Chancellor Day outlines ways to insure privacy of information

In recent weeks, perhaps because of heightened security and disclosure of information nationally, there has been much concern expressed over the issue of privacy of information. Coincidentally, at City College, our Information Technology Policy Committee, under the leadership of **William Beaver**, has been engaged in the deliberation and formation of a proposed policy statement to ensure the privacy of information and prevent identity theft. The policy recommended by the ITPC pertains primarily to computerized information about students stored in the BANNER student information system, but ITPC has also recommended that the college review all aspects of information sharing policies with respect to confidentiality and disclosure. Toward that end, we have asked the Chair of the Academic Policies Committee, **Madeline Mueller**, to work with the Chair of the Information Technology Policy Committee, **William Beaver**, to begin a research process and in consultation with others to help us move toward an effective policy with respect to the issue of privacy.

One of the immediate steps we know that we must take, even prior to the full development of a policy on privacy, is to cease our use of social security numbers as identification numbers for students and employees. With the help of the Information Technology Services Department and the ITPC advisory groups, we are going to replace SSNs with newly generated random identification numbers. We hope to have that system in

place early in the next academic term. We will provide everyone with additional information on this when the details are fully developed.

In the meantime, we need to take two additional measures. First, we are asking all BANNER users to look up records of students and employees by names rather than social security numbers; and the ITS Department will ensure that only the last four digits of social security numbers are displayed for viewing rather than the entire SSN. Second, we are asking that everyone examine his or her departmental or personal practices to identify any transactions or reports (e.g. grade lists)

that might have previously provided access to or displayed SSNs and to make those numbers blind (except perhaps for the last four digits) in order to protect privacy. We believe that these two measures, despite some short-term inconveniences, will provide us with an appropriate short-term solution while we work toward a more complete policy and procedure to protect privacy.

I want to thank the ITPC and the Associated Students who have brought this matter to our collective attention, and I know you will help us to ensure that we protect the privacy of our students and employees with maximum feasible vigilance.

FAQ will explain new law on nonresident tuition exemption

Editor's Note: Vice Chancellor of Student Development Don Griffin and his staff have developed the following list of Frequently Asked Questions concerning the new AB540 Nonresident Tuition Exemption statute.

1. What is AB540?

AB540 is a new state law that exempts certain students who are not residents of California from paying nonresident tuition at California Community Colleges and California State Universities.

2. Who is eligible?

Students, "other than a nonimmigrant aliens," who meet ALL of the following requirements are eligible for the AB540 nonresident tuition exemption.

- You attended a California high school for three or more years.
- You graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent of a high school diploma from California (e.g., GED or California Proficiency Exam).
- You registered in Spring 2002 or later.
- You completed a City College Student Exemption From Nonresident Tuition form.

3. If I do not have a GED or high school diploma, where can I go to get one?

Courses are available in City College of San Francisco's Noncredit Division to prepare you for the GED. For more information, please call the Adult Learning Center at (415) 241-2300.

4. Will the information I provide be given to Immigration?

No. All information obtained shall be held in the strictest confidence.

5. What steps do I take to determine whether I qualify?

Complete a Student Exemption From Nonresident Tuition form. City College will determine your eligibility based on your application and Student Exemption From Nonresident Tuition form.

6. Does AB540 make me eligible for Financial Aid and/or EOPS?

No. However, please contact EOPS and the Financial Aid Office for more information regarding their programs. EOPS: Ocean/Phelan campus behind Smith Hall, (415) 239-3561. Financial Aid: Ocean/ Phelan campus, Cloud Hall 324, (415) 239-3576.

7. If I qualify for exemption from nonresident tuition under AB540, how much do I have to pay to attend CCSF?

\$11 per unit.

8. If I paid nonresident tuition in the past, can I be reimbursed?

No. However, you may be eligible for reimbursement if you paid nonresident tuition for Spring 2002.

9. When can I apply?

You can apply at any time. Complete the Student Exemption From Nonresident Tuition form and submit it to Admission and Records Credit Division, Conlan Hall 107.

