CCSF Learning Communities seeking additional faculty members to establish course linkages

Learning Communities at City College of San Francisco is an innovative approach to learning in which faculty and students work together to create a sense of community. In Learning Communities two or more classes are connected through content, ideas and activities. Each community explores a common theme to see relationships between different ideas and subjects. Some links are transfer classes and some are developmental.

Faculty members who are involved in the Learning Communities approach are enthusiastic about how it works. They would love to be contacted by other City College instructors to demonstrate how Learning Communities works and assist City College faculty in linking their courses for additional Learning Communities offerings. In particular they would like to have more Learning Communities instructors from Science, Mathematics, English and Reading.

Ethel Tang-Quan, Coordinator of the Learning Communities program points out that in working with other faculty to create new linkages, "I try to facilitate some type of process of matchmaking. We chat and find out their interests then chat with others about linking their classes. I would like to see more Learning Communities that link with Math and Science, and more English and Speech. I like to link skills classes with content classes."

Tang-Quan continues, "Students in Learning Communities say it's the social aspect that stands out. I think its due to unspoken peer pressure, i.e. people notice if you're absent, etc."

Faculty members who wanted to share their insight about teaching Learning Communities courses included:

Linda Legaspi who has taught in the English Department since 1996, says, "City College is such a big school. You can get lost. Learning Communities makes it more intimate. You make connections with other faculty on a regular basis. I've never worked this closely with other faculty. We help each other to become better teachers. You find ways to connect with learning disabled students. Also, the students develop ties, too. Some departments are concerned because of enrollment issues. We've learned that classes need to be back to back on the same days. Students want prime-time classes. We as teachers don't talk to each

other about education. When you're with another teacher who gives as much, it makes you better. Once they get going, learning goes faster for your students."

Josephine Loo of the Writing Success Project and the Learning Assistance Department, began as a part time counselor at CCSF in 1992 and taught in the Freshman Experience Learning Community in 1999. Loo points out, "Some students haven't had previous educational experiences that were positive. In Learning Communities, students feel more like human beings. They know that we (faculty) talk with each other about them, so they don't feel so anonymous. And students get results more quickly because we see what's not

working and can change direction. Teachers are more willing to be innovative because of the support we receive from our colleagues. It takes a commitment. And that sometimes frightens people. I'm part of the tutorial program, so we can book students right into it if needed. It heightens the reason we entered this profession to begin with. Learning Communities restores your 'freshman zeal.'"

Joyce Brady, who has been an instructor in the Health Science Department for 13 years, says, "We are students forever. Teachers should observe our Learning Communities classes rather than just reading about it. They should sit in on a class and ask questions like 'Why did this happen?' We need to make more of a Learning Community of Learning Communities instructors. We need a greater relationship with other Learning Communities teachers. Teaching is all about relationships and learning through relationships. In our paired class we have one syllabus, one test. Initially, it's work. Building takes work. You design the tools that will help you formulate the thing you're trying to do."

Ethel Tang-Quan, Speech Instructor in the English Department for 25 years, says, "What makes Learning Communities successful is communica-

tion. It's the key element. Joyce gives me so much insight into what's going on with me. I get to be a learner too, not just be an authority sitting at the head of the class. I've grown as a teacher and as a human being. Joyce has challenged the routine from the past. Joyce has demanded this openness. We talk about what's bothering us now, and that's spilled over to the rest of my life, too. There are rough spots. We did not know each other before we started. One of our goals this semester was to bring more joy into class. I love to talk about students with my colleague. There is a connection between student and Learning Communities teacher. They ask for recommendations and keep in touch after graduation."

William A. McGuire, English and Humanities faculty, says of Learning Communities, "I can see how other teachers teach. It's cooperative, not off-putting like a formal evaluation. The cross-fertilization adds more tricks to the bag. Humanities is the integration of art and other disciplines. Students really like it. It's a win/win for both of us. Students in LCOM 106 San Francisco Arts explore the novel *The Maltese Falcon* with one faculty member exploring it from the English point of view and one from the art and historical point of view. This is the only opportunity for team teaching at this school. Students come to class very cozy and loving. Those circles of warmth are rare and wonderful. A year goes by and I see guys still hanging together."

Louise Nayer, English Department instructor, says, "When you're teaching it's great to feel the class is more unified. We get a sense that students know each other better. We have weekly meetings between **Tim Killikelly** and I. Students respond."

I. CALL TO ORDER

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 2:43 P.M.

II. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

The agenda was adopted as amended without objection.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of October 17, 2001 were approved as amended without objection.

IV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Ophelia Clark made several announcements. The bond election is next Tuesday. The Enhanced Self-Study (ESS) Ad Hoc Coordinating Committee has forwarded many recommendations to the appropriate Governance committees; some will come before Council. African-American faculty, administrators, and staff will host a Prop A fundraiser on Thursday, November 1. Council member Nance announced that there is a petition to rename Benjamin Franklin Middle School as Burl Abron Toler Middle School. Former CCSF administrator Toler was the first African-American secondary school principal in the San Francisco Unified School District.

V. OFFICERS' REPORTS

A. President

President Ophelia Clark distributed a written report. She attended a meeting of the Promoting Diversity and Student Equity external working group. She

reminded Council about the Council meeting attendance rules in the Senate Constitution. Vice Chancellor Goldstein informed the Board on Thursday, October 25, that the College budget will feel the effects of low sales tax revenues locally.

