## Dr. Anita Grier named to State Governing Board

Dr. **Anita Grier**, President of the City College of San Francisco Board of Trustees, has been appointed to the Board of Governors of the California state community college system.

Governor Gray Davis made the appointment September 8.

The Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, by statute, provides leadership and policy direction in the continuing development of the California Community Colleges system. Among its charges are establishing minimum academic and personnel standards; evaluating and reporting on the fiscal and educational effectiveness of the 72 districts; conducting research and providing appropriate information services; providing representation, advocacy and accountability for the colleges before state and national legislative and executive agencies; and administering fiscal support programs (both operational and capital outlay).

Dr. Grier was elected to the CCSF Board in 1998 and re-elected in 2002. She chairs the CCSF Board's Diversity/Community Outreach Committee, and serves on the Board's Personnel and Education committees. She is Administrator/Special Assignment for the San Francisco Unified School District. Since 1973, she has been an administrator, principal, program manager, special education teacher, program administrator and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) director for SFUSD.

Dr. Grier often states, "Our community college should assume a more meaningful role in the development of students who are planning to attend state colleges and universities, and older adults who

want to return to college to further their education or vocational skills. I know our Community College works. My own professional and scholastic achievement is proof of that."

Dr. Grier earned her BA and MA degrees from San Francisco State University and a Doctoral degree in Education from the University of San Francisco.

The 17-member board, appointed by the Governor, includes 13 public members, two of whom must be current or former elected members of local boards. Board members do not receive a salary.



## Youth conference scheduled Oct. 24

City College of San Francisco will co-sponsor a Youth Conference and mock Grand Jury examining *Emperor Hirohito's Crimes Against Humanity: Guilty or Not?* It will be held **Friday, October 24**, from 1:30 to 5:30 P.M. in Visual Arts 115 on the Ocean Avenue Campus.

The mock grand jury proceeding will be conducted by high school and college students. The audience will hear testimony from witnesses re-enacting the roles of Japanese soldiers, survivors, 'comfort women,' and Emperor Hirohito. The prosecutor will seek to prove there is sufficient evidence to indict the Emperor on war crimes committed by the Japanese soldiers during World War II.

There also will be a panel including U.S. Congressman **Mike Honda**, D-San Jose; **Iris Chang**, author of *Rape of Nanking* and *The Chinese in America*; **Michael Franzblau**, MD, Clinical Professor of Dermatology, University of California, San Francisco; and **Daro Inouye**, San Francisco Deputy Public Defender. The

brochure describing the event points out that the panel will probe: "Was Emperor Hirohito much more complicit than Japan and the U.S. have ever acknowledged? For decades, the debate has been whether the Emperor was merely a puppet of the militarists or was directly culpable as the nation's leader who had final legal and moral authority. To what extent was Emperor Hirohito responsible for the war crimes of the Japanese Imperial Army and is there sufficient evidence to try him for those crimes?"

Other co-sponsors of the event are Rape of Nanking Redress Coalition, chaired by the Honorable **Julie Tang** and Professor **Peter Stanek**, and the Alliance for Preserving the Truth of the Sino-Japanese War.

As part of the program, there will be an art exhibit by **Holly Wong**, titled *Witness Series*.

The cost will be \$20 general admission; students and seniors will be admitted free of charge.

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**Survey to probe effectiveness of CCSF shared governance system**

The College Advisory Council of the CCSF Shared Governance System will be conducting a comprehensive program review of the effectiveness of our system of participatory governance. The review will take place this semester.

You will soon receive an email requesting that you fill out an online survey about

your views of the current system. This online survey will be available to everyone who is currently or has been a member of one or more Shared Governance Committee(s) during the last three years. A paper version will also be available. Please respond to the survey by **September 26**.

The results of this survey, along with data from college listening sessions, which will be held later this month, will be shared with the Academic Senate, Administrators' Association, AFT 2121, Associated Students' Council, Classified Senate, SEIU Local 790, and the Department Chairs Council. The college organizations will provide their own self-assessment of the shared governance system in a series of meetings in October and November.

This comprehensive review will conclude with a summit meeting of all shared governance stakeholders to review the strengths and challenges and to develop recommendations that will improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the system. These recommendations are scheduled to be presented to the Board in December.

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## CCSF Web Page, PSA and Catalog earn awards from National Council for Marketing and Public Relations

City College of San Francisco will be recognized with three awards at this year's National Council for Marketing and Public Relations (NCMPR) District 6 Medallion Awards Ceremony to be held on **September 26**.

The winning entries are for the New CCSF Web Page, the 2003-04 College Catalog and the Public Service Announcement (PSA) created for the Promoting Diversity Statewide Initiative funded by Board of Governors for the California Community Colleges. These awards will be honored with a gold, silver or bronze award at the regional conference to be held at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Phoenix, Arizona.

These awards are a tribute to the committed work of many City College faculty, administrators, classified staff and students.

The Promoting Diversity PSA was created for a statewide project co-chaired by Dr. **Robert S. Gabriner** and **Martha Lucey**. Two years ago, the Office of the Chancellor, California Community Colleges, commissioned City College of San Francisco to conduct a project to research and promote best diversity practices in the state's community colleges. The project was funded by the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges. One of the objectives of the project was to produce a PSA that could be used by all 108 community colleges to interact with their local communities in ways that affirm the colleges' commitment to diversity. The PSA was produced by Crocker/Flanagan Advertising firm.

The CCSF Communications Committee, chaired by **Francine Podenski**, set up project groups whose work resulted in awards for the Web Page Design and the Catalog.

The Catalog Project Group, chaired by **Tom Blair**, met weekly last year to review and revise the CCSF catalog. Core mem-

bers of the Catalog Work Group include **Brian Ellison, Kim Nacion, Deanna Abma, Michele Gorthy, Karen Cox, Lisa King, and Martha Lucey**. Photos for this year's award-winning catalog were provided by City College's Photography students. The cover was designed by graphic artist **Martin Kazinski** of the CCSF Office of Marketing and Public Information. For the first time, the Catalog was done in-house by **Kim Nacion** of the Office of Instruction. The Catalog Project Group is continuing with revisions for the 2004-2005 Catalog. The Communications Committee Web Design Project was initiated at the request of students, faculty, and staff. During a three-year period the committee coordinated focus groups that included students, faculty, staff, and administrators, consulted with web design com-

Design proposals were presented to the Academic Senate, the Information Technology Policy Committee, and the College Advisory Council. ### CCSF alumna Jeanne Hallacy to show her award-winning film September 24

Filmed over two years at a community hospice in the slums of Bangkok, the documentary, *Mercy [Med-dah]* unfolds through Luk Nam's diary as she recalls the loss of her family and her best friend. The film is an intimate portrait of an overlooked side to the AIDS crisis — focusing on the children of parents who are HIV positive and who are deeply affected by the loss of their loved ones. *Mercy* is a film about survival and the power of compassion. This moving story is a lesson about how to embrace life in the face of death.

City College graduate **Jeanne Hallacy** is returning to present her film and to answer questions about its production and her career in Thailand. She serves as the Vice President of the Thailand Foreign Correspondents Association and has worked under contract for major news networks. Her previous film, *Burma Diary*, won a Gold Apple award at the National Educational Media Network Film Festival.

*Mercy* will be shown on **Wednesday, September 24**, from 1 to 2 P.M. in Rooms 304 and 305 of the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center. Hallacy will answer questions from 2 to 3 P.M. in Rosenberg Library 305 on the same day. This program is co-sponsored by the Asian Coalition, Asian Studies Department, the East/West Group, the Health Department, and HIV-STD Education Office. ## CCSF's Chinese 1A online course given State Educational Technology Award

City College of San Francisco's Online Elementary Chinese 1A was honored with an Educational Technology Award at the California Community Colleges Board of Governors regularly scheduled meeting in Sacramento on September 9.

These awards, jointly sponsored by the State Chancellor's Office and the Foundation for California Community College, highlight programs and staff members whose contributions have helped the community colleges to keep their campus operations and educational program in-step with the technology revolution.

The CCSF project involved a collaborative team effort to develop and implement innovative technical solutions to teaching the Chinese language online. Students, faculty, administration, and student interns were involved with developing unique software. The result was one of the first online elementary Chinese language courses at a community college in California. The engaging course fills to capacity each semester and has been lauded as a "Best Online Teaching Site" by the California Virtual Campus.

