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Asian Infusion Project wins kudos

Psychology Instructor **Lisa Harrison**, Political Science Instructor **Lou Schubert** and Dean **Sandra Handler** were pleased to have been invited to give a presentation on CCSF's Asian Infusion Project at the recent Community Colleges for International Development (CCID) Conference in Tampa, Florida. One of the goals of the organization is to internationalize the curriculum. The Asian Infusion Seminar Series Project at City College meets that objective. The enthusiasm and the commitment of the presenters were contagious. Community colleges in Denver, Colorado and in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania are already making plans to emulate the process.

This is the third year of this project at CCSF. This semester 20 outstanding faculty members from a variety of disciplines are participating. Monthly seminars are held featuring prominent speakers. For example, in Fall '01 experts lectured and led seminars on "Taoist Wanderings in the Mysterious East," "The Rise of Entrepreneurs in China," "And There Can Be No Twain: Bridging the Gap to Japanese Fiction and Poetry," and "Filipino Histories: Using and Abusing the Past in the Present." Topics this semester include "China's Contribution to American Law," "How the Self Remembered: Cultural Contexts of Autobiographical Memory," and "Islamic Issues." The inspiring speakers provide the impetus for the participants to discover new information linking Asia to their particular courses in a variety of ways. There is also a mentoring component. This year **Karin Hu** (Psychology), **Marc Kitchel** (Economics), **Tim Killikelly** (Political Science), **Sharyn**

Kuusisto (Foreign Languages), **Louise Nayer** (English), and **Lou Schubert** (Political Science) are serving as mentors. The faculty new to the project this year are **Tim Berthold** ((Health Sciences), **Karen Cox** (English), **Bob Davis** (Music), **Lou Marla Dea** (ESL and Health Sciences), **Joy Durighello** (ESL), **Jeff Goldthorpe** (English), **Peggy Gorham** (Music), **Michelle Gorthy** (Speech), **Lisa Harrison** (Psychology), **Wendy Kaufmyn** (Engineering), **David Landes** (Economics), **Arthur Nishimura** (Sociology) and **Lia Smith** (ESL). Two active members of the local East-West Group are serving as faculty liaisons: **Joan Wilson** (English) for Fall '01 and **Bob Irwin** (ESL) for Spring '02. The new participants will present their revised syllabi at the May seminar.

All of those associated with Asian Infusion appreciate the opportunity to discuss ideas with excellent instructors from a variety of disciplines and value the intellectual challenges which the speakers and the readings provide. This has proven to be one successful way to bring varying points of view/cultural contexts to our curriculum. Our students have demonstrated clearly their approval and appreciation. The project was originally funded by a grant from the State Chancellor's Office. The CCSF Office of Research and Development, the Institute for International Students, Vice Chancellor **Frances Lee** and Chancellor **Philip Day** provided the leadership to make the project happen.

Subject: NOMINATIONS TO EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Nominations are now open for the 2002-2004 term of office on the Executive Council of the Academic Senate. There are fifteen (15) vacancies, each of which is for a two-year term. Note: if any of the fourteen (14) members whose terms expire in Spring 2003 (see below) resign before the seating of the new Council, their term(s) will be completed by the runners-up in this election, starting with the person ranked 16th in number of votes received and proceeding in order of decreasing vote number until all the vacant positions are filled.

Nominations for Council membership are made by petition (see over for Petition form). Each petition must be endorsed by three (3) members of the Senate (any three faculty) and must include the signed acceptance of the nominee. In addition to the petition, each nominee may include a statement of **NO MORE than 25 words** to be included with the ballot. **Longer statements will be edited or omitted.**

Candidates should be aware of the following provisions of the Constitution.

ART III (Constitution): The Council shall consist of 29 members elected at large, subject to the following provision: that no more than three Senate members from a department, as defined in the Bylaws, shall serve on the Council at one time, except ESL, which shall have no more than six.

ART IV (Constitution): A candidate for membership on the Council must be nominated by written petition of three Senate members and must accept the nomination in writing on the petition. For public information, petitions will be posted at the Academic Senate office on the day they are received. The balloting must be completed at least four weeks before the end of the semester.

If, by March 8th (the close of nominations), the number of candidates does not equal twice the number of vacancies to be filled, the Council or the Election Commission shall postpone balloting one week, during which time additional candidates may be nominated upon the written petition of one Senate member and the written acceptance of the candidate. The postponed balloting shall then take place regardless of the number of candidates.

I. CALL TO ORDER

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 2:45 P.M.

II. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

The agenda was adopted as amended without objection.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. Approval of December 12, 2001 Executive Council Minutes

The minutes of December 12, 2001 were approved as amended without objection.

B. Approval of January 14, 2002 Plenary Minutes

The minutes of January 14, 2002 were approved as amended without objection.

