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Susan Lopez selected for LEADERS

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ship training in Washington, DC, this spring.

The National Institute for Leadership Development is internationally recognized by colleges, universities and businesses for its visionary, holistic programs that produce leaders who effectively challenge assumptions, eliminate barriers and create new pathways to successful solutions.

Professor Lopez has a BA in Linguistics from UC Berkeley and an MA in Multicultural Education from the University of San Francisco, and plans to pursue a Master's of Public Administration, starting this fall. She was originally hired in 1978 as a classified school aide at the Adult Learning Center, became a part-time instructor of Adult Basic Education and ESL classes, and later a full-time ESL instructor. Professor Lopez has been trained by the Adult Literacy Instructor's Training Institute as a "change agent" for family literacy, and also received adult literacy training in Spanish under the auspices of the Mexican government at the Mexican Cultural Center.

Susan Lopez coordinated the Mission Campus Literacy and Citizenship programs for many years, also writing the literacy portion of the ESL Noncredit Curriculum Guide. With the help and support of her colleagues, she spearheaded the development of the literacy program, which grew from 12 students to over 400 per semester. (The well-respected Mission Campus Literacy Program assists those immigrant adult students who have little formal education. Students learn reading, writing, speaking and listening skills, with many of them also studying native language literacy and basic numeracy. Many successfully transition to regular noncredit ESL and Transitional Studies classes.)

She has made other professional contributions at CCSF in the areas of governance, planning and accreditation. Currently the Second Vice President of the Academic Senate, Prof. Lopez has served on the Executive Council for many years. She has been twice elected as Second Vice President and previously

served as Council Secretary and Parliamentarian. During the past two years, several of the goals she proposed were eventually adopted by the Executive Council as official Council Goals.

During the last Self Study for Accreditation, Susan Lopez was a co-chair of the Institutional Mission Standard of the Self Study and the author of the section of the same name. She later contributed extensively to the Enhanced Self Study recommendations as well.

For the last several years, she has been a core participant in planning for the New Mission Campus. Additionally, she has advocated at several public hearings on behalf of CCSF, for the educational needs of non-traditional and noncredit students, including most recently the WASC hearing on Draft A of the Proposed Accreditation Standards.

In addition to her Academic Senate responsibilities, she continues to teach ESL and literacy at Mission Campus and also participates actively on the college's Planning and Budgeting Council, where she is helping to develop the new Strategic Plan for 2003.

He began his career at CCSF as a part-time instructor teaching office technology courses at the Presidio of San Francisco. His perseverance and dedication to City College paid off when he was hired as a full-time business faculty member in 1991. His assignment brought him to the Downtown Campus, where he taught desktop publishing and introductory computer courses. He quickly became popular among faculty, staff, and students alike because of his pleasant demeanor and outgoing personality. I. CALL TO ORDER

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 2:55 P.M.

II. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

The agenda was adopted without objection.

III. Approval of Minutes

The minutes of February 6, 2002 were approved as amended without objection.

IV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Ophelia Clark announced that Mayor Brown will swear in Trustees Rodel Rodis and Johnnie Carter, Jr. as President and Vice President of the Board at 6 p.m., Monday, February 25, in the City Hall South Light Court (of the Rotunda). Mayor Brown will also honor Senate member George Rush, the National Football Coach of the Year, and the City College Rams, National California Community College 1999-2001 Football Champions.

Clark announced also that she and Council members Lawson, Martinez, and Nance attended the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Luncheon at the Ocean Avenue Campus earlier that day.

Clark congratulated Council member Don Cate for receiving the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival Excellence in Theatre Education Award.

First Vice President Yee announced that Ocean Avenue Campus switchboard service was interrupted. Council member Sunny Clark heard that the problem was a long-distance connection switch failure.

Second Vice President Lopez announced that the Accrediting Commission of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges has written Draft B of the new accreditation standards and she will have more information on that by the next meeting.

V. OFFICERS' REPORTS

A. President

President Clark reported that she had written a memo regarding the use of the Senate letterhead in the Mathematics Graduation Requirement faculty position paper.

On February 15, she attended a meeting of the California Academic Senate Standards and Practices Committee in Los Angeles and heard testimony regarding changes in the Disciplines List ("minimum quals").

Clark continues to compile a list of forms that should be made available online. When the list is complete, she will forward it to Vice Chancellor Goldstein.

For ten years, Senate member Henry Augustine has been coordinating the African-American Scholastic Programs. A resolution to upgrade this position to an administrative "Director" will go before the Board at its February meeting. The officers will continue to monitor the appropriateness of any new administrative positions. Council discussed possible implications of a proposed 12-month faculty calendar.

Clark continues to work on the Alternative Calendar Study Group. She

will give a report at the next Council meeting.

