SF Forum selects Lou Batmale

Dr. **Louis Batmale** was honored as "San Franciscan of the Year" by the San Francisco Forum at a banquet in his honor on May 4, 2001 in the cafeteria at 50 Phelan Avenue. Former City College Trustee **Chuck Ayala** made the presentation. Former CCSF Trustee Robert Varni was Master of Ceremony.

Dr. Batmale is best known for having served as the first Chancellor of the San Francisco Community College District, which later became City College of San Francisco. He served from 1970-1977.

Following graduation from the University of San Francisco, he earned Masters and a Doctorate from the University of California, Berkeley. His life has been dedicated to the creation of learning opportunities for generations of San Franciscans.

Batmale's teaching career included St. Ignatius High School, Commerce High School and Galileo High School in San Francisco.

The San Francisco Forum was established in 1975 as an organization to uphold and preserve the great traditions of the City of San Francisco through educational, social, and cultural activities, and to provide a Forum for discussion in these areas.

CONCLUDES 65TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

West Side Story gala June 1

The opening night of **Leonard Bernstein's** *West Side Story* at the Diego Rivera Theatre will feature a fundraising reception as the final event of City College of San Francisco's year-long celebration of the 65th anniversary of its founding.

The June 1 evening event will begin with a pre-theatre hors d'ouvres in the Art Department Gallery, move to the Diego Rivera Theatre for the 8 P.M. performance, and return to the gallery at intermission for dessert. A \$65 donation (in honor of CCSF's 65 years) includes admission for up to two people to the show, plus the pre-theatre and intermission receptions. Proceeds from the benefit will be used for arts scholarships.

West Side Story is a re-telling of Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* re-set in the Spanish Harlem of the 1950s. It is directed by **Jose Luis Leiva** (stage) and **Michael Shahani** (music), with choreography by **Dean Loombas**. The CCSF Theatre Arts and Music Departments co-production features a cast of more than 40 CCSF students as well as a full orchestra.

Shared governance update

College Advisory Council

I. Reports from the CAC Committee Chairs:

There was no report given by the CAC Committee Chairs.

II. Shared Governance Issues

A. College Diversity Committee

The first College Diversity Committee meeting is scheduled for March 6. At the next College Advisory Council meeting there will be a presentation given by the chair/appointee of the College Diversity Committee, on their first meeting.

B. Minutes and Attendance of Committees

There is a concern about the attendance of committee meetings, taking minutes and providing these minutes to the Office of Shared Governance for further dissemination. To better track the attendance the following suggestion was made. Since the minutes in some cases take long time to reach the Office of Shared Governance, a sign up sheet should be distributed at the beginning of the meeting and forwarded to the Office of Shared Governance at the end of the meeting. The issue of providing minutes in a timely fashion will be addressed at a later time.

C. Parking and Transportation Subcommittee - Parking Fee

The December 21 minutes of the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee raised the issue of taking away some of the parking rights of classified staff working less the 40 hours a week and charge the full time faculty and the classified staff for parking. As these are issues that are part of the contract negotiating the Council members wanted to make sure that the topic will not be discussed in the shared governance system as it does not belong there.

III. California Community Colleges 2002-2003 Budget Process and Timeline

Dr. Philip R. Day Jr., spoke on the process and updated the council with the latest information. The only bump in the process and timeline was that the District will not be able to meet the timeline for

the "District Input and Concept Papers" that are due to Sacramento by April 13. As Chancellor Day is on the PCB task force he will be able to provide further information for the council on the development of the budget at a later time. The concern of a decrease in the state budget was raised, but it was too early to know if it will affect the Community Colleges.

IV. CCSF Catalog

Brian Ellison and Don Newton attended the meeting to provide additional information regarding the CCSF Catalog. The Council learned that all the costs associated with the catalog are recovered from the sales of the catalog. However, some criticism was raised such as the catalog should be more student friendly. The content of the catalog should be also less confusing, and the pictures should be relevant to the content of the page. It was suggested that a focus group, with 10-12 people, should be created that would take a look at the catalog and provide additional feedback to the appropriate Dean(s). It was also suggested that an ad hoc working group be created under the Shared Governance Communications Committee to explore ways to further improve the catalog.

Facilities Review Committee

Minutes of the committee's April 4 meeting.

David Liggett was introduced as the new Director of Facilities. His official start date is next week.

