Overall community colleges' funding reduced \$86.8 million

Editor's note: This announcement about how community colleges fared in the State Budget just passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor was made August 4 by the State Chancellor's Office. Specific details on how the State Budget affects City College of San Francisco will be featured in the next issue of City Currents.

SACRAMENTO – California Community College officials breathed a sigh of relief as Governor **Gray Davis** signed the 2003-04 Budget on August 2. Making good on his promise to protect funding for education, a promise also made by the Legislature, the Governor approved the entire community college funding package sent to him by the Legislature. When all sources of revenue are combined, overall funding for the community colleges is reduced by just 1.7 percent (about \$86.8 million) compared to the level of funding provided in the 2002-03 Budget Act.

Though State General Fund spending for the community colleges is reduced by more than \$250 million — a 9.4 percent reduction — the net reduction is only \$86.8 million because of the increase in student fees and anticipated growth in property tax revenues.

The budget includes the following specifics for the 108 community colleges:

- provides funds for 1.5 percent enrollment growth (approximately 15,500 additional full-time students). However, actual enrollments in the colleges have been increasing by 4 to 5 percent per year in recent years, and the colleges are already serving tens of thousands of students without funding.

- makes a major reduction of funding for the Partnership for Excellence program from \$293 million to \$225 million;

reduces funding for Part-time Faculty Compensation from \$57 million to \$50.8 million; and makes about \$10 million in reductions to two categorical programs that fund Instructional Equipment and Scheduled Maintenance.

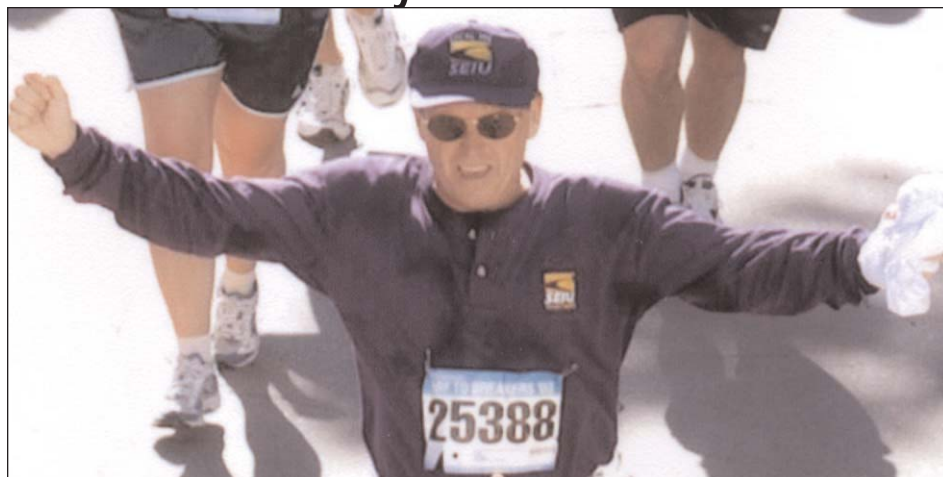
- allows the community colleges to defer \$200 million in revenue to July of 2004, the start of the 2004-05 fiscal year. The funds, however, will be usable for 2003-04 costs, thus sparing the colleges from making an additional \$200 million in reductions in the current year. The deferral consists of \$150 million in general apportionment funds and \$50 million in Partnership for Excellence funds being allocated to colleges in July 2004, instead of June 2004. The deferred amounts will be credited to 2004-05 funding, and will be paid back over several years.

The budget also raises student enrollment fees from the current \$11 per unit to \$18 per unit (a 64 percent increase),

effective for the fall term (which begins in August for most colleges). However, the budget also provides for a major expansion of programs to ensure students are aware of financial aid, and that they receive assistance in securing this aid.

Overall, the signed budget reflects a funding level that is much more workable than the huge reductions originally proposed in January. At that time, the colleges faced a 10.6 percent cut that would have reduced overall funding by \$530 million. Through a unified effort with all the colleges and organizations, and through the willingness of the Governor and the Legislature to listen and respond, the community colleges were able to secure a reduction that is roughly proportionate to the reductions imposed upon the University of California, the California State University, and the K-12 schools.

Budget Accountability Act initiative seeks to reform State budget process

All during Flex Day on **Thursday, August 14**, members of the Classified Senate and SEIU 790 will be seeking signatures to place an initiative on the March 2004 ballot to reform California's budget review process. AFT 2121 already has turned in many signatures faculty gathered on the initiative during the summer. For Flex, Classified employees will be stationed along the Visual Arts courtyard during the breakfast hour, outside of the Diego Rivera Theatre following Chancellor Philip R. Day, Jr.'s Flex Day address, and in the Cafeteria during lunch to allow registered voters the maximum opportunity to sign. If you are not registered, the classified will have the proper form for you to fill out to become a registered voter. The deadline to submit signatures to the Secretary of State is midnight on Thursday, August 14.

