City College of San Francisco will celebrate 65 years of excellence on **Wednesday April 25** with the *Wok on the Wild Side* fundraising event at San Francisco City Hall. The festivities in the Rotunda and Light Courts will get underway at 6 P.M.

Among special guests will be San Francisco Mayor **Willie L. Brown, Jr.** **Narsai David** of KCBS Radio will be the event's Roving Chef, introducing participating restaurateurs to guests and calling the closing bids to the Silent Auction.

The feast will feature taste treats from dining boutiques like Anzou (Hotel Nikko), Millennium, Mandarin, Hyde Street Bistro, Crown Plaza, St. Regis, Savannah Grill, Mark Hopkins and Hilton Hotels.

Chef **Selu Garcia** of the Mandarin will feature a smoked tea duck breast, while the Crown Plaza will do Italian antipasti. Chef **Eric Tucker** of the Millennium will provide the vegetarian dish, Plantain Tort. The Hyde Street Bistro, which is co-owned by CCSF pastry chef **Betty Marcon** will feature a dessert buffet. **Patrick Walsh** of La Scene Cafe & Bar will prepare one his specialties.

Kendall-Jackson Winery will host a wine pairing educational seminar, and there will be tea tasting by TAZO.

Entertainment will include songs from *West Side Story* presented by the CCSF Music and Theatre Arts departments.

Johnnie Carter named to fill vacancy on Board of Trustees

San Francisco Mayor **Willie L. Brown, Jr.**, has appointed **Johnnie Carter** to the San Francisco Community College District Board of Trustees. Carter, who was sworn in on Tuesday, April 10, replaces **Robert E. Burton** who died.

"Clearly, with Johnnie Carter's experience in and passion for California community colleges, we are delighted with the quality of the appointment by Mayor Brown," said CCSF Chancellor Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.** "Johnnie Carter's demonstrated commitment to California community colleges can only enhance his role as a Board member for City College of San Francisco."

Carter is employed as the California State Senate Education Liaison and works as a Legislative Aide to State Senator John Burton (D-San Francisco). He is attending law school at the University of San Francisco.

"The opportunity to serve is one that I look forward to," said Carter to *City Currents*. Carter had sought election to the Board, which oversees policy for City College of San Francisco, in November 2000. He finished a strong fifth in the 13-person contest, garnering 64,383 votes. His top priorities, as provided to the Smart Voter website of the League of Women Voters California were:

- Maximize funding from federal and state sources to improve educational quality while expanding student enrollment.

- Prepare students for the current and future job markets by expanding partnerships with private industries.
- Increase student access to educational resources such as computer technologies and counseling.

Carter pointed out to the League that he coordinated the successful efforts for both securing \$900,000 targeted for City College and the expansion of Cal Grant funding. He also serves as a board member of the Bayview Opera House, African American Historical and Cultural Society, and the Thad Brown Boys Academy.

All City College campuses celebrate anniversary

The celebration of “65 years of excellence” at City College of San Francisco (CCSF), the largest multi-campus community college district in the nation, is offering an opportunity to showcase CCSF’s varied and unique programs.

Each of City College’s campuses plans to host a free open house and tour during the week of April 23rd to April 28th. The campus deans are encouraging the community to attend, so they can see first-hand their innovative and affordable educational programs.

The Downtown Campus (800 Mission St. at Fourth St.) tour on **Thursday, April 26** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON, features its business and hospitality programs, like Educated Palate, a student-run restaurant. The highlight of the morning will be a 10 A.M. panel discussion with former Downtown Campus students who now have jobs in the electronics industry and with representatives from a number of high-tech companies.

“The purpose is to give students some information about what they need to do to prepare themselves to work for technically related companies,” says Dean **Steven Glick**.

With approximately 34,000 students, the Ocean Avenue/Phelan Campus is the most populated. Among activities planned for **Friday, April 27** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON is a tour of the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library/Learning Resource Center to showcase some of its impressive features like video conferencing, an archives room, electronic reference service, full-text periodical database, media center, special collections, and a language center with software for e-mailing in foreign languages.

