Assemblyman **Mark Leno's** San Francisco office has announced that the following information about City College of San Francisco's 70th anniversary activities and programs is being published in a newsletter being sent out to constituents of Assembly District 13.

*Dear Neighbor,*

*I am proud that our hometown educational institution, City College of San Francisco, is celebrating its 70th anniversary this year. Over 2,000 full- and part-time faculty teach nearly 40,000 students each semester at 100 different locations across the City.*

*In conjunction with this anniversary and to further the role of the school in our local community, I authored Assembly Bill 499 this year. Currently, there is no opportunity for City College to encourage local small businesses to contract for services with the institution. AB 499 offers City College the option to grant a preference to local small businesses in the contracting process, thereby further contributing to the vitality of the local communities the college serves.*

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## City College plans programs in China, Viet Nam

Over the summer, the Board of Trustees of City College of San Francisco has approved separate agreements with China's Sino-American Education Center (SAEC) and Vietnam's Ho Chi Minh City Peoples Council to offer educational programs in their respective countries.

After a series of discussions and evaluation of the proposal, the China program arranged through City College's Office of Contract Education was brought to the shared-governance process and senior administrators for consideration and approval. The Agreement is a three-way understanding among the Sino-American Education Center, Inc. (SAEC), University of California, Berkeley (UCB), and City College of San Francisco (CCSF) for a program housed at Tsinghua University in China.

In essence, CCSF will provide lower division transfer education for UCB. The SAEC will coordinate recruitment, enrollment and faculty logistics with Tsinghua University in China. SAEC is the managing partner with whom CCSF will enter into a training agreement. CCSF will offer sixty (60) units of transfer courses in meeting the requirements of three UCB majors in IT, Bioscience, and Political Science. Tsinghua Experimental High School in Shenzhen will be one of the major feeders to the program. In addition, many of the incoming high school graduates who will not be able to attend Tsinghua University will be recruited to the UCB-CCSF Program. Contract Education has worked extensively with SAEC to achieve this goal.

For each student, SAEC will pay CCSF \$176 per unit for credit classes offered in China with a minimum of 150-200 students per year. SAEC is responsible to conduct student recruitment, arrange for training facilities and provide appropriate housing for all CCSF faculty and staff. CCSF has the primary responsibilities for student admission, placement and matriculation process, work with Department Chairs to select faculty members to teach in China, and provide I-20s to qualified students who wish to transfer to CCSF to continue the first two years of studies in the United States.

This program has the potential to increase CCSF's international student body when the students are granted visas to come to the United States during their two years of studies. The project would offer a semester length study abroad for CCSF students who wish to spend a semester in China. CCSF students would have the opportunity to enroll in CCSF general education courses while learning about Chinese culture and language.

In order to implement this program in a seamless way, CCSF will work closely with UC Berkeley to establish a transfer program. Contract Education wishes to enter into a cooperative agreement with UC Berkeley for accepting transferable credits earned from this China program. The term of the agreement is from July 1 2005 to June 30, 2010, for a period of five years.

The Planning Agreement between Ho Chi Minh City Peoples Council and City College of San Francisco signed was signed June 16, 2005. The planning objectives to provide support for the development of community college educational services for Ho Chi Minh City include:

City College of San Francisco would provide advice and technical assistance to the Department of Public Education for Ho Chi Minh City for current and future educational projects that are under study including a feasibility study for adapting the City College model for the delivery of educational services for the growing student population of Ho Chi Minh City.

City College of San Francisco would provide training for faculty in the subject areas of health care services, business management and English as a Second Language. CCSF will also seek to expand its Southeast Asia Business and International Education Center in collaboration with Ho Chi Minh City.

City College of San Francisco and Ho Chi Minh City will explore the feasibility of engaging in the exchange of faculty and students between City College of San Francisco and Ho Chi Minh City post-secondary institutions.

City College of San Francisco and Ho Chi Minh City agree to work to identify and secure the necessary financial resources to offset the associated costs of these efforts and programs.

### Trading with Vietnam trip

City College of San Francisco's School of Business and the Southeast Asia Business and International Education Center is offering a once in a lifetime opportunity visit Vietnam and to learn about trade and other business activities in Vietnam.

The group will spend nine days (**November 4-13**) in Ho Chi Minh City. Participants will meet Vietnamese business owners who are anxious to trade with the U.S., be personally introduced to Vietnamese officials who can help set up a business; participate in lectures and workshops that explain how to interact with Vietnamese entrepreneurs and officials; learn about key trade agreements and other critically important regulations and legal requirements..

The cost of airfare, hotel, daily breakfasts and selected dinners, including transportation while in Vietnam is estimated to be under \$2,000.

The "A" Workshop covers the use of the library online catalog to find books, videos and more. 50 minutes

The "B" Workshop teaches the use of several periodical databases to find, print, or e-mail magazines and newspaper articles. 50 minutes

The "C" Workshop covers basic Internet concepts and basic search techniques using Web subject directories and search engines. 50 minutes

The "W" Workshop emphasizes more advanced search features for search engines and evaluating and citing Web pages. 50 minutes

The "D" Workshop teaches research paper skills, including narrowing a topic, finding suitable sources, citing sources and preparing the bibliography. Only for student who have required papers/projects. Bring a copy of your research assignment and your topic. LIMIT OF 20 PEOPLE. 90 minutes
