DR. JACK WILDE LECTURES ON CHINA

CCSF satellite presentation

Dr. Jack Wilde, Instructor, Disabled Students Program and Services, spoke via satellite with 72 seventh graders from Jackson High School, Massillon, Ohio, on the theme "Introduction to China." Also in attendance were their teacher Jeff Starsky and three student teachers. Wilde's presentation was made just three weeks after a tornado ripped off the roof of the school. Wilde's talk originated in the Executive Videoconference Room of the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center which allows for teleconferencing anywhere in the world. CCSF's Dave Gallerani facilitated the logistics of the hook-up. The talk was part of the Office of Marketing and Public Information's Speakers Bureau, a free service to community organizations, businesses, schools and chambers of commerce. By sharing the scholarly pursuits, professional expertise and personal interests of its faculty, CCSF hopes to inspire and increase awareness of the many subjects offered at its various campuses throughout San Francisco.

I. Call to Order

President Ophelia Clark called the meeting to order at 3:01 P.M.

II. Adoption of Agenda

The agenda was adopted without objection.

III. Approval of Minutes

The minutes of 2002 April 17 were approved without objection.

IV. Announcements

President Ophelia Clark announced that the May 15 Council meeting would be held in Rosenberg Library, Room 518, on the Ocean Avenue Campus, so that Council members may easily attend the Faculty Association Retirement Reception. She reminded Council that the retirement party for Senate member Ray Berard, former Senate President, will be on Friday, May 3, and that graduation will be held on Friday, May 24.

First Vice President David Yee announced that the Chancellor's Awards Ceremony will be held on Tuesday, May 7, from 4:30 to 6:30 P.M., in the Pierre Coste Room, on the Ocean Avenue Campus.

Secretary Teti wished everyone a joyous Beltaine (May Day). He wishes the same, belatedly, to anyone taking the trouble to read these minutes.

Council member Verdugo announced

that the Latina/o Services Center will host a Cinco de Mayo Open House on Friday, May 3, in Cloud Hall, Room 364, on the Ocean Avenue Campus.

V. Officers' Reports

A. President

President Clark reported that she participated in Community College Day on Tuesday, April 30, in Sacramento. Senate member Tannis Reinhertz, Clark, and other CCSF representatives met with legislative aides to discuss the \$20 billion budget shortfall and its effect on such programs as CalWORKs and Staff Development.

She reported also that the Faculty Position Allocation Committee has agreed to simplify the process for approving replacement positions, and the Department Chairs' Council has approved the new process. Council will consider approval of this process at its next meeting.

B. First Vice President

First Vice President Yee reported that Second Vice President Lopez and he attended the Special Joint Meeting of the Boards of the San Francisco Community College District and of the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD). He thought the meeting was very productive. The Boards agreed that the two Districts should share their collected data more often, and they should work to articulate the SFUSD mathematics graduation requirement with student placement in the CCSF mathematics sequence.

C. Second Vice President

Second Vice President Lopez reported that she also found the Special Joint Board Meeting productive. She said that there seemed to be the general feeling at the meeting that continuing to meet jointly at least once a year was very important. She noted also that the two Districts' articulation officers meet more often than do the Districts' Boards.

D. Secretary

No report.

VI. Unfinished Business

A. Consideration of Enhanced Self-Study (ESS) Recommendations

Senate member William J. Beaver summarized for Council the ESS recommendations EMT1 (creation of a Banner User Needs Team), EMT2 (development of a CCSF web portal), EMT3 (Smart Cards), and EMT4 (Degree Audit Report). Portions of these recommendations are already being done, others need to be studied for feasibility and must go before the Planning and Budgeting Council for funding. Beaver is forming a Simplified Data Access Group, eventually to be subsumed by the Banner User Needs Team; interested faculty should contact Beaver to join.

2002-05-01-01 (Podenski/Teti) MSU

That Council approve ESS recommendations EMT1, EMT3, and EMT4.

