## REPORT TO COLLEGE COMMUNITY

### CCSF Education Facilities Improvement Bond Projects update

We are pleased to share good news in the midst of these tough economic times. City College is moving ahead with several major facilities projects made possible by the successful passage of the College's Education Facilities Improvement Bond (Proposition A) in November 2001.

The following is a status report on these projects funded by Prop A on several City College campuses located throughout San Francisco.

An architectural/engineering group has been selected and approved by the College Board of Trustees for the Community Health and Wellness Center to be built on the Ocean Avenue Campus. With the funds that are now available, we have made some timely decisions that will allow us to begin construction on several high-priority projects. During the Proposition A Campaign, we made a promise to diligently pursue all opportunities for State matching dollars whenever possible so as to ease the burden on the local district. It was a promise kept.

City College has succeeded in securing State matching funds for two major, new district facilities:

- New Mission Campus: \$28.5M
- New Chinatown/North Beach Campus: \$30M

Proposition A also approved \$10M for the construction of a new facility for Child Development and Teacher Training called the Joint-Use Facility in partnership with San Francisco State University. We also have been successful in getting

this facility approved by the State Board of Governors and included on their long-range Capital Priority List for \$27.4M. This project is not expected to begin until 2005, with construction to be completed in 2008. Finally, renovation and seismic upgrading funds for the John Adams Campus have been provided with additional State funds in the amount of \$23.4M.

We will focus our energy first on the Ocean Avenue Campus with a new Student Health Services Facility and Child Development Center within the overall project planning for the Community Health and Wellness Center, and to consider both as separate annexes to this primary facility. Several reasons help us make this decision, but most importantly is the fact that the Community Health and Wellness Center is definitely NOT eligible for State funding because the State classified it simply

as a "GYM." Additionally, identifying resources to get the Wellness Center built is a high priority because of related projects that would have an immediate impact on our student body. For example, we cannot wait too much longer to provide a new home for Student Health Services, which currently serves more than 5,000 students, or for that matter for the Child Care Center. Both of these services are now housed in dilapidated bungalows dating back to the 1950s. The advantage of this approach is that it puts these sub-projects on a very fast track and both could be built and opened even before the larger Health and Wellness Complex is finished. Furthermore, the new Student Health Facility would include a second floor with 10-12 new classrooms, which would allow the Ocean Avenue Campus to eliminate many of its dilapidated bungalows also being used as classrooms.

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## Facilities bond update

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We will turn our attention next to the Community, Cultural, Performing and Media Arts Classroom/Laboratory to be built on the Balboa Reservoir facing the Ocean Avenue Campus. This construction project requires us to work jointly with the Public Utilities Commission from a financial and project-management perspective. Additionally, the chances for support from the State for this facility are extremely high because of the priority associated with instruction and classroom space. It is highly probable that \$30M-35M in support from the State could be advanced and funded out of a future statewide bond (2005/06 or 2007/09). This coupled with another \$25M from the planned Phase II Bond will enable the College to build a true community treasure to be enjoyed for decades by local residents.

City College of San Francisco can now Center into a long-term lease with San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) for the College's new Mission Campus at 106 Bartlett St. The 75-year ground lease will cost the College an upfront total payment of \$7.5M, which will allow the College to build a new 140,000-square-foot campus on an empty lot located at Bartlett, Valencia and 22nd Street. CCSF also will renovate the existing buildings at the site which houses the College's Mission Campus and the SFUSD's Downtown High School. This expansion is estimated to cost \$63M and to be opened by Spring 2007. The lease with SFUSD allows the Downtown High School to stay at its current location for 30 years with an option for renewal for an additional 30 years. This new site will include new classrooms, more credit courses, child care, a state-of-the-art library and a community meeting space for to serve more than 9,000 students from the Mission District.

The land lease will provide the College with more space than the original plan to

build the new campus on the site of the New Mission Theatre and Giant Value store, both of which will be sold in the near future.

