DOE grants \$145K to CCSF to build business in Vietnam

City College of San Francisco (CCSF) has been awarded \$145,815 by the U.S. Department of Education Office of Postsecondary Education, Business & International Education Program to develop a Southeast Asia Business and International Education Center, with the goal of contributing toward expanding our nation's capacity to conduct business in and/or with Vietnam. It is the intent of CCSF to broaden the program after the first two years to include other Southeast Asian countries.

To achieve this goal, the Center will focus on the following objectives throughout a two-year period:

- Develop curricula and a new certificate program for individuals and businesses interested in doing business in and/or with Vietnam;
- Create outreach strategies to engage the local small- and medium-sized business community through a monthly speaker series and quarterly business roundtable;
- Build a six-week summer student internship program that places CCSF business students in American- and/or Vietnamese-owned businesses in Vietnam;
- Develop a faculty exchange program in which CCSF business faculty tour American- and Vietnamese-owned businesses in Vietnam and meet with university faculty from Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City; and
- Conduct trade missions for local businesses to travel to Vietnam to build rela-

City College commencement ceremony May 23 in Davies Hall

Commencement exercises for the Class of 2003 at City College of San Francisco will be held **Friday, May 23** at Davies Symphony Hall in San Francisco Civic Center. The ceremony will begin at 5:30 P.M. Nearly 500 students and 100 faculty members are expected to participate. Admission is by ticket only.

Frances Lee, who has served as Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs for 12 years at City College of San Francisco, will be the keynote speaker. She is retiring after a 30-year career at CCSF, where she was the first Dean of the Chinatown/North Beach Campus. Lee, a graduate of City College of San Francisco, holds a Master of Social Work from Fresno State University.

The student speaker will be **Joanne Chew**, a San Francisco native who had plans to major in veterinary medicine, but changed her major to theatre arts after working for local film projects and plays. She plans to further her education at San Francisco State University and at Studio A.C.T.

Rodel Rodis writes in *SF Chronicle* of new Filipino American war heroes

Rodel Rodis, a member of the Board of Trustees of City College of San Francisco, wrote in the *San Francisco Chronicle* Op-Ed Page of April 30, 2003: "Filipino American heroes from the war in Iraq are changing the image of Filipinos across America. From **Joseph Menusa** to **Nino Livaudais** to **OJ Santa Maria** to **Joseph Hudson**, their stories embrace the full spectrum of what is considered to be the best American ideals of courage, sacrifice and death."

He recounted how prior to World War II, "Filipinos in America were stereotypically viewed as subservient houseboys. But then in early 1942, a sea change in attitude occurred when Americans learned

of the incredible heroism of the starved, outmanned, outgunned Filipino defenders of Bataan and Corregidor."

Rodis pointed out that in 2003 President **George Bush** visited the hospital bedside of Daly City resident Marine Lance Corporal OJ Santa Maria, 21, and said to the newly sworn U.S. citizen, "We're proud to have you as an American."

But, Rodis cautioned, "These new heroes, however, must not be allowed to overshadow a tragic reality. Thousands of lawful permanent immigrants, both in and out of the military, suffer because of U.S. government policies." Specifically, he noted that "because of the Abu Sayyaf terrorists on tiny Basilan Island, the United States has declared the Philippines an 'al Qaeda active' nation."

Rodis continued, "Despite excellent work histories, almost 2,000 Filipinos recently lost their airport screener jobs because they are not U.S. citizens — a new requirement imposed by the Aviation Transportation Security Act in response to Sept. 11.

"Today, many Americans find reason to reassess and honor a people that has produced these 21st century American heroes. It is time for the federal government to follow suit and drop its anti-immigrant policies, recognizing the worth and contributions that all Filipinos and other immigrants make to America, in and out of the military," Rodis stated.

Rodel Rodis to chair Calif. State ACCT through 2005

City College of San Francisco Trustee **Rodel Rodis** has been reappointed Northern California State Chair of the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) for 2003-05, it was announced by **Lou Braxton**, Pacific Chair of ACCT.

"The ACCT represents more than 6500 trustees who govern over 1200 community colleges in the U.S., Canada and England," said Rodis. His duties as State Chair are to act as liaison between the ACCT Board of Directors and the community college trustees from Northern California. Rodis is responsible for coordinating a statewide recruiting effort to enlist membership in ACCT; working to ensure retention of current ACCT members; encouraging statewide attendance at ACCT seminars and conventions; and encouraging boards to submit award nominations for the regional and annual awards.

