# Shared governance update College Advisory Council

## Minutes of the September 2, 2004 meeting

### I. Reports from the Committee Chairs

**A. College Diversity Committee (Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr. – Committee Chair)**

The committee did not meet yet, but there will be a joint meeting with the Basic Skills Committee on student services with lots of Q&A. Dr. Day will give an update on the meeting at the council's October meeting.

**B. ITPC (Bill Beaver – Committee Chair)**

There was no report as the committee did not meet yet.

**C. Communication Committee (Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr.)**

Dr. Day distributed the Board Communications Planning Meeting notes. The notes dealt with the issue on how the College can currently improve the way in which it communicates to its internal and external constituents. The document looked at what is working, what are our goals, and what we can do to expand and improve our outreach. **Francine Podenski**, the chair of the Communication Committee, pointed out that the notes address real needs, however, a large portion of the proposed improvements and outreach is already exists or is being developed. **Athena Steff** talked to the essential needs of improving the quality of some of the printed material by utilizing the existing Docutech at the Mission Campus. Athena and **Arthur Curtis** will be invited to a feature cabinet meeting to further expand on the idea. Finally, creation of a workgroup was suggested with members from the Communication Committee and the Board Communications Planning Group to accelerate the planning process. The Communication Committee will review the Planning Meeting notes at its next meeting, on October 5.

### II. Shared Governance Program Review (Robert Gabriner)

Bob Gabriner distributed the latest draft of the Shared Governance Review Recommendations. Point 5 of the New Initiatives was revised and Bob was asked to bring back the final draft for review (and for adoption) at the next College Advisory Council in October.

# Yes We Can Conquering Children's Asthma — Together

*Editor's note: The following article originally appeared in "Toward Total Community Health" by Kaiser Permanente. It is reproduced in City Currents with permission.*

Asthma is the number one cause of children's hospitalization, emergency department use, and school absence in the United States. Yet with proper preventive care, asthmatic children can avoid most asthma attacks and hospitalization.

Children from low-income communities – usually communities of color – are hospitalized more frequently than the wealthier children who live across town. Contributing factors include more environmental contaminants in low-income areas, as well as barriers to preventive care and successful asthma self-management.

What can be done to help reduce these health disparities in our communities? Kaiser Permanente helped found the YES WE CAN Urban Asthma Partnership in 1997.

YES WE CAN is coordinated by Community Health Works in San Francisco, California, a nationally recognized center for innovation in community health, based at City College of San Francisco and San Francisco State

University. It has developed a prevention-oriented, culturally sensitive model of asthma care for low-income children. The distinguishing feature of this model is that it is carried out by a health care team including doctors nurses, and community health workers. With funding assistance from a network of partners, including The California Endowment, City College and SF State have tested their approach at three demonstration sites, and developed the YES WE CAN Toolkit – materials and detailed instruction manuals for replicating this successful program in community "safety net" clinics across the nation.

While Kaiser Permanente has contributed more than \$300,000 in funding, and materials to this program, we also recognize the importance of sharing our clinical expertise. "Kaiser Permanente's most significant contribution was its willingness to share its knowledge with those in the community safety net," said **Vicki Legion**, MPH, faculty in the Health Science Department and director of YES WE CAN. "Everyone knows that Kaiser Permanente is light years ahead of most other organizations in its systematic development of successful chronic conditions management practices."

The YES WE CAN Toolkit, which offers step-by-step instruction for a primary care clinic or a Medicaid managed care plan to start an asthma program, integrates Kaiser Permanente's chronic conditions management expertise along with the YES WE CAN care model and quality improvement methods from the National Initiative on Childhood Health Quality. The toolkit includes a Program Implementation Manual; a Clinical Care Coordinator Manual; a Community Health Worker Manual (in English and Spanish); a database CD-ROM to prompt and chart clinical encounters and home visits; and supplementary resources including videos and posters.

The Toolkit has won special praise from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and is being used by a growing number of community primary care clinics. In Northern California, the Redwood Community Health Coalition, which includes 26 primary care clinic sites in four counties, is piloting the Toolkit and clinical model at three of its clinics. "This very innovative toolkit," said **Jean Merwin**, the Coalition's executive director, "combines best practices in disease management, and gives us the tools to train the staff at our clinics."

Over the long term, said YES WE CAN's Legion, "We hope to follow Kaiser Permanente's lead and develop toolkits for other chronic conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, congestive heart failure, and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease."

## Yes We Can gets results

A 2002 study of results at the Pediatric Asthma Clinic of San Francisco General Hospital, a demonstration site for the YES WE CAN clinical model, showed the following:

Intervention	Before	After
Use of written asthma plans to follow latest guidelines	0%	100%
Use of controller medications	40%	83%
Use of mattress covers	6%	94%
Hospitalization rates	21%	4%
Emergency Department use	63%	32%

The polling places are located at the Diego Rivera Theatre, Ocean Avenue Campus, 50 Phelan Ave.; Chinatown/North Beach Campus, 940 Filbert St.; Southeast Campus, 1800 Oakdale Ave (at Phelps); Castro Valencia Campus at James Lick Middle School, 1220 Noe St.; and John Adam Campus, 1860 Hayes St.

Any registered voter in the City and County of San Francisco may use a provisional ballot at these campus polling spots. However, because the supervisorial races are by districts, if a person votes out of his/her supervisorial district, he/she will not be able to vote in that supervisorial race.

### Helen C. Toribio

A memorial service for **Helen Caubalejo Toribio**, who was a professor in the Asian American Studies Department at City College of San Francisco for seven years, will be held **Saturday, November 20**. It will begin at 1 P.M. in the Lower Level of the Student Union on the Ocean Avenue Campus.

Ms. Toribio recently completed many years of research on the little known history of the Philippine-American War, with the publication of *The Forbidden Book*, a chronicle of U.S. political cartoons that reflected the polarized debate in congress and between presidential candidates on the annexation of the Philippines. She is also the author of articles on the anti-martial law movement in the U.S. and the history of the Union of Democratic Filipinos. Ms. Toribio was also a co-author and editor of *Seven Card Stud with Seven Manangs Wild*, an anthology of the Filipino American experience.
