March on Capitol had big impact on budget cuts

The next day after the March 17 march of faculty, students, classified, administrators, trustees and the public on Sacramento to protest disproportionate budget cuts to community colleges, Governor Gray Davis signed Senate Bill 18X. It drastically reduced the amount of budget cuts to community colleges from Davis' original \$288 million to \$161 million for the current fiscal year, according to the Community College League of California. American Federation of Teachers Local 2121 was a major contributor to the March, which also included significant support from the Academic Senate, the Classified Senate, Service Employees International Union Local 790 and the CCSF Administrator's Association. 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Board of Trustees policy on war with Iraq outlined in resolution

Editor's Note: City College of San Francisco's policy on the war in Iraq was stated in Resolution S3 passed at the Board of Trustees meeting on January 30, 2003.

**Protestation of
Contemplated War on Iraq
(Resolution No. 030130-S3)**

SUMMARY:

Worldwide protests against an impending US-led war on Iraq underscore the massive opposition to this potential international crisis. Getting people connected is a major step toward the realization that they have a voice and that they can use it to oppose what the government is doing. The citizens of San Francisco and their local elected officials have the constitutional right to petition the national government on this matter of grave concern to our City, the nation, and the world community.

WHEREAS, the residents of the City of San Francisco believe that a democratic nation should neither be an aggressor nation nor pursue an unjust war; and

WHEREAS, the City of San Francisco's 18-25 year old population is likely to be a primary source of conscription and recruitment for military personnel to fight a war from which there is no just cause or result; and

WHEREAS, a war will impact our students disproportionately in terms of their age category and ethnicities; and

WHEREAS, a war will divert huge sums of money away from education and other social services that are intended to help our students and the communities in which they live at a time of significant budget reductions; and

WHEREAS, no one to date has been able to articulate why war on Iraq is in the interest of American citizens;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:
the Board of Trustees of the San

Francisco Community College District hereby voices our opposition to any preemptive strike or act of war contemplated by the President and the Congress of the United States, and resolves that no war against Iraq be undertaken at any time by the United States unless as a response to a direct military attack by Iraq or by a United Nations Resolution that underscores the urgency of such an extreme response.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the governing body reaffirms The Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the principles of international law, and calls on the Bush administration and our representatives in Congress to provide leadership in encouraging peace, democracy, and respect for human rights in Iraq and throughout the Middle East.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chancellor will forward copies of this resolution to appropriate governmental entities at the federal, state, and local levels.

CCSF student Linda Fonseca finishes training at Guide Dogs for the Blind

Linda Fonseca of San Francisco, who attends City College of San Francisco, recently completed a month of intensive training with a black Labrador Retriever Guide Dog at her side. The duo graduated from the Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc., in a ceremony March 8 at the 11-acre campus in San Rafael.

At CCSF, Fonseca is interested in computers and is currently taking programming courses.

During the course of training, Guide Dogs and their new partners learn to work as teams. They practice safe travel techniques on stairways and elevators, on crowded sidewalks and across busy streets. Guide Dogs learn to stop at all curbs and wait until their partners command them to go forward or turn. They will disobey a command to cross a street

if traffic is approaching. They guide people safely around pedestrians and obstacles, including overhead obstacles, and avoid distractions.

AmeriCorps members sponsor Family Reading Fair at Sutro Elementary

CCSF AmeriCorps members sponsored two nights of Family Reading Fair at Sutro Elementary, a local public school, for parents who had expressed a desire to learn strategies and techniques in helping children become better readers. These workshops were designed and conducted by AmeriCorps members in three different languages, Chinese, English and Russian. More than 50 parents participated in spelling and vocabulary games and learned about strategies and activities to promote the love of reading at home.

The parents were very appreciative of the members' efforts: "We were able to discuss children's reading homework and came up with different ways to increase children's interest in reading." Other parents pointed out that they learned more than just reading strategies: "I learn to understand my child's learning style and difficulties in learning. I will encourage and communicate with my child more". In our bilingual workshops, parents also "learned that I also need to promote my child's first language. I learned that if I promote my child's native language then I'm also supporting his learning of English".

In addition to being a rewarding experience for parents, many of the AmeriCorps members expressed that the Family Reading Fair was a great learning opportunity for them:

"By participating in the Family Reading Fair, I learned that there are many parents who need help in learning ways to help their children to read more. In addition, I myself learned a lot by doing research and by listening to parents as they share their children's experiences at home" (**Carlos Ovando**).

"This workshop gave me a glance of the difficulties that parents have and face at home. It enhanced my knowledge to bet-

ter assist children in order to lessen parents' responsibilities and burdens on students' homework" (**Crystal Lo**).

"I feel that we have given parents some helpful tools that will assist them in increasing their children's literacy. I am overall very happy about the impact we made" (**Nicole Muller**).

"I learned a lot from the experience. For example, I had to set goals for the Family Reading Fair, and then I needed to plan on how to achieve these goals. Also, I learned something from the parents. It helped me think more about the children we serve from a parent's perspective" (**Wing Zhong**).

"This gave me experience for the future when I become a teacher. It gave me one-on-one experience with parents, and reminded me to look for what works best for each individual child and how to teach a kid in a different way based on his/her learning style" (**Vernita Joyner**).

"I found that parents are very interested in helping their kids and are willing to learn different ways to improve their kids' reading and homework skills. This experience gave me a better understanding about the parents and a chance to communicate with them" (**Jannie Kuang**).

"Working together, I found new avenues for resources and different ways to teach the same subject. I learned a lot of innovative and interesting ways to prepare children to read" (**Eli Horn**).

In addition to participating in special service projects, AmeriCorps members tutor children and assist elementary school teachers in the public schools.

CCSF is Reading...

Yann Martel, *Life of Pi*, Harcourt, 2001. 2002 Mann Booker Prize for Fiction.

An East-Indian boy nicknamed Pi grows up in Pondicherry, an old French colonial city on India's East Coast. He is knowledgeable and fascinated about animals living in his parents' privately owned zoo. While raised a Hindu, he startles everyone by declaring his interest in also becoming a Christian and a Muslim. The time is the late 1970s, and his father decides the family should emigrate to Canada. Selling some of their zoo animals, they book passage with the rest in a Japanese ship. A few days out of Manila, the ship sinks. Pi finds himself alone in a lifeboat with several surviving animals, soon reduced to one Bengal tiger. Described through the eyes of a precocious adolescent, the narration projects an awesome picture of wild animals and the sea. Considered as fable, myth, or metaphor, Canadian novelist Martel creates within a multi-ethnic framework, laced with humor and gentle irony, a delightful adventure story well suited to our postmodern era. **Joe Thorn**, English-Humanities

Ann Patchett. *Bel Canto*. Harper Collins, 2001. Winner of the PEN/Faulkner Award.

Maybe it's the times: this is another fable, a sad one. It is set in a poor Spanish-speaking country and begins with the lights going out. A multi-national group has gathered in the home of the country's vice president for a concert by a renowned operatic soprano. A group of terrorists invade the house looking for the country's president, who has missed the party to watch his favorite soap opera — or perhaps because he has heard rumors of the coup. For four months a kind of separate peace is established between the captors and their prisoners, the way a multi-cultural world might function. The most impor-

tant contributors to the rapport are the opera singer's beautiful music, a kind young man who has mastered most of the world's languages, and a terrorist who had been an elementary school teacher. Other wonderful characters surface and grow with the help of these three. It is a beautifully told story with just enough of a happy ending to keep the reader from despair. **Ellen Wall**, English
