# CCSF is Reading

## *The Stones Cry Out* *Surviving the Killing Fields*

**Molyda Szymusiak.** *The Stones Cry Out.* Indiana University Press, 1999. It was first published in French in 1984 by Editions La Decouverte.

**Haing S. Ngor.** *Surviving the Killing Fields*, Pan Books Ltd., 1989.

A recent trip to Cambodia and Vietnam with the CCSF Study Abroad program piqued my interest in reading two books on "the events" promulgated by the Khmer Rouge in Cambodia from April 1975 through 1980. Both books are written as first person accounts of what happened to the authors during this time.

*The Stones Cry Out*, by **Molyda Szymusiak**, is the account of a 12-year-old child who was the only member of her immediate family to survive the terror; she escaped to Paris and was adopted by a Polish couple (thus her name). As a child, she understands nothing of the politics but merely reports in detail what her daily life was like.

The second book, *Surviving the Killing Fields*, by **Haing S. Ngor**, on which the film was based, chronicles the same events but from the viewpoint of an adult. He is a physician and Ms. Szymusiak is the daughter of a high official, thus putting them both in the group of people the Khmer Rouge was exterminating — anyone who was educated, could read, or had a profession.

The soldiers of the Khmer Rouge were mostly ethnic Khmer, peasants from the countryside, uneducated, and many were as young as 10. Everyone was now to be "equal." Both authors were residents of Phnom Penh when the Khmer Rouge marched through in their black pajamas and rubber-tire sandals and "liberated" the capital. The first big lie happens immediately: Everyone must leave the city, but only for three days so there is no need to take much with you. They leave, most never to return, and begin an

odyssey of starvation, forced labor, murder, and disease they could not have imagined. One third of the population of Cambodia will die by the time this horror ends. I preferred the adult perspective of Dr. Ngor's book, but either one will give the reader a visceral experience of this historical period.
