## CCSF seeks public input on Draft Environmental Impact Report for planned facilities on Ocean Avenue Campus

City College of San Francisco is in the midst of preparing a Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) related to the College's new Master Plan.

To solicit input from the community on the scope of the Draft EIR, there is a public meeting scheduled **Wednesday, November 19** from 5 to 6:30 P.M. in the Pierre Coste Dining Room. Written comments also may be submitted by the public prior to 5 P.M. on **Thursday, November 20**. An actual draft of the EIR is expected to be available to the public the first week of December.

The draft EIR primarily will concern facilities on the Ocean Avenue Campus. Many of the projects will use funds from the Proposition A bond issue passed by the voters of San Francisco in 2001.

"The College's Master Plan presents building plans and recommendations for the long-term development of the campuses of City College of San Francisco with a special focus on the Ocean Avenue Campus which has many of the proposed projects," writes Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, Chancellor, in a post card notifying residents near the Ocean Avenue Campus of the November 19th meeting.

The proposed Ocean Avenue Campus Master Plan includes construction of a Community Wellness Center and related near-term projects. Construction of other projects identified in the College's 2001 bond measure and the Master Plan's 2015 building program for Ocean Avenue Campus facilities also would be included.

The components of the Master Plan are as follows:

- Construction of new College buildings;
- Expansion of selected existing buildings;
- Renovation of most existing buildings;
- Demolition of several existing buildings;
- Demolition of the berm between the North and South Reservoirs;
- Construction of structured parking to replace existing surface parking spaces that would be eliminated and to provide additional spaces;
- Conversion of Cloud Circle to a pedestrian mall with limited parking access;
- Improvements to campus entries on Ocean and Phelan Avenues;
- Provision of other vehicle, pedestrian and bicycle access and circulation improvements;
- Relocation of a recreational field; and
- Enhancement of the campus landscaping.

The Master Plan discusses planned changes at all CCSF sites. Most of the CCSF campuses will see only minor changes within the timeframe of the Master plan, such as the remodeling of space to adequately provide for program requirements. Planned improvements at the Chinatown campus have already been approved by the College; the planned program at the Mission Campus has already been approved, and the College recently completed supplemental environmental review of a new program site. Therefore, the Draft EIR will discuss site-specific impacts from the development at

the Ocean Avenue Campus primarily. The EIR will address development at all of the campuses where the combined changes could result in cumulative (regional) impacts.

The Board of Trustees must certify the Final EIR before making its decision on the proposed Master Plan.

The San Francisco Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on the Master Plan, which is being prepared to meet the requirements of the San Francisco Planning Code (Institutional Master Plans). The hearing will be for the receipt of testimony only as the City and County of San Francisco does not have approval authority over the College's Master Plan. The reconfiguration of the Balboa Reservoir is subject to approval by CCSF, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors and the Mayor.

Copies of the Notice of Preparation of the EIR, along with a description of the Master Plan, and a list of the potential environmental effects can be obtained in the Dean's Office at each of the CCSF campuses. These documents also are available at CCSF campus libraries as well as all branches of the San Francisco Public Library.

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# Shared governance update

## Registration Enrollment Subcommittee October 24 minutes

**Darlene Alioto** was re-elected Chair of the committee.

**1) REGISTRATION UPDATE:**

Dean **Robert Balestreri** distributed the Registration calendar for Spring 2004. Fall 2003 registration went well. There were a few BANNER problems in coordinating drops from a lab section versus a lecture session and with restricted majors. However, these problems were corrected.

Dean Balestreri and **James Hsiao** addressed the committee regarding telephone registration and maintenance issues. CCSF's current Telephone Registration System (STARS) is outdated. As BANNER is upgraded to version 6 at the end of 2004, the current voice response system will not be compatible with new data base and the new technology. It is estimated to cost \$100,000 to develop a product to replace the current Telephone Registration System and \$30,000 to keep the current system maintained and operating. In Fall 2003, there were 45,492 students who registered via the WEB and 8,394 students who registered by phone. (Only a handful of students, maybe 500-600, registered in person). Most students are choosing to register on-line and the College has added 20 computers for student use in the Registration Center. There are also eight computers for student use in E 107 and four computers for student use in the Counseling Office. While 8,394 students registering by phone is equal to 15%, it is presumed that most of these students would be able to register on-line if necessary. Concern was expressed for the 4% who may not have access to either computers or to an internet service provider and who would be forced to come in and register in person. James Hsiao indicated that ITS could keep the current telephone registration system going a while longer. After much discussion, the Registration-Enrollment Subcommittee reached the following consensus: The current Telephone Registration System should be

kept going as long as possible with a phase-out by January 2005. Meanwhile, CCSF should create more resources and provide ITS with increased support to improve web-based registration technology. Furthermore, the availability of computers for student use in registration should be expanded throughout the campus (Registration Center, Library, Batmale Hall, etc.) – and the window for in-person registration during the registration period should be expanded.

No substantive changes are anticipated for Spring or Summer registration.

**ADD/DROP UPDATE:** The add/drop process worked well. There were no problems and there are no anticipated changes.

**ON-LINE ADMISSIONS APPLICATION:** The on-line admission application process is fantastic! ITS did a great job in setting up and implementing this system. This admissions process is instantaneous and the program automatically checks for residency, etc. Dean Balestreri says it has been a "life saver."

**LATE ADD PROCESS:** The new Late-Add process, which ends two weeks prior to final examinations (rather than the day before), is underway. So far there have been 1,488 late adds this semester (out of more than 39,000 students).

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## Shared governance update

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Currently, the signature of the instructor, the Department Chair, and the Dean are required. The Deans will meet to determine whether or not they wish to continue to sign off on these forms.

**INSTRUCTIONAL CALENDARS:** Dean Balestreri distributed the instructional calendar for the Spring 2004 semester. Calendars for Summer 2004 and Fall 2004 were not yet available.

**VOTER REGISTRATION:** **Tim Killikelly** was unable to attend today's meeting, however, he sent a draft of the Voter Registration Project which has now being expanded state-wide.

**FTES COMPARISON:** Dean Balestreri distributed the official FTES data:

Summer 2002: 1444.30 FTES

Summer 2003: 139.99 FTES (we rolled 1,300 FTES forward to 2003-2004)

2002-2003: 36,347.26 FTES (state residents)

2002-2003: 2,017.20 FTES (nonresidents)

**OTHER:** Dean Balestreri informed the Committee about SB338 – a state law which limits the number of concurrently enrolled high school students in Physical Education classes to 10% of the total enrollment of the class. The Administration will meet with the Physical Education Department to discuss this issue and decide whether the College should decrease the number of Physical Education classes or to continue to enroll more than 10% in these classes and simply not expect state reimbursement for those students. Dean Balestreri also informed the Committee about the new restrictions on visas. Individuals with B1/B2 (Tourist Visas) are prohibited from enrolling in any public or private institution in the United States.

Individuals on F2 Visas (spouse or dependents of foreign students on F1 visas) are also prohibited from enrolling in any public or private institution in the United States. The Office of Homeland Security states that if these dependents wish to enroll, they must apply for the F1 visa and be bound by those regulations.

## Don Newton leads college bookstore association

City College of San Francisco Bookstore Manager **Don Newton** has been elected President of the California Association of College Stores. On November 5, Newton was installed as the President of the California Association of Colleges Stores (CACS) for a one-year term.

CACS is the regional association representing college stores in Arizona, Nevada, California and Southern Oregon. It has a total of 138 College Store members plus an additional 168 members who sell books and supplies to college stores. The purpose of the association is explained in part of its Mission Statement: "...provide leadership, resources, and services to support our member's ability to prosper in a rapidly changing environment."

Newton is not the first CCSF Bookstore Manager to head CACS. In 1956, the first CCSF Bookstore manager, **Dick Main**, was also President of CACS. Newton is the third manager of the CCSF Bookstores and has been in that position since 1994. He has been managing college stores throughout the U.S. since 1970.

Prior to his installation, Newton stated that he would not have been able to volunteer his time with CACS had it not been for the support of the Bookstore Staff and Dean **Stephen Herman**. "By participating in CACS, however, I have been able to bring much back to City College. Our Bookstore Staff, as well as the entire CCSF community, has benefited from my activity in CACS."

## Multimedia Studies program updates Honors Program's look with CD-ROM

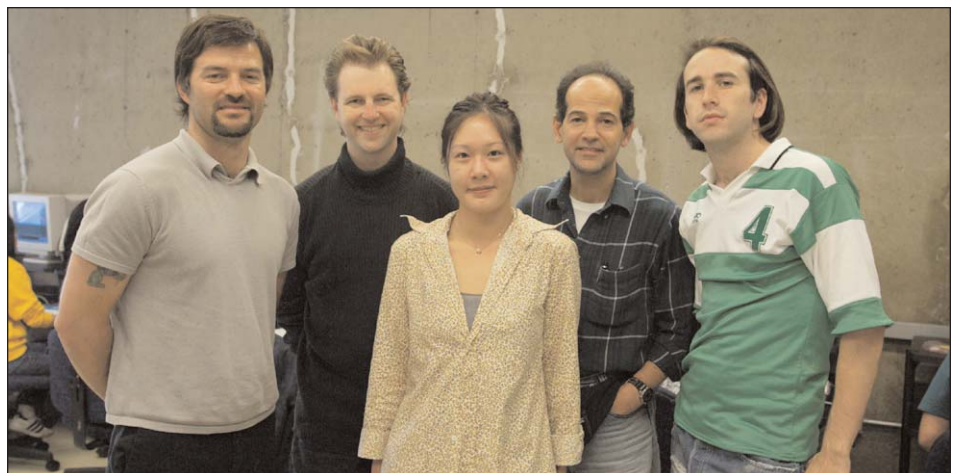
Students in **Christopher Clark** and **Glenda Drew's** IDST 150 (Advanced Multimedia Production) class are working on a project this semester to produce a CD-ROM for the CCSF Honors Program. The Multimedia Studies students working on the project are **River Chan, Silvano Silva** and **Ricky Celis**.

