Minutes for December 12, 2004

1. Introductions

a. Two visitors from City Car Share

2. Acceptance of the Minutes from 11/11/04

(Moved, seconded and approved with grammatical corrections)

3. Old Business

a. Update on reservoir project/Phelan Ave. – Carl Koehler reported that the turning on of the signal light on Phelan has been pushed back from next week to two weeks from now. It makes more sense to start up the lights for the new semester as opposed to two days of school traffic.

b. Striping of Phelan Ave. – The proposed plan is to take Phelan from four lanes, down to three, a bad idea. There would be one lane of traffic in each direction, a center turn lane into the reservoir, no parking on the west side before the entrance for a right-turn lane, and also bike lanes in each direction. Doing so would cause backups in both directions and huge amounts of traffic. Striping is to begin on the 20th of December. Carl Koehler will work with Jim Blomquist to stop the new lane striping.

c. Possible location of additional Bike Racks – The bike rack project is on hold due to the fact that the previous student reps have not brought forth any information. Shawn Yee is to check into where these students are.

d. Rewrite of Parking regulations – 7:00-10:30 ticking in the reservoir. The signs that were made had the old regulations. The printed regulations will go into effect starting next semester. The regulations are in place to stop Riordan and BART people from parking all day for only \$1.

e. Bicycle “Boot” progress – Some of the boots for the bikes have been picked out. Carl handed out the draft of the policy. Majority of the bike traffic seems to be around the library, as the 1st Floor bike racks are always full opposed to Ram Plaza that is not always full.

4. New Business

a. City Car Share – City Car Share costs \$4/hr, \$0.44/mile, and \$10/month. Pods, car locations, contain 1-5 cars each and are scattered all throughout the city. Russian Hill, Mission, and East Bay are proposed locations for new pods. We at the Ocean campus want a pod on campus; CCS doesn't see the Ocean campus being a profitable location. Gough, Chinatown, and any other campus that is hard to get parking is a place that they would want. A survey will be conducted to see if CCSF faculty and/or students will use the program. The item will be revisited in Feb.'s meeting with more information.

b. No more 10:30AM enforcement in the reservoirs – Signage in the reservoir will change to reflect the new policy. CK will work on that.

c. Request for carpool spaces – The new Wellness Center will be built as a “Green Friendly” project. The college needs to have so many “points” to qualify, and to earn points certain criteria must be met. One of the criteria is that we have 27 van/carpool spaces on campus. Locations such as the reservoir were named as places to put some of these spaces. With the loss of the two campus lots, parking will just keep getting tighter.

d. N-Lot will shrink because of a bungalow for Facilities & Planning, and **C-Lot** will lose spaces because of big storage containers.

Communication Committee Minutes for February 1, 2004

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Minutes from the December 2, 2004 meeting were approved.

2. KCSF RADIO UPDATE

Dr. Cecil Hale, Broadcast Electronic Media Arts instructor, attended to discuss KCSF Radio. The College Advisory Council has requested that the Communication Committee act as an advisory body for KCSF Radio because the station reaches a global audience via the internet. Dr. Hale explained that KCSF Radio operations and programming are the core curriculum and laboratory activity for three CCSF credit classes: BCST 130, 131, and 132. After discussion, the committee agreed to advise KCSF without directing or interfering with curriculum or classroom activities associated with the station.

3. COMMITTEE MISSION STATEMENT REVIEW

The committee agreed the new mission statement shall read: "Recommends policies related to college communications: publications and other media including educational access television, KCSF Radio, and the front page of the college website." Podenski will present the revised mission statement to the College Advisory Council.

4. EATV-CH27 UPDATE

Many cable subscribers in San Francisco receive a degraded EAtv-Ch27 signal. The problem is caused by a substandard connection between the EAtv-Ch27 headend on Ocean Campus and Sutro Tower. Over three years ago San Francisco's Department of Telecommunications and Information Services (DTIS) directed Comcast to upgrade the connection between the College and Sutro Tower as part of their cable franchise contract obligation. City College has experienced unreasonable delays and repeated broken promises related to this work. Comcast technicians made an appointment with Broadcast Media Services technical staff to work on connection upgrade on

January 27 and did not show up.

Comcast has rescheduled this work for February 8, 2005.

5. DISTRICT COMMUNICATION PLAN

The next step will be to appoint members and resources to a study group to be chaired by Dr. Thomas Blair, to work on the Educational Access Television section of the Communication Plan. Focus of the group: evaluation of the current status of EAtv-Ch27 staff, programming, and technology; exploration of ways to more fully utilize EAtv-Ch27; budget and staff needed to increase the program week from five days to seven day; webcasting EAtv-Ch27 to increase audience reach; acquiring additional program material; and producing more locally originated programs.

6. COLLEGE WEBSITE - FRONT PAGE

Faculty in Review biographies are frequently inconsistent with faculty biographies on individual departmental websites. The committee suggests that faculty awareness be increased about the options available for faculty to update their own biographies in Faculty in Review and that departments be encouraged to create direct links on department websites to individual Faculty in Review bios.

Recommendation: Office of Marketing

and Public Information publish an article on this subject in *City Currents*.

2. Front page bulletin rules were discussed. The committee recommends the following:

- a. Administrator: Martha Lucey, Dean of Marketing and Public Information
- b. Maximum four bullets on the front page at any given time.
- c. Maximum two lines per bulleted item.
- d. Items may be bumped after two weeks.

7. ACCREDITATION DRAFT REPORT

There are inaccuracies in the draft Co-chair's report from Standard IIA about the Communications Committee, the District Communications Plan, and the Office of Marketing and Public Information. Committee Chair Francine Podenski and Dean Martha Lucey were directed to draft a memo from the Communications Committee to the Accreditation Work Group with corrections.

8. GUARDSMAN KIOSK UPDATE

Journalism Department Chair Juan Gonzales is researching information about the Kiosk Project. He will return to the Communications Committee this semester with additional information.

Note: if any of the fourteen (14) members whose terms expire in spring 2006 (see "Council Staying On" below) resign, their term(s) will be completed by the runners up in this election, starting with the person ranked 16th in number of votes received and proceeding in order of decreasing vote number until all the vacant positions are filled, and in accordance with any limits in the Constitution and Bylaws.

Nominations for Council membership are made by petition (see over for Petition form). Each petition must be endorsed by one (1) member of the Senate and must include the signed acceptance of the nominee. In addition to the petition, each nominee may include a statement of **NO MORE than 25 words** to be included with the ballot. **Longer statements will be edited or omitted.**

Candidates should be aware of the following provisions of the Constitution.

ART III (Constitution): The Council shall consist of 29 members elected at large, subject to the following provision: that no more than three Senate members from a department, as defined in the Bylaws, shall serve on the Senate at one time, except ESL, which shall have no more than six.

ART IV (Constitution): A candidate for membership on the Council must be nominated by written petition of three Senate members and must accept the nomination in writing on the petition. For public information, petitions will be posted at the Academic Senate office on the day they are received. The balloting must be completed at least four weeks before the end of the semester.

If by March 19 (the close of nominations), the number of candidates does not equal twice the number of vacancies to be filled, the Council or the Election Commission shall postpone balloting one week; during which time, additional candidates may be nominated upon the written petition of one Senate member and the written acceptance of the candidate. The postponed balloting shall then take place regardless of the number of candidates.