I. Subcommittee Reports

A. Works of Art

Julia Bergman reported on several projects with major facilities components: the Olmsted Mural Restoration project needs to have tight coordination and planning discussions now to make sure that the plumbing project is finished before August, and that lighting and railing requirements are also in place before the project begins. **Caroline Soo Hoo** is the contact in the Facilities Office.

There has been a request to get the Diego Rivera Theater cleaned up. The Lobby and the exterior of the building need paint, the doors look horrible, the banner is hanging by a thread on the light pole. There are many more people coming to see the mural and the place looks horrendous. The Theater BUG has paint for the building on its Prop A list; it is hoped that this project will be funded, and happen before June.

A consultant has been hired by the District to help plan for and implement an expanded exhibits program, which will link art to the curriculum and integrate it into the lives of our students. Three display cases from the Rosenberg Atrium will be relocated to the Art Dept., the Rivera Theater Lobby, and the Lobby of the Downtown Campus. Eventually, exhibit space will be identified in as many District locations as possible.

B. Parking and Transportation

Since **Jerry DeGirolamo** did not apply for a seat on the FRC in time for a re-appointment to the committee, there is currently no representative from Parking and Transportation on this committee. Julia Bergman will contact the Chair to have their minutes forwarded to the FRC.

C. Facilities Projects

The new Chair, **Sunny Clark**, reported that several issues came before the group

at the meeting on Monday, April 2: the need for campus and district-wide signage (this has been known for a very long time and hopefully will be addressed if the November bond measure passes); the status of funds for landscaping, originally to be considered by each BUG for Prop A funding; house construction on Marston Ave.; the College received notice of intent to build about one year ago and City permits have been issued for the construction. Several people have expressed concerns about run-off and drainage from the site.

CCSF Facilities Master Plan

Peter Goldstein introduced the draft of a revised plan for review by the committee. A revised Facilities Master Plan will be submitted to the SF Planning Commission in the very near future as a step to assure them that the College has a clear plan that matches the request for the voters to approve a substantial bond measure this Fall.

Changes and modifications, large and small, recommended by the committee: Move the Mission Statement and Vision Statements closer to the front of the document.

Reinforce statement on p.28, Initial Planning Concepts, about the College commitment to user input and participation in the facilities planning and implementation process.

Move the Main Campus plan from the Appendix to be the first item after History, under the heading: Campuses; then follow in alphabetical order the others as listed on the Table of Contents, p.3. Replace the Main Campus section on p.18 as noted above. Carefully check language and details in the p.18-19 section for inclusion in the new Main Campus document. For example, the Appendix currently addresses planning concepts, but does not mention specific buildings or important elements such as the inclusion of Student Health in the new Community Health and Wellness Center, does not mention the Center for Pan American Studies, and so on. The Appendix currently mentions the Phelan

Campus, which should be changed.

The map in the Appendix does not match the map by KMD. Get the electronic file of the current Main Campus map from the Public Relations Office, or Graphic Communications, and clean everything up. Order: Executive Summary, Mission Statement, Vision, History, Education Plan. Add maps for new Mission and Chinatown/North Beach Campuses. Delete Robert Burton from the title page. Delete 31-33 Gough address for the administrative services building.

Warehouse: add Carroll Avenue address. Review and clarify all pagination. Delete last sentence of p.3 Executive Summary Use real spiral binding; add tabs

The committee endorsed the document, with changes, by consensus; it will be reviewed again in the Fall.

District Order of Priority for Proposed Projects

After extensive discussion, it was agreed that the following changes would be recommended:

Merge Community Cultural, Performing & Media Arts Complex with Balboa Reservoir Infrastructure Construction
Delete Window Replacement since this will certainly be a part of every building remodeling project.

Remove Child Care from the Student Services Project and add it to the Academic Joint Use Facility

The recommended priority of projects is:

1. Mission Campus
2. Chinatown/North Beach Campus
3. Community Health & Wellness Center
4. ADA Barrier Removal — District
5. Academic Joint Use Facility
6. Community Cultural, Performing & Media Arts Complex with Balboa Reservoir Infrastructure & Parking
7. Student Services & Administrative Services
8. Center for Pan American Studies
9. Remodel John Adams Campus
10. Remodel Alemany Campus
11. Remodel Downtown Campus
12. Remodel Science Building
13. Remodel Arts Buildings

- 14. Airport Campus Equipment
- 15. Remodel Evans Campus
- 16. Remodel Cloud Hall-Phase 2
- 17. Property Acquisition Adjacent to Main Campus

This revised list was recommended by consensus.

