Rosenberg Library wins ACRL 'Excellence' Award

City College of San Francisco's Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr. Library & Learning Resource Center is one of three winners of the 2003 Excellence in Academic Libraries Award. Sponsored by the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL) of the American Library Association and Blackwell's Book Services, the award recognizes the staff of a college, university, and community college library for programs that deliver exemplary services and resources to further the educational mission of the institution.

The Library and Learning Resources Center (LLRC) of the City College of San Francisco, winner of the community college category, emphasized how the staff had galvanized themselves into an effective team and lived the mantra of "Helping to Achieve Student Success."

"Delighted, excited, and invigorated are words that best describe how exhilarated I felt when I found out that our team (the faculty and staff) at the City College of San Francisco Library and Learning Resources won the prestigious ACRL Excellence in Academic Libraries Award," said **Rita Jones**, Dean of CCSF Library and Learning Resources. "The close partnership with the faculty, administration, and students at our college enabled us to create innovative programs to serve our 110,000 diverse students and bring the acclaimed award to the City College of San Francisco. On behalf of CCSF, our students, and the San Francisco Community, we thank you."

"The selection committee felt that the LLRC's emphasis on 'being about and for student success' spawned energetic, effective, and highly creative programs and efforts," **Betsy Wilson**, chair of the 2003

Excellence in Academic Libraries Selection Committee, said.

"Receiving an Excellence in Academic Libraries Award is a national tribute to a library and its staff for the outstanding services, programs and leadership they provide to their students, administrators, faculty, and community," said **Mary Ellen Davis**, ACRL executive director.

The other winners of the awards are Baruch College's Newman Library, and the J. Edgar and Louise S. Monroe Library at Loyola University, New Orleans

Each winning library will receive \$3,000 and a citation, to be presented at an

award ceremony held on each recipient's campus. The winners will also receive special recognition at the ACRL President's Program during the American Library Association (ALA) Annual Conference on Monday, June 23, 2003, at 1:30 P.M. in Toronto.

ACRL is the only individual membership organization in North America that develops programs, products and services to meet the unique needs of academic librarians. ACRL's 11,000 members are comprised of individuals from a wide range of academic institutions, publishers and vendors who sell in the academic marketplace.

City College students along with other community college students in the State are organizing a march on Sacramento on March 17 to protest the proposed hike in tuition and overall budget reduction.

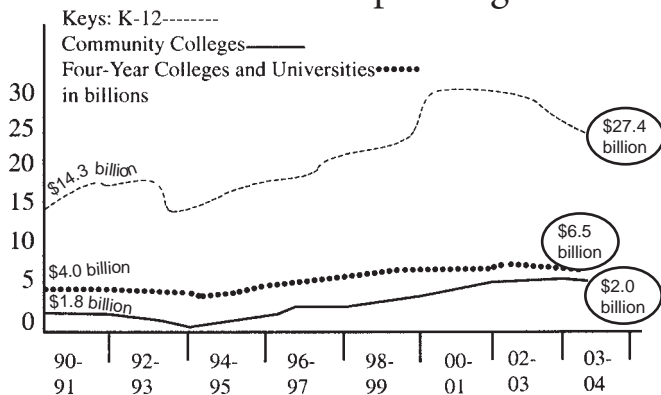
We are strongly encouraging everyone in the college and friends in the community to join the students in this statewide effort so our voices and concerns can be heard by Governor Davis and the legislators.

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More *Stories of Survival* March 6 at John Adams Campus

On November 12, the John Adams Campus auditorium was filled to capacity for a special event sponsored by the John Adams Campus library (and co-sponsored by Concert & Lectures series, John Adams Student Council, John Adams ESL and Transitional Studies Departments): readings from the *Stories of Survival: Three Generations of Southeast Asian Americans Share Their Lives*. This book is a moving collection of oral histories of Southeast Asian American residents who live in apartment buildings owned by the non-profit Indochinese Housing Corporation in the Tenderloin district. At the event, youth who participated in the making of the book read stories of their elders.

Following the reading, the audience was treated to a performance of traditional and modern Cambodian dance. At the very end of the program, attendees participated in telling their own stories of exile, immigration and rebuilding their lives in America through the creation of a mural on canvas. The mural making activity was coordinated by the Mural Exchange Project which produces collaborative murals at community events throughout the Bay Area.

The mural from the *Stories of Survival* event is currently on exhibit, along with other murals by the Mural Exchange Project, at the John Adams Campus library. The three women that make up the Mural Exchange Project will be giving a presentation in Room 202 at John Adams on **Thursday, March 6**, from 11 A.M. to 12 NOON. This event is being co-sponsored by the John Adams Student Council.

The Department of Health Science will offer free Noncredit CPR and First Aid classes to City College employees. CPR and First Aid skills are important both at work and at home.

Health 5000 CPR: Monday, March 24, 4:30-8:30 P.M., Ocean Avenue Campus, Cloud 334. — The Adult CPR class will train participants in the Chain of Survival, early recognition and management of victims with heart attack symptoms, how to perform rescue breathing, relief of airway obstruction, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and activation of the Emergency Medical Service system.

Health 5001 First Aid: Monday, March 31, 4:30-8:30 P.M., Ocean Avenue Campus, Cloud 334. — The First Aid class will train participants in the identi-

fication and care for victims of common traumatic, medical and environmental emergencies in a community setting using emergency preparedness scenarios at City College. Instruction will include the performance of secondary survey and the activation of the Bay Area's Emergency Medical Service System.

Captain **Bill Long** of the San Francisco Fire Department, who has been a Fire and Health Science Instructor at City College for the past eight years, will teach both classes.

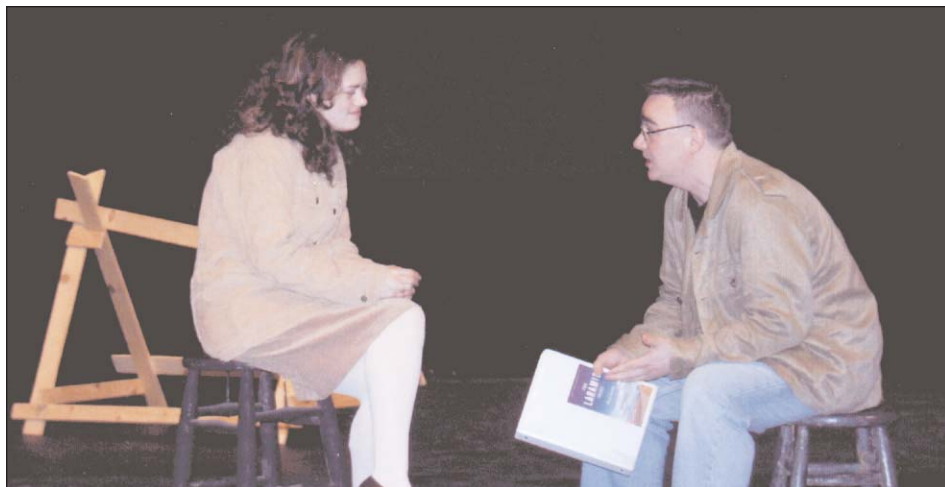

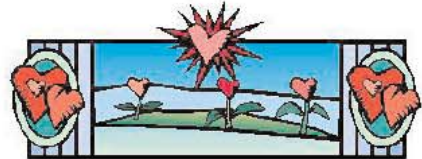
