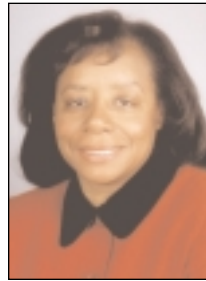

Dr. Anita Grier has been elected to the Board of Directors of the California Community College Trustees, a unit of the Community College League of California. "I am thrilled to report that Dr. Grier has just been elected for a full two-year term," said Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr., CCSF Chancellor.

## Student intern opportunity for summer

CCSF-CalWORKS Dean **Bernice Brown** and Philanthropic Ventures Foundation (PVC) President **Bill Somerville** have worked together to make the following unique opportunity possible for your students. Please urge them to apply.

CCSF-CalWORKS and PVC have partnered to create a Summer Fellowship for currently enrolled CalWORKS students. The summer program will place students in non-profit community based agencies or philanthropic organizations for 12-week, paid internships.

The ideal candidate would be an individual who is willing and able to work 32 hours a week, from June 3 through August 21, and is interested in performing public service work and exploring the role of service in their lives.

Agencies such as Tides Foundation, San Francisco Food Bank, Network for Elders, and San Francisco League of Urban Gardeners (SLUG) are eager to employ interns, at a rate of \$10.50 per hour. These work-study interns would also receive the benefit of mentoring at the work site, as well as the advice of the instructor of General Work Experience Education (WKX 303) **Joann Hendricks**.

*Editor's note: The following memo was written by Darlene Alioto, President of the Department Chairs Council.*

Dear Chairs -

I am sure that all of you have received the e-mail or read the article in *City Currents* relating to **Elizabeth "Lisa" Wong**, former secretary to Vice Chancellor **Frances Lee**. As you know, Lisa is suffering from an advanced case of multiple sclerosis (MS). In her early forties, Lisa has now lost all sensation in her limbs and must rely on a wheelchair and the aid of others. Aside from her husband and daughter, Lisa has no relatives in this country.

Our classified staff have been asked to donate sick or vacation days to help Lisa. Unfortunately, there is no system developed that allows CERTIFICATED staff to also donate sick days to a member of the CLASSIFIED staff — even though we view ourselves as one family.

Therefore, at the suggestion of **Peggy Guichard**, Chair, Health Care Technology, we are proposing that the DCC start a scholarship/college fund for Lisa's daughter, **Anna H. Leung**. Anna is in her second semester here at CCSF and plans to transfer to UC in two or three semesters.

Lisa was always very kind and helpful to the Department Chairs and this is one way we can show our appreciation. So, we invite YOU and YOUR FACULTY and STAFF to contribute generously to this fund.

### I. Call to Order

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 2:59 P.M.

### II. Adoption of Agenda

The agenda was adopted as amended without objection.

### III. Announcements

President Ophelia Clark announced that (former) Council member Don Cate retired on April 1. Executive Council quorum is now fourteen (14). She drew attention to a memo from Human Resources about changes in the health coverage costs. Faculty should look for postcard invitations to the Graduation exercises in Davies Symphony Hall at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, May 24. Senate member Ray Berard, former Council president, will be honored with a retirement party on Friday, May 3. The Asian Coalition Scholarship Dinner will be held at 5:30 P.M. on Friday, April 26 at San Francisco's New Asia Restaurant.

Council member Lawson announced that the Career Center will have its 8th annual Career Fair from 9 A.M. to 1 P.M. on Wednesday, April 24, in the Ocean Avenue Campus Cafeteria.

AFT 2121 President Allan Fisher invited faculty to a reception in honor of

Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi from 4 P.M. to 6 P.M. on April 19 in the 33 Gough Street auditorium.

Council members Shaeffer and Podenski announced that Shaeffer will be stepping down from the Program Review Committee of the Planning and Budgeting Council; they encouraged Council to seek a faculty member to replace him.

