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ACCT Leadership Conference to be held in San Francisco June 25-28

The national Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) will hold its western Regional Trustee Leadership Conference June 25-28 in San Francisco. The theme of the conference is Workforce Development. **Richard N. Adams**, chair of ACCT, stressed that the conference will explore the idea that community colleges are the most effective vehicle to training people for the careers of tomorrow.

Between 300 and 400 trustees are expected to attend the conference, which will be hosted by City College of San Francisco, Peralta Community College District, Chabot-Las Positas Community College District, San Mateo Community College District, Foothill-DeAnza Community College District, Marin Community College District, West Valley-Mission community College District, Napa Valley Community College District, Contra Costa Community College District, San Jose/Evergreen community College District and the California Community College Trustees.

From the CCSF Board of Trustees, Dr. **Anita Grier**, President, and **Rodel Rodis**, Member, have been active with the preparations for this conference.

Dr. Grier, a member of ACCT's Diversity Committee, will facilitate a panel discussion on how community colleges can partner with local small businesses. Panelists will include representatives of Mason Tillman and Associates, a public policy research and public relations company located in the San Francisco Bay Area, which specializes in business and affirmative action programs, analysis, regulatory compliance, and community outreach.

Rodis recently was reappointed Northern California State Chair of ACCT for 2003-05 by **Lou Braxton**, Pacific Chair of ACCT. Rodis also continues as President of the Association of Asian/Pacific Islander Community College Trustees

Assemblywoman **Sarah Reyes** (D-Fresno) who serves on the Assembly Education Committee, and **Roberta Achtenberg**, Senior Vice President for Public Policy with the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, will address the trustees at luncheon meetings.

Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, Chancellor of CCSF, will introduce Achtenberg.

San Francisco Mayor **Willie L. Brown, Jr.**, has been invited to give the welcoming address.

Trustees attending the ACCT conference will take a tour of the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center on the Ocean Avenue Campus. Concurrently, Chabot College and Laney College also will offer tours.

Nursing instructor to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro for prostate cancer

A City College nursing instructor wants your money!

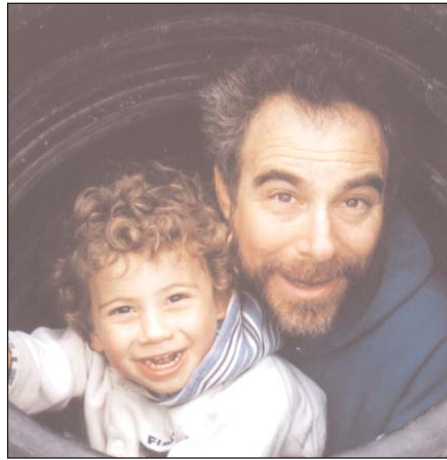
This September CCSF faculty member **Jan Zlotnick** will spend a few weeks of his sabbatical by climbing Africa's highest peak for charity. The event, the Prostate Cancer Climb up the mystical Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania, is being sponsored by the Prostate Awareness Foundation, a San Francisco based non-profit agency established by and for men with prostate cancer. The agency's goal is to raise \$1,000,000 nationally for research, and to increase public awareness about prostate cancer, the most common form of cancer in men after skin cancer.

Zlotnick, who also teaches Men's Health Issues at City College, is one of two male instructors on the nursing faculty. He will climb with a team of about 20 prostate cancer veterans and supporters, who hope to reach the summit with a flag carrying the names of those who contribute money to the cause.

Zlotnick was diagnosed with prostate cancer 10 years ago after a routine blood test for the prostate specific antigen (PSA). He was only 41-years-old at the time. "I might well be dead now, had my general practitioner not been up-to-date with his medical information," he acknowledges. "The PSA test was new at the time."

As it is, Zlotnick is still not cancer-free. He underwent surgery 10 years ago to remove his prostate gland. But shortly afterward it was discovered that he still had a positive PSA, which meant there was still cancer in his body. Radiation was also not curative. "Most competent urologists now know that prostate cancer is usually a systemic disease by the time it is diagnosed," Zlotnick says. "Surgical failures are extremely common."

While prostate cancer strikes and kills about the same number of men as breast cancer does women, funding for research

has lagged far behind that for breast cancer. Zlotnick says this is because men are statistically much less likely to join support groups and to network around health issues. "And talking about problems 'down there' is particularly difficult for many men", Zlotnick adds.

Zlotnick believes his cancer story really started a year before his diagnosis, when his father was diagnosed with another type of cancer, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. "My dad, who lived in South Florida, had always been my main man, the spiritual center of my life," he says. "As a registered nurse and health science instructor, I fought to keep him alive and well, managing his care from my world on the other side of the country. It was stressful, very stressful."

It was when his father's demise seemed imminent that Zlotnick was diagnosed with prostate cancer. "I had 'curative' surgery in Berkeley shortly before Dad died at home in Florida with my mother and sisters around him. I will always remember the pain of saying good-bye to him at the San Francisco airport, knowing I would never see him again. He told me I would be all right, that I would live a long, happy life. I am sure that he suffered greatly, loving me as much as he did and feeling so helpless to do anything for me. But he waited until after my surgery,

until he knew I was okay, to die. It was in a phone booth, holding my catheter bag, that I told him I was all right, giving him the permission that he needed to end his own suffering.

"In the process of living I strive to make a positive difference in the lives of others. I am more involved now with political and social causes than ever before. I am committed to teaching others how to work on their health habits, and have created a Men's Health class at my community college to further this cause. And I have had the good luck to become friends with **Ken Malik** of the Prostate Awareness Foundation, with whom I now try to help other prostate cancer veterans and their families."

Zlotnick is upbeat about the September climb: "Now I am challenging myself to climb higher than I ever have, and to raise at least \$10,000 for PAF. In doing this I want to be a role model for others, especially the young men in my health science classes who often set their goals far too low. And I want to succeed at something that frightens me; I have not done well at high altitude climbing in the past. But neither have I put my mind and body to training for such a climb. I look forward to the inevitable camaraderie that will develop between myself and the other climbers, the cheering each other on, and the feeling of satisfaction of having made it to the top despite my ten years of cancer."