10. Where can I go for more information and a Student Exemption From Nonresident Tuition form?

For additional information and a Student Exemption From Nonresident Tuition form, contact: Admission and Records—Credit (Conlan Hall 107); Admission and Records—Noncredit (31 Gough St.); Admission and Enrollment (all campuses); Counseling (all campuses); Chinatown/North Beach (940 Filbert St.); African American Scholastic Programs (Bungalow 500); and Latino Services Network (Cloud 364).

11. If I am a U.S. citizen, does this apply to me?

Yes. AB540 applies to you if you attended a California high school for three or more years AND you graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent of a high school diploma from California (e.g., GED or California Proficiency Exam).

12. Does qualifying under AB540 mean that I now meet California residency requirements?

No.

13. Does qualifying under AB540 affect my U.S. residency application?

No.

Dennis Deaver never gave up hope of returning to work here

A little more than three years ago **Dennis Deaver** was "working at CCSF as a Stationery Engineer, thinking life was great and would go on forever." Then he got word from his doctors that he had developed hepatitis C, his liver was debilitated and he would at best have only a few years to live. "Shortly after that diagnosis, I had a massive liver failure and ended up in the hospital. It became apparent that I couldn't work anymore." However, that was not the end of this story, but the beginning.

His supervisor, **Jim Keenan**, called Dennis at the hospital. Dennis remembers, "Jim said we at CCSF are going to help you and stand by you until you have a transplant and can come back to work."

It would begin a journey that would take three years before finding the right donor. "In that entire time, I never once missed a pay check," said Dennis. "I could not have done that without Jim Keenan and the support of my coworkers. They recruited and found a lot of people, mostly people who were going to retire with sick leave on the books. Thirty hours here, 20 hours there, these things translated into paychecks." And because he was still on the books, Dennis remained eligible for medical and insurance benefits.

Dennis received the transplant on June 18, 2001. After a nine-day stint in

Stanford hospital and six months of rehabilitation, he returned to work at City College on December 10.

Dennis says that he wants to raise awareness of Hepatitis C. "It's a vital thing. A blood thing. You can get it from transfusions, tattoos, body piercing. It sits quietly in your system for years. There are no symptoms. One day, you'll wake up and you'll be hemorrhaging inside. It's only been discovered since 1991 when they got the test that detects it."

As to being back on the job, Dennis, says, "I want to thank everyone who helped me to get back here on the job."

Donald J. Devoto, most senior H&R Dept. instructor, passes away

Donald Jennings Devoto, who began teaching in the Hotel and Restaurant Department in 1958, died from a heart attack in his Mill Valley home on Wednesday, November 28, 2001, two days after instructing what would be his last class at CCSF and one day prior to his seventy-seventh birthday.

Mr. Devoto was a descendent of one of San Francisco's oldest families, his grandfather having helped build one of Nob Hill's first homes. Mr. Devoto was born and raised in The City, graduating from Lowell High School. He attended the University of California, Berkeley, and completed his undergraduate degree at the School of Hotel Administration at Cornell University. During World War II, he served in Europe on the staff of General **Omar Bradley**. After the war, he began a thirty-three-year career with Hilton Hotels, serving as an executive in

San Francisco, Dallas and Atlantic City, retiring as Vice President and General Manager of the Reno Hilton.

Mr. Devoto began teaching marketing at City College and in later years instructed in Hotel Administration. He also helped to establish the Hospitality Program at the University of San Francisco, as well as instructed in the Hotel and Restaurant Program at Diablo Valley College. He served as the President of the Nevada Hotel and Lodging Association, where he was inducted into its Hall of Fame, a Director of the San Mateo County Convention and Visitor's Bureau, a Trustee of the Nevada Gaming Commission, Treasurer of the National Hotel Sales and Marketing Association, and Chair of the Education Committee of the California Hotel and Lodging Association. Since 1987 Mr. Devoto had a consulting practice and was Western

Regional Director of Cayuga Hospitality Advisors.

Mr. Devoto was an avid sportsman and environmentalist, spending many summers at his home in Sun Valley, Idaho.

He is survived by his wife of over fifty years, **Nida**, his children, **Dana Humber**, **Sally Hagstrom** and **Jeffrey Devoto**, his brother, **Justin Devoto**, and seven grandchildren.

The H&R family will always remember Don Devoto for his tremendous business acumen, his wonderful and warm sense of humor and his genuine care for his colleagues, our civil service staff and, most of all, his students.