### IV. Officers' Reports

#### A. President

President Clark distributed a written report. This week's issue of *City Currents* includes the list of 2002–2003 Executive Council candidates. Clark continues to serve on the statewide Standards and Practices Committee, which is responsible for handling the Standback-Stroud and LaRoche Awards.

The China Project Board resolution was withdrawn from the agenda of the March 20 Board meeting, due in part to action taken at the last Council meeting. At the Board meeting, Judy Teng, Dean of Contract Education, distributed a packet of information to the Trustees; Clark has made copies available to Council members. She encouraged Council to read the packet carefully for discussion at its April 17 meeting. There will be a presentation from a delegation on Monday, April 8.

At the behest of the College Diversity Advisory Committee, Vice Chancellor Frances Lee convened a special meeting among students and the Mathematics Department on Tuesday, April 2. Clark was impressed with what the Department is doing to expand its offerings. The meeting's participants discussed strategies for informing students of their options.

#### B. First Vice President

First Vice President Yee distributed a summary of the March 22, 2002 Pre-Session Meeting of the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges Area B, and said that his experience there was

very positive. Also, he thanked Council members for helping with the election materials.

#### C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Lopez reported that she attended the National Leadership Institute for Women last week in Washington, DC. She believes that California is far ahead of the nation on educational issues.

#### D. Secretary

No report.

#### V. Unfinished Business

##### A. Enhanced Self-Study (ESS) Recommendations

President Clark reported that many of the approved ESS recommendations require funding, so these need to go before the Planning and Budgeting Council. Council member Mueller reported that the Academic Policies Committee will be considering at its April 22 meeting the ESS recommendations on Discipline Majors and on the Transfer Associate Degree.

#### VI. New Business

##### A. 100% Pro Rata Pay for Part-Time Faculty

AFT 2121 President Allan Fisher reported that both of AFT Local 2121's Executive Board and Delegate Assembly passed unanimous resolutions supporting 100% pro rata pay for part-timers in exchange for an expanded commitment to the College. Fisher summarized various arguments in favor of 100% pro rata pay (e.g., better faculty morale, equal pay for equal work, equitable distribution of duties, better student service). Council brought up several concerns to be addressed, including current part-timers who are not prepared to make the extra commitment, part-timers whose other jobs cause conflicts, and the facilities needed for part-timers to hold office hours.

President Clark informed Council of the formation of a joint Senate/AFT Task Force to look into 100\$ pro rata pay issues.

#### B. Discussion of Article III of the Academic Senate Constitution

Council discussed strategies for rewording the Senate Constitution and/or the Council By-Laws to preserve diverse representation on Council while some departments are restructured or split.

#### VII. Governance Reports

##### A. Facilities Review Committee (FRC) (of the Planning and Budgeting Council)

Council member Mueller reported that the Facilities Committee of the Board would have a meeting on the very day of the Council meeting, and that the Committee appeared to be planning to make decisions without the input of the FRC. Mueller intends, if necessary, to make it clear that doing so would contravene the Board's own Shared Governance Policy.

Second Vice President Lopez expressed dismay that an important meeting of the Facilities Committee of the Board of Trustees was not broadly announced at CCSF, effectively preventing interested faculty from attending. She noted that since she had just heard of that meeting, she would leave the Council meeting

early in order to attend, and to advocate, if necessary, for keeping a new Mission Campus at the top of the District's facility priorities list (as it currently is). She expressed that all Trustees should support the project as part of their commitment to the College and its mission.

Council expressed concern about the limited manner in which the Board Committees generally advertise their committee meetings.

##### B. Communications Committee (of the College Advisory Council)

Council member Podenski reported that the Communications Committee agreed to support the idea of allowing reassigned time for a CCSF website content manager.

#### VIII. Open Forum

Council member Lawson asked about the cost to CCSF of the proposed China project. President Clark replied that Dean Teng's withdrawn Board resolution explicitly stated that the project requires no money from the General Fund.

#### IX. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 4:32 P.M.
