"The Center for Habitat Restoration brings together students in Biology Work Experience, environmental professionals, the college and the community in a symbiotic relationship." The students find an outlet for their passion for environmental causes, work alongside professionals from public and private environmental agencies, access student scholarships, stipends, and employment. What began with the students volunteering hours of work turned into offers of paid internships and jobs. The students were found to be self motivated, dependable, and accurate. They have made a palpable difference at Wolfback Ridge in Marin County, and Mountain Lake and Lake Merced in San Francisco.

CCSF student **Mary Ellen Doyle** won the CCEIA essay contest: "My Internship Experience: Career Connections and a Pathway to My Future." With it came a \$500 award, a plaque, and an opportunity to read the essay at the Awards Luncheon. Mary wrote about how the CHR experience "transformed" her life and her quest for a second career. She read her essay with warmth, aplomb and humor.

Another student, **Marvin Tang**, created a graphically attractive and informative power point presentation for the conference workshop Beddecarax presented. As Ed put it, "My student did all the work, I'm just pushing the buttons." The attendees all wanted to meet this student!

CHR is supported by the Biology Department, chaired by **Calvin Hom**. Through CHR, new courses had been written, and old curriculum revitalized. Collaborations with a variety of agencies have made it possible for the college to utilize their laboratories and equipment. The college and the agencies co-host symposiums. Countless students have been engaged in new career searches, and found meaningful career options.

The City College of San Francisco, and the Cooperative Work Experience Education Program administered by the Center for Habitat for Restoration, "renders an outstanding contribution to the advancement of Cooperative Education practices and philosophy" indeed. Congratulations, All!

Departmental revisions highlighted by Provost

Frances Lee, Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs (Provost), announces that several departments are being reorganized and that the changes will be effective with the Fall 2002 semester

- The Computer and Information Science (CIS) Department will be divided into two departments. One will be named Computer Networking and Information Technology and use the abbreviation of CNIT. **Pierre Thiry** will be the chair. The other one will be named Computer Science and use an abbreviation of CS. **Thomas Boegel** will be the chair.

- The Hotel and Restaurant Department and the Hospitality Department will be merged to form the Culinary Arts and Hospitality Studies Department. **Ed Hamilton** will continue as chair.

- The Consumer Arts and Sciences Department and the Fashion Merchandising Program now within the Business Department will come together to form a new department to be named Fashion Department. The election for a chair is taking place now.

Francisco Wong-Diaz part of 'Latinos & Law' symposium

Dr. **Francisco R. Wong-Diaz** was a speaker and panelist in the fourth annual 'Latinos and the Law Symposium' of Columbia University's School of Law. The symposium, held from March 7-10, included panels on terrorism and civil liberties, creating a unified Latino voting bloc and building political coalitions. Among the panelists were U.S. Representative **Charles Rangel** (NY), **Herman Badillo** (Chairman of the Board, CUNY), Prof. **Rodolfo de La Garza** (Columbia), **Ted Cruz** (Political Advisor to President Bush), Justice **Petra Jimenez** (New Mexico Supreme Court), and **Orlando Sanchez** (former candidate for Mayor of Houston).

Changes in the Student Development division told

Don Griffin, Vice Chancellor of Student Development, announces that effective immediately, please be advised of three significant changes in the Student Development Division.

- The General Counseling Department has been reorganized into four departments: New Student Counseling, Continuing Student Counseling, International Student Counseling, and Transfer Counseling. Department Chairperson elections will occur in April.

- The African American Scholastic Program and Latino Services Network have counselors who report directly to the program administrator. The Director of the African American Scholastic Program is Dr. **Henry Augustine** (239-3702). The Director of the Latino Services Network is **Ted Alfaro** (452-5336).

- The Vice Chancellor of Student Development will assume the Dean of Counseling & Special Support Services responsibilities. The department chairpersons of Career Development and Placement, General Counseling, Learning Assistance, and the four new counseling departments will report to the Vice Chancellor of Student Development.

Julia Bergman to help Afghan girls

City College librarian **Julia Bergman** traveled to Afghanistan during spring break with Central Asia Institute (CAI). Julia, who is on the board of the Institute, was to be joined by CAI Executive Director **Greg Mortenson**. Their purpose was to identify a location for a girls' school and a library. With the assistance of the Afghan ambassador to Great Britain, they will meet with officials to try to find a village that has available land and people committed to guiding and managing a school project. Julia wants to raise \$30,000 for this project. Theatre Arts Chair Don Cate retires; he deserves a standing ovation

Don Cate has retired as of March 22, 2002. As most of you know, Don has been a member of the faculty for over 22 years and has provided leadership for the Theatre Arts Department for many of those years.