Second Vice President Lopez reported that she has been involved in trying to increase awareness for the need for student services of various types (food, library, Financial Aid, counseling, cultural activities, student government, shared governance) at the (non-Ocean-Avenue) Campuses.

VI. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Executive Council Goals

President Clark has written her first Senate column for *City Currents*. Second Vice President Lopez reminded Council that President Clark has met with AFT 2121 President Fisher in accordance with the Council's Mutual Interest Goal. Clark and Lopez will be contacting various College groups in an effort to recruit candidates for the 2002-2003 Council elections. They encouraged each Council member to recruit at least one candidate. Clark and Lopez have tried to recruit also from among former Council members. First Vice President Yee is trying to place an ad on the "fog" server's login screen. All of these actions serve to implement Council Goal One.

B. Report from Meeting of the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements

President Clark thanked all Council members who participated in last week's Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements. Clark reported that many, but not all, of the requests were approved. Occasionally the Bipartite receives requests accompanied by course outlines that are outdated. She and Vice

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Chancellor Lee plan to include guidelines in the Department Chair information packet as a means of discouraging outdated course outlines. Second Vice President Lopez reminded Council that the Bipartite approval process could have two steps, the first being a checklist review of the proposed course outline. (This would be distinct from the Curriculum Committee's critical review process.)

Council expressed concern that there could be a potential lack of follow-through on conditionally approved requests and felt such arrangements should be avoided.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Report on the CCSF Foundation

Council member Mueller, Senate appointee to the newly reconstituted CCSF Foundation, reported on its meeting of Tuesday, February 19. There are still many vacancies for voting directors. The Foundation is very enthusiastic about City College and the directors are encouraging other philanthropists from diverse backgrounds to consider participating.

B. Voice-mail Boxes for All Faculty

President Clark brought the following resolution before Council.

WHEREAS, Voicemail is extremely useful and desirable in communicating with students and colleagues; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Academic Senate Executive Council urge administration to make voicemail boxes available to all faculty members (Credit and Noncredit, full-time and part-time) desiring that service.

VIII. GOVERNANCE REPORTS

A. Academic Policies Committee

Council member Mueller reported that the Academic Policies Committee will meet on Monday, February 25, to discuss various Enhanced Self-Study recommendations, especially ones regarding Noncredit issues.

B. Facilities Projects Subcommittee (of the Facilities Review Committee of the Planning and Budgeting Council)

Council member Sunny Clark informed Council that the District is at the end of a compliance grace period, and now needs to build a temporary storage facility for hazardous material. The Facilities Projects Subcommittee and the Facilities Review Committee approved a site close to the Ocean Avenue Campus practice field, near the new crafts building. There will be a small, pre-fabricated, odor-free, aesthetic, compliant building for storing hazardous material from the Ocean Avenue Campus; an environmental truck will collect this material. Having a central site is more environmentally sound and less expensive than having the truck visiting multiple sites. Council expressed many concerns, and Council member Sunny Clark will bring these concerns to the next meetings of the Subcommittee, the Facilities Review Committee, and the Health and Safety Committee.

C. Information Technology Policies Committee (of the College Advisory Council)

First Vice President Yee reported from the Information Technology Policies Committee (ITPC). ITS upgraded its systems operations on January 2 to Banner 5. Student ID numbers will be issued in the Fall; the necessary alphabet character will be W. The Help Desk will become a troubleshooting center, and users are assigned "trouble tickets" with which to

track progress on their requests. The Science Hall network will be completed by the end of February. The Airport Campus network upgrade is on hold. Yee mentioned also various network rollout issues, including upgrades, deployment, and services. For more information, including news about the Educational Technology Office, the Office of Technology Mediated Instruction, the Technology Learning Center, and the draft of the web-page accessibility policy, faculty may consult the minutes of the ITPC meeting.

D. Planning and Budgeting Council

First Vice President Yee reported that the Planning and Budgeting Council (PBC) discussed issues from the Office of the Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs (Mid-Year assessment, enrollment figures, bond measure plans, classes for the Airport Commission, alternative calendar) and from the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Student Development (Latino Services Center, Transfer Center, web and phone registration figures, faculty use of "WebFor", a second student trustee, outreach to high schools, Counseling Department split). An upcoming PBC retreat will be used to develop the 2003-2009 Strategic Plan.

E. Catalog Review Group (of the Communications Committee of the College Advisory Council)

Secretary Teti reported that the Catalog Review Group continues to identify potential opportunities to shorten the Catalog by reducing the amount of duplicated information and by redirecting certain topics to the Student Handbook. The Catalog Group is mindful that the Catalog represents a legal contract between the District and its users, and of the significant contributions made by the Catalog's approximately sixty authors.