2002-05-01-02 (S. Clark/Yee) MSP

That Council approve ESS recommendation EMT2 with Item 5 amended to read: "The results of the investigation of the needs and objectives of the CCSF web portal (as outlined in item 4) will be brought to the Executive Council so that Council may consider approval of the implementation phase (item 6)."

B. Report by President Clark on the April 22 Presentation by the Alternative Calendar Working Group

President Clark reported that she and other members of the Alternative Calendar Working Group distributed the findings from their April 19 visit to the San Jose/Evergreen Community College District (SJ/ECCD). Second Vice President Lopez reported that she was told that all Districts with a compressed calendar have used it only for Credit classes. Senate member Mueller iterated her opinion that implementation of a compressed calendar requires unused classroom space, of which CCSF has very little. Senate member Darlene Alioto, Chair of the Department Chairs' Council, reported that she was appalled that the visiting team was brought to,

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SI/ECC District headquarters, not a campus, and that the District presentation was one-sided. She recommended that CCSF faculty and administration work in concert to change the Education Code, not the calendar, so that the academic year could be shortened without compression.

C. Results of DCC Survey on Student Service on Faculty Search Committees
Senate member Darlene Alioto, Chair of the Department Chairs' Council (DCC), distributed the results of a DCC survey asking Department Chairs about the history of student service on their Department's search committees. Forty-one departments responded, of which two had students participate in the teaching demonstration. (The Faculty Hiring Document precludes student service on the actual hiring committees.) Of the responding departments, 37 expressed disapproval of the concept of student service on the committees. President Clark reminded Council also of the distinction between a department voluntarily allowing a student of that department's choice to serve, and being required to include a student chosen by the Associated Students Council.

D. Amendment of the CCSF Academic Senate By-Laws, Article 1

- Delete "Dental Laboratory Technology,"
- Replace "Computer/Information Science (CIS)" with "Computer Science/Technology,"
- Replace "Consumer Arts/Sciences" with "Fashion,"
- Replace "Counseling" with "Counseling Services"
- Replace "Hospitality" and "Hotel/Restaurant" with the single department "Culinary Arts/Hospitality Studies," and

- Change the revision date to 5/1/02.

Whereas, Raymond J. Berard has served as an officer of many civic organizations such as the Golden Gate Democratic League and of the Irish-American Democratic Club, and as a member of such civic organizations as the Democratic Women's Forum; and

B. Review of Draft of the 2003 Strategic Plan

Second Vice President Lopez, who is serving on a small editing group for the 2003 Strategic Plan, oriented the Council to the new Plan draft, which, she noted, had been put together through an inclusive process. She stated that the new document places a stronger emphasis on basic skills and student learning outcomes and has been updated in positive ways. Lopez reported that:

- The Mission Statement has been slightly modified.
- Five "imperatives" overarch the whole Plan as a way of incorporating broad principles.
- The new Vision Statement has already been reviewed by the Council.
- The six Institutional Goals have not changed much.
- Eight Strategic Priorities form the Plan's basis. She suggested that Council review those pages in particular. She indicated that they dealt with such areas as remediation, academics, workforce, publicity, student services, funding, technology and college climate. She noted that "facilities" was no longer considered a separate strategic area. She expressed that some environmentally-conscious action items should be incorporated into the next draft, since CCSF has

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now taken on environmental leadership in the revised Mission Statement. Council members were encouraged to read the draft and send input to the Office of Research, Planning, and Grants by May 15.

It was asked whether all input submitted by faculty would be reviewed by the whole editing team. Lopez answered that it certainly was her understanding that it would, and that any major substantive changes would probably go to the Planning and Budgeting Council. There was a concern expressed about an item relating "customer service" to evaluations. Lopez said that item had already been flagged by the editing team and would probably be changed, depending on the totality of input received. President Clark thanked Second Vice President Lopez for her work on college plans, and thanked Senate member Berard for his original proposal that the Council take a more active part in reviewing College plans.