The CD will contain an introduction to the honors program, important honors forms, testimonials from honors students, pictures of honors students, information about CCSF's honors transfer partners, frequently asked questions, and links to relevant web sites. Because the project involves making a CD-ROM, the IDST 150 students are able to incorporate considerably more dynamic graphics and animation than they would be able to include on a typical web site. The 'flash' visual effects you will see in the end product would take too long to download off the web, but will come to life in seconds for users because of the CD-ROM technology. Because they are using a cross platform programming, both Mac and PC users will be able to take advantage of the CD.

The purpose of the CD-ROM will be to promote the honors program to new stu-

dents and serve as a tool for continuing honors students. The CD-ROM was originally the brainchild of Dr. **Brian Ellison**, Dean of Curriculum, Faculty Evaluation, and Tenure Review. Honors Program Coordinator **Sami Kudsí** explains, "Dean Ellison threw the idea out while we were walking back to our offices after a meeting and I just ran with it. The CD-ROM will be very convenient for honors students, since everything they need to get started and keep going in the program will be at their fingertips. Because the information is provided in a colorful and exciting way, more students should be attracted to the program than ever. The Multimedia Studies Program students are truly amazing. I have never worked with such an intelligent, creative and hard working group. Project manager and lead designer River Chan has really impressed me with her leadership skills and artistic vision."

City College has begun to gear up for the 2006 accreditation team visit. Pending the approval of the College Advisory Council, there will be 11 ad hoc committees dedicated to the Accreditation Self-Study, and these will need representatives from all CCSF constituent groups.

The following are the self-study committees and the standards addressed. Please consult the ACCJC "Introduction to the Accreditation Standards" for the complete description of each sub-standard.

**Mission**

The institution has a statement of mission that defines the institution's broad educational purposes, its intended student population, and its commitment to achieving student learning.

**Institutional Effectiveness**

The institution demonstrates a conscious effort to produce and support student learning, measures that learning, assesses how well learning is occurring, and makes changes to improve student learning.

**Instructional Programs**

The institution offers high-quality instructional programs in recognized and emerging fields of study that culminate in identified student outcomes leading to degrees, certificates, employment, or transfer to other higher education institutions or programs consistent with its mission.

**Student Development**

The institution recruits and admits diverse students who are able to benefit from its programs, consistent with its mission.

**Library**

Library and other learning support services for students are sufficient to support the institution's instructional programs and intellectual, aesthetic, and cultural activities in whatever format and wherever they are offered.

**Human Resources**

The institution employs qualified personnel to support student learning programs and services wherever offered and by whatever means delivered, and to improve institutional effectiveness.

**Facilities**

Physical resources, which include facilities, equipment, land, and other assets, support student learning programs and services and improve institutional effectiveness.

**Technology**

Technology resources are used to support student learning programs and services and to improve institutional effectiveness.

**Finances**

Financial resources are sufficient to support student learning programs and services and to improve institutional effectiveness.

**Leadership**

The institution recognizes that ethical and effective leadership throughout the organization enables the institution to identify institutional values, set and achieve goals, learn, and improve.

**Governance**

In addition to the leadership of individuals and constituencies, institutions recognize the designated responsibilities of the governing board for setting policies and of the chief administrator for the effective operation of the institution.

### What to expect as part of the Ocean Conversion:

- Departmental interviews are currently being held and training classes will be provided from November 11th to November 26th. Details of the training times and location will be provided via email.
- All existing voicemail messages must be removed by 5 P.M. on November 20th. Messages not removed by 5 P.M. will be erased and will not be recoverable.

- New telephones will be placed next to the old telephones beginning November 10th. Both telephones will be operational, but inbound calls will only ring on the old telephone until the conversion is completed.
- Neither old nor new telephones will be able to receive incoming calls for approximately 1 hour during the business day on November 21st. Outbound calling will be possible on the new telephone during this time. Since the conversion will take place in numerical order, please expect intermittent telephone service throughout the day if you are calling individuals on the Ocean Campus.

• The Campus Police will continue to be accessible at extension 3200 throughout the conversion.