B. First Vice President

First Vice President David Yee attended an ITPC meeting; he will report on it at the next Council meeting.

C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Lopez reported that she has been following up on the Administrative Evaluation Process. The Chancellor is checking with the Senate, the Associated Students, and Classified leadership for input. Lopez is exploring middle ground that would not unduly minimize faculty and classified input; meanwhile she expects to bring the current draft to the next meeting for discussion.

D. Secretary

No report.

VI. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Safety Issues

President Ophelia Clark has written a memo to the College Advisory Council about emergency planning by its Health and Safety Committee. She and Council member Sunny Clark attended that Committee's meeting on Tuesday, October 23. The current emergency manual needs updating. Council member Sunny Clark agreed to update medical sections. Other sections might be distributed only to employees who need to know the contents. Council discussed several ideas, some of which had been discussed at the Committee meeting. These included phone stickers with emergency numbers, automated voice messages in faculty voicemail boxes, floor-level arrows indicating evacuation routes through hallways, incorporating emergency information into instructors' handouts, Flex Day workshops, and battery-operated office radios.

B. 2001-2002 Executive Council Goals
Second Vice President Lopez encouraged Council members to submit ideas for goals to the Senate office or to post them on the Council email list-serve, by the time of the following Council meeting at the latest.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Area B (Bay Area Regional) Meeting of the State Academic Senate

Second Vice President Lopez reported that she attended the Area B Meeting, held on October 19 and 20 in Alameda. The purpose of the meeting was to prepare for the State Academic Senate Fall Session, to be held later this month. Lopez provided handouts listing some resolutions discussed at the meeting, and offered to get a copy of any resolution that individual Council members wanted to see. One important resolution criticized the lack of State Academic Senate input in forming accreditation teams, and the replacement of qualitative standards with data-driven, corporate-model standards. The Western Association of Schools and Colleges will hear feedback on its proposed new standards in January in San Francisco.

State Chancellor Nussbaum has decided not to contest an appellate court ruling that some Community College affirmative action procedures are not in compliance with the law; instead he will write an advisory memo. Council member Nance affirmed that the College believes it is in compliance and therefore will not be affected. The California Department of Finance is trying to set educational policy; the State Academic Senate will consider a resolution to prevent that.

Lopez reported that she had, at President Clark's suggestion, introduced in Area B a resolution to study low cost housing options for faculty. This resolution will go to the state conference.

B. Documents on the CCSF Website

President Ophelia Clark reported that the Board agendas and minutes are now

available online from Vice Chancellor Goldstein's webpages. Clark mentioned that Goldstein's office was willing to provide additional forms online. Second Vice President Lopez discussed with Council a rough draft of a resolution about encouraging the increased availability and use of online forms. She plans to introduce the motion formally at the next meeting.

C. Emeritus Faculty Status Update

Council member Mueller distributed copies of the current CCSF emeritus policy, adopted by the (Credit) Executive Council in 1983. The officers and Council member Mueller will draft a resolution updating the policy. Council discussed privileges that might be granted to emeritus faculty.

D. Strategic Planning Project of the Planning and Budgeting Council (PBC)

Second Vice President Lopez reminded Council that the PBC is reviewing the implementation status of the current Strategic Plan. She informed Council that, although items are moved from the Strategic Plan into the Annual Plan, these items have sometimes constituted less than half of the Annual Plan.

Lopez presented charts showing that the completion rates of the various strategies ranged from 0% to 60%. Budget, Facilities and Technology strategies had relatively high completion figures in contrast to Supportive Working Environment, Quality Service, and Continuous Program Improvement. The relatively low figures may be a result of the action items having been designed with extremely broad scope, encompassing many steps.

E. Enhanced Self-Study (ESS) Ad Hoc Committees

Council member Mueller reminded Council that the term of the ESS Ad Hoc Committees was limited, due to the nature of ad hoc committees, and has expired. According to our Standing Rules, Council must reactivate ad hoc committees and task forces after they

have sunset. If there are still issues to be resolved, the Ad Hoc should stop meeting and bring the matter to a standing Committee or Subcommittee.

VIII. GOVERNANCE REPORTS

A. Academic Policies (AP) Committee

Council member Mueller reported that the Classified staff wish to have a representative on the Academic Policies Committee. Council agreed that this was appropriate.

2001-10-31-01 (Mueller/Teti) MSU That Council authorize President Clark to approve, along with the Chancellor, adding a Classified position to the composition of the Academic Policies Committee.

B. College Diversity Advisory Committee (of the College Advisory Council)

Council member Nance reaffirmed that the College's hiring procedures are in compliance with the State code and will not be affected by State Chancellor Nussbaum's memo. The Committee is reviewing the affirmative action policy,

and wishes to encourage outreach in order to have faculty more closely resemble the student body. The Committee may recommend a workshop to help prospective faculty apply for academic jobs more effectively.

IX. OPEN FORUM

Council member Homer reported that she had participated in the very successful Teach-in panels. The Teach-in panels were held in the Diego Rivera Theater. Topics included the role of the U.S. in Middle East politics, and racial profiling. The next Teach-ins are scheduled for 12-2 P.M., November 14 and 15, in the Diego Rivera Theatre. Topics will include the role of the media in the current crisis, and the role of government in political dissent.

X. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 P.M.
