## 1948 football greats plan reunion here October 25th

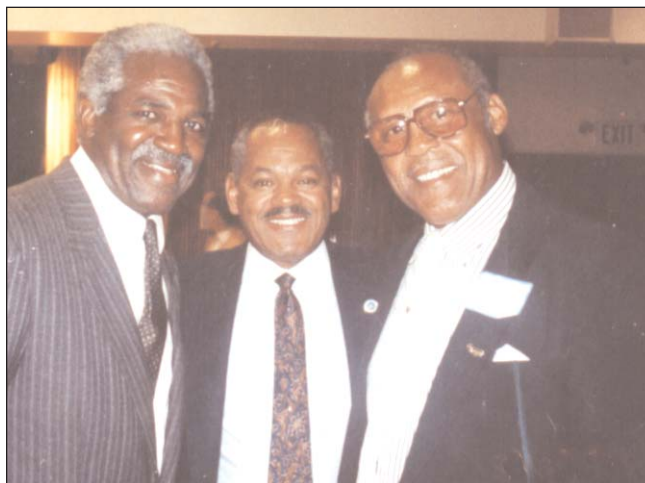
Members of City College's World Championship 1948 Football Team will have a reunion and tailgate party on **October 25** at Rams Stadium before the game with Foothill College. **Walt Jourdan** (Class of 1950) is leading the planning for the event, which will begin about 10:30 A.M. in the barbecue area adjacent to the field.

Walt told City Currents he has spoken with CCSF Sports Hall of Fame members **Ray Urbano, Ollie Matson, Don Stillwell, Roy Giorgi, Burl Toler** and **Bob Taquinto** and hopes all will be there.

Walt would like to get in touch with any other members of that championship 1948 team, and is asking all CCSF employees that if they know people from the squad to ask them to get in touch with him at his toll free number (800) 848-8654. CCSF Head Football Coach **George Rush** says, "The 1948 National Championship Football Team is one of the most storied football teams in the history of City College. It produced many great Division I and professional players, including Walt Jourdan, Ollie Matson and Burl Toler. It was coached by the legendary **Grover Klemmer**."

"It's been 55 years since we played at City College, and our membership is declining. We would like to get together and give some support to our team," said Burl. Faculty, classified and administrators are invited to participate in the party, too. The cost would be \$10 to defray the cost of the food and beverages.

The two friends reminisced about how Burl became part of the 1948 team. Toler had never played high school ball and one of the team members, **Bill Fischer**, said Burl ought to try out for the Rams. At practice, every time the coach called out a position to try out, Burl raised his hand. He got the call for defensive line-backer. During the practice, **Ollie Matson** tried to get around Burl three separate times, and got tackled each time. Finally with Burl on top of him, Ollie just said, "My name's Ollie Matson, what's yours?"

They also remembered a game against Hartnell College, when the Salinas students drove around the motel all night to keep them awake. It didn't matter though, the Rams still won.

"As a team we had a lot of kids who took advantage of the opportunities and went on to do great things. Many of us still

keep in touch to this day," says Burl.

"Burl was the most highly thought of," says Walt. "We used to tell people watching the game that if you want to find where the ball is, just look for Burl."

Walt was born in New Orleans and grew up in Oakland. After City College, he went into the Navy as a sonar technician. "My wife prevailed on me to go back to school." He earned an electronics engineering degree and went into designing ships for the

Navy as well as the aerospace industry. Later, he joined the nuclear agency and retired in 1994 as head of the US Bureau of Reclamation office in Tracy.

Burl is originally from Tennessee. He came west to go to City College, and got interested in sports here. After CCSF, he transferred to USF on a scholarship, earning a BA and MA. In 1965, Burl became the National Football League's first black head linesman. He retired from the NFL after 25 years officiating.

Times were different in 1948, they recalled, noting that all you had to do was buy a \$5 student body card, pay a few lab fees and buy your books. There was no tuition. Walt and Burl lived in the dorms on campus and worked in the cafeteria where they were able to eat their fill for breakfast, lunch and dinner.

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**Chancellor seeks entries to annual greeting card design competition**

Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, Chancellor of City College of San Francisco, is sponsoring a district-wide contest for the design of a greeting card to celebrate the new year. The designs are intended to represent the College's diverse student body and commitment to educational access and opportunity. Designs should be non-denominational and should express the spirit and hope of the coming year.

**PRIZES:** First prize is a \$250 gift certificate for art/graphic supplies. Each of two runner-ups will be awarded a \$100 gift certificate.

**IMAGE GUIDELINES:** Final size is 4.75 x 6.5 inches. Designs should be created to match this proportion. Designs may be black and white or full color. Any medium may be used. Traditional media artwork should not be any larger than 12 inches in the largest dimension. A hand-out with more specific details on dimensions will be made available with the entry form. Digitally-created artwork should meet the following specifications: Raster images should be created with a resolution of 300 ppi in the RGB color model. Image dimensions should be at least 4.75 x 6.5 or proportionally larger. Vector images should be created in the CMYK color model.

**DEADLINE: Entries are due by 3 P.M., Friday, October 17**, in the Chancellor's Office located at Conlan Hall, E-200. No entries will be accepted after the deadline.

**SUBMISSION GUIDELINES:** A jury made up of three members of the Art, Graphic Communications, and the Photography Departments, along with Chancellor Day, will pick the winning entry and two runner-ups.

**WINNING ENTRIES:** An exhibition of entries will be showcased in the Visual Arts Building in December. Winning entries will be published in the student newspaper and in the College's *City*

*Currents* magazine. The winning entry will be featured on the Chancellor's annual greeting card.

Entry forms are available in the Art Department, V-118 and in the Chancellor's Office, E-200.