IV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Ophelia Clark announced that the College is experiencing increased enrollment. The statewide Academic Senate will hold its annual Vocational Leadership seminar in February in Santa Cruz. The U.S. government increased Pell grants to \$4000. Further, Perkins Act (VATEA) funding increased by \$80 million, of which CCSF will receive a portion. Hispanic Serving Institutions received \$26 million. The GED test is now available online, but there has been a change in the policy for accepting old test scores. Council members Delgado and Martinez announced that Puente program students

won various honors last semester. Individual students won scholarships from PG&E. admission to U.C. Berkeley, the opportunity to cut a record with Santana, and admission into the U.S. Marshalls internship program. Council member Verdugo announced that the Latino/Latina Services Center is advertising its services to students at all campuses.

Council member Nance is drafting a calendar of events for Black History month.

Council member Fan will help to present Understanding Iranian Culture through Film, a four-film series at the Rosenberg Library.

V. OFFICERS' REPORTS

A. President

On December 1, President Ophelia Clark attended a meeting on proposed changes in accreditation standards. On January 21, she attended a breakfast, and participated in the march, commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The December Board meeting featured student speakers opposing certain aspects of the hiring of the new "Director" of the Latino Services Network. She reported that some student leaders are campaigning to have students serve on faculty hiring committees. However, Clark observed that the California Education Code clearly assigns authority on faculty hiring matters to faculty.

B. First Vice President

No report.

C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Susan Lopez reported that she and Secretary Teti have been working on the Mathematics Graduation Requirement Study Group. The news about the SFUSD algebra requirement has been a consideration for faculty on the study group. She reported also that the Cesar Chavez birthday holiday is a new California state holiday even though it is not on the CCSF academic calendar. She spoke with Allan Fisher,

who indicated that it may have been an oversight that it was not negotiated, and that he would raise the issue with the Union representatives.

D. Secretary

No report.

VI. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Administrative Evaluation

President Clark distributed copies of the "Hiring, Evaluation, and Retreat Rights" Appendix of the Administrator Hiring Document, of the current Administrator Evaluation instrument, and of the proposed Administrative Evaluation document. Changes include having the input about the evaluatee come from surveys instead of interviews, doing away with the evaluation committee, and, instead, convening an oversight committee which would act briefly at the end of the process. Second Vice President Lopez mentioned a concern that the evaluatee's supervisor writes the report alone, and the supervisor controls the list of colleagues consulted. The proposed procedure includes the possibility for input from volunteer evaluators. The Chancellor has agreed that the proposed treatment of new administrators with less-than-satisfactory evaluations is imperfect as currently drafted. Council member Mueller reminded Council that it was primarily the Senate and the Board that formulated the Hiring, Evaluation, and Retreat Rights policy in 1991 as a package, and the process is governed by AB1725. The conditions in Part IV (Service Term) of the proposed procedure do not conform to state code, and there are poorly phrased sentences in Part III (Oversight Committee).

B. Further Implementation of Executive Council Goals

Second Vice President Lopez reported on further implementation of the Council Goal One (To Strengthen the

Representational Nature of the Council). Public Relations Director Martha Lucey has approved starting a monthly Senate column in *City Currents*. Council member Mueller will encourage the Chairs at the DCC to promote Senate and other shared governance participation in their departments. The latest Council meeting agendas were sent to all campuses. Second Vice President Lopez asked Council members for suggestions on ways to continue the recruitment of diverse candidates and recruit larger numbers of candidates from all campuses and from the special services programs. Council members made several good suggestions.

C. Update on Mathematics Graduation Requirement Study Group

Secretary Teti reported that the faculty on the Mathematics Graduation Requirement Study Group agreed to recommend that CCSF maintain the current graduation requirement and perhaps revisit the requirement in the next accreditation cycle. A better long-term decision on the requirement can be made after seeing the result of the new SFUSD algebra requirement, and it is logical to review the requirement together with all the current recommendations that have impact on the structure of the CCSF Associate Degree.

D. Vision Statement

First Vice President Yee distributed copies of the Chancellor's Vision Statement, as will be presented at the January 24 Board meeting in the Chancellor's report. Also included will be appendices with links to the Strategic Plan.

E. Enhanced Self-Study (ESS) Update

President Clark again encouraged faculty to read the texts of the ESS recommendations on the Web, as well as Dr. Kathe German's ESS article in *City Currents*.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements Meeting

President Clark reminded faculty that the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements will meet on February 13. Next week's Council packets will include the material, and the February 6 Council meeting will feature a Bipartite Committee training workshop.

Other potential agenda items, along with the ESS recommendations, include student attendance policies, a website accessibility policy, definitions of "certificate" and "award of achievement," and a possible Information Competency degree requirement.

X. OPEN FORUM

President Clark reminded Council that the Chancellor reported that the Counseling Department will split into four departments. Dr. Day, Vice Chancellor Griffin, and Senate member Ann Clark are still working on the details.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 P.M.
