# Shared governance update College Advisory Council

Minutes of the December 4, 2003 meeting

## Reports from the Committee Chairs

Communication Committee (**Francine Podenski** – Committee Chair)

Francine Podenski provided an update on the progress of the committee's work in particular; the new contract for the EATV, and the possibility of taping and cable casting the concert and lectures series on EATV. Francine Podenski also informed **Athena Steff**, the President of the Local SEIU 790, and **Rose Vela**, the President of the Classified Senate, that **Dana Galloway** of the Broadcast department was able to improve the quality of the voice on the recording of the Classified Development Day keynote speaker.

ITPC (**Bill Beaver** – Committee Chair)

Bill Beaver informed the Council that the ITPC is currently working on two major projects. The new telephone rollout was deferred until after the Spring Semester registration. These projects are the privacy statement and the banner upgrade.

**Darlene Alioto**, President, Department Chairs Council, expressed her hope that the new Banner will be here to serve us and not the other way around.

Shared Governance Program Review (**Robert Gabriner**)

Robert Gabriner and the council member agreed on the next steps in the process.

There will be reports and recommendations on the shared governance system from the lead organizations, which will be provided to the Office of Research and Planning by February 23.

The March 4 meeting of the CAC will run for two hours, and it will be dedicated to discuss these reviews and reports.

The final report with recommendation will be completed after the March 4

meeting and forwarded to the Chancellor and the Board of Trustees.

Discussion of the New Late Add Policy (**Robert Balestreri**)

As the last step in the shared governance process, the New Late Add Policy recommendation was presented to the CAC, which approved the policy. The recommendation will be presented to the Board of Trustees for adoption.

Awarding Honorary Degrees (**David Yee**)

David Yee, the president of the Academic Senate, presented the Honorary Degree recommendation to the Council. The CAC adopted the recommendation.

The Council adjourned in the memory of **Steve Levinson**.

## Project SHINE Receives Student Leadership Grant

Project SHINE (Students Helping in the Naturalization of Elders) has received a \$10,000 grant from Temple University to develop a student leadership program for SHINE “graduates” who want to strengthen and deepen their commitment to supporting immigrant elders’ quest for U. S. citizenship and English proficiency.

Project SHINE at City College of San Francisco is a collaborative project with San Francisco State University. Both schools are part of a consortium of 17 U.S. colleges and universities overseen by the national SHINE program at Temple University. The Corporation for National and Community Service funds the grant through the Center for Intergenerational Learning at Temple University.

Each semester nearly 150 CCSF and SFSU service-learning students from Political Science, Sociology, Health and Aging and other classes go into 45 non-credit citizenship, native-language literacy and ESL classes and community sites to work with older learners struggling to gain a stronger foothold in U. S. society.

**Christine Francisco**, Coordinator of the Office of Mentoring and Service Learning, notes, “We are delighted to add a leadership component to Project SHINE which has served our college well since 1997.”

“For many students, working with Project SHINE is their first exposure to the rewards of meaningful community service. They come away wanting to contribute more. Now we have a program for them,” adds Camilla Bixler, Coordinator of Projects SHINE and SAIL.

## *Infection Control Challenges in the Burn Unit*

Speaker: **Fred Deneau**, M(ASCP), CMS, CIC; Infection Control Practitioner, St Francis Memorial Hospital, San Francisco

Date: **Friday, February 20**

Time: 12 NOON-1 P.M.

Deneau will discuss his background and training in infection control. He will then provide an overview of the cover the types of trauma and burn injuries that patients suffer from. This discussion will consider many variables that lead a burn patient to be immune-compromised including the most common pathogens causing infections. Some of the treatments used to treat burn victims will also be presented. This talk is particularly targeted to allied health students.

## **Mad Cows, Mosquitoes and Modern Plagues**

In our recent history we have witnessed the emergence of novel diseases such as AIDS, Lyme Disease, Ebola and Hantavirus to name a few. In just the past several years West Nile Virus, Bird flu and SARS have emerged. Now BSE has finally been documented in the United

States. Dr Toebe will explore the biological, ecological and social factors that have allowed diseases such as these to surface. Dr Toebe will examine these issues in depth in a new course on Emerging Diseases in the fall of 2004.

## *Virus Discovery: The Story of SARS Detection*

Speaker: **David Wang**, Ph.D. University of California, San Francisco, Department of Biochemistry and Biophysics

DNA microarrays, otherwise known as "gene chips" provide a novel approach for the identification and characterization of both known and unknown viruses. Using a DNA microarray composed of oligonucleotide elements (fragments of DNA) derived from every known virus, it has been possible to detect a wide variety of known viruses from clinical specimens. In particular, the ability to detect novel viruses was underscored by the

successful identification of a novel coronavirus during recent the SARS outbreak of March, 2003. These findings and the potential of this technology to revolutionize the diagnosis of chronic and infectious diseases will be discussed.

## *Madagascar: A Land of Many Faces*

Join me for a look at a natural paradise praised by naturalists everywhere. Madagascar separated from Africa about 130 million years ago. This isolation has made the world's fourth largest island a living laboratory for evolution. It possesses a rugged mountainous backbone, numerous rivers and lakes, and a variety of habitats including rainforest along the east coast, dry forests in the west, and "spiny" desert in the southwest. This environmental heterogeneity has promoted the evolution of plants and animals found nowhere else on Earth. We will explore several of Madagascar's ecosystems, take a look at some of its unique plant and animal groups, and learn about the factors that have contributed to environmental degradation and extinction. I will also introduce a recently initiated drug discovery program in Madagascar that will provide economic benefits and contribute to biodiversity conservation in the rich moist forests surrounding Ranomafana National Park in southeastern Madagascar.
