Voters approve Prop. A by immense margin

Voters in San Francisco overwhelmingly approved Proposition A at the polls on Tuesday, November 6, authorizing City College of San Francisco to issue \$195 million in general obligation bonds to pay for capital improvements.

As of November 7, with 100 percent of the precincts reporting, but with some absentee ballots still to be counted, the San Francisco Department of Elections reported the votes on Prop. A were 78,179 yes to 29,554 no, which translated to 72.57% and 27.43 percent, respectively.

"We are grateful for the overwhelming show of support by the citizens of San Francisco for one of their premier educational institutions," said Dr. **Natalie Berg**, President of the Board of Trustees. "This vote underscores belief in the college and in all it accomplishes. We are indeed thankful for their embrace of our goals."

Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr., Chancellor, said, "The vote by the citizens of San Francisco represents a strong reaffirmation of their trust and confidence in City College and its mission of providing educational and training opportunities for tens of thousands of people from all walks of life. This has been the tradition of City College of San Francisco for over 65 years.

"Our faculty, despite the serious limitations of our facilities and physical environment, has truly done an outstanding job. Now, with this vote, we finally have access to significant resources to upgrade and rebuild this great institution. As we move into the 21st Century, we want the future generation of students and faculty to have the appropriate resources and facilities available to ensure that the commitment of providing high-quality programs and services to benefit all citizens of San the Francisco Bay Area is not only

maintained, but enhanced. This vote makes that possible," Dr. Day continued. "On behalf of the Board of Trustees, faculty, staff and the 100,000 students who attend City College of San Francisco each year, thank you for supporting Prop. A. And special thanks to all of our supporters and campaign workers, without whom we would not be here celebrating," Dr. Day added.

The bond issue approved by the voters on November 6 constitute Phase I of what is anticipated to be a two-phase project. The Phase II projects will be put to a bond ballot at a future time and will provide the necessary support to continue the effort started in Phase I and initiate new projects that are necessary, but cannot be started until the effort associated with Phase I is complete.

Phase I projects include:

- \$75,171,876 in matching funds for the new Mission Campus and the new Chinatown/North Beach Campus;

- \$25,000,000 for new Community Cultural, Performing & Media Arts Center
- \$25,000,000 for new Community Wellness Center
- \$16,043,145 for completion of the college's computer network
- \$16,000,000 for renovation of aging facilities and improved disabled access
- \$13,000,000 for Balboa Reservoir infrastructure and environmental impact report for development
- \$10,000,000 for construction of a new facility for child development and teacher training
- \$9,252,656 for acquisition and seismic retrofitting of Evans Avenue Campus
- \$5,532,323 for acquisition of parcel "swing space" adjacent to the Phelan/Ocean Avenue Campus to maintain programs during construction.

The Osher Scholars will be among the future leaders of health care, nursing, the culinary arts and child care.”

I. CALL TO ORDER

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 2:42 P.M.

II. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

The agenda was adopted without objection.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of October 3, 2001 were approved as amended without objection.

IV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Ophelia Clark announced that she received a memo discussing the issue of City College's compliance with the local San Francisco "Sunshine" ordinance.

Council member Podenski regretfully informed the Council that District Senior Broadcast Technician Stefan Poněk had passed away unexpectedly.

V. OFFICERS' REPORTS

A. President

President Ophelia Clark reported that she attended a Neighbor Labor rally and walked a precinct with Council member

Lynch. She also attended a College Diversity Advisory Committee meeting, an Alternative Calendar Study Group meeting, a U.C. Extension leadership class, a Board Agenda Review session, and the Faculty Association Fall Reception.

B. First Vice President

No report.

C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Lopez reported that she attended a Noncredit Issues Subcommittee meeting at which Nicholar Chang, Dean of Matriculation, explained the use of Noncredit Matriculation funds for Counselors. That Subcommittee is reviewing some ESS recommendations. Lopez has also been suggesting to the appropriate people that certain documents (e.g., Board minutes) be made available online.

