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Student Health Center gets wired

Thanks to the support and efforts of the Student Development and Technology Office (SDTO) under Vice Chancellor Don Griffin, the two arms of Student Health-Medical/Nursing Services and Psychological Services-are now wired!

In January we returned to find new computers distributed throughout the Health Service. Prior to receiving these new machines, Student Health had been limping along in our on-line capabilities. However, this new equipment, funded through SDTO, has brought us into the new millennium. All of us at Student Health can now, at the very least, communicate with our campus colleagues through email, can pull useful and relevant information off the web, and can create Word documents for those writing projects we all have to do. Some of us have more experience and facility with using computers than others, but it's amazing what even a little bit of practice and experience can do. Already, after a just a few weeks of use, even the most reticent among us have become enthusiastic learners and users.

Most importantly, these new computers have created the capability for us to install a new, grant-funded program called Medpro. Medpro is a program that is designed specifically for use by medical clinics/health services. A number of colleges and universities throughout California, such as Sacramento State University, Dominguez Hills State University and the University of Alabama have been using Medpro in their health centers. The program is designed to allow us to schedule and reschedule appointments, gather information in a data base, and do patient check-in directly from the computer. The types of complex information required to be collected by the nursing staff is now facilitated by the Medpro program and needed and otherwise useful statistics can be captured and stored in the data base. This data base simplifies the process of obtaining patient information needed for direct services as

well as facilitates obtaining information for generating reports on any number of useful subjects.

Since most psychological services do not follow a strict medical model, few programs of this nature include a mental health component. One of the attractive features of Medpro is that it comes with a mental health component and also has the capability of adapting most program functions to the particulars of the needs of mental health clinics. And of course, program security and student confidentiality have been utmost in our minds in all phases of adapting the program.

Since the start of the semester, Student Health staff have been busily engaged in learning the Medpro system and have already begun to see the enormous advantages of using it. The efficiency in scheduling and rescheduling appointments alone has made a noticeable difference in the use of staff time. Soon, with the use of the bar code system making student, faculty and staff information instantly available, our efficiency will be increased even more dramatically. As our learning curves level off and our comfort levels increase, we will see even greater improvements in our overall program functioning, and we will be able to get more and better information faster which will guide us in future programming.

We wish to thank **Lindy McKnight** in SDTO, Vice Chancellor **Don Griffin** and all the great help and support we have received from ITS for propelling us into a new, high-tech semester with the minimal amount of "kicking and screaming."

## I. CALL TO ORDER

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 2:42 P.M.

## II. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

The agenda was adopted without objection.

## III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of January 23, 2002 were approved as amended without objection.

## IV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Ophelia Clark announced that there was an arson fire in Cloud Hall Room 328 on Tuesday, February 5. Second Vice President Lopez announced that there was recently a small arson fire on the outside grounds of Mission Campus. Clark announced also that former Council President Ray Berard will be retiring at the end of this semester.

Council member Nance circulated a petition to support renaming Benjamin Franklin Middle School as Burt Toler Middle School.

Council member Delgado confirmed that some Puente student scholarships are awarded by special-interest groups of PG&E employees and not by PG&E itself. Council member Martinez announced

that the Puente program sponsored a mentor gathering for faculty and students.

## V. OFFICERS' REPORTS

### A. President

President Clark, First Vice President Yee, and Council member Mueller attended the last Board meeting. It was announced that the new Board President is Trustee Rodel Rodis and the new Vice President is Trustee Johnnie Carter, Jr.

Trustee Rodis has attended many Council meetings, so Clark will invite Trustee Carter to a future Council meeting.

During the Disciplines List (minimum quals) hearing at the State Academic Senate Standards and Practices Committee meeting on Friday, February 1 at the Oakland Waterfront Plaza, Senate members Mike Hulbert, Joani Marinoff, and Tim Berthold testified against some

of the proposed changes. President Clark is a member of that Committee and heard the testimony.

### B. First Vice President

First Vice President Yee has attended meetings of the Information Technology Policies Committee and of the Planning and Budgeting Council. He warned Council that, in his role as timekeeper, he may need to become slightly more aggressive about enforcement.

