

Student Health Services can provide help to people experiencing post trauma reactions

Although it may take some time, the earthshaking events of September 11 and the horrifying images that none of us escaped will gradually begin to recede from our conscious minds. While we live with an awareness that the world is somehow different, most of us will carry on with our lives, get into our usual routines and things will return to “normal.”

However, some of us may begin to notice or experience some changes in ourselves that seem mysterious in that we can't tell where they come from, and we can't justify their existence. Here are some of the mysterious symptoms:

- Difficulty falling or staying asleep
- Feeling unduly angry or irritable
- Having difficulty concentrating
- Being easily startled
- Having a heightened sense of awareness
- Feeling an unexplained sense of doom or futility
- Crying easily
- Experiencing a change in appetite
- Feeling numb
- Having a hard time connecting with people

Although it might seem unlikely to us, we could well be having a delayed response to the trauma of September 11. Our “normal” response was to put it aside as soon as possible and carry on. For some of us this just didn't work. We thought everything was going along fine, but then we started to experience some of the symptoms listed above.

Perhaps as you read this you are thinking that “this can't apply to me. I wasn't in New York or Washington, D.C. and didn't witness any of it first hand. I don't even have any friends or loved ones who live in those areas.” However, if, like the rest of us, you did have your television or radio on most of the day of September 11, you did witness everything in great and terrifying detail—over and over again. The images seemed burned into all our minds.

In fact the attack was one of such magnitude that it has become recognized as a disaster that has indirectly affected much of the world.

This loss of ability to cope effectively is especially true for those of us who have experienced other traumatic events in our past. These events could range from physical and/or sexual abuse to the death of a loved one, the loss of a pet or the abusive political environment of a place we have recently left. It is well documented that previous trauma frequently intensifies the feelings experienced from ensuing traumas.

If these behavioral and emotional changes persist over a long period of time, say a month or longer, we can recognize them as being symptoms of post trauma or what psychotherapists call “post traumatic stress syndrome.”

As you can imagine, such symptoms can be quite disruptive of a person's life, but there is help. If you or anyone you know is experiencing these symptoms, the most important thing to do is to talk to someone. A trained professional is typically the most helpful and that could be a priest or religious figure, a psychological counselor or other trained mental health professional.

At City College, Psychological Services, located in Student Health Services, Bungalow 201 on the Ocean/Phelan Campus, is staffed with professional clinicians who can provide help with post traumatic stress or other reactions. We are available for individual appointments as well as consultation to family members, staff and faculty regarding yourselves, students or others you may be concerned about.

If this information applies to you or anyone you know, call (415) 239-3148 or come by the Student Health Center in Bungalow 201 and **Donna O'Rourke** can give you an appointment.

A final word about accidents. During a time of great distraction, preoccupation and reduced concentration, we can be more susceptible to having accidents. It is a good idea to be extra aware as we attend to our daily duties at home, at work, or while driving. Remember to treat yourself with care and kindness.

- 1) Impacted courses: (a) Classes for which the department cannot meet student demand or (b) Classes that have consistently high enrollments and the online version of the class would give students more scheduling flexibility by mixing traditional classes and online classes.
- 2) Survey and introductory courses, particularly courses that meet a general education, transfer, or certificate requirement and have high enrollments and/or multiple sections with strong enrollments.
- 3) Courses that meet the specific educational needs of specific student population(s), particularly students who would be unlikely to take a traditional version of the class at one of CCSF's sites. While enrollment in these classes would be open to all students, the primary reason for developing and offering the course online would be to attract new students.
