CCSF dedicates Orfalea Family Center at John Adams Campus

City College of San Francisco celebrated the opening of the Orfalea Family Center at the John Adams Campus with a formal dedication ceremony on **Wednesday, October 17.**

Named to honor **Paul Orfalea**, the founder of Kinko's copy stores, and his wife **Natalie**, for their generous support of child development programs at City College of San Francisco, the child care center will accommodate 40 children whose parents are students at the John Adams Campus, 1860 Hayes St.

"Our passion is to support the best in child development centers and early childhood education in California. We want to help City College become a model for child care in America," said Orfalea.

The Orfalea Family Foundation is making annual donations of \$350,000 over the next 10 years to the Foundation of

The City College of San Francisco for child development. A \$5 million gift in 2011 will create an endowment to help CCSF become a shining model for child-care in America.

Currently, the Child Development and Family Studies Department offers high quality early care and education to more than 400 children in 10 programs throughout San Francisco. The nationally recognized faculty has developed a model of early care and education that supports the inclusion of children with special needs, provides a training model in understanding sensory integration, and supports low income student parents in completing their educational goals.

The Orfalea Family Center at John Adams Campus includes a new toddler program serving children 18- to 36-months-old in a state-of-the-art environment. The Center also will serve as a

training site for the early childhood students and include a parenting resource library.

Funds from the Orfalea Family Foundation will be used to expand the early child care and education services in City College's future Chinatown/North Beach and Mission campuses, fund parenting libraries and create an annual parenting lecture series. Funds will also be utilized by the Orfalea Family Centers in obtaining accreditation by the National Association for the Education of Young Children. Scholarships for child care services will be provided to families who do not qualify for other subsidies, with an emphasis on re-entry students.

Chancellor Day's memo advises us to be cautious with mail

Dear College Community:

These are certainly difficult times, with news headlines constantly reminding us that our world is not like it used to be. While there is no reason for us to be overly concerned, the fact is that a growing number of organizations are being threatened by cases — real or fabricated — of Anthrax infection. On October 16, for example, City Hall was closed after an employee reported seeing a white powder substance when opening the mail.

Our campus Police Chief, **Gerry De Girolamo**, is currently working with Vice Chancellor of Administration and Finance **Peter Goldstein** to develop an Emergency Response to Mail Allegedly Containing Anthrax. In the meantime, I encourage all campus departments and everyone responsible for opening the mail to be a little more alert than usual. If you notice anything strange, please contact Mr. DeGirolamo at (415) 239-3151 immediately. In the mean time, we will make arrangements for wide distribution of the Emergency Response steps as soon as they've been developed. Thanks for your patience and due diligence.

City College Honors Program enrolls 501st student

The City College Honors Program, which offered its first courses in spring 1999, has accepted the 501st student into the program. This milestone joins several others in the development of the program:

- First City College student selected to the All California Academic Team
- Acceptance of the CCSF honors Program by the UCLA Transfer Alliance Program (making CCSF one of only three community colleges in Northern California to offer priority transfer to UCLA possible)
- Acceptance of the first CCSF students to UCLA through the priority transfer track
- Acceptance of CCSF into the UC Irvine's Transfer Alliance Program
- CCSF's sponsorship of the Western Regional Honors Conference in San Francisco at which 250 faculty and honors students attended from more than 150 colleges and universities

CCSF is about to sign a special agreement with San Francisco State University which will provide for special transfer tracks and added benefits for honors students.

In recent survey, 92 percent of the students in the Honors Program stated they would recommend it to their peers. They also supported an expansion of Honors offerings. Thus, CCSF is increasing the number of courses next semester.

"For Spring semester 2002, CCSF will offer approximately 35 honors credit courses in a variety of fields, but we would still welcome new course offerings," says Honors Coordinator **Tom Blair**. "Faculty who would like to offer a course in honors should contact me at (415) 239-3542."

Breast Cancer Awareness Week

CCSF will observe Breast Cancer Awareness Week from October 22 to 26, 2001.

As part of this effort to raise consciousness about breast cancer prevention, there will be information and demonstrations available at a Wellness/Health Fair on **Tuesday, October 23** from 9:30 A.M. to 3 P.M. in the Student Union, Phelan/Ocean Avenue Campus.

Among the special activities will be free instructions about how to perform self breast examinations and self testicular examinations, plus the opportunity to practice on plastic models. In addition, there will be tables with information on early detection of breast cancer, information on nutrition and prevention.

The health fair also will provide free screenings for anemia, blood pressure and diabetes. Also available will be urine tests for chlamydia and gonorrhea.

UCSF pharmacists will offer free prevention education information on the topics of over-the-counter medications, sexually transmitted diseases, women's and men's health, nutrition, the Vial of Life project and other immunization information.

The health fair is sponsored by CCSF Student Health, RN and MA programs, Associated Student Council, AGS, UCSF Pharmacy.

Calendars for 2002 featuring the photographs and stories of breast cancer survivors from the Bayview, Hunters Point, Potrero and Sunnysdale neighborhoods will be for sale with proceeds benefiting services to women in those areas. The calendars will be available at the fair and from the CCSF Bookstore Annex, 11 Phelan Ave.