### C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Lopez reported that she attempted to attend the last Board meeting but was refused parking. She has reviewed the 2001-2002 Mid-Year Assessment Report. She will investigate the connection between the Unit Objectives and the Annual Plan.

At the recent Bipartite Committee meeting, more than 30 people attended, including Executive Council members, administrators, and those department chairpersons who spoke on behalf of their own requests. ## VI. Unfinished Business

### A. Workshop on upcoming Bipartite Committee Meeting

Senate member Mueller reviewed the history and rationale behind the CCSF Graduation Requirements. President Clark distributed a summary of these requirements. Mueller discussed past practice on interpreting such phrases as “general introductory” (specifically as applied to in Foreign Languages and Mathematics). Clark and Mueller walked Council through the approval process using some of the current requests as illustrative examples.

### B. Status Report on 2001-2002 Executive Council Goals

President Clark mentioned that her first monthly Senate article will appear by the end of February in City Currents. Clark continues to work with other College constituencies on the Alternative Calendar Working group. Second Vice President Lopez will continue to work on implementing strategies for recruiting candidates for next year’s Council.

### C. Update on Mathematics Graduation Requirement Study Group

Secretary Teti reported that both the administrators and the faculty on the Mathematics Graduation Study Group have produced position papers, and these were included in the packets. He and Second Vice President Lopez briefly went over the documents. Teti reported also that the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements is likely to table the issue of the Mathematics Graduation Requirement until the College is ready to consider the possible restructuring of the Associate Degree as a whole. It was agreed that a memo be sent affirming that the use of the Academic Senate letterhead on the faculty paper was not meant to indicate that the paper

was the official Executive Council position.

## VII. NEW BUSINESS

### A. Foreign Language Placement Units Recommendation from Academic Policies Committee

Council member Mueller, Chair of the Academic Policies Committee, described that Committee’s discussion of the recommendation. Senate members Jackie Green and Tom Blair briefed Council on the year-long history behind the Foreign Language advisory placement test proposal. There was concern about possible conflicts with the “Credit by Examination” section of the Catalog, so the Department was encouraged to get the Council’s support.

### 2002-02-06-01 (Mueller/Lopez) MSU

That Council support the Foreign Language Department’s request to give advisory placement tests and allow students who place into and complete successfully an advanced-level class with an A or a B to be awarded the units of the immediately preceding level of that language.

### B. Impact of Potential Program Budget Cuts

President Clark drew attention to copies of the Governor’s analysis of the State funding. Clark encouraged faculty to oppose any cuts, possibly with a letter-writing campaign. It was mentioned that the entire staff development budget (including faculty travel funds) was cut because of lack of a perceived lack of accountability. Faculty should be alert for news about the “May Revise” of the budget.

## VIII. GOVERNANCE REPORTS

### A. Noncredit Issues Subcommittee (of the Academic Policies Committee)

Second Vice President Susan Lopez reported that the proposal to count Noncredit attendance by census has been referred by the State Chancellor’s Cabinet

to the Funding Formula Task Force for review. Lopez reminded Council of Subcommittee Chair Eve Tarquino’s Plenary report on the Noncredit teaching load. One proposal is to redesignate a few of the 25 weekly contact hours as “availability hours” for meeting with individual students, rather than teaching hours. Many noncredit faculty do not have offices, but could still arrange to meet with students. She explained the possible impact of a compressed calendar on the Noncredit teaching load.

### B. Health and Safety Committee (of the College Advisory Council)

Council member Sunny Clark reminded Council that she was asked to review the College’s Emergency Operation Plan Manual. She and Health Science faculty confirmed that the Manual’s information was decades out of date. The Committee asked Council member Sunny Clark and Senate member Annie Tse to update the Manual, possibly with the help of a working group, and to plan trainings in CPR, First Aid, AED, and disaster response management. The Committee favored devoting release time for faculty to improve the Manual, and Vice Chancellor Goldstein agreed to try to find funding. Council member Kox mentioned that Rita Jones, Dean of Library and Learning Resources, has implemented an emergency plan for Rosenberg Library. Sunny Clark mentioned also that CCSF is designated as an emergency triage center, yet few of the College employees have been trained for triage work.

## IX. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 P.M.
