Business

Programs from the 2003 graduation were viewed by the committee. The committee program agreed to use the same format for the 2004 graduation.

Unfinished Business

A. Open membership for the TLTR

Fred Teti informed the Committee that the TLTR had officially voted for open (not unlimited) membership. The Committee ratified this change by consensus.

B. Minimum Written Composition Graduation Requirement Report

Committee member **James Sauve** presented a written summary of the work done by the English Department Curriculum Committee to investigate the CCSF written composition requirement. The English Department has collected a great deal of data on student performance, especially at the English 94 level. The data strongly suggest that English 94 reading and writing skills do not meet a college-level standard. Furthermore, English 96, unlike English 94 and ESL 82, meets the legal criterion specified in Title V of the Education Code.

Consequently, the department conducted a referendum regarding the appropriate minimum A.A./A.S. graduation requirement. 96% of those who voted supported English 96. Sauve and English Department Chair **John Batty-Sylvan** stressed that this vote was only one part of the significant, ongoing research, revision, and reform being proposed for the English Department curriculum leading up to English 96.

Some Committee members expressed some concern about the effect on ESL students and on the graduation rate as a whole, but the Committee responded well to the English Department's proposal. Committee member **Klein** called for a vote on this issue at the next meeting, and moved

"That we endorse the recommendation of the Department of English that English 96 be the appropriate minimum level for meeting the CCSF A.A. degree requirement and that the recommenda-

tion be forwarded to the Bipartite Graduation Requirements Committee."

New Business

A. CCSF Honorary Associate Degree

The Executive Council has referred to Committee a motion regarding an honorary CCSF associate degree. The motion asks the Committee to define what such a degree might mean, and to devise a process for awarding such degrees. **Larry Klein** suggested that honorary degrees are, by definition, not academic degrees, but nonetheless the issue can be settled by awarding special degrees not tied to any official CCSF program (e.g., Associate of Humane Letters). Others suggested simply printing the word "honorary" on the diploma. **Fred Teti** agreed to research what other community colleges do, and whether there are laws about honorary degrees. Committee may form a working group next month.

B. Proposed New Final Exam Schedule

Committee member **Terry Hall** distributed copies of a proposed new final exam schedule devised by **Min Chen**. It is a five-day schedule, not a six-day schedule, allowing for a "reading day" after instruction and before exams. Furthermore, the weekday of a class's exam is always a weekday when that class met during the semester. Committee's reaction to the proposed schedule was favorable.

C. Proposed Catalog Rights Statement

Brian Ellison, Dean of Curriculum, Tenure Review, Faculty Evaluation, and the Catalog, asked the Committee for its reaction to a proposed Catalog Rights statement. Committee members suggested a few changes. They recommended that Ellison double-check the list of grades that can be used to establish continuous enrollment to ensure that they are grades we can currently assign, and that he include a disclaimer about not guaranteeing access to courses no longer offered.

D. Official Name for the TLTR

Teti informed the Committee that the TLTR has voted to change its official name to the "Teaching, Learning, and Technology Roundtable". Committee ratified the vote by consensus.

Subcommittee Report

Donna Hayes, Co-Chair of the Transfer Issues Subcommittee, reported on the Subcommittee's activities during Spring 2003. These included CSU Pass-Along (a process for certifying whether private school and out-of-state coursework fulfills the CSU G. E. requirements), transcript notation for CCSF G. E., CSU, and IGETC courses, and swirling registration. In Fall 2003, the Subcommittee will work on UC transfer enhancement with Dean **Wing Tsao**, and on better email communication with CCSF students. Hayes submitted a written summary for anyone wanting more details.

The APC expressed interest in pursuing again the IGETC-pattern transfer associate degree.
