## Let students know about these new scholarships

Please let your students know that several new scholarships will be available to CCSF students, starting this semester.

Architecture students who have been accepted for transfer by a California baccalaureate institution with an accredited architecture program can apply for the **Gordon H. Chong & Partners Community Design Scholarship**, worth \$2,500. Applications will be coordinated by Architecture Department Chairperson **Jerry Lum**. In addition to submitting the CCSF General Scholarship Application, students will provide copies of architectural drawings or renderings done while at CCSF that exhibit innovative and creative thought, preferably on a community design-focused effort. Selection of the recipient will be done by the firm of Gordon H. Chong & Partners.

Starting in Fall 2003, students who plan to teach English, Social Sciences, Behavioral Sciences, Art, Music, Philosophy or any combination thereof will be able to apply for the **Sidney and Margaret Ancker Scholarship**, worth \$1,000. Students must have completed the equivalent of one full year of courses at CCSF, including two courses in one of the specific disciplines listed above, and students must be planning to transfer to Stanford or any campus of UC or CSU. Award recipients must use the award while completing another year at CCSF. If no student qualifies in the Fall semester, applications will be accepted in Spring semester. An award will be made once each academic year. This scholarship has been made possible by a bequest of \$100,000 by the Anckers, who were both members of the faculty. Mr. Ancker

taught humanities, classics, and English courses in the Department of English and Mrs. Ancker was a member of the Counseling Department. Margaret Ancker received her B.A. degree from the University of California and her M.A. from Stanford. Sydney Ancker received both his B.A. and M.A. from the University of California. He also earned an Ed.D. degree from Stanford.

Two new scholarships have been made possible by a bequest from **Sophie Vlamis**. Ms. Vlamis, an immigrant from Greece, received her B.A. from Mills College and her M.A. from Stanford. Ms. Vlamis was a member of the Department of English, and she was active in the creation of the credit ESL curriculum.

The first scholarship, known as the “Sophie Vlamis Scholarship for CCSF Students,” will be worth \$500. Eligible students will have completed 24 CCSF units with a gpa of 3.5 or higher.

Preference will be given to students who have completed at least one ESL course at CCSF. The number of awards and the semester in which the first award is made will be dependent on available funds generated by an endowment of \$45,000.

The second scholarship is the “Sophie Vlamis Scholarship for San Francisco High School Graduates.” This scholarship, worth \$1,200 and to be disbursed in four semester installments, would be for a graduating San Francisco high school senior who speaks English as a Second Language and has been enrolled in ESL classes within the last three years.

Additional selection preferences would be for students who have low incomes, are recent immigrants, or represent the first generation of their family to attend college. The number and frequency of these awards will be determined by the availability of funds generated by a separate endowment of \$45,000.

## Deadline extended to contribute to Faculty Voluntary Sick Leave Bank

Due to low enrollment, the deadline for the submission of sick bank contributions to join the Faculty Voluntary Sick Leave Bank (VSLB) has been extended to **April 11**. To date only 30% of full-time tenure faculty have joined, and less than 5% of part-time faculty have joined.

The Voluntary Sick Leave Bank is a pool of sick leave hours established and maintained by the voluntary contribution of accrued sick leave days/hours by faculty. The Bank provides members with specified additional sick leave benefits in the event of a catastrophic or life-threatening injury or illness. The VSLB is adminis-

tered pursuant to the provisions of the AFT 2121/SFCCD CBA Article 17.C.10.

## RECOGNITION OF ACHIEVEMENT

### Dr. Elaine Johnson writes of Bio-Link for national magazine

Dr. **Elaine Johnson**, executive director of CCSF's Bio-Link, an Advanced Technological Education Center for Biotechnology, has had her article "Biosecurity — The Role of Bio-Link," published in the February/March 2003 issue of *Community College Journal*. This program, funded by the National Science Foundation and located at City College of San Francisco, provides training in biosecurity techniques.

### Instructor, students decry stories on alcohol, drug treatment

**Dee-Dee Stout**, instructor in the Health Science Departments Community Health Worker Program, and her students in the Alcohol and Other Drug Counseling Certification Program, a joint grant between CCSF and San Francisco State University, have written a letter to the editor of the *San Francisco Chronicle*, taking issue with the premise of a series of articles and columns on alcoholism and drug treatment. In particular, they take issue with a premise "that our crisis in health care access is due to 'drunks' who clog the system rather than soaring health care costs, cuts to budgets, etc.," and a column by **Rob Morse** (11/4/02) which opined that drug and alcohol treatment rarely works.

### Alumna Janet Alvarado panelist at Smithsonian Museum

**Janet Alvarado**, CCSF alumna, will be a featured panelist for "Through Filipino American Eyes: 100 Years of History and the Future in America" to be held **March 22** in Washington, D.C., at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History. Subject: NOMINATIONS TO EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Nominations are now open for the 2003-2005 term of office on the Executive Council of the Academic Senate. There are fifteen (15) vacancies, each of which is for a two-year term. Note: if any of the fourteen (14) members whose terms expire in Spring 2004 (see below) resign before the seating of the new Council, their term(s) will be completed by the runners up in this election, starting with the person ranked 16th in number of votes received and proceeding in order of decreasing vote number until all the vacant positions are filled.

Nominations for Council membership are made by petition (see over for Petition form). Each petition must be endorsed by three (3) members of the Senate and must include the signed acceptance of the nominee. In addition to the petition, each nominee may include a statement of NO MORE than 25 words to be included with the ballot. **Longer statements will be edited or omitted.**

The following Council members will serve the second year of a two-year term during 2003-2004:

Candidates should be aware of the following provisions of the Constitution.

ART III (Constitution): The Council shall consist of 29 members elected at large, subject to the following provision: that no more than three Senate members from a department, as defined in the Bylaws, shall serve on the Senate at one time, except ESL, which shall have no more than six.

ART IV (Constitution): A candidate for membership on the Council must be nominated by written petition of three Senate members and must accept the nomination in writing on the petition. For public information, petitions will be posted at the Academic Senate office on the day they are received. The balloting must be completed at least four weeks before the end of the semester.

If by March 28 (the close of nominations), the number of candidates does not equal twice the number of vacancies to be filled, the Council or the Election Commission shall postpone balloting one week; during which time, additional candidates may be nominated upon the written petition of one Senate member and the written acceptance of the candidate. The postponed balloting shall then take place regardless of the number of candidates.

CCSF is one of only two community colleges in the state of California that does not require a course equal to, or higher than, Elementary Algebra as a graduation requirement in this area. Fred Teti and Keith McAllister explained that our Math E courses are more rigorous than many in the state and that these courses are structured to benefit CCSF students. The Math E courses are not being taught as terminal, low skill level offerings, but are purposely structured to cover material that could eventually lead to algebra competency.

### B. Executive Council Goals: Yee, Nance

We discussed the Action Plan for each of the four goals that, at the January 22, 2003 meeting, we agreed to address.

Subcommittees are supposed to be meeting and reporting back to Council with proposals for carrying out each of the goals. The committee responsible for the faculty hiring document will be presenting preliminary drafts through the spring '03 semester.

### C. Proposed AA/AS Math Graduation Requirements: Podenski

Some of the information presented during the informational discussion at the 1/22/03 Senate meeting was out of date, and, in some cases, may have been inaccurate. When the Math EX outline was submitted to Sacramento, the State Curriculum office staff questioned the legitimacy of allowing the Math EX course to satisfy the CCSF AA degree math requirement. There is now some question about whether or not staff's correspondence reflects an official position, or was the opinion of one staff member. A recent review of the college catalogs from the 107 community colleges indicates that there is a wide variety of approaches to the AA Degree Math Requirement throughout the state.

There are three areas that the senate would like more information about before making a final recommendation regarding the CCSF math graduation requirement: 1) the senate would like clarification about the standing of the written correspondence from the State Chancellor's Office to CCSF administration. Is the written opinion that of one staff member or does this correspondence represent an official State

Chancellor's Office position?; 2) The senate requests an overview report of math graduation requirements from a sampling of the 107 community colleges throughout the state. The overview will inform the senate recommendation on this matter; 3) the math courses (e.g. Math EX) may have more rigor than the course title suggests. Senate would like clarification regarding the rigor of these courses.

Council will make a recommendation regarding the CCSF math graduation requirement after research is completed.

## VII. New Business

### A. Bipartite Committee Meeting: Mueller/Yee

The Bipartite Graduation Requirement Committee will be meeting on February 12, 2003. Decisions as to whether a course will be accepted for a particular graduation area are reached by consensus. The criteria for a given course can blur, since it may be difficult to assign specific learning skills to some areas. Samples of past course outlines which have gone before the Graduation Requirement Committee were distributed to Council and discussed to prepare members for the February 12 meeting.

## IX. Governance Reports

Yee: There is an ITPC proposal for a new telephone system for the District. Discussion is taking place at this stage about the type of system which should replace the current one.