For the new Chinatown/North Beach campus, the District did award the contract for architectural/engineering services to Esherick Homsey Dodge Davis and that project has been moving forward. Our efforts in this arena are governed and influenced by the settlement agreement reached between the District and the Friends of the Colombo Building. The latter group was very directly involved in the architectural selection process, along with members of our faculty, staff, and Dean **Joanne Low**. A planning and organizational meeting between the selected firm, members of the Architectural Review Committee, and our staff has been held and we are moving forward on that project, as well.

Downtown Campus construction renovations are proceeding and will get underway during the early Summer. That project is expected to be completed in a year, and will include an improved first floor access and upgrade for the "Educated Palate" restaurant and classroom laboratory as well as a renovated/expanded Library and Learning Resource Center for students.

Renovation/Seismic Upgrade and Retrofitting Project at the Evans Campus is well underway. A contractor has been hired; construction is underway; and it is expected to be completed by the opening Fall 2003.

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# Paralegal Program earns Innovative Partnership Award

The work experience provider/employer is Eviction Defense Collaborative, located at 433 South Van Ness. The CCEIA called its cooperative education partnership "innovative." Both Dora Lew Dye and **Colleen Carrigan** of EDC were honored at an awards luncheon on April 10, 2003.

The EDC is a non-profit, legal clinic that assists tenants facing eviction. EDC trains the student interns to conduct client intakes, prepare legal documents related to eviction proceedings, see firsthand what settlement conferences entail, and help tenants prepare pleadings. Of the students and the chair, EDC writes:

"Clearly, Dora's students emulate their professor, as each one of them works tirelessly to ensure the tenants they serve are treated with respect and great care....The CCSF students who meet with these tenants provide immeasurable services and without their help the EDC would not be able to meet the needs of the community."

# How I use technology in the classroom

**J**ust about all I know about computer technology was learned at CCSF, starting with self-paced tutorials back in 1987 when I learned DOS and thought I had discovered a new continent. When the TLC (Technology Learning Center) was created, I took every workshop I could fit into my schedule: from graphics to Internet applications to HTML. When I was through taking workshops and had spent enough time playing with what I had learned, I began teaching TLC workshops and developed my own materials for teaching HTML and web design.

Initially, the only obstacle to using online materials in my classes was the fact that not all my students had Internet access. However, since about 1998, I've used more and more online materials to the point where I've taught a hybrid course at the highest ESL level. The online portion of the course consists of a series of 15 labs of increasing difficulty that acquaint the student with resources related to the

course work that are available on the Internet and the use of research skills to find and use those materials.

Over the years, my ESL students have put together research papers, multimedia presentations, and literary magazines and shared them online. I'm itching to teach a completely online ESL class in the future.

Also, I'm the "webkeeper" for four sites in the ESL Department as well as the Diego Rivera Mural Lesson Plans website, and I designed the SCANS website for CCSF.

## III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the February 12, 2003 Bipartite Graduation Requirements meeting were approved unanimously. Minutes of the February 19 and March 5, 2003 Council meetings were approved with corrections.

## V. OFFICERS’ REPORTS

Vice President Sneed: On March 14 and 15, Jane Sneed attended the Vocational Education Faculty Leadership Seminar in Santa Cruz, sponsored and paid for by the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges. One of the most pressing issues discussed was the impact that the budget crisis is likely to have on vocational programs and services. In order to be represented, vocational faculty is urged to participate fully in shared governance. A binder with relevant documents about Economic Development, Workforce Preparation and Occupational Education, and Current Vocational Education Resources and Issues is now available in the Senate office, E202.

Second Vice President Podenski: The Council discussed a letter written by CCSF Board member Julio Ramos, which appeared in the March 12, 2003 edition of the *S.F. Bay Guardian*. The article alleged that Chancellor Day, other administrators, and consultants suppressed, distorted or filtered District records so as to conceal information from him and other Board members. The Council discussed this matter and decided that President Yee and other Council members would research this matter and advise council regarding an appropriate response. Council members expressed strong disagreement with the letter.

Secretary Nance: The March 17, 2003 rally in Sacramento to protest state-wide community college budget cuts was a resounding success. A large number of faculty and students from CCSF, as well as many from other colleges throughout the State, gathered in Sacramento to voice their concerns.
