Resolution S8 from September 20 meeting calls on us to be vigilant against ‘scapegoating’

Prayer and Remembrance of Tuesday, September 11, on Behalf of the Thousands of Victims and their Families (Resolution No. 010920-S8)

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Our world, our country, our communities, and our lives were forever changed on the morning of Tuesday, September 11, when the skyline blackened with smoke and soot and hung above two major U.S. cities and a rural field in western Pennsylvania. What has emerged in the aftermath of Tuesday’s horrors is a complex picture of loss and grief, but also bravery and compassion as thousands of Americans have rallied around the crash sites, the surviving victims, and the hundreds and thousands of family members, friends, and loved ones around the nation who are struggling to cope with immensity of what has happened.

Sadly, our grief has been heightened since the tragedies by innumerable reports of attacks on individuals and groups of Middle Eastern descent in retaliation for the events of September 11. It is within this context that the Board of Trustees feels strongly that there is a need to maintain an enhanced climate of appreciation for diversity and respect for people of different cultures and religious beliefs.

RECOMMENDATION:

WHEREAS: The events of September 11, 2001, at the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and Somerset, Pennsylvania, serve as a cruel reminder of the fragility of life as we know it; and

WHEREAS: We are grieving for the dead and the wounded, for the family and friends of those who have perished, and for our own wrenching sense of loss; and

WHEREAS: Our nation has witnessed the incredible bravery demonstrated by firefighters and rescue teams, the victims, and the hundreds of untold stories of heroism upon which this country is founded; and

WHEREAS: People have strong emotions following the September 11 attacks on the United States; and

WHEREAS: The Board of Trustees, Chancellor, and the entire College Community are deeply concerned that some people have responded during this time of shock and grief with acts of intolerance based on racial and ethnic stereotyping; and

WHEREAS: The Associated Students are working with various student groups to organize special workshops over the next few months to educate the campus community about the dangers and harm of racial profiling on our campuses; and

WHEREAS: The Muslim Student Association and the Women Islamic Association have passionately expressed their sense of loss and grieving both for their own community and for the larger

community, and also make an appeal to help fight stereotyping and discrimination against Muslims; and

WHEREAS: City College of San Francisco has been designated a “hate-free” zone through the efforts of the college-wide Diversity Committee and punctuated by a Global Exchange poster-campaign customized to reflect the College’s involvement and including emergency contact numbers for relevant CCSF offices;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Board declares City College of San Francisco will not tolerate any scapegoating of individuals who are not in any way associated with the acts committed by the terrorists, and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED: That the San Francisco Board of Trustees directs the Chancellor to distribute copies of this resolution to the entire College community and to enlist the College Police in enforcing the resolution.

Safety precautions for the mail

Gerald DeGirolamo, Chief of Public Safety for City College of San Francisco, has issued a memo outlining the safety precautions all CCSF employees should take when opening mail. That memo, dated October 16, 2001 and titled "Letter and Package Alert," states:

In light of current events the San Francisco Community District is committed to providing information and protecting the safety and health of all personnel. Provided below are some instructions regarding "Suspicious Mail".

1. Do not accept mail/parcels that are unexpected or from someone unfamiliar to you.
2. Be alert to mail with excessive or no postage, also mail of unusual weight, given their size, or are lopsided or oddly shaped.
3. Be alert to restrictive markings — "Personal" or "Confidential".
4. Be alert to letters and packages with wires protruding, oil stains on wrapper or strange odor.

5. Be alert to mail that show a city or state in the postmark that doesn't match the return address.
6. Do not accept mail with no return address or an address that cannot be verified as legitimate.
7. Do not move suspicious envelopes or packages.

If you suspect or encounter any suspicious mail, immediately contact the Campus Police Department at 239-3200, or #1 from any campus pay phone.

President Ophelia Clark made several announcements. The Senate office has begun tallying the results of the Chancellor's evaluation. The Alternative Calendar Study Group will meet on Monday, October 15, from 2:30 to 4 P.M., in Cloud 339, on the Ocean Avenue Campus.