Bond Summary

Peter Goldstein reviewed all of the projects recommended for inclusion in the bond measure. The Renovation package is in two parts with basic building structure as one section and general aesthetic upgrades (paint, blinds, floors for each building) as the second part. The Renovation and Remodeling of Aging Facilities is listed at \$53,610,000.

It was suggested that additional language such as "Bungalow Replacement" be added to the line item description for the Joint Use Academic Facility and to the Community Performing, Cultural & Media Arts Center.

Adding housing to the bond measure has been requested by some students and their faculty advisor. After discussion by the committee it was agreed that housing needs to be addressed, but not as a part of this bond measure.

Issues:

The current \$285 million is absolutely at the upper limit of what the voters can be asked to support.

The Balboa Reservoir site is the ONLY site available to the College for the completion of the Main Campus. The State is horrified by the thought that the College would use land directly adjacent to the campus for anything other than academic purposes.

During three of four City-wide elections in 1986, 1987, 1988 and 1991 the voters rejected proposals to place housing on the Balboa Reservoir site (1987, 1988, 1991).

The facilities proposed for the West Campus will serve thousands and thou-

sands of students each semester. Housing on the Balboa Reservoir site would only serve a very few students.

The College should be apart of a broader effort, perhaps in partnership with San Francisco State, to identify locations for student housing throughout the City. Student housing could be near other CCSF campuses, or SF State.

The committee voted by consensus to support the bond measure as currently proposed and not to include housing.

Enhanced Self-Study: a work in progress

The Ad Hoc Committees of the Enhanced Self-Study initiated in the fall have made considerable progress over the past eight months. With over 160 faculty, staff and students involved, discussion has focused on the challenges and opportunities presented by pre-registration and matriculation, pre-college learning, and college level learning, with special attention given to the development of enrollment management tools and the assessment of student learning outcomes. During many meetings, participants have examined the available data, analyzed the current design of programs and services, considered a variety of "best practices" here and elsewhere, and identified areas that require further development. It is these select areas that are now the focus of a growing body of recommendations, many of which are still under development, and several of which have come forward for approval.

Four specific recommendations that have come from the Enrollment Management Tools Ad Hoc Committee co-chaired by **Terry Hall** and **Agatha Panday** address technological enhancements to our current information system:

- **A Banner Users Needs Team** to assist in modifying Banner to "make it better suited to the informational needs of end users," an effort that is designed to assist department chairs, deans and other users with the systems in use in the operation of their units to better serve students.

Prop A Update

The original cost estimating for projects included in the Prop A bond measure was done in 1995/96 and prices have escalated since then. For example, the original price estimate for the replacement of the Main Campus fire alarm system was \$1 million, it will actually cost \$2 million. The District is recommending that health and safety projects be completed first, before funds are expended for renovation or aesthetic upgrades. If the new bond measure passes in November, renovation projects will be covered.

- **A CCSF Web Portal** to establish communications via the Internet, a sort of "Campus Commons" for students, staff, alumni and visitors that will provide students access to their academic records, instructors, counselors and classmates via a virtual learning community.

- **A Student ID Smart Card** to provide all students with access to the library, to various services such as counseling, health, etc., and to the bookstore, while also establishing an automated attendance reporting system for the noncredit area, to increase student convenience and self-esteem.

- **DAR: A Degree Audit Report** has been recommended as a component of the information system to be used by students as a road map for their academic career with easy access to all of the information they will need to graduate and transfer.

Each of these recommendations has been approved by the Ad Hoc Coordinating Council of the enhanced Self-Study and will now be sent forward to the Academic Senate. In the interim, the Coordinating Council is continuing its deliberation of the 13 additional recommendations it has received to date, anticipating the receipt of more before the end of the semester.

Robert L. Seward recognized for contributions to Rivera archives

Robert L. Seward, former CCSF student and English teacher and administrator at Merritt College, was recently honored for his contributions to City College's Diego Rivera Mural Archives in Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center, Room 335.

During the ceremony on May 3, 2001, faculty and staff thanked him for his generous donations, and **Julia Bergman** presented him with a Joseph Schmidt chocolate representation of Pan American Unity. Seward then explained how the rare books and videos he was donating related to various aspects of Diego Rivera's Mural of Pan American Unity.