I have never met a faculty member or department chair more dedicated or involved than Don Cate. To say that he went above and beyond the call of duty is an understatement.

During his tenure, Don has been responsible for producing, designing, directing, and/or managing an extraordinary range of theatre, musical theatre, and opera productions including the premieres of original works, little known or forgotten pieces that deserved to be presented to new audiences, and plays and musicals from the full range of dramatic and musical literature.

In addition, Don has worked with many other departments, City College offices, and community groups that use the Diego Rivera Theatre for a variety of College and public events. The amount of time, energy, and professional expertise that Don has contributed to all of these duties is quite extraordinary.

Don has also played an active role in the CCSF's participation and recognition in the annual American College Theatre Festival and was recently honored by his peers for his outstanding work.

Most important are Don's contributions to the education and personal development of thousands of CCSF students who have taken his classes, been involved in productions — onstage and backstage, or experienced the cultural enrichment of attending theatrical events at City College. Similarly, there is a large group of faculty, community artists, and music and theatre professionals who have col-

laborated with Don and been enriched by his expertise, dedication, and love of the art of making theatre. One might expect that someone who has taken on the breadth of program-related responsibilities that Don has assumed might limit their involvement in other campus activities. But Don has also taken an active role in the governance of the College and has regularly volunteered to work on projects and college-wide initiatives.

Don has frequently combined his commitment to the College with his professional craft and the Theatre Department's resources to provide entertainment and technical assistance for major College events, like last year's 65th anniversary celebration.

With Don's record of achievement, involvement, and dedication, it is clear to me that we may fill Don's position sometime in the future, but we will not replace Don Cate.

When Don and I discussed his decision to retire, he adamantly insisted that he was not interested in making a "big deal" out of his retirement. It is ironic that someone who spent his professional career "putting on shows" does not want us to put on a show of our admiration and appreciation for his work.

But Don cannot stop us from giving him a well-deserved standing ovation.

Patricia Mitchell trains women for leadership in Africa

Patricia Pittman-Mitchell, part-time ESL instructor was selected to participate in a multinational citizen exchange project with counterparts in Sub-Sahara Africa. Through "Women Power in Politics: Building Grassroots Democracy in Africa," Patricia trained women leaders of non-governmental organizations in leadership, advocacy, lobbying and grassroots organization.

The training workshops brought together Nigerian women and men with the objective of building a crop of lobbyists committed to working on the issues of 30% representation of women in political offices and to develop non-partisan civic education and broaden the base of democratic debate.

Training workshops were held at various venues in Lagos, Asaba/Delta State, Abuja and Kaduna, Nigeria.

Margarita Baxter, Cultural Liason for the Spanish Consulate in San Francisco, not only attended but was so impressed with student Gaerlan's work that she invited the playwright to apply for a grant from the Program for Cultural Cooperation administered by the Spanish Ministry of Education and Culture. "**Beat**" **Kitano**, the award-winning director of "Fireworks (Hana-bi)" and "Sonatine," shows heartfelt yet surreal and poignant yet perverse feeling in this film. A loutish ex-hoodlum, played by Kitano, must help a sensitive nine-year-old boy find his mother in this goofy, spontaneous road trip through contemporary Japan.

The Korean film "Chunhyang" (2000) will be screened on **Thursday, April 11** at 12:30 P.M. in R304. This is a gorgeous and spirited film. It is a classic tale of lovers torn apart by two different worlds, and the power and ultimate triumph of love over adversity. "Chunhyang" is a beautiful tale of forbidden passion and devotion unfolding in the spectacular settings of 18th Century Korea.

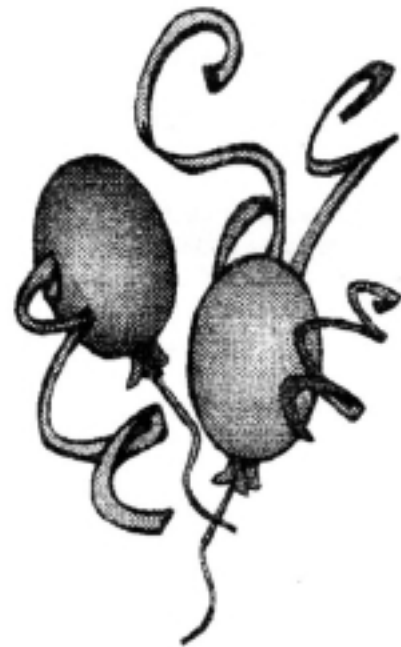