Council member Verdugo announced that the Latino College Fair will be held on Saturday, October 6, from 9 A.M. to 12:30 P.M. at the Ocean Avenue Student Union. Interested faculty may send her materials for display at the fair.

Council member Fan announced that he is presenting two film series later this semester at the Rosenberg Library. They feature the works of a French playwright and of some Chinese filmmakers.

V. OFFICERS' REPORTS

A. President

President Ophelia Clark reported that she and approximately 34 others attended the bond measure fundraiser on Sunday, September 30. The Area B meeting will occur on October 19. Council member Mueller, Senate members Ann Clark and Ellen Wall, and President Clark attended the FACCC Conference on Friday, September 28.

B. First Vice President

First Vice President David Yee reported that the Information Technology Policies Committee meeting originally scheduled for Friday, September 28, was canceled.

C. Second Vice President

No report. (Second Vice President Lopez was serving jury duty.)

D. Secretary

VI. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Executive Council Retreat

President Ophelia Clark commended Second Vice President Lopez for her efforts at organizing the retreat, held on Saturday, September 29, from 9 A.M. to 3:30 P.M., at the Fort Mason Gatehouse.

2001-10-03-01 (Teti/Yee) MSU That Council commend Second Vice President Lopez for organizing yet again a fabulously successful Executive Council retreat.

B. Students on Administrator Search Committees

President Ophelia Clark informed Council that Chancellor Day had responded to the officers' concerns about his request to allow students to serve on the search committee for Latino Services "Director". Day is asking that Council consider, in the future, allowing students to serve on search committees for the Vice Chancellor of Student Services, and for administrators serving under that

Vice Chancellor. There are twelve such positions currently (including the Latino Services "Director").

Council expressed many concerns. These included student service on evaluation committees, the composition of search committees, students' abilities to meet the demands of serving on hiring committees, the effect of student service on a candidate administrator's retreat rights, and whether the Ocean Avenue Associated Students Council should appoint students to a college-wide committee.

Council reaffirmed its stance that this issue should not be tied to a single position. If necessary, Council will consider working with the Board of Trustees to modify the Administrator Hiring Document. Council continues to resent being put in the position of appearing to oppose Latino Services and student participation in College decisions. Council encouraged the officers to continue resisting potential misuse of the title "Director".

C. Proposed Changes in the Administrator Evaluation Procedure

Council consented to postpone this item until its next meeting, when Second Vice President Lopez returns.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Executive Council Goals for 2001-2002

The Executive Council will develop and pursue goals throughout the academic year. Second Vice President Lopez will assist with this effort.

B. Introduction of Ocean Avenue Associated Students (AS) President Richard Cantora

President Ophelia Clark welcomed Ocean Avenue AS President Richard Cantora. President Cantora invited Council members to call on him for input on student-related issues. He expressed concern for

IX. GOVERNANCE REPORTS

A. College Diversity Advisory Committee
(of the College Advisory Council)

Council member Nance reported that the Committee held an emergency meeting to address the aftermath of September 11. Some of the Committee's concerns are the welfare of Arab-American and Islamic students, and of students in the military. The Committee is recommending that the campuses have response teams ready for critical situations. The Committee may produce and distribute posters much like the "Hate-Free Zone" signs.

B. Planning and Budgeting Council (PBC)

Council member Mueller reported that the PBC discussed how the College's budget would be affected by the downturn in the economy. Recent decreases in Computer and Information Science and Multimedia enrollment will affect the most recent Faculty Position Allocation Committee recommendations. First Vice President Yee reported that the PBC has begun to review the Strategic Plan status report and the proposed strategic planning timetable.

C. Facilities Projects Subcommittee (of
the Facilities Review Committee)

Council member Mueller reported on behalf of Council member Sunny Clark, Chair of the Subcommittee. Senate member Joy Durighello has submitted to the Subcommittee a proposal to improve signage on campus. The proposal recommended erecting signposts directing pedestrians toward buildings, and plac-

ing signs in front of buildings with the buildings' names. The Subcommittee will not meet again until the new Associate Vice Chancellor of Facilities is chosen. Until then, the Subcommittee members will attend Facilities Review Committee meetings.

