Voters re-elect Marks, Berg, Rodis and Ramos for City College of San Francisco Board of Trustees

Voters re-elected incumbents **Milton Marks III, Dr. Natalie Berg, Rodel E. Rodis** and **Julio Joaquin Ramos** to new four-year terms on the Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Community College District in a general election held November 4, 2004.

According to unofficial data from the San Francisco Department of Elections with 578 of 578 precincts reporting as of November 2, election night: **Milton Marks III** received 120,161 votes or 24.35% of the ballots cast; **Dr. Natalie Berg**, 97,277 (19.71%); **Rodel E. Rodis**, 82,270 (16.67%); and **Julio Joaquin Ramos, Esq.**, 74,248 (15.04%). Comparable totals for the other candidates in the race were: **Matt Julh-Darlington**, 64,207 (13.01%); and **Judith Susan Schiff**, 52,660 (10.67%). There were 2,709 write-ins (.55%).

According to the San Francisco Department of Elections there are a total of 486,937 registered voters, and 271,058 cast ballots in the November 2 election, for a voter turnout of 55.67 percent.

Milton Marks III

Marks is the Vice President of the City College Board of Trustees for 2004. He was first elected to the District in November 2000. Trustee Marks is Chair of the Board's Education Committee and a member of the Finance and Legislative committees.

Dr. Natalie Berg

Dr. Berg was first elected to the Board in November 1996 and re-elected in 2000. She has served the Board as its President during 1997 and 2001. Trustee Berg is Chair of the Board's Personnel

Committee, and a member of the Facilities and Diversity/Community Outreach committees.

Rodel E. Rodis

Rodis was first elected to the Board in 1992 and re-elected in 1996 and 2000. He began his service as an appointed Trustee in 1991. Trustee Rodis served as President of the Board during 2002 and 1998. He is Chair of the Board's Facilities Committee, and a member of the Finance and Education committees.

Julio Joaquin Ramos, Esq.

Ramos was initially elected to the Board in 2000. He is Chair of the Board's Legislative Committee, and a member of the Diversity/Community Outreach and Technology committees.

Note: The in-house internal transfer process is a new process in accordance with the provisions of the SEIU Local 790 contract, and is subject to modifications and/or amendments on an as-needed basis.

Class: 1402 Junior Clerk (Business Department)

Appointment Type: *Provisional.* Provisional incumbents will be required to pass a Civil Service examination process for this class in order to be considered for a permanent position

Schedule: *One part-time (20 hrs./wk.) school term only (180 working days per year) position.* This position is grant funded and funding is reviewed on a yearly basis. Hours and campus may change according to needs.

School term only employees are hired for a specific work calendar and may not have an assignment during school/academic break.

Location: *Business Department, John Adams Campus, 1860 Hayes at Masonic.*

Position Description: Under general supervision, the Junior Clerk provides clerical support for a busy job development program within the Business Department, John Adams.

Examples of Duties: The responsibilities include data entry, computerized record keeping and general clerical support including job tracking, document production and web assistance. Includes heavy telephone work and some faxing. The position also requires providing job development materials to students and acting as a liaison between students and the job developer.

Wells Fargo Bank donates \$250,000 for teacher development

Wells Fargo Bank has awarded City College of San Francisco (CCSF) a \$250,000 grant to fund The Wells Fargo Math and Science Scholars Program for the first year of what is expected to be a three-year program. The College will need to apply for additional funds for the second and third years.

This new teacher education program will address three critical problems that affect public education in San Francisco and California:

- Low student achievement in math and science;
- The lack of credentialed math and science teachers;
- The lack of well-paying, field-based jobs for future teachers at community colleges.

The Wells Fargo Foundation has worked to improve academic achievement in math and science within the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD). For the past five years, City College's Teacher Preparation Center has also worked to address this same goal by placing CCSF students in District classrooms to support K-12 teachers and to integrate academic coursework with early professional experience. Since 1999, the Center has placed more than 500 City College students in K-12 classrooms. Students have contributed over 7,000 tutoring hours in 108 classrooms and 30 elementary schools.

The Wells Fargo Math and Science Scholars Program will add to the Center's successful programs that have positioned CCSF as a leader in San Francisco's teacher recruitment and training effort. The key programs are highlighted below:

- **Credential and Transfer Support:** CCSF offers San Francisco State University (SFSU) courses on campus at a reduced rate for students interested in pre-kindergarten and K-12 education.
- **Teacher Workforce Development and Service Learning:**

Students fulfill their pre-credential requirement through supervised field work (90 hours/semester) and unit-bearing work experience courses.

- **Teacher Recruitment:** CCSF offers a Teacher Career Pathway Program at Lincoln High School, paid internships and lab aide positions for students working at Mission Science Workshop (K-8 applied science projects at the Mission Campus) and in District math and science classrooms.

- **Joint Use Facility:** The Academic Joint Use Facility will co-locate Child Development and Allied Health faculty from CCSF and SFSU. This innovative model will support the teacher preparation, early childhood education, community health and multidisciplinary programs.

The Wells Fargo Math and Science Program will meet these annual objectives:

- 20 Wells Fargo Math and Science Scholars a year will intern in SFUSD classrooms;
- 15 Wells Fargo Math and Science Scholars will receive transfer scholarship assistance to SFSU; and

- 20 SFUSD Faculty Mentors will receive \$200 stipends for student supervision.

Dr. **Kathleen Sullivan Alioto**, Dean, CCSF Development, points out that special thanks are in order for **Lisa Stevens**, Wells Fargo Bank Bay Area Region President; **Mario Diaz**, Regional Vice President, Wells Fargo Foundation; **Ioanna Stanatopoulos**, Vice President and Manager, Retail Renewal Installation; and **Ann Alioto**, Consultant to CCSF and Wells Fargo Bank.

The grant was developed through the vision and work of **Kathleen White** of the Child Development and Family Studies Department and its Director, **Stephen Rico**; **Kristin Hershbell Charles**, **Kelley Karandjeff** of the CCSF Office of Research, Planning and Grants, and its Dean, Dr. **Bob Gabriner**; Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, Chancellor, and Dr. **Allison Satterlund** of the Chancellor's Office; CCSF Controller **John Bilmont**, and Executive Assistant **Kris Kvigne** and Proposal Writer **Kathleen Murphy**, both of the CCSF Development Office.

Special thanks also are due to the Board of Directors of the CCSF Foundation for getting out the message about how critical City College is for workforce development. Particular thanks should go to Nomination Chair **Walter Newman** for urging Wells Fargo to become more involved with CCSF.
