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Shared governance update Academic Policies Committee

Minutes of the March 22, 2004 meeting

I. Agenda Adopted

Committee adopted the agenda.

II. Minutes Approval

Committee approved the 2004 February 23 minutes.

III. Chair's Report

- The Executive Council has appointed **Lancelot Kao**, Chair of Astronomy, to the Committee.

- The Executive Council eventually approved for consideration by the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements the proposed catalog language (with cosmetic changes) for the Mathematics Graduation Requirement.

- The Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements approved the aforementioned catalog language on Wednesday, March 10. It will appear in the Fall 2004 Catalog.

- The Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements also approved the Information Competency Degree Requirement pending the work of a Task Force (yet to be composed) to examine the details of implementation.

- **Fred Teti** expressed concern about the continued absence of students on the Committee. **Larry Klein** suggested that Fred Teti contact the Dean of Student Activities instead of the Associated Students.

IV. Unfinished Discussion/Business

A. Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC)-pattern Transfer Degree Discussion

In the absence of **Bruce Smith** and **Madeline Mueller**, the Committee did not hold an official discussion of the IGETC-pattern degree, but it was suggested that, at the next meeting, the Chair supply CCSF Catalogs for reference.

B. Written Composition Graduation Requirement (WCGR) Update

Jim Sauv  reported on recent developments in the joint meetings of the English and ESL Departments' Curriculum Committees. The ESL Department is cre-

ating a course (tentatively numbered 170) that might satisfy the WCGR. **Lynn Schneider** reported that ESL will hold a Department meeting this week to discuss various course options.

V. Subcommittee Doings

The Basic Skills Subcommittee supplied notes from its February meeting. The Distance Learning Advisory Committee (DLAC) supplied unapproved minutes (for informational purposes only) from its February meeting. Our Committee hopes to receive live reports from the DLAC and the Noncredit Issues subcommittees in April.

Committee adjourned in memory of Dean Bruce Smith's father, and with wishes for a swift recovery to District Shared Governance Coordinator **Attila Gabor**.

Summary of Motions and Recommendations

- IGETC-pattern Associate Degree (Item IV.A.): Bruce Smith and Madeline Mueller will continue to research concerns and try to draft a proposal. Teti will importune the Office of Instruction for Catalogs.

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CCSF Board of Trustees designates May 17–24 Classified Employees Week

The Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Community College District has designated **May 17 through 24** as *Classified School Employees Week*.

Janet Willett and Patricia Delich of Ed Tech Office visit Denmark

At the invitation of Northern Denmark Business and Technical College, **Janet Willett**, Coordinator of the Office of Technology-Mediated Instruction, and **Patricia Delich**, TMI Instructional Designer, spent a week in March in Denmark. Discussions, facility tours, and workshops took place on seven EUC Nord (Northern Denmark) campuses, the University of Aalborg, and with the funding agency of the Danish Center for International Cooperation and Mobility in Education and Training in Copenhagen.

The visit to Denmark followed two prior visits to CCSF by Director **Palle Damkjaer** and International Coordinator **Birthe Jaegerum** of EUC Nord, a two-year public college with multiple campuses. In addition to its on-site programs, EUC Nord has 10,000 online students and many years of offering courses online. The visits were made possible by a Danish grant for Trans-Atlantic Center for Applied E-learning.

The TMI office and faculty from the CCSF Business Department are participating in an online pedagogical exchange with faculty from EUC Nord. Both parties are hopeful for future collaboration in the area of best practices for online pedagogy. The University of Aalborg has extensive experience using problem-based, project-organized educational practice. Graduates are in great labor demand because under this model they practice skills needed in the workforce: communication, team-based learning, problem analysis, reflection, ability to acquire new knowledge, reporting/documentation, etc. TMI is working with Danish faculty to incorporate the method into online delivery where appropriate, especially with a workforce education focus. EUC Nord is also considering a formalized program to send some of its students to study abroad at CCSF.

Matthew Kennedy to sign new book

Anthropology faculty member **Matthew Kennedy** has recently published *Edmund Goulding's Dark Victory: Hollywood's Genius Bad Boy* (University of Wisconsin Press). The biography traces the life of esteemed screenwriter-director-composer Goulding (1891-1959), the man behind many film classics, including *Grand Hotel*, *Dark Victory*, and *The Razor's Edge*. Kennedy will do a book signing and reading at Limelight Bookstore, 1803 Market Street in San Francisco on **Monday, June 14** at 6:30 P.M.