D. Secretary

No report.

VI. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Students on Administrator Search Committees

President Ophelia Clark described a proposed administrator search procedure for the Latino Services Network "Director". Students would not serve on the screening committee, but they would meet with the candidates and then offer feedback to the screening committee before the finalists were sent to the Chancellor's interview. Part of the proposal was an agreement that the faculty and the Chancellor would review the current hiring document. Council discussed various concerns about the proposed procedure before voting for approval.

2001-10-17-01 (Teti/Yee) MSP That Council approve the proposed procedure outlined in President Clark's memo and First Vice President Yee's flow chart.

B. Proposed Changes in the Administrator Evaluation Procedure

Second Vice President Susan Lopez reminded Council that the administration is still working on details of the proposed administrator evaluation procedure draft. As reported at an earlier meeting, the proposed procedure will likely feature evaluation surveys instead of interview committees. There seems to be a plan for an oversight committee on which two faculty would serve on an ongoing basis. The oversight committee would only monitor the procedure as evidenced in the paperwork. Lopez fears that this would greatly reduce the faculty role in administrator evaluation. She raised concerns about the limitations of a survey as opposed to an interview, and about confidentiality. She noted that the proposal was still under revision and that faculty had not yet been given the current version.

C. Program Review

Council member Podenski reported that the Program Review Committee is proposing to add a sheet to the Program Review process for Deans to supply their comments about the reviewed program, and that formal involvement of the Dean in the process is a significant change. Council agreed to discuss the matter as necessary.

D. Executive Council Goals for 2001-2002

Council consented to adopt a goal set by last year's Council: to strengthen the representational nature of the Executive Council. First Vice President Yee encouraged Council members to submit ideas for new goals.

E. Resolution on the title “Director” and the Latino Services Network position

2001-10-17-02 (Mueller/Martinez) MSU

WHEREAS, The California State code defines a community college administrator as either “classified” or “instructional/student services”; and

WHEREAS, The City College title of “Director” was recommended to the Chancellor and adopted by the Board of Trustees as applying to the category of classified administrators only; and

WHEREAS, The later use of “Director” to describe a new student services administrator was made without prior approval of the expansion of the category; Therefore be it

RESOLVED, That faculty participation in the search for the new Latino Services Network “Director” will not constitute an approval of the category of non-classified directors; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the possibility of an additional category of administrative instructional/student services director be discussed and recommended through an agreed-upon participatory governance process; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Council, in anticipation of such a process, request a chart showing all current administrators, including classified directors; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the faculty participate in the hiring of any future non-classified directors only after the titles, duties, and potential number of positions are discussed and recommended through an agreed-upon participatory governance process.

VII. New Business

A. Visual Education at CCSF

Senate member Julia Bergman, Chair of the Works of Art Subcommittee, reported that the Subcommittee wishes to relate

the various Rosenberg Library and City Arts displays and activities to other aspects of the College curriculum. She emphasized that the intended project will encompass more than just the Library and Art Departments on the Ocean Avenue Campus. Alison Nordström, Director of the Daytona Beach Community College photography gallery, is working as a consultant on the project. Council expressed approval for the project. Bergman invited all interested faculty to get involved.

B. CalWORKs Report

President Ophelia Clark welcomed Bernice Brown, Dean of CalWORKs. Dean Brown, Senate member Anna Wong, and staff member Pearl Howe described the CalWORKs program and the services it has provided in the past semester. They emphasized that CalWORKs helps increase enrollment and retention.

That Council authorize President Clark to approve the CalWORKs proposal for the coming year.

C. Emergency Plan

Senate member Dora Dye related her experiences on September 11 and pointed out the apparent lack of a College emergency plan. Some Council members replied that the Health and Safety Committee of the College Advisory Council drafted a plan in the 1980s. Part of this plan is in the Faculty Handbook. Some Building Users’ Groups have drafted building-specific plans. President Clark agreed to draft a letter asking the College Advisory Council to refer the matter to its Health and Safety Committee.
