CCSF staff assumes new responsibilities

“Given the drastic reductions in our budget, coupled with the departure of a number of staff (retirements, career moves, etc.), there are a number of situations where specific individuals have taken on additional responsibilities and are the key point of contact for areas that heretofore were covered by others,” points out Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, Chancellor.

“It is important to note that none of these people are receiving additional compensation,” says Dr. Day. “We wanted to make sure that these people are recognized, and more importantly, that others know who to contact in case of problems, concerns, or for general information.”

Dr. **Don Q. Griffin**, Vice Chancellor of Student Development, has taken on the additional assignment of Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs. He continues to oversee the Office of Dean of Student Support Services (formerly Counseling). The College Advisory Council of the CCSF Shared Governance System will hold two listening sessions on **Thursday October 2:**

- from 1 to 2 P.M. at John Adams Campus (Room 202), and
- from 4 to 6 P.M. at Ocean Avenue Campus (Pierre Coste).

Every member of the City College community is welcome to attend. These listening sessions will offer an opportunity for students, faculty, staff, and administrators to comment on CCSF's system of participatory governance.

LGBT community asked to submit names to 'Outlist'

The City College of San Francisco Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender (LGBT) Subcommittee of the Diversity Committee is asking the men and women among the faculty and staff of CCSF, who are openly gay, lesbian, bisexual or transsexual to add their names to a "Who's Out" list to be posted on the web on National Coming Out Day **October 11**.

"We hope by listing these names on a 'Who's Out' list can bring visibility and education about sexual orientation issues in City College," says **Linda Bacon**, Nutrition Instructor.

"Gays and lesbians are different than many other minority groups in that their minority status can be invisible — you can't know someone's sexual orientation by looking at them. One of the reasons that discrimination exists is because of this invisibility," Bacon points out.

Feedback gathered at these sessions, along with data collected through surveys completed by current and past shared governance committee members, will be provided to the Academic Senate, Administrators' Association, AFT 2121, Associated Students' Council, Classified Senate, SEIU Local 790, and the Department Chairs Council. Each of these organizations will also develop their own self-assessment of the shared governance system in a series of meetings to be held in October and November.

The review will culminate in a retreat of all shared governance stakeholders, during which participants will utilize listening session, survey, and self-assessment data to develop recommendations for improving the system's efficiency and efficacy. These recommendations will be presented to the Board of Trustees in December.

College forms available online

Rita Jones, Dean of Library and Learning Resources, and **James Lim** in conjunction with **Terrance Hall**, Dean of Faculty Support Services and Scheduling, have developed a web-based directory of commonly used CCSF forms.

The purpose was to provide an easily accessible and central location for many forms used by the college. Dean Hall's office scanned nearly 100 forms into the Adobe pdf (portable document format) file format. There are also many links to online forms which various CCSF departments have already placed on the web.

Many different kinds of forms are available. Some examples include: Application for Admission (Credit), Formal Request for Reasonable Accommodation, Buildings & Grounds Work/Service Requisition, and Class Field Trip Authorization. Some of the forms need to be submitted in duplicate and these will be marked SAMPLE with a note about where they can be obtained. Otherwise, the forms can be output to a printer and used. I. Call to Order

President Yee called the meeting to order at 2:45 P.M.

II. Adoption of Agenda

The agenda was adopted by consensus.

III. Approval of Minutes

Minutes of the April 2, 2003 Council meeting was approved with corrections.

IV. Announcements

Mueller: This will be the last weekend for performances of "One Touch of Venus" at the Diego Rivera Theater.

Sneed: The 25th Annual Great Teacher's Seminar will take place August 3 -7 at Casa de Maria in Santa Barbara, CA.

Nance: The "Keep the Doors Open" march will take place on Friday, May 9. There will be a march from 5th and Mission up Market to Civic Center where the rally will take place.

Podenski: Spring Flower and Plant Show is coming up on May 8, 2003.

V. Officers' Reports

President Yee:

1) The Faculty delegates at the recent Area "B" Academic Senate Plenary Session meeting were grateful to CCSF for its leadership role in the April 17, 2003 "March on Sacramento to keep the Doors Open".

2) Attended Articulation statewide "IMPAC" meeting. There is a new online resource called "Oscar" which will provide Advisors at four-year institutions with the course outlines from any school so that advisors will be able to better counsel transfer students.

3) Attended the Asian Coalition Scholarship Dinner.

4) The Chancellor wondered if, in concept, Council would agree with the idea of CCSF offering summer courses for S.F. Unified School District (SFUSD) students. Since Unified will not have a regular summer session, SFUSD students would pay to take CCSF courses. Council discussed and decided to have a special meeting to discuss this on Wednesday, May 14 from 2 P.M. to 3:30 P.M.

5) In the recent Senate election, three faculty from the Counseling Department were elected. The Senate By-Laws stipulate that only three faculty from the same area, except ESL, can be on Council at any one time. There will be only two openings on Council for faculty from Counseling. Three counselors were elected; the one with the least votes was declared ineligible. Thus, an opening will remain for the next highest vote-getter, Ann Clark, serving currently in the department of Special Assignment Faculty (as listed in the By-Laws).

Sneed: The State Academic Senate officers at the recent Academic Senate Plenary Session let CCSF use their official statewide Academic Senate banner to carry in the March 9 "Keep the Doors Open" March and Rally and indicated

that they lend their strong support. Also, Joshua Law's students provided the music for the Friday night State Academic Senate Spring Plenary Session social get-together and were well received. Materials from various workshops of the Plenary Session were brought back and are available in the Senate Office.

Podenski: A sign up sheet was circulated to get contact information about old and new Council members. A schedule for the 2003-2004 Council meetings was also distributed.

VI. Unfinished Business

A. Report of Shared Governance Program Review: Yee

There was no report.

B. Enhanced Self Study (ESS) Recommendation Update: Mueller/Ophelia Clark

About 17 recommendations have gone through process and have been approved by Executive Council. An "On Hold" category may need to be created for recommendations that have been approved but won't go forward at this time for budgetary or other reasons. The Senate is also considering a procedure of approving recommendations that come before it with listed concerns, instead of holding them up. The Senate would then expect that these recommendations would come back before Council once the concerns have been addressed.

C. Update from Executive Counsel Workgroup on Accreditation: Mueller

There was no report, but the Administration understands that this is a "Faculty Driven" process.

VII. New Business

A. Proposed Director of Payroll Position: Jim Kendrix, Chief Financial Officer/Podenski

Mr. Kendrix explained that it would be cost effective to reduce this position from

a Dean to a “Director.” He also felt that, within the management infrastructure of the Business Office, the duties and responsibilities of this position are not at a Dean’s administrative level. Questions were asked of Mr. Kendrix regarding this issue. Council then discussed the background of “Director” appointments over the past few years. In past discussions with the Chancellor, Officers had been trying to determine what the duties and responsibilities of a Director are and the difference between a “director” and an “administrator”. After discussion, the following resolution was approved by Council:
