CCSF policy on service animals

Editor's Note: The following is a new Administrative Regulation (AR7.13.02X) concerning the use of service animals on campus. The old regulation on animals, AR 7.13.02 U, did not cover the circumstances described in the new regulation. Although the new regulation was distributed last semester, the following is a reminder to everyone of the regulation. Please contact Linda R. Jackson Associate Director/ADA Coordinator in the Office of Affirmation Action, if you have any questions regarding the regulation.

AR 7.13.02

X. Administrative Regulation Regarding Service Animals

San Francisco Community College District policies (3.02 and 5.07) permit qualified individuals with disabilities to use service animals in District facilities and on District campuses in order to ensure that qualified individuals with disabilities can participate in and benefit from District services, programs and activities, and to ensure that the District does not discriminate on the basis of disability pursuant to the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and all other applicable laws.

The following procedures regarding service animals apply to students, faculty and staff, as well as members of the community coming on campus for occasional use.

Definition:

Service animals perform some of the functions and tasks that an individual with a disability cannot perform for himself or herself. Service animal is defined in Title III of the ADA regulations (28 C.F.R. Section 36.104) as follows:

Service animal means any guide dog, signal dog, or other animal individually trained to work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including, but not limited to, guiding individuals with impaired vision, alerting individuals with impaired hearing to

intruders or sounds, providing minimal protection or rescue work, pulling a wheelchair, or fetching dropped items.

If an animal meets this definition, it is considered a service animal under the ADA, even if it has not been licensed or certified by a state or local government, or by a private agency.

Occasional use of a service animal in District facilities on District campuses (i.e., attendance at a concert or special event) may not be challenged except if the use of the animal poses a direct threat to the health or safety of other persons, or if the presence of the service animal will result in a fundamental alteration of the service, program or activity involved. (Title II of the ADA Regulations, 28 C.F.R. Section 35.130 [b] [7])

A disability is defined in Title I of the ADA Regulations, 29 C.F.R. Section 1630.2(g) as:

A physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities of an individual; a record of having such an impairment, or being regarded as having such an impairment.

Responsibilities of Persons Using Service Animals:

The care and supervision of a service animal is the responsibility of the individual

with a disability using the animal's services. If a service animal becomes unruly or disruptive (e.g., barking, running around), or if the animal is unclean, to the extent that the animal's behavior may pose a direct threat to the health or safety of others, or may cause a fundamental alteration in District services, programs or activities, then the District will consider the issue of appropriate care and supervision.

All service dogs must be immunized against rabies in accordance with State of California Health and Safety Code Section 121690.

District Procedures to Request Use of Service Animals:

For employees and visitors to campus events, the District ADA Coordinator will evaluate the request to use a service animal through the District's Employees' Americans with Disabilities Act Accommodations Program.

For students, the Disabled Students Programs and Services (DSP&S) will evaluate the request to use a service animal through the DSP&S certification procedures.

Appeal Procedures on Denial of Request To Use Service Animals:

An employee or visitor to campus events who is denied use of a service animal may file a discrimination complaint or informal charges of discrimination pursuant to the District's discrimination complaint procedures.

A student who denied use of a service animal may appeal the decision through the DSP&S appeal process, or file a formal discrimination complaint or informal charges of discrimination pursuant to the District's discrimination complaint procedures.

This Administrative Regulation supercedes AR 7.13.02 U to the extent there are any conflicts.

Invitation to anonymously self-identify as an individual with a disability

The District Office of Affirmative Action is in the process of preparing a new Faculty and Staff Diversity Plan as required by the State Chancellor's Office pursuant to the Education Code and Title 5 regulations. The plan will include a statistical analysis of the total number of employees who self-identify as individuals with a disability.

"We want to provide the most accurate and up-to-date statistical information to the State Chancellor's Office regarding our current employees' status, and we realize some of you may not have had the opportunity to self-identify in the past," says **Linda Jackson**, the District's ADA Coordinator. "Therefore, we are providing an opportunity for all employees to self-identify, now, as a person with a disability."

If you wish to self-identify as a person with a disability, as defined under the law, please complete the short form at the bottom of this page and return it to the Office of Affirmative Action at the address indicated on the form below. Since there is a very specific definition of who is considered a person with a disability under the law, the definition is included on the form.

Submission of this information is voluntary and you will not be required to give your name or department. "It would assist us to have this information, but if you decide not to provide the information, you will not be subjected to any adverse treatment as a consequence," continues Jackson.

Voluntary Invitation to Self-Identify

Yes, I am a "person with a disability," as defined below, and I have not previously self-identified. Please include me in the total number of persons with a disability who are employed by the District for purposes of statistical analysis in the District's new Faculty and Staff Diversity Plan.

A "person with a disability" means an individual with an impairment that limits a major life activity (i.e., hearing, seeing, walking). Under current law, to "limit" a major life activity means to make it more difficult to engage in the major life activity as compared to the average person.

Study Abroad Program extends to United Kingdom

City College students can now study abroad in the United Kingdom with the Study Abroad Program's new Semester in London Program at Westminster Kingsway College.

According to Study Abroad Program Coordinator **Jill Heffron**, Westminster Kingsway College, a junior college located just south of the River Thames near Battersea Park, was chosen for its similarities to City College. Courses are taught at a similar level and student services are parallel. The student population is also similar in terms of age and diversity.

