Lumina Foundation awards \$2.5 million grant to NATN

A \$2.5 million grant will help a national coalition make postsecondary education more accessible to interested students by changing transfer policies in higher education and improving shared technology for planning, financial aid, and enrollment.

City College of San Francisco, as the lead institution for the National Articulation and Transfer Network (NATN), will use the grant over three years to plan and implement a uniform transfer agreement between participating four-year colleges and to develop CollegeStepz, website technology that will make transfer practices accessible nationally. The grant was made by The Lumina Foundation for Education.

“This grant makes it possible to build a whole new capacity for helping students achieve success in higher education,” said Dr. **Philip R. Day Jr.**, Chancellor, and founder of NATN. “Students don’t just enroll in one institution. They take multiple routes across a complex educational landscape, oftentimes without a road map. This money will help us help them overcome barriers along the way and achieve their educational goals.”

NATN officials cite a continuing lack of access to higher education as a huge barrier to equal opportunity in America. “Despite the progress in reducing the gap in educational attainment and achievement in the past 20 years, a greater proportion of Whites earn college degrees than do other racial and ethnic groups,” said Day. “Because postsecondary education leads to higher employment rates and income levels, those groups not attaining degrees suffer disproportionately.”

Founded by City College two years ago and representing nearly 300 community colleges, baccalaureate institutions, and urban high schools, NATN has designed a three-tiered articulation system for collaborative development and implementation at a dozen or more regional sites around the U.S. The purpose of the system is to reduce transfer barriers (loss of credit; increased time to achieve a degree; and increased costs) and correspondingly to increase the number of students, especially students of color, progressing successfully from high schools through com-

munity colleges and on to baccalaureate degree completion.

The coalition believes its proposed uniform transfer agreement will increase the number of students – especially students of color – moving successfully from high schools through community colleges and on to four-year degree completion. Its proposed web technology, CollegeStepz, will give students and professional staff access to improved support systems across institutions and educational levels for planning, financial aid, enrollment,

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and transfers. The participating four-year colleges initially comprised the Historically Black Colleges and Universities, the Hispanic Serving Institutions, Tribal Colleges, and Asian-Pacific Islander Serving Institutions, but has been expanded to include other colleges and universities.

Dr. **Anita Grier**, president of the Board of Trustees of the City College of San Francisco, commended the project and the decision for the grant award: "We welcome and eagerly support our chancellor in providing leadership for a national system of student support to expand and improve the opportunities of students and the transfer system from community colleges to four-year institutions. In California, the state-supported universities lack the resources to accept all students who seek higher education, and students are turning to other alternatives such as culturally enriched institutions where they will need help in negotiating the pathway. This project is good news for our students and others throughout the nation."

Lumina Foundation for Education, a private, independent foundation based in Indianapolis, addresses issues surrounding access and success – particularly among underserved populations, including adult learners. The Foundation is investing in NATN as part of a comprehensive strategy to support increased

opportunities for success among students enrolling in community colleges, the nation's largest sector in higher education. For information on Lumina Foundation, visit www.luminafoundation.org.

The National Articulation and Transfer Network, until recently a coalition of institutions led by its steering committee, is now chartered as a non-profit organization in the state of California with a national board of directors and a national membership of institutions. The parent organizations, all of whom signed the original cooperative agreement giving birth to the coalition, are the American Council on Education (ACE), the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC), the Council of Great City Schools (CGCS), the National Association for Opportunity in Higher Education (NAFEO), the United Negro College Fund (UNCF), The Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU), and the American Indian Higher Education Consortium (AIHEC). NATN has reached its current organizational and program status with three-year seed-funding by the U.S. Department of Education's Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education. City College of San Francisco is the founding institution and the business agent for NATN.

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Reports from the Committee Chairs

College Diversity Committee (Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr.)

Chancellor Dr. Day gave an update on the ongoing projects. First, Dr. Day mentioned "The High School Report" which was just published by the Office of Research and Planning and circulated both internally and externally. Other ongoing projects of the College Diversity Committee are: Title IX, Strategic Implementation Plan and the Multi-Cultural Infusion Project. Dr. Day will keep the Council up to date on the progress of these projects.

Communication Committee (Francine Podenski)

Francine Podenski, the chair of the Communication Committee, announced that the CCSF homepage won an award as one of the best community college websites. To further improve the web design there will be an online survey. In addition, Chancellor Dr. Day suggested that the committee should contact 15 to 20 web designers and ask them to critique the CCSF homepage. There also should be a study conducted with student focus group(s) about the website design and its usability from the students' point of view. Finally, a cooperation between the Communication Committee and the ITPC was also recommended.

ITPC (Bill Beaver)

Bill Beaver, the chair of the ITPC, informed the Council that the new telephone system project was on schedule and should be completed by December. Further discussion was about the "high security and low access" policy of the ITS which was implemented without the consultation of the ITPC and consequently the College Advisory Council. Chancellor Dr. Day suggested that "enough security and high access" should be the goal of the college. The ITS should work this issue out with the ITPC.