Over the past three years, in addition to giving money to archival projects, Bob Seward has donated around 35 out-of-print books and 25 videos.

While a student at City College, in addition to having "great teachers" and living in veteran's housing for \$40 a month, Bob served as editor of City College's literary magazine *Forum* in 1951 and was

actively involved in art groups and projects. He says that his positive experiences at City College inspired him to go into community college education after his graduation from SF State and later to make donations to City College.

He also credits **Masha Zakheim**, English/Humanities emerita and author of two books on Bay Area murals, for getting him involved in mural research three years ago. Former colleagues at Merritt College, they hadn't seen each other for almost 40 years when Bob took Masha Zakheim's tour of Coit Tower and she invited him to see Rivera's mural of *Pan American Unity* at City College.

Bob Seward's involvement with community college education also led to a recent study on developmental and remedial reading, *A Comparative Survey of Developmental English Programs at Merritt College and Selected California Community Colleges* (1998). The study includes City College of San Francisco, where Bob Seward has agreed to give a presentation on this study in Fall 2001.

Rodel E. Rodis is named Northern California Chair for ACCT

Rodel E. Rodis, Vice President of the City College of San Francisco Board of Trustees, has been named Northern California State Chair of the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT). Rodis was first elected to the Board in 1992. He was re-elected in 1996 and 2000.

"The ACCT represents more than 6500 trustees who govern over 1200 community colleges in the US, Canada and England," said Rodis. His new duties as State Chair will be to act as liaison between the ACCT Board of Directors and the community college trustees from Northern California. Rodis is responsible for coordinating a statewide recruiting effort to enlist membership in ACCT; working to ensure retention of current ACCT members; encouraging statewide attendance at ACCT seminars and conventions; and encouraging boards to submit award nominations for the regional and annual awards.

Calif. Academy of Sciences applauds research by CCSF biology students

Three City College students presented research papers April 25 at the first annual Mountain Lake Symposium at the California Academy of Sciences in Golden Gate Park.

Mary Ellen Doyle reported on zooplankton identification and population trends in Mountain Lake. **Andrew Rush** outlined his findings on bird populations at the site. **Tracy Held** presented a pictorial historical record of the lake.

Also in attendance to discuss the results of their year-long field research were: **Kelley Bard, Robert Cedano, Rosemary Nocera, Karen Noll** and **Ingrid Smart** reported on water quality;

Christa Erwin, Ruth Henry and **Heather Chase** talked about birds;

Anna Potterat and **Margaret Tam** spoke of herpetology; and

Scott Davidson, Ron DeLeon, Summer Lindzey, Karen Loveless, Jeremy Myers and **Jammine O'Keefe** spoke about zooplankton.

All of the CCSF participants are students in Biology 91 – Biology Work Experience. At the conclusion of the conference The California Academy of Sciences awarded all of the students certificates of appreciation recognizing their contributions to an intensive inventory and monitoring of San Francisco's last freshwater lake.

"Their valuable scientific data has greatly enhanced our understanding of the biodiversity of the lake and their information now forms a valuable baseline for the Mountain Lake Restoration and Enhancement Project being conducted by the California Academy of Sciences and the National Park Service," said **Ed Bedecarrax**, Chair, CCSF Biology Department.

Alex Alexander recognized for contributions to mediation

Alex Alexander was this year's recipient of the Northern California Mediation Association (NCMA) and Society for Professionals in Dispute Resolution (SPIDR) award for his "significant contributions to the field of mediation." The award is given each year to a deserving mediator in memory of **Gil Lopez**, a pioneer mediator with the San Francisco Community Boards.

Alex was trained as a mediator/factfinder/arbitrator at UC Berkeley, under a grant by the US Department of Labor. He is a veteran mediator and emeritus faculty member of CCSF. Alex is currently an EEO hiring monitor for the college.

Raymond Rea to make presentation about 'queer film' on two panels

Community Health Worker Certificate a national model

On March 29 and 30th, 14 representatives of nine community colleges from around the United States attended a seminar to aid them in replicating City College's Community Health Worker Certificate. The CHW Certificate is the first such college credit certificate in the US. It was developed by Community Health Works, the decade-old partnership of City College of San Francisco (College of Health and Physical Education) and San Francisco State University (College of Health and Human Services).