Mission Campus Dean **Carlota del Portillo** will offer brief tours of the present facility (106 Bartlett St.) **Tuesday**,

April 24 from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON. On display will be architectural photographs of the proposed future building on Mission Street.

Dean **Joanne Low** of the Chinatown/North Beach Campus (940 Filbert St.) invites visitors to take a “self-guided walking tour” **Tuesday, April 24** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON. Guests will receive a schedule and sit in on classes such as citizenship, literacy, English as a Second Language (ESL) computer lab and a vocational office training lab.

The John Adams Campus (located at the old Lowell High School site, 1860 Hayes St.) will encourage guests to tour the School of Health which offers programs in Emergency Medical Tech, Cardiovascular Tech, Vocational Nursing Program, Pharmacy Tech and the High Tech Computer lab. The tours are set for **Monday, April 23** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON.

Dean **Linda Grohe** points out that she “wants the public to come in and see our programs. The John Adams campus is a wonderful San Francisco institution.”

Plans for the Airport Campus Open House (San Francisco International Airport, Building 928) feature exciting tours of different shops in the hanger, where visitors can see carburetion, propellers, reciprocating engines and jet engines. Classroom visits and a look at old airplanes will be included **Tuesday, April 24** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON.

“To serve the workforce and economic development of the community is a prime goal of the Evans Campus,” says Dean **Phyllis McGuire**. We have grown to 3,000 students since we started only five years ago — a dramatic growth. Located in a site now owned by the college, Dean McGuire continues, “Both credit and noncredit classes are offered with emphasis in the construction and skilled trades.” The Evans Campus tour

will be held **Monday, April 23** from 6 to 8 P.M.

Bruce Smith, Dean of the Castro/Valencia Campus, looks forward to welcoming visitors on **Saturday, April 28** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON. This City College campus provides weekday evening and Saturday morning classes featuring foreign languages, music, theater, health and gay/lesbian studies.

Dean **Veronica Hunnicutt** is pleased to invite the community to Southeast Campus (1800 Oakdale Ave.) which offers programs in community health as well as a general education curriculum. The Southeast Open House will be **Tuesday, April 24** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON.

City College’s Alemany Campus (750 Eddy St.) is also scheduling tours, says Dean **Gary Tom**. The Open House will be **Thursday, April 26** from 10 A.M. to 12 NOON. “It is a campus where 95% of the courses offered are in ESL,” Tom points out.

Speech and debate team takes 3rd at state championship

The CCSF Speech and Debate Team earned a third place Sweepstakes award in the Limited Entry category at the California Community College Forensics Association State Championship on March 14-18.

Paul Garcia and **Todd Kern** earned bronze medals in Oral Interpretation of Prose. There were 65 students entered in the prose event.

Maya DeVerte earned a bronze medal in Oral Interpretation of Poetry. There were 35 students entered in the poetry event. "The really impressive part of Maya's success is that it was her first tournament with the CCSF team," said **Cynthia Dewar**, CCSF Director of Forensics.

Jed Wheeler earned a bronze medal in impromptu Speaking. He was competing against 114 other students. "I really admire Jed because of his novel approach," explains **Sami Kudsi**, Assistant Forensics Coach. "He uses his anarchy paradigm to analyze the topics he is given in both debate and impromptu. Jed is an anarchist in the tradition of **Noam Chompsky**, not **Sid Vicious**. He is one of the most well-read students we have ever had. For Jed it is not just a speech contest, but a training ground for creating a better democracy." Jed and his debate partner, Maya, won three of their six Parliamentary Debate rounds. There were 85 debate duos entered in the event.

The tournament featured 28 other community colleges from throughout California. In the Limited Entry category, there were 10 other schools.

