. She also holds a lifetime credential as a California Community College Instructor.

Involved in her community of San Rafael, she has served as trustee for Dixie Elementary School District since 1997. She is also affiliated with numerous organizations and associations, such as the National Council of Occupational Education, and is a member of the Statewide Committee on Vocational Education directed by the Office of the State Chancellor.

Ohlone College, and has been director of financial aid at Antioch University West and also at Ohlone College. As an EOPS counselor at City College, Jenkins planned and developed EOPS Intake components. He counseled and facilitated university admission for incarcerated ex-offenders as a financial aid counselor at San Francisco State University. Jenkins also supervised and directed a \$6 million Guaranteed Student Loan Program at 34 off-campus locations in 11 states as a financial aid counselor at Golden Gate University.

Jenkins was part of the implementation team that participated in The Collaborative for College Access, a national project to increase access to higher education for youth who will be the first generation in their families to attend college. The Education Resources Institute (TERI) started the project in 1995 with a major grant from the De Witt Wallace-Reader's Digest Fund. Jenkins along with others on the team have opened a main Access Center in San Francisco with plans to move to Hunter's Point, Excelsior and other communities. He is also involved in various community service organizations. Each year, he participates in the Oakland Black Expo, where he does a one day college education seminar for parents and students.

Jenkins does community outreach with the educational ministry of the Acts Full Gospel Church in East Oakland. He holds a B.A. in Sociology and a M.S. in College Student Personnel Administration from Indiana University in Bloomington.

I. CALL TO ORDER

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 2:47 P.M.

II. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

The agenda was adopted as amended without objection.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of February 7 were approved as amended without objection.

IV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Southeast Campus Dean Veronica Hunnicutt welcomed Council to her campus, and President Ophelia Clark thanked her for the generous refreshments. Clark asked Council members eligible for reelection to submit their materials as soon as possible. She announced also that, in celebration of Black History month, Dr. Grace Carroll will speak in the Pierre Coste Room. Senate members Bonnie Gratch, Michael Kelly, Brian Lym, and Madeline Mueller, and Curriculum Dean Brian Ellison are currently attending the Information Competency hearings at Diablo Valley College. The State Academic Senate's Vocational Education Seminar will be held March 23 and 24 in Santa Cruz.

Council member Berard announced that on Monday, February 26, the librarians and he at John Adams Campus will be hosting video presentations in honor of Black History month.

Council member Verdugo announced that the Cesar Chavez Breakfast will be held on Friday, March 30, and the Cesar Chavez March will start at 11 a.m. on Saturday, March 31. She encouraged faculty to participate.

Council member Podenski encouraged faculty to give department chairs their input on the new Educational Technology Plan.

V. OFFICERS' REPORTS

A. President

President Ophelia Clark reported that the 65th Anniversary Committee is continuing to work with the Hotel and Restaurant Operation Department. The event will be held in the City Hall Rotunda on Wednesday, April 25. The tickets will cost \$100.

B. First Vice President

First Vice President David Yee reported that the Banner Advisory Committee met the week of February 12. There are still two faculty slots available. Yee was elected chair of the Committee. The Committee's name will be changed to the Administrative Applications Advisory Committee.

C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Susan Lopez reported that she has been following up with Chancellor Day on the Council resolution to assess the implementation status of the Strategic Plan. Day has acknowledged that Council's concerns are valid. In response, he has told Senate officers that he will now suggest postponing the drafting of a new Strategic Plan until about June 2002, when the results of the Educational Master Plan, the Enhanced Self-Study, and the 2001 Bond

Initiative will be known. The new timeline would also facilitate the evaluation of both the Strategic and Annual Plans.

Lopez reported also that CCSF met the February 1 deadline for submitting to the State the plans for the new Mission Campus building. The team is currently improving the design of façade, and is discussing the interior with the historical preservation architect. Lopez is pursuing the possibility of adding such environmental elements as windows that open, and solar panels on the roof. The newspaper *El Tecolote* ran a favorable cover story about the new building, emphasizing the services the Campus will provide to the neighborhood.

VI. SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS: WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION, JULIO RAMOS, TRUSTEE

the Thai border with a former university professor who’s now a wanted man. The film is set against the backdrop of Burma’s struggle for democracy led by **Aung San Suu Kyi**, whose courageous efforts won her the Nobel Peace Prize in 1991.

The Killing Fields, Thursday, March 22, 12:45 P.M., Rosenberg Library, Room 304. A superb and intense drama about the real-life relationship between New York Times reporter **Sidney Schanberg** and his Cambodian assistant **Dith Pran**. The film is a realistic depiction of the horror and atrocities in Cambodia when it was ruled by the ruthless Khmer Rouge, under whose regime 1.7 million Cambodians lost their lives. The film won three Academy Awards and was nominated for Best Picture.

This critically acclaimed Japanese anti-war animated feature was directed by **Keiji Nakazawa** who was 6-years-old in August 1945 when the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, killing most of his family. The film is a semi-autobiographical account of the director’s real-life experience before, during, and after the blast that took the lives of more than 70,000 Japanese civilians in less than one minute. The film is in Japanese with English subtitles.