D. Information Technology Policies
Committee (of the College Advisory
Council)

First Vice President David Yee reported that ITS has hired a Windows NT expert. To improve service and accountability, ITS will begin keeping a Help Desk service record, and it will conduct a Help Desk users' survey. Results of the ITS Equipment Survey have been compiled. Other projects include piloting smart ID cards in the Fall of 2002, testing an automated software delivery system, and scanning email for viruses before the email is uploaded.

ITS has implemented the Banner Web products for Faculty and for Employees, and it is testing Banner 5. Banner may begin generating artificial student ID numbers in November.

X. OPEN FORUM

AFT 2121 President Allan Fisher informed Council that the Union is sponsoring many activities during October and November in support of the bond measure. Council thanked Fisher for his efforts.

Council member Podenski told Council that the Program Review procedure may be reformed again. She recommended that Council examine the proposed changes. Some faculty expressed concern that the changes may compromise the faculty-driven nature of program review.

XI. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 5:05 P.M.

Stefan Poněk

Stefan Poněk, Senior Engineer, Broadcast Media Services, a beloved friend and colleague, passed away Monday, October 15, 2001, of a heart attack.

There will be a memorial gathering to celebrate Stefan Poněk's life and work at City College in the Television Production Studio (Arts Extension 164, Phelan/ Ocean Avenue Campus) on Friday, November 2, at 1 P.M.

Stefan enjoyed a successful radio disc jockey career that spanned 30 years and included star status at the original and legendary underground San Francisco rock station KSAN (which took him to Woodstock, Altamont, and places in between); K101, KSFO, KYA, KMPX, KMUZ, KYUU, KGO, and Magic 61—classical, country, and rock radio stations.

At the age of 13, Stefan was broadcasting stacks of 78's out of his grandmother's attic through a homemade transmitter. During high school he operated a pirate radio station that he built and ran from his barn until an FCC representative arrived to close him down.

Stefan also produced records and demo sessions; he built and operated a recording studio in Marin that supplied worldwide syndication to rock radio stations. He became a licensed general contractor for a few years, then a managing partner with an investor group buying, restructuring and re-selling radio stations. That phase of his career had him building new stations and consolidating multiple stations using modern digital technology. He trained sales forces, designed facilities and formats and was the General Manager of KNBA in Vallejo and KNSN in Chico.

In the early 60's Stefan was involved with cold war electronic radar jamming, counter measures, digital data transmission in its early development, and he trained military personnel.

Stefan enjoyed the atmosphere and challenges of City College. His easy style and youthful approach made him very popu-

lar with students. He managed technical operations for Broadcast Media Services and EAtv-Ch27 and oversaw the design and construction of the district's new hybrid cable/fiber video infrastructure. Stefan was also responsible for Broadcast Electronic Media Arts (BEMA) production equipment and he worked with faculty and staff to upgrade and improve the district's audio and video production and transmission facility.

Stefan was major contributor of knowledge and expertise as a member of the California Historical Radio Society, which is dedicated to the preservation of antique electronics.

He is survived by **Margaret Lochran**, his daughter **Kristin Poněk** (22), his son **Seth Poněk** (33), and his three grandchildren: **Kyle, Gabriella, and Landon**, and a fourth on the way...and by countless people whose lives he changed and saved.

Foresto M. Simoncini

Foresto Michael Simoncini, who was a professor of Italian and Spanish at City College of San Francisco and schools in South San Francisco for more than 30 years, died in San Francisco on September 30, 2001. He was 77.

Mr. Simoncini was born in San Francisco. He was a member of the Italian Cultural Institute and the Sons of Italy.

He is survived by his daughter, **Lynne S. Sarmiento**, and his grandson, **Maximilliano Foresto Sarmiento**.