Celebrating San Francisco's family child care providers' educational achievements

On Thursday, April 22nd, City College of San Francisco's Child Development and Family Studies Department (Child

Development Department) hosted a reception to honor the educational achievements of San Francisco's licensed family child care providers. The event, which was part of the 4/17-4/24 Week of the Young Child, celebrated a landmark in the history of the Child Development Department's now five-year-old training program for San Francisco child care providers: This Spring, 1,000 San Francisco's family child care providers had participated in the program, completing a combined 2,500 units in Early Child Development and Education, or 30,000 hours of training. To place this achievement in perspective, imagine how you would feel at the end of the following day: The alarm goes off at 5 A.M. You rush to get ready for the first young clients who will arrive in half an hour. You spend the day tending to 8-9-10, or even 14 children, including a few infants who need constant attention. You teach, play, engage, change diapers, prepare meals, clean dishes, comfort those who need encouragement, and never run out

of energy. Around 4 P.M the first parents arrive for pick up. By 5:30 the house is finally quiet. What do you do? Fall into a comfortable chair? Not so....you run out of the house, get into the car and drive to a three-hour CDFSD class on

"Infant/Toddler Development."

The Training Program: Designed to Meet the Changing Needs of a Busy, Multi-Lingual Community of Professionals

At the April 22nd celebration, child care provider representatives spoke about their community's strong commitment to education. And while they congratulated their colleagues on what has been accomplished thus far, all speakers stressed the need for continued education. For this, the commu-

nity will continue to rely on CCSF's Child Development Department which delivers training in three different languages, in multiple locations, every day of the week, early in the day as well as late in the evening. "Our mission is to make high-quality training available to San Francisco's family child care providers," says **Stephen Santos Rico**, Chair of the Child Development Department. "Sometimes this means taking the training out to where the providers live and delivering it in their language. It also means that we work with the providers to stay on top of their training priorities. It is a lot of work, but the community's response makes it all worthwhile."

Dating back to the late nineties, CCSF's collaboration with San Francisco's provider community was originally part

of a national movement to improve the quality of child care and to help child care providers organize. With assistance from a High Quality Child Care Investment grant, CCSF hosted a series of community meetings that identified providers' training priorities and scheduling preferences. Classes began and immediately took off, and when the grant ended CCSF had positioned itself to take the work to scale. The ensuing expansion was supported by San Francisco's Department of Children, Youth & Their Families (DCYF) and encouraged by DCYF's vision and interest in developing for San Francisco a highly trained and well-organized provider community.

As the menu of courses expanded, the local child care advocacy groups grew in membership and strength. A DCYF grant helped launch the local networks that connect and organize providers by neighborhood and cultural affinity. At this

time, 60% of San Francisco's providers belong to a network and three in four providers belong to The Family Child Care Association of San Francisco.

Is There Anybody Whose Education Matters More to Us?

One of the reasons why CCSF’s Child Development Department has become a key provider of education for local child care providers is that the Department stays abreast of the changing educational needs of the local child care provider community. As an illustration, the Child Development Department recently collaborated with local providers to develop and conduct a comprehensive, city-wide survey of the training needs and priorities of San Francisco’s approximately 630 licensed providers. The survey, which achieved a remarkable 32% response rate, found that the child care providers want more short-term courses in computer applications and in advanced business development. They are also interested in training that prepares them to achieve high ratings on the Environmental Rating Scales, an initiative that is designed to improve and standardize the quality of infant/toddler care. The preferred time for the training is weekends, so, as **Sharon Donovan**, Director of CCSF’s Professional Development Project noted: “It is fortunate that we have in place a group of committed instructors.”

The survey also asked providers about their current level of education. The findings confirmed that San Francisco’s child care provider community is very well-educated. More than half of the respondents reported that they had completed education beyond high school, 10% hold AA or AS degrees, 19% hold BA or BS

degrees, and 6% have completed some graduate level work.

At the April 22 celebration, two things were clear. San Francisco’s child care providers have a special relationship with CCSF. More than 80 providers attended the event—rushing over after the last child was picked up. The other characteristic that struck an outsider was that this is a remarkably integrated community of professionals. It is not only that the provider community is more diverse than San Francisco itself, but also that there is a tremendous amount of interaction and collaboration between the different ethnic, linguistic and neighborhood-based groups. Because this is a highly organized community, many providers know each other even if they are working in different parts of the city. And it is clear from their interaction that they network among themselves to make the community stronger.

As the last provider left the Rosenberg Library Atrium that hosted the celebration, Stephen Santos Rico reflected on the CDFSD’s commitment to continue to serve this diverse community: “Is there anybody whose education should matter more to us than those who take care of our kids? Having a community of educated child care providers makes our city a better place to live. And from our perspective, going out there to Sunnysdale or to Chinatown to deliver training to these hard-working students—that’s what being a community college is all about.”
