## City College of San Francisco's Bio-Link National Center receives \$50,000 from Genentech, Inc.

**David Ebersman**, Senior Vice President for Product Operations at Genentech, Inc., presented a check for \$50,000 to the Board of Trustees of City College of San Francisco on behalf of the College's Bio-Link program. The presentation was made at a regularly scheduled Board of Trustees meeting the night of February 28. The gift from Genentech will establish a national equipment registry for biotechnology education. The registry will provide an effective way for companies to donate equipment to educational programs that prepare workers for the biotechnology industry.

"On behalf of all Genentech employees, I would like to say how pleased we are to make this donation which will assist City College and other colleges throughout the nation in developing future leaders in biotechnology," said Ebersman in presenting the check.

"City College is most grateful to Genentech, the guiding force behind this national effort, and to the registry's designer, David Ebersman," said Dr. **Elaine Johnson**, Director of Bio-Link, a National Advanced Technological Education Center for Biotechnology.

Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, Chancellor of City College of San Francisco, said, "I extend my deepest appreciation to Genentech for its investment in community colleges, and City College of San Francisco in particular. This investment will help all community colleges prepare the future workforce in biotechnology."

Genentech, Inc. has provided ongoing support for community colleges that

include necessary biotechnology skills as a part of their educational programs. Community college biotechnology graduates are entering the biotech workforce with rewarding careers and opportunities for advancement within the industry.

Bio-Link was funded three years ago by the National Science Foundation. It receives additional support from industry, the University of California San Francisco (UCSF) and other partner institutions.

**Alternative Calendar Working Group**

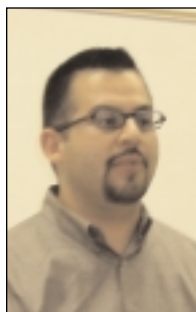

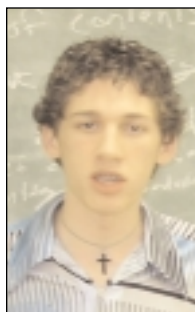

# Speech & Debate Team members earn awards at Northern California Forensics Championships

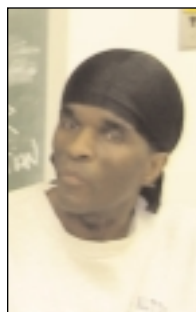
Eight students and two coaches from City College of San Francisco's Speech and Debate Team traveled to CSU-Chico on February 8-10 for the Northern California Forensics Association's

Championship Tournament. The eight Rams in attendance were **Marlon Reynolds, Daryl Michael, Bobby Frazier, Joseph Trumbo, Vincent Chandler, Philip Nails, Jud Fox, and Nixon Hazard**. The Rams were coached by **Sami Kudsi**, Assistant Forensics Coach, and **Michelle Gorthy**, Forensics Coach. At the tournament CCSF competed against a total of 22 colleges and universities.

**Vincent Chandler** and **Philip Nails** tied for second place in the category of Impromptu Speaking. **Joseph Trumbo** was a finalist in Impromptu Speaking. There were a total of 70 students entered in the Impromptu Speaking event.

**Vincent Chandler** and **Philip Nails** also advanced to octo-finals in Parliamentary Debate. **Bobby Frazier** earned a tenth place Speaker Award in Parliamentary Debate. There were a total of 60 students entered in Parliamentary Debate.

At the NCFCA Championship CCSF students competed against students from UC Davis, Butte Community College, Foothill College, CSU-Humboldt, Cabot Community College, Modesto Junior College, Yuba Community College, University of Nevada-Reno, Contra Costa Community College, Solano Community College, CSU-Chico, CSU-Fresno, Santa Rosa Community College, Fresno City College, CSU-San Jose, San Joaquin Delta College, Diablo Valley College, Los Rios Community College, CSU-San Francisco, Deanza College, and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.

The NCFCA Championships marked the first tournament to be attended by the forensics team's newest coach, **Michelle Gorthy**, who previously coached the forensics squad at Cuyamaca College in Southern California.

In reference to the success of the team **Sami Kudsi**, Assistant Forensics Coach stated, "We have an excellent squad this time around. Most of them are very up to date on their current events and have a thorough understanding of argumentation theory, which makes them if nothing else a challenge to every debate team they meet. When we lose, we never go down easy and that's all that matters to me. When we win, well everyone loves winning, so I have little to say about that. The Rams are more about education than collecting trophies, but we have earned our share of awards over the years. Our next big challenge will be the State Champs March 13-18 in Concord, so my focus is on getting the team ready for that. Southern California is very tough, so we have our work cut out for us."

# Nominations sought for Executive Council

Nominations are now open for the 2002-2004 term of office on the Executive Council of the Academic Senate. There are fifteen (15) vacancies, each of which is for a two-year term. Note: if any of the fourteen (14) members whose terms expire in Spring 2003 (see below) resign before the seating of the new Council, their term(s) will be completed by the runners-up in this election, starting with the person ranked 16th in number of votes received and proceeding in order of decreasing vote number until all the vacant positions are filled.

Nominations for Council membership are made by petition (see below for Petition form). Each petition must be endorsed by three (3) members of the Senate (any three faculty) and must include the signed acceptance of the nominee. In addition to the petition, each nominee may include a statement of NO MORE than 25 words to be included with the ballot. Longer statements will be edited or omitted.

The following Council members will serve the second year of their two-year term during 2002-03: **David Dore** (Business), **Susan Lopez** (ESL), **Mark Fan** (Library), **Diana Verdugo** (EOPS), **Antonio Martinez** (Counseling), **Madeline Mueller** (Music), **Marie Osborne** (Counseling), **Matt Duckworth** (English), **Glenn Nance** (African American Studies), **Alliene Lawson** (Career Guide), **Sunny Clark** (Student Health), **John Delgado** (English), **John Odell** (Broadcasting), **Jessica Nelson-Lundy** (English), **Raymond Holbert** (Art).

The following Council members have served two consecutive terms and so are ineligible to run: **Don Cate** (Theater Arts), **Ophelia Clark** (Business), **Sue Homer** (Social Science), **Randall Laroche** (ESL), **Karen Saginor** (Library), **Frederick Teti** (Math).

Candidates should be aware of the following provisions of the Constitution.

ART III (Constitution): The Council shall consist of 29 members elected at large, subject to the following provision: that no more than three Senate members from a department, as defined in the Bylaws, shall serve on the Council at one time, except ESL, which shall have no more than six.

ART IV (Constitution): A candidate for membership on the Council must be nominated by written petition of three Senate members and must accept the nomination in writing on the petition. For public information, petitions will be posted at the Academic Senate office on the day they are received. The balloting must be completed at least four weeks before the end of the semester.

If, by March 15th (the close of nominations), the number of candidates does not equal twice the number of vacancies to be filled, the Council or the Election Commission shall postpone balloting one week, during which time additional candidates may be nominated upon the written petition of one Senate member and the written acceptance of the candidate. The postponed balloting shall then take place regardless of the number of candidates.
