Board of Trustees elects Lawrence Wong President and Milton Marks III as Vice President for 2004

Lawrence Wong, Esq., has been elected President of the Board of Trustees of City College of San Francisco. Milton Marks III was selected to be the Vice President of the Board. Their colleagues voted Wong and Marks into their respective posts at the Board's regular meeting on January 29.

Wong was the Vice President of the Board in 2003. He also served as President in 1996 and 1999. He was first elected to the Board in 1994 and re-elected in 1998 and 2002.

Trustee Wong is recognized as a leader in promoting educational programs and services for immigrants and non-native speakers, Minority and Women Business Enterprise Programs (M/WBE), and efforts to diversify the college faculty and staff. Trustee Wong was born and raised in San Francisco. He was educated in the city's public school system and is a graduate of City College of San Francisco, the University of California at Berkeley and the University of Santa Clara School of Law.

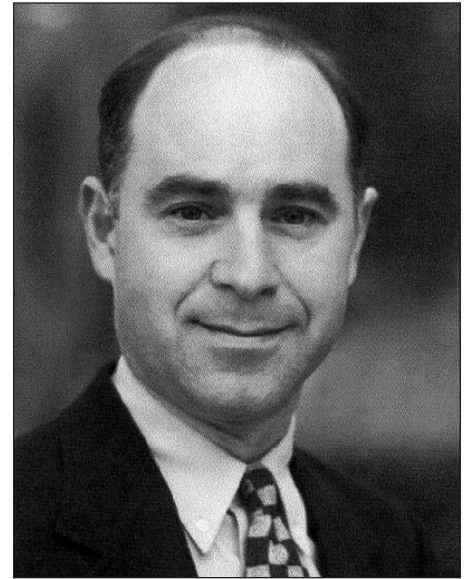
Marks was elected to the Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Community College District in November 2000.

Mr. Marks earned his MS degree in Historic Preservation from the University of Pennsylvania, and his AB degree in History (with Honors) from Bowdoin College.

Teacher Prep Center earns \$600,000 grant from CPEC

The Teacher Prep Center, within the Child Development and Family Studies Department at CCSE, was recently awarded a \$600,000 grant by the California Post-Secondary Education Commission, the only community college and the only two-year institution awarded a grant this year. Seventeen grants were awarded throughout California to colleges and universities engaged in Improving Teacher Quality (ITQ) activities. Among the other grantees are Cal, Stanford, UC Davis, CSU Humboldt and CSU Chico.

The \$600,000 grant, contracted over the next three years, will be used to recruit, support, educate and transfer community college students interested in becoming math and science teachers.

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\$600,000 grant to Teacher Prep

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San Francisco State University (SFSU) and the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) are partners in this effort and activities will include providing CCSF students with field experiences in SFUSD high schools and middle schools, developing courses and pathways at CCSF that articulate with math and science pathways for teachers at SFSU, providing faculty support for teachers to meet and discuss teacher and student standards in math and science, supporting paraprofessionals at SFUSD interested in becoming teachers, and providing resources, counseling and support activities to students at CCSF.

The CPEC grant, written with support from Kristen Hershbell, Associate Dean of Grants and Resource Development; Kelly Karandjeff, Special Projects Coordinator in Research, Planning and Grants; Dr. Robert Gabriner, Dean of

Research, Planning and Grants; Eva Schiorring, Researcher; Stephen Rico, Chair, Child Development and Family Studies Department; Wing Tsao, Dean, School of Math and Science; Jacob Perea, Dean of Education at SFSU; and Brad Stam, Director of the Office of Teacher Affairs at SFUSD, will allow for a rare collaborative in the area of teacher preparation.

The Teacher Preparation Center at CCSF has focused primarily on recruiting and training elementary school teachers over the past four years with the support of Teacher Reading and Development Project (TRDP) funding from the California Community College Chancellor's Office. The CPEC grant will allow for the development of articulated pathways for future middle and high school teachers, especially in high need areas. Math, science and special education remain the teacher subject areas that have the most critical shortages in California. CPEC support will allow for CCSF to recruit and transfer from our student population a diverse pool of future teachers that closely represents the diversity of California's public school population. "Infection Control Challenges in the Burn Unit" will be the topic of the next seminar to be presented in the City College of San Francisco Biology Seminar Series for Spring 2004. The speaker on **Friday, February 20** from 12 NOON to 1 P.M. in Room 300 of the Science Building will be **Fred Deneau**. M(ASCP), CMS, CIC; Infection Control Practitioner, St Francis Memorial Hospital, San Francisco. Deneau will discuss his background and training in infection control. He will then provide an overview of the types of trauma and burn injuries that patients suffer from. This discussion will consider many variables that lead a burn patient to be immune-compromised, including the most common pathogens causing infections. Some of the treatments used to treat burn victims will also be presented. This talk is particularly targeted to allied health students.