"That's what makes London interesting. They have their own melting pot," said Heffron. "Not only will it be a great opportunity for City College students to live in another country and become a part of that culture for a semester, they will also have the chance to study with students from Britain, India, Africa, Asia and Pakistan. The school is a good match for City College in terms of its diversity."

Courses offered in the London study abroad program include Mass Media and Society, Introduction to Film Studies, Shakespeare, Principles of Fashion Design, Fashion History, Fashion Drawing, and Clothing Study. Completed course work is transferable to the California State University system and a course also transfers to the University of California system.

The media and film courses will be taught from the British viewpoint with British and Irish, as well as American cinema studied. The fashion courses will include western, eastern and folk influences and will reflect both European and non-European perspectives. The course on Shakespeare is specially designed for City College students.

The London academic program combines in-class lectures, group study and weekly tutorials with faculty, which is an integral part of British education.

Though there is no minimum amount of units to take when on the London program, Heffron recommends students take 12-15 units and no less than 9 units, in order to get the maximum out of their study abroad experience.

"The beauty of this program is that students will be exposed to different perspectives, values and context," said Heffron.

Excursions outside of London to locations such as Cambridge, Oxford, Stonehenge, Bath and Stratford-Upon-Avon are included in the program. Optional activities such as film showings and theatre performances are also offered. Students participating in the program live in shared student apartments in the heart of London's Holborn and Bloomsbury Districts.

The idea for the Semester in London program originated from City College students who, during advising and counseling sessions with Heffron, expressed interest in studying in London.

According to Heffron, London is the most popular place for American students studying abroad.

In addition, the Study Abroad Program is trying to reach out more to males, people of color, students studying outside the humanities, and older, returning students attending college for the first time. Historically, the majority of American students who study abroad, according to Heffron, have been female juniors studying languages and the humanities.

In selecting a study abroad program in London, Heffron researched and compared a variety of programs and schools to see which one would fit City College's student population.

Westminster Kingsway College became the strongest contender because of its resemblance to City College and the variety of courses that would be available to students. In addition, like City College, Westminster Kingsway College is also "trying to meet the needs of a global

economy by assisting their communities in which both technology and people's personal and professional needs are always changing," said Heffron.

"I was struck by how similar it was to City College - the diversity, the age of the students, how they dressed, the non-intimidating, accessible atmosphere," said Heffron about her visit to Westminster Kingsway. "It has the community college feeling."

In organizing the Semester in London Program, Heffron worked with Accent International Consortium for Programs Abroad, who also partners with CCSF to other programs in France and Italy. Both Heffron and Accent served as liaisons between City College and Westminster Kingsway College, working with the two institutions' department heads in selecting courses that would interest and feel comfortable to City College students.

The Board of Trustees, who Heffron cites as being very supportive of the Study Abroad Program, approved the Semester in London Program in January 2001.

For the moment the Semester in London Program is only being offered in the fall semester. "If there is more student interest, we will consider offering the program in the spring," said Heffron.

In the future, the coordinator hopes to expand the London program by offering more classes. "We are slowly finding courses at Westminster Kingsway College that are equivalent to ours," said Heffron. Student feedback given on evaluations will also be used to fine-tune the Semester in London Program in the future.

Established in 1985, under the direction of retired French Instructor Sue Light, the Study Abroad Program has offered academic experiences in Russia, Japan, Vietnam, Australia, Costa Rica, China, Mexico, France and Italy.

The coordinator is currently working on developing programs in Spain and China. She also is investigating the possibility of offering a program in Cuba.

Heffron, who has a BA in Dance History and a Master's Degree in International Business from the American Graduate School of International Management, has been the Study Abroad Coordinator at City College for the past six years. She brings a wealth of knowledge and personal experience to the program, having studied in France and China and taught English in Spain.

In outlining the advantage and importance of the Study in London Program, Heffron added, "Though it may not be our individual heritage, it is our country's heritage. You can learn a lot about yourself by looking at the history of the country in which you live. To understand who you are, it helps to see where the United States came from."

National and international organizations and associations, including K-12 associations, UNESCO and the European Union, have also announced that they will celebrate International Education Week during the week of November 12-16, 2001 and are planning major events to mark the occasion.

The California Early Childhood Mentor Program in Bungalow 213, located between the Student Health Center and the Journalism Bungalows near the corner of Phelan and Judson, provides a new and exciting venue for programs supporting the professional development of early childhood educators and future elementary school teachers.

The Mentor Program, which moved from Chabot College in Hayward earlier this year, serves 70 community colleges in California and is supported by the California Department of Education and other grants.

In addition, the facility houses five other grant funded projects sponsored by the Child Development & Family Studies Department. The San Francisco Early Childhood Professional Development Project, (The Miriam and Peter Haas Fund), the Teacher Preparation Center and AmeriCorps (State Chancellor's Office), the Child Development Training Consortium (California Department of Education) and the City College Mentor Program all combine to provide students and community members access to resources, information and support in the area of teacher development.

City College of San Francisco offers a unique model for the delivery of services targeted to improve professional development opportunities, provide career resources and develop educational support services for the early childhood community and future elementary school teachers.