Called the Budget Accountability Act , the reform measure would:

- Hold the Governor and Legislators accountable by permanently forfeiting their salaries, per diem expense allowances and car allowances for each

day after the legislative deadline for action that there is no budget;

- Require the Legislature to remain in session and prohibit it from acting on other legislation until the budget is adopted.
- End partisan gridlock by reducing the vote threshold for the Legislature to adopt the state budget and related tax legislation from two thirds to 55%.
- Give voters information about the budget in the official voters' pamphlet and on a state web site.
- Require the state to create a "rainy day" fund of 5% in years when revenues exceed the amount needed to fund existing service levels.

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Dr. Natalie Berg picked for Earl Raab Award

Think of students with disabilities while preparing your syllabus

All faculty members should be aware that following statement needs to be present on every CCSF course syllabus.

"If you:

- Need classroom or testing accommodations because of a disability;
- Have emergency medical information to share with me;
- Need special arrangements in case the building needs to be evacuated;

Please make an appointment with me as soon as possible. My office hours are...."

Students seeking disability related accommodations are encouraged to also register with Disabled Students Programs and Services located in Room 323 of the Rosenberg Library (415) 452-5481.

I strongly suggest that faculty read their syllabus out loud to the students in their classes. This will give the students time to ask for clarification, and it also provides access for students who may have visual impairments.

Instructors are not expected to determine appropriate accommodations.

If the student is registered with DSPS, the student must come to DSPS each semester to receive an official document from DSPS that outlines reasonable classroom/testing accommodations determined by a DSPS Counselor. The student then shows this document to instructors while discussing accommodations.

If the student does not have this document or is not registered with DSPS, the instructor should refer the student to DSPS. If the student is reticent to go to DSPS, some faculty have found it helpful to escort the student to the Rosenberg Office.

Alternate procedures are available for students who are requesting a disability related accommodation but do not wish to register with DSPS. Students may obtain information about these alternate procedures from the DSPS office in Rosenberg 323.

Parking regulations highlighted

Kenneth L. Baccetti, Interim Chief of Police, has announced the following Fall 2003 Parking Regulations for Faculty, Staff and Students:

A parking permit is required to park on all City College campuses 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Overnight parking is prohibited on all campuses.

STUDENT PARKING: Vehicles parked in student parking lots, shall display by affixing, a current valid student parking decal inside the vehicle in a seven inch square area of the lower front windshield on the side opposite from the driver (passenger side). After 10:30 A.M. (Monday through Friday), students without a semester parking permit may park in student parking lots, on a space available basis, with the purchase of a daily \$1 parking permit purchased from a ticket vending machine. The one-day parking permits must be displayed, with date side up, on vehicle dashboard. Students may purchase a semester parking permit in Conlan Hall E-104.

PERMANENT FACULTY/STAFF: The current Diego Rivera decal is valid. Please come to C-120 for a parking decal. Vehicle registration will be needed for permit issuance. Hours of issuance: please call (415) 239-3025. Faculty and staff will be limited to a maximum of two permits. If you have the old black and white decal, it is no longer valid.

TEMPORARY FACULTY AND CLASSIFIED STAFF will be required to obtain a new parking permit from the Campus Police, Chief's office C-120. New college I.D. cards are needed and your vehicle registration will be required when applying for your parking permit. Last semester, **Spring 2003, temporary faculty and staff parking permits will be valid through August 29, 2003.** Only classified personnel working 20 hours or more per week are eligible for a semester staff parking permit.

DAY SCHOOL parking enforcement for no permits, color zones and out-of-stall violations will commence on the first day of instruction for all student and faculty parking lots, and continue throughout finals.

NIGHT SCHOOL STUDENTS displaying a current parking permit may park in any lot except Lot E, Cloud Circle, Marston Road and Science Circle. Blue medical zones, red zones, yellow zones and out-of-stall parking will be enforced. Students without a semester parking permit will be required to purchase and display a daily parking ticket from the vending machine.

NIGHT SCHOOL FACULTY can obtain their parking permit in the Evening Division Office (Cloud Hall 310) between 5 and 7:30 P.M. August 18-21, 2003.

SATURDAY SCHOOL STUDENTS displaying a current parking permit may park in any lot except Cloud Circle and Marston Road. Red zones, blue zones, yellow zones and out-of-stall violations will be enforced. Students without a semester parking permit will be required to purchase and display a daily parking ticket from the vending machine.

VENDORS, MAINTENANCE & CRAFT permits are **due** for renewal. If your parking permit is **salmon** in color it is not valid. Parking permits are issued in C-120.

TOWING: Illegally parked vehicles may be towed at the owner's expense. For towed vehicles, call (415) 553-1235.

DISABLED PERSONS PARKING: Students, faculty and staff with permanent disabilities may park in any student or faculty parking lot and blue zones on City College campuses only after obtaining a disabled person's placard from the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) and registering their placard number with the Campus Police (C-119). Failure to display a valid DMV placard and CCSF disabled person parking permit will result in your vehicle being cited.

Blue Zones (Medical) are enforced at all times, 24 hours.