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# Russian Film Festival — Kinofestival — scheduled for fall

Professor **Krista Hanson** of the CCSF Foreign Language Department will be hosting a Russian Film Festival this fall on the Ocean Avenue Campus, 50 Phelan Ave. All five films will be shown on Thursday evenings in the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center at the times and in the rooms indicated below. Admission is free. All films are in the Russian language with English subtitles.

***Close to Eden (Urga: Territoriya lyubvi)***, 1991, will be shown **Thursday, September 25**, 7-9 P.M., Rosenberg 301.

This unusual and beautiful film opens on the plains of Mongolia, where a shepherd named Gombo and his family live in the ways of their ancestors. When Sergei, a Russian road builder, drives his truck into a lake, the two men strike up a friendship that's as funny as it is unpredictable and set off for the city. Directed by the Academy Award-winning director **Nikita Mikhalkov** (*Burnt by the Sun*), this imaginative cross-cultural comedy was a 1992 Academy Award Nominee for Best Foreign Language Film.

***Ivan Vasilievich Changes His Profession (Ivan Vasilievich menyaet professiyu)***, 1973, will be shown **Thursday, October 9**, 7-9 P.M., Rosenberg 301.

When a Muscovite inventor turns on his time machine, Tsar Ivan Vasilievich (the Terrible) ends up in modern Moscow, and Ivan Vasilievich, the apartment house manager, goes back to the 16th century. A popular and funny film based on Ivan Vasilievich by **Mikhail Bulgakov**, the author of *The Master and Margarita*.

***Crime and Punishment (Prestuplenie i nakazanie)***, 1970, will be shown **Thursday, October 23**, 5:30-9:30 P.M., Rosenberg 304.

**Lev Kulidjanov's** classic version of **Dostoevsky's** novel — very intense with outstanding casting, including **Innokenty Smoktunovsky** as Porfiry Petrovich. A long film, but highly recommended!

***Anna Karenina***, 1967, will be shown **Thursday, November 13**, 6:30-9:30 P.M., Rosenberg 304.

Not the Hollywood version, and based on **Leo Tolstoy's** novel of adultery and passion, the film stars the great actress **Tatiana Samoilova**.

***Irony of Fate or, Have a Good Steam! (Ironiya sudby, ili s lyogkim parom!)***, 1975, will be shown **Thursday, December 11**, 6:30-9:30 P.M., Rosenberg 304.

Back by popular demand, the classic New Year's romantic comedy which is widely shown during the holidays in Russia. On New Year's Eve a hesitant groom returns home from drinking with his friends in the bathhouse to propose to his girlfriend, but wakes up to find he is not in Moscow, but in Leningrad. The film pokes fun at the cookie-cutter construction of new high-rises around city centers and weaves a funny and delightfully unlikely romance.

first offering of  
fall semester

The City College of San Francisco Music and Theatre Arts Departments will present **Aaron Copland's** opera *The Tender Land* during late September and early October in the Diego Rivera Theatre on the Ocean Avenue Campus.

**David Parr** will serve as director, and **Michael Shahani** as the musical director. Performances will be held **Friday, September 26** and **Saturday, September 27** at 8 P.M.; **Sunday, September 28** at 7 P.M.; **Saturday, October 4** at 8 P.M. and **Sunday, October 5** at 2 P.M. Tickets will cost \$15 general admission; \$10 for students and seniors.

Early in 1952, Copland accepted a commission from the League of Composers to write an opera for television with a grant provided by the songwriting team of **Richard Rogers** and **Oscar Hammerstein II**. Copland collaborated with **Erik Johns**, his lover at that time, on the libretto. The inspiration for *The Tender Land* came from a book by **James Agee** called *Let Us Now Praise Famous Men*, with accompanying photographs by **Walker Evans**.

Although intended for television, Copland and Johns were unable to find a network that was interested. Instead, it was introduced by the New York City Opera on April 1, 1954, reworked into three acts for the Tanglewood Music Festival on August 2, 1954, and premiered in its final version at Oberlin College on May 20, 1955.

*The Tender Land* tells the story of Laurie, who will graduate from high school the next day. However, she feels that she has outgrown her hometown and angry that her mother and grandfather try to control her life. During a pre-graduation party she meets two drifters who have just come into town and becomes infatuated with one of them.