Phyllis McGuire speaks at S.F. 911 Center dedication

"Under development today, the program links our own 9-1-1 training to the college. This program is designed to encourage career choice and career opportunity in emergency communications.

"Growth and changes in emergency communications due to technology advancements, community expectations and public safety response reliance on our communication professionals makes this program vitally important today," continued McGuire.

"She added, "City College of San Francisco's 9-1-1- Program is the key to attracting and retaining quality 9-1-1 professionals to public service. With over 6,000 9-1-1 centers in the United States, the program will be the example to which other communities aspire."

Patricia Mitchell recognized as 'Local Hero' by KQED

Patricia Mitchell, ESL Instructor, was selected by Channel 9 television station KQED as one of five outstanding women from the Bay Area to be honored as Local Heroes during Women's History Month. AmeriCorps members staff booths at Cesar Chavez Day celebration

Each AmeriCorps Program was assigned a theme for their booth from among the ten values that **Cesar Chavez** lived by. CCSF's AmeriCorps value was "Tolerance and Multiculturalism. There were two interactive, educational activities to engage children who visited the booth. An ESL teacher at the University of San Francisco in his other life, McGoldrick managed to throw in lessons on U.S. history, cross-cultural customs and civics vocabulary.

Dr. Andrew Jaffe talks of 'Measuring the Universe' at free astronomy lecture

The Astronomy Department will host a free lecture and Star Party on **Friday, April 27** from 2:30 to 3:30 P.M. in Room 305 of the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center. Dr. **Andrew Jaffe** of the UC Berkeley Center for Particle Astrophysics will talk about *Thoroughly Modern Measurements of the Density and Curvature of the Universe*.

The Star Party will be held in Science Hall, 4th floor from 7:30 to 9:30 P.M. The Star Party is the Astronomy Department's Open House. The Observatory opening may be cancelled due to poor viewing conditions.

Jaffe writes: "In the past decade, the cosmic microwave background (CMB) has become an observational tool for studying the early universe in great detail. I will first outline the impact of recent data from the MAXIMA and BOOMERANG experiments. In particular, these results measure the geometry of the Universe, and, when combined with other cosmological observations, begin to pin down

its constituents: baryons, dark matter, and, to the chagrin of us theorists, something very like a cosmological constant. I will also talk about what else the CMB can teach us, as we finally measure its polarization, and as we peer at it with ever-higher resolution and sensitivity, opening windows on both the very early universe and the epoch of galaxy formation."

Jaffe is currently an assistant research physicist, furthering his postdoctorate research at the Center for Particle Astrophysics/Astronomy at UC Berkeley. He received his B.S. in Astronomy and Physics from Yale in and his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago, working with **Josh Frieman** and **Mike Turner**, after which he went on to conduct his post-doctoral research at CITA from 1993-1996.

Robyn Kapp, another history major, calls the mural "extremely intertextual" and thinks it can be "a visual spring-board for fostering discussions within many different disciplines." Speaking of studio arts, she says, "It's amazing that we can get so close to the brush strokes produced by the hand of such a great artist!" Among the classes for which she thinks it could be used are art history, history of the US, and Latin American history—especially pre-Columbian—and theatre arts. Ghee Phua, studying Studio Arts, suggests including Rivera's mural as a study of a piece of art work for an art history class, and **Maria Tenreiro** suggests using it for US history classes, modern art history classes, and drawing classes. "Most people think artwork belongs in museums," says **Brenda Kong**, a student assistant for **Diana Scott**, from whom she first learned about the mural. "However, many people do not know that we have a work of art at CCSF. I would like more people to know about this mural."

The other docents concur. "The most amazing thing about this mural is that it truly inspires its viewers to be intellectually curious," says **Robyn Kapp**. She goes on to say, "I'm very impressed to see such wonderful collaboration among students, faculty, and the administrative staff. It demonstrates the power behind this mural, which for many years was overlooked. This {new focus} is a great statement about the strong intellectual environment at CCSF today. It really is one of the best city colleges in the state."