Shared Governance Program Review (Robert Gabriner)

Robert Gabriner gave an update on the shared governance program review. Dr. Gabriner distributed the results of the online survey. Although at this point there was no response from the students, some 45% of the district employees completed the survey. Dr. Gabriner also distributed a revised shared governance program review timeline, which identified March 1, 2004 as the ending date of the review process. Last, the summary of the shared governance listening session was distributed. On the request of the Academic Senate there is going to be an additional listening session, scheduled for October 29th. To increase the turnout, in addition to the mailing and the announcements in *City Currents*, there will be flyers posted throughout the campus.

Personnel and Organizational Issues (Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr.)

Chancellor Dr. Day told the Council that Dr. **Don Griffin** shall remain the Vice Chancellor of Student Services and he will also take over the responsibilities of **Frances Lee**, who recently retired. The position of Vice Chancellor for Student Services will be advertised and filled by July of 2004. The position of Frances Lee will be filled by Dr. Griffin until his retirement in 2005.

Missing students to be made visible at next March in March

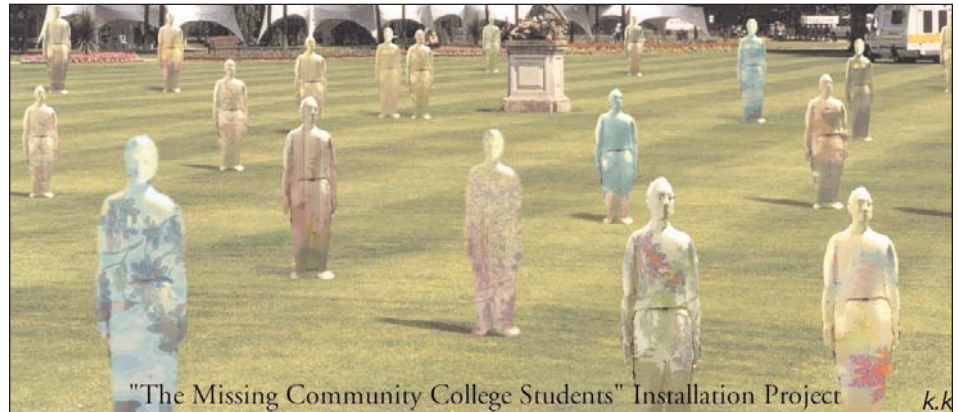

A statewide art installation is being planned for community college advocacy. Because we believe there could be community college budget cuts for both the current year (03-04) and the next budget year (04-05), we believe there will be a need to build both public awareness of and political support for the community colleges. To that end, we propose that all the community colleges in the state participate in "The Missing Community College Student" project.

At the November 4, 2003 meeting of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges a study was released that stated over 90,000 community college students had been denied access to classes. Additionally, in the Capitol there has been talk of narrowing the scope of who the community colleges serve and again denying access to adult Californians. Because the open access policy is fundamental to the mission of the California community colleges, we think we need to do "The Missing Community College Student" art installation project.

Two life size molds—one male and one female—will be sculpted. Then about 200 fiberglass models would be produced (about one for every 500 missing students) for development into art pieces representing the broad diversity of our community college students across the state. We hope that students from each college would turn two of these life size models into a "Missing Community College Student." Upon completion, they would be shipped to the receiving address in Sacramento. At the time of the second March on behalf of Community Colleges (tentatively scheduled for March 15), all of the "Missing Community College Students" would be installed on the Capitol lawn or on the median strip down Capitol Mall or other appropriate locations. The idea is that on the day of the March, the current students would



join the "Missing" students for a rally in support of the community colleges; however, at the time of May Revise, may be another appropriate time.

Afterwards, the art pieces would be auctioned off to fund further advocacy efforts on behalf of the community colleges. Additional fund raising efforts might include smaller versions, coffee mugs, greeting cards, t-shirts, etc.

In order to be ready for a March installation, your urgent attention to this advo-

Career counselor Kathleen Mitchell publishes 'The Unplanned Career'

City College of San Francisco Career Counselor **Kathleen Mitchell**'s new book, *The Unplanned Career: How to Turn Curiosity Into Opportunity*, is being published November 17 by Chronicle Books. The cost is \$19.95.

The Unplanned Career rewrites all the old career myths and offers new and fresh alternatives. The first hurdle for most people is feeling stuck where they are. This inspiring journal debunks that myth and encourages readers to focus on what they can do to enhance their careers rather than to dwell on what they think they can't. A better job with better pay does not necessarily require more school, a new degree, and a pre-determined path. The book suggests exploring other options such as, letting curiosity be your guide; requesting special projects in your current position; and volunteering on the weekends to gain insight and experience elsewhere.

The point of the book is to convince readers they do not need to have a perfect plan in place before exploring their career options. Unlike other career titles, which tend to advise on planning, planning, and more planning, *The Unplanned Career* encourages exploring and doing. Included throughout the book are real-life scenarios where happenstance, an innocent inquiry, or polite interest have led to internships and job offers, which then have led to profound career changes and satisfaction. Proceeding ahead and taking action, even without a firm plan, can bring many happy and unexpected surprises.

Mitchell has worked for more than 20 years as a career counselor and consultant. After working with hundreds of people, she created her own theory for career development called Planned Happenstance. She holds a master's degree in career development and a doctorate in counseling psychology.