Trustee Rodis also continues as President of the Association of Asian/Pacific Islander Community College Trustees.

Student Trustee Richard Cantora wins Fulbright grant to study in Philippines

Richard Cantora, incumbent Student Trustee on the CCSF Board, has been chosen as one of ten scholars this year's Fulbright-funded Advanced Filipino Abroad Program (AFAP). This is a two month immersion in Philippine language and culture at De La Salle University in Manila. Cantora is one of only 10 students chosen nationwide. This will be his second stint in the Philippines, since he received a Virlanie Foundation grant in the summer of 2000 for work with street children in Makati, Metro Manila.

Last year was a banner year when three of the 10 Fulbright winners were our students. CCSF's group of **Eunice Nuval**, **Dominika Maglasang** and **Jennifer Co** was the largest group from the US Mainland. They competed against candidates from University of Michigan, University of Wisconsin, UCLA, and CSU Hayward. CCSF students have consistently garnered Fulbright-AFAP awards since 1996. Instructors from our Foreign Language and Philippine Studies Departments mentored and coached the applicants.

Student Will Poston receives NSEP grant to study in Egypt

Will Poston, a CCSF student, has been awarded a scholarship of \$20,000 to study abroad in Egypt for a year. He is among the 170 nationwide students to win such an award.

"Will is in so many ways a typical successful CCSF student," says **Sue Light**, NSEP adviser at CCSF. "Disenchanted with high school, he joined the Navy, where he served for seven years. He enjoyed the Navy experience and took his GED, but felt the need for higher general education. He enrolled at City College, but after 9/11 he felt a strong need to serve his country by learning the language and culture of the Middle East. He immediately enrolled in an Arabic language and a Middle Eastern culture class at UC Berkeley at the same time as he was a full time student at CCSF. He took 10 units of Arabic and maintained a 3.5 GPA at CCSF — no mean task with the commute to Berkeley.

"Clearly, the NSEP appreciated his determined efforts and are giving him a maximum scholarship of \$20,000 to study in Egypt," Light said.

CCSF is Reading...

Laurence Yep. *The Traitor: Golden Mountain Chronicle, 1885.* New York: HarperCollins, 2003.

Two-time Newbery Honor recipient **Lawrence Yep** constructs a novel set in Rock Springs, Wyoming, 1885, three years after the Chinese Exclusion Act. Michael Purdy, an illegitimate White American boy, and Joseph Young, a Chinese American boy, form an unlikely friendship when they find themselves displaced from their communities. Their friendship is put to the test when mounting tensions rise against the Chinese laborers, igniting one of the worst race riots in Chinese American history. Based on an actual historical incident, Yep's retelling captures the horrifying events that culminate in a tumultuous massacre against the Chinese American community. By juxtaposing alternate adolescent viewpoints and parallel narratives, Yep conjures up a story whose characters grapple with struggle, trust, hope and perseverance in the face of impending adversity.

Alisa Burgess, Ph.D. *How to Grow a Second Skin for Your Soul: For Those Who Feel Hurt, Judged, Criticized, Abandoned, Invalidated When Someone Else Acts Like a Jerk.* Richmond, Virginia: Oaklea Press, 2002.

Dr. Burgess is a CCSF faculty member in the Student Health Department. Her book is aimed at sensitive people who easily lose their own boundaries in relationships. Their souls may be imprisoned by dependency on others and fear of how others may react. She uses psychological and spiritual tools and techniques to handle negative encounters while letting in those people who are capable of true friendship. Alexander McCall Smith. *The No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency.* New York: Anchor Books, 1998.

Are mysteries for summer reading supposed to be literature? This one is: two Booker Judges' Special Recommendations and one of the International Books of the Year in the *Times Literary Supplement*. "Mma Ramotswe had a detective agency in Africa, at the foot of Kgale Hill. These were its assets: a tiny white van, two desks, two chairs, a telephone, and an old typewriter. Then, there was a teapot, in which Mma Ramotswe — the only lady private detective in Botswana — brewed redbush tea....Detective agencies rely on human intuition and intelligence, both of which Mma Ramotswe had in abundance. No inventory would ever include those, of course." This is the opening paragraph leading into a gutsy, intelligent mystery (and, yes, it's often funny enough to laugh aloud). There are now four books in the series. Brew some rooibos; sip, read and enjoy.