Community Health Works' training director **Cindy Tsai** and I, Health Science faculty member Vicki Legion, presented a review of the curriculum; discussed student learning teams, performance examinations and other successful teaching techniques; and led networking discussions. The participants learned about the cluster of urban community health programs in San Francisco including the Drug and Alcohol Studies Certificate, the HIV/STD Certificates, the Health Care Interpreter Certificate, the new Welcome Back program to reintegrate health professionals trained overseas, and the urban health bachelors and master's in public health at San Francisco State University.

The train-the-trainer seminar was funded by the innovation arm of the US Department of Education, FIPSE (the Fund for the Improvement of Post Secondary Education), and was co-sponsored by RHORC (the Regional Health Occupations Resource Center), a program of the Chancellor's Office of the California Community College system.

Community health workers are first-level health professionals who work in public health clinics and community based health outreach projects in low income communities. Community health workers link people up with available services, provide care coordination, do health advising, and often provide language translation. They work in a wide range of specialty areas as HIV prevention and care, maternal child health, asthma and nutrition.

The CCSF CHW Certificate has been carefully evaluated for seven years. Certificate completers have high rates of retention, career and educational advancement, and success on performance examinations. Post program surveys a year after graduation show that the 100% of those employed as CHWs are serving in low income medically underserved communities.

Five community colleges have already started CHW certificates or course work: Santa Rosa Junior College (Sonoma County), Ivy Tech State College Gary Indiana), Three Rivers Community College and Housatonic Community College (Connecticut) and Community College of Denver. Other colleges are laying the groundwork for the program: Butte and Shasta Community Colleges in northern California, Hunter College in New York, Kauai Community College/University of Hawaii, and Mendocino Community College.

Dissemination conference participants were particularly interested in an excellent articulation agreement between City College and San Francisco State University to speed students toward transfer and graduation. Twelve units of CCSF credits satisfies graduation requirements in the SFSU Department of Health Education. In San Francisco to date three students who started in the CHW

program have completed their master's degrees at San Francisco State in public health or social work. They are all now serving as program leaders in medically underserved communities.

Participants were enthusiastic about the seminar, and started an electronic discussion group hosted by Community Health Works. They also initiated a national workshop on college credit Community Health Worker programs scheduled for the American Public Health Association conference in November 2002.

Joani Marinoff, Chair of the Health Science Department is also the co-principal investigator of the Community Health Works partnership. She is particularly excited about the dissemination of the Community Health Worker Certificate program because she got her start in the health professions as a community health worker. The community health worker is that sorely needed intermediary between the physician and patient who insures good patient care. CCSF China Project. Dean Teng had established cooperative agreements with four of China's best universities to house the City College ESL noncredit pilot program in China. She worked with Vice Chancellor's Goldstein's office to assess the costs of the program. Unfortunately, prospective Chinese students would find the expected costs of the CCSF program prohibitive, especially compared to ESL programs already offered by other countries and financed with government subsidies by those countries. Furthermore, students passing these classes would not get college credit for their work, nor would the U.S. embassy support issuing visas to CCSF China students transferring to the U.S. There are no active plans at the present time to continue pursuing an ESL program in China.

Dean Teng reported also that the short-term skills-enhancement classes did well in China. CCSF completed an FAA license-preparation and skills-enhancement program last summer and just graduated its third class for aircraft maintenance mechanics with 100% success. The Contract Education Office is still investigating the feasibility of offering credit classes in e-commerce and small business operations.

C. CalWORKS Report

CalWORKs Dean Bernice Brown reported that the CCSF CalWORKS Program is applying to the state Chancellor's office for renewal. Senate member Anna Wong discussed the various services offered by the Program, especially the new Collaborative Management System. Wong made a point of thanking the Department of Human Services of the City and County of San Francisco for its financial support. CalWORKs staff member Pearl Howell emphasized that the work-study opportunities for CalWORKs participants is a major component of the program.

D. Bond Measure

Chancellor Day distributed copies of a Bond Issue Fact Sheet and invited questions from Council. Dr. Day confirmed that renovation funds would be used District-wide, and that he intends that renovated buildings and new buildings feature state-of-the-art education technology. Dr. Day asserted that long-range

plans include replacing all Ocean Avenue Campus bungalows with permanent buildings dedicated to various needs, including student services.

VIII. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 5:10 P.M.