## Book Loan Program for Classified

City College of San Francisco classified employees who are taking classes at CCSF already have their fees waived, and can now have their books paid for through a new Bookloan program.

The Classified Union has negotiated with the Administration and worked with the Bookstore to create the Book Loan Program.

To obtain books for your courses under the program, the procedure is as follows:

- 1) Get ORIGINAL form [triplicate: white, yellow, pink copies].
- 2) Fill out personal information and CRNs you have registered in.
- 3) Get signature by your department or payroll to verify you are currently working as a Classified employee.
- 4) Bring the Book Loan Form and your recent pay stub to any CCSF bookstore.
- 5) Select your books.

6) Sign off on the form in front of the bookstore cashier. You get the pink copy of the form. Don't lose the pink form as you will need to turn it in later.

7) Return the books when class has ended. Bring the books and your pink copy to the Bookstore by the last day of final exams. Books must be returned in good condition. The Bookstore will check the books in and you will not be charged. Otherwise, the full amount of the books will be deducted from your paycheck.

8) If you drop, withdraw, or file for an incomplete for the class, you must return the books to the Bookstore as soon as possible.

Funds for this program are limited. Usage will be monitored. For a copy of the Book Loan form, call (415) 239-3920.

# Library Information Skills Workshops - Fall 2003

The following schedule of Library Information Skills Workshops has been scheduled for Fall 2003. There are four types: A, B, C and D.

“A” Workshop covers the use of the library online catalog to find books, videos and more; 50 minutes.

“B” Workshop teaches the use of several periodical databases to find, print, or e-mail magazines and newspaper articles; 50 minutes.

“C” Workshop is not for beginners to the Web. You will learn advanced uses of search engines for academic research and how to evaluate websites; 60 minutes.

“D” Workshop teaches research paper skills, including narrowing a topic, finding suitable sources, citing sources and preparing the bibliography. It is only for student who have required papers/projects. Bring a copy of your research assignment and your topic; 90 minutes. Prerequisite: Workshop B or C completed before D. Proof of attendance obtained at Reference East Desk.

Please let your students know that scholarships worth up to \$20,000 to study abroad are available under the National Security Education Program (NSEP). “City College of San Francisco has never failed to have at least one winner every year,” says **Sue Light**, NSEP advisor, noting that CCSF students have won scholarships to study in China, Japan, Egypt, Croatia, Korea, Vietnam, Mexico, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Chile, Argentina, Brazil and Thailand. Light will hold two workshops to help prepare students to win one of these large scholarships to study abroad. The workshops will be held:

President Yee called the meeting to order at 2:45 P.M.

**II. Adoption of Agenda**

The agenda was approved unanimously.

**III. Approval of Minutes**

Approval of the minutes for the April 2, 2003 Council meeting was deferred until the next Council meeting.

**IV. Announcements**

There were no announcements.

**V. Officers' Reports**

President Yee:

- 1) The Statewide Academic Senate Plenary session will be at SFO Westin on May 1-3. Yee handed out the schedule and he encouraged people to attend the Breakout sessions.
- 2) Attended the Area B Academic Senate Plenary Session meeting. Copies of Resolutions for State Academic Plenary Session were distributed to Council and President Yee provided background information about them.
- 3) Attended the party in honor of faculty who had just gotten tenure yesterday.
- 4) Will be attending the statewide "IMPAC" meeting between C.S.U., U.C. and Community College representatives

to discuss articulation between the different systems. An effort will be made to create a "seamless" transfer process for students transferring to four-year colleges throughout the state.

Vice President Sneed: Attended meeting with Peter Goldstein and others about plans to close Literacy program at Gough Street because there was no money available for night security. An arrangement was made to lock the facility in the evening providing that faculty would unlock the door for students taking the class.

Secretary Nance: Traveled with Dr. Augustine, Director of the African American Student Retention Program, students, and faculty on the Historic Black College Tour. Visits were made to a number of colleges in various southern states and our students were given orientations.

**VI. Unfinished Business**

A. Report of Shared Governance Program Review: Yee

Program Review is still in the process of change. Some of the issues being discussed are:

1. If a respondent comments on a committee, does he/she have to mention which committee?
2. For those who served on more than one committee, should comments be made on all of them? (It was suggested that it could be the most recent committee served on.)
3. If Council members have any suggestions, get them to President Yee.

B. Enhanced Self Study (ESS) Recommendation: Yee

1. Outreach and recruitment - Pre-Registration and Matriculation #3 [PRM3] (From Student Prep Success).

Executive Council approves PRM3.

2. Early Intervention Pre-Collegiate Basic Skills Students - Pre-College Learning #1 [PCL1] (from Student Prep Success).

**2003-04-23-02 (Sneed/Lopez) MSP**

Executive Council approves in concept PCL1 with the following concerns:

- 1) The basic skills in the Early Alert document don't match up with the State definitions or other ESS recommendations;
- 2) It isn't clear how this matches with Title 3;
- 3) What will the impact are on caseload, taking into consideration budget constraints?
- 4) Are students referred automatically or selectively?
- 5) Details of implementation should be left up to counselors and others involved with the process.

C. Update from Executive Council Workgroup on Accreditation: Yee

The Executive Council subcommittee has not met yet. President Yee suggested that Council discussion of this issue with the Chancellor be postponed until Executive Council has the opportunity to discuss the recommendations being prepared by the Accreditation workgroup of Executive Council.

D. Math Grad Requirements: Yee

President Yee distributed the draft of a resolution for Council to look over. This was the product of a review of math requirements from other Community colleges in the state. The intent of the resolution was to provide as much latitude as possible to students seeking to satisfy this requirement. Council discussed and passed the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Math Competency graduation requirement framework for an Associate Degree at CCSF will be fulfilled by any of the following:
