Elizabeth Brent, Dean, Outreach and Recruitment Services, pointed out that these counselors and deans were able to find out details about CCSF from the 35 tables staffed by representatives of CCSF Departments and Programs.

Ft. Mason plans Art Show for Nov. 30, Dec. 1-2

City College's Ft. Mason Art Campus will hold its 27th annual Art Exhibition and Sale on Friday, November 30 from 6 to 9 P.M. and December 1 and 2 from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M. The location is Building B, Laguna Street at Marina Boulevard.

Original work by faculty and students will be for sale. Included will be works in the mediums of ceramics, drawing, mixed media, painting, photography, printmaking, sculpture, watercolor, weaving and textiles.

The CCSF Office of Continuing Education will sponsor demonstrations by various artists working in several mediums.

The exhibition will include a silent auction of art work donated by faculty and students. Bids can be made November 26 to December 3 in the Fort Mason Coffee Gallery.

Dr. **Anita Grier** and **Johnnie L. Carter, Jr.** of the CCSF Board of Trustees, and CCSF Dean of Student Affairs **Frank Chong**, representing the Board of Education of the San Francisco Unified School District, welcomed the guests at a special breakfast. At lunch in the Pierre Costé Room, delegates received greetings from Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs **Frances Lee** and Vice Chancellor of Student Development Dr. **Don Griffin**.

A highlight of the conference was a panel of CCSF students offering details about "Why I Chose City College of San Francisco." Panelists were **Israel Abarca**, **Jamescraig Jackson**, **Cameron Kanchuk**, **Sita Resnick**, **Jamaica Taylor** and **Julia Ubungen**. Kanchuk, of Washington State, for instance, pointed out that the diversity of City College was the deciding factor

for her because she wanted to learn more about and interact with people from a greater variety of backgrounds than the rural island culture where she grew up.

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Shared governance update

Parking and Transportation Subcommittee

Minutes of the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee's October 9, 2001 meeting.

Concerning Student Representation: It was decided that **Rick Cantora**, President of Associated Students on the Phelan/Ocean Avenue Campus, and **Skip Fotch**, Dean of Student Activities, should be contacted to encourage students to join the committee. **Susan Baker** volunteered to telephone. **Otto Wong**, Associated Students Shared Governance Coordinator, came in later. He volunteered to join the committee and encourage student participation.

Gerald DeGirolamo, CCSF Chief of Public Safety, was invited to the meeting to give an overview of the Officers and Control Aids at Phelan/Ocean Avenue and JAD Campuses. At the Phelan/Ocean Avenue Campus there are three shifts with three to four officers per shift. There are three Control Aids (ticket writers) who work 16 hours per week. Cloud Circle has a Control Aid patrolling from 7:30 A.M. to 11:30 A.M. daily. On the first day of school, the Faculty Lots are patrolled and ticketed. The Student Lots are given a period of one week and this year two weeks. At JAD there are four officers on two shifts (two early and two late).

DeGirolamo also brought up the problem of egress from the reservoir and the possibility of adding another exit. He Cited problems (blocking the roadway, illegal U-turns) with parents dropping off their children at Riordan School.

Stephen Herman, Dean, CCSF Administrative Services, stated that the college had already been to the city with that request and had gotten nowhere. Furthermore, he said there would be no immediate solution of creating another exit and it might be better to wait until the School Bond passes and parking is built.

Annette Rappleyea, faculty representative, brought up that **Linda Squires-Grohe**, Dean, John Adams Campus, has designated 20 spots for student parking, which is not posted. This has caused confusion as the students are parking everywhere and there is no parking for faculty. **Carlota del Portillo**, Dean, Mission Campus, also assigned parking spaces at her campus and sent a copy of the new guidelines to the Public Safety Department. After communicating with DeGirolamo, del Portillo decided to follow the established district Parking Policy. Neither of the Campus Deans consulted the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee or the Facilities Review Committee. Herman volunteered to draft a memo to all the Campus Deans from the subcommittee to inform them that the committee is not interested in dictating parking policy at their respective campuses, but would like to know if they have gone through a shared governance procedure to determine their parking policy. He will bring the memo to the next meeting.

Month long red parking permits were issued to construction workers by the Facilities and Planning Department, when the shops and warehouse project was being built. It was discussed that a

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parking policy during construction projects is already in place. Rappleyea is to send a copy of the policy to the Facilities and Planning.

Herman suggested that a Policy Manual be created. It was decided this would be a good idea when policy issues come up. Rappleyea, and Classified Representatives **Connie Hector, Richard Gale** and **Susan Baker** agreed to work on creating the Policy Manual. Some things to be included would be the Student Parking Regulations and fees, a map noting the parking spots, and any policies approved within the past few years.

Herman discussed how the monies from the parking permit sales and collections are spent. He stated several Classified Employees' salaries are paid and maintenance on the parking machines and upkeep of the student lots come from parking funds. He offered to bring a full fiscal report to the next meeting.

The poor condition of B Lot after the construction project was completed was discussed. It was decided that the issue of repairing the parking lot should be brought to the attention of Facilities and Planning. Gale volunteered to look into who is responsible for B Lot's repair.

Finally, the motion of reducing the composition of the Subcommittee from three representatives to two for each of the four constituent groups was opened for discussion. The committee had a quorum of seven and the vote was unanimous. This recommendation be forwarded to the Facilities Review Committee for final approval following input from the leaders of each constituent group (faculty, classified, students, and administration).

Bonnie Gratch Lindauer and Brian Lym win \$2,000 grant

Library and Learning Resource librarians **Bonnie Gratch Lindauer** and **Brian Lym** have been awarded a \$2,000 grant from the California Academic and Research Librarians Association. Their proposal entitled, *Developing and Field-Testing Valid Information Competency Assessment Instruments: A Collaboration of Bay Area Community College and CSU Librarians*, was selected for the 2001 Research Award. Lindauer and Lym share the award with a colleague from Santa Rosa Junior College and one from Cabrillo College.

Steven Brown, Amy Kee teach at retreat

Steven Brown, faculty member in the CCSF Department of Environmental Horticulture and Floristry, and CCSF graduate **Amy Kee**, were faculty members of the recently held Floriculture Retreat sponsored by the California State Floral Association (CSFA). The Association plans to repeat the Floral Retreat in August 2002.

Julia Bergman and Joe Thorn are panelists at national conference

Two faculty members participated in the Community College Humanities Association national conference held October 25-27 in Portland, Oregon. The theme was "Odyssey 2001: Human Reflections & Connections."

Julia Bergman, on a panel "Community College Museums and Object-Based Learning," highlighted with slides and a colorful brochure the many uses of one famous art object, **Diego Rivera's** "Pan American Unity" mural.

Joe Thorn, on a "Personal Odysseys" panel, explored the topic "Humanities: Ways In Which They Relate to Asian Comparative Religions."

Continuing Education adds Swedish and Urdu

The Continuing Ed Program has added Swedish and Urdu language classes to the program beginning Spring 2002.

The CCSF Continuing Education (CE) Program served 143 students during the Spring 2001 semester in eight languages beyond those offered by the credit Foreign Language Department.

CE plans to continue to offer Arabic, Czech, Greek, Hindi, Korean, Persian, Brazilian Portuguese, Thai, and Vietnamese during the Spring 2002 semester. The addition of Swedish and Urdu brings the total to 10 languages not offered by the credit Foreign Language Department

Conversational French, Italian, and Spanish are also offered through Continuing Education. CE classes differ from credit language offerings because they are only seven weeks long and emphasize conversation.

The Continuing Education Program does not receive state funding and is entirely self-supporting. Student fees are based on the number of instructional hours and expenses incurred. This gives the program the flexibility to offer classes with as few as eight students.

The Continuing Education Program and the Foreign Language Department collaborate on many aspects. The Foreign Language Department assists CE in screening potential instructors, cross referencing CE language classes in the CCSF class schedule, and participates in the CE Concurrent Enrollment Program.

The Foreign Language Department benefits from participating in the CE Concurrent Enrollment program by earning incentive funds. The Foreign Language Department received \$7670 in the past three years. This allowed the department to advertise in the *San Francisco Chronicle*, produce a department brochure, and to purchase educational materials. The Foreign Language Department also lists its evening classes in the CE class schedule.

Students taking CE foreign language classes typically have a BA, BS, or higher degrees; 75% of them work full time. They use the languages for travel, business, or to converse with family members and friends. CE foreign language classes are held weekday evenings at Marina Middle School, Presidio Middle School, or at the Downtown Campus.

It is the goal of the Continuing Education Program to expand its language offerings.
