## City College raising \$10,000 to help victims of Katrina

As a follow-up to my earlier communication regarding City College's participation in relief efforts to offset the horrific impact of Hurricane Katrina, I have more information to share. We are participating in consent with the statewide community college effort that is being led by Dr. Edward Valeau (President of Hartnell College) and Ned Doffoney (President of Fresno City College)...both born and raised in Louisiana. The goal is to have

each district raise \$10K so that statewide effort will raise approximately \$1.9M.

After consulting and in cooperation with AFT 2121, SEUI Local 790, Classified Senate, Administrators, and the Associated Students/Inter-Club Council, we have agreed that we would set up a local fund (CCSF Katrina Relief Fund) for purposes of receiving people's contributions. 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# CCSF's Unlawful Discrimination and Harassment Policy

*Editor's Note: In order to facilitate awareness of City College of San Francisco's policies on equal opportunity and harassment prevention, City Currents publishes the policies near the beginning of the semester.*

The policy of the San Francisco Community College District is to provide an educational and employment environment in which no person shall be unlawfully denied full and equal access to, the benefits of, or be unlawfully subjected to discrimination on the basis of ethnic group identification, national origin, religion, age, sex, race, color, ancestry, sexual orientation, or physical or mental disability in any program or activity that is administered by, funded directly by, or that receives any financial assistance from the State Chancellor or Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

Nor shall any such persons be denied full and equal access to, the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination on the basis of marital status\*, medical conditions\*, gender identity\*, domestic partner status\*, AIDS/HIV status\*, status as a Vietnam-Era veteran\*, or status as a lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender\* or questioning\* person in any District program or activity.

The policy of the San Francisco Community College District is to provide an educational and employment environment free from unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct or communications constituting sexual harassment.

Employees, students, or other persons acting on behalf of the District who engage in unlawful discrimination as defined in this policy or by state or federal law may be subject to discipline, up to and including discharge, expulsion, or termination of contract.

In so providing, the San Francisco Community College District hereby implements the provisions of California Government Code sections 11135 through 11139.5, the Sex Equity in Education Act (Ed Code, Section 66250 et seq.), Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C.

Section 2000d), Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. Section 1681), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. Section 794), the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. Section 12100 et seq.) and the Age Discrimination Act (42 U.S.C. Section 6101).<sup>1</sup>

\*These categories are not subject to the State Chancellor's jurisdiction.

<sup>1</sup>If the federal statutes cited herein would result in broader protection of the civil rights of individuals than that broader protection or coverage shall be deemed incorporated by reference into, and shall prevail over conflicting provisions of Title 5, section 59300, as cited in this Policy.

## Definitions

Definitions applicable to the nondiscrimination policies are as follows:

- "Appeal" means a request by a complainant made in writing to the San Francisco Community College District governing board pursuant to Title 5, section 59338, and/or to the State Chancellor's Office pursuant to Title 5, section 59339, to review the administrative determination of the District regarding a complaint of discrimination.
- "Complaint" means a written and signed statement meeting the requirements of Title 5, section 59328 that alleges unlawful discrimination in violation of the nondiscrimination regulations adopted by the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, as set forth at Title 5, section 59300 et seq.
- "Day" means calendar days.
- "Mental disability" includes, but is not limited to, all of the following:
  - (1) Having any mental or psychological disorder or condition, such as mental retardation, organic brain syndrome, emotional or mental illness, or specific learning disabilities, that limits a major life activity. For purposes of this section:
    - (A) "Limits" shall be determined without regard to mitigating measures, such as medications, assistive devices, or reason-

able accommodations, unless the mitigating measure itself limits a major life activity.

(B) A mental or psychological disorder or condition limits a major life activity if it makes the achievement of the major life activity difficult.

(C) "Major life activities" shall be broadly construed and shall include physical, mental, and social activities and working.

(2) Any other mental or psychological disorder or condition not described in paragraph (1) that requires specialized supportive services.

(3) Having a record or history of a mental or psychological disorder or condition described in paragraph (1) or (2), which is known to the District.

(4) Being regarded or treated by the District as having, or having had, any mental condition that makes achievement of a major life activity difficult.

(5) Being regarded or treated by the District as having, or having had, a mental or psychological disorder or condition that has no present disabling effect, but that may become a mental disability as described in paragraph (1) or (2).

"Mental disability" does not include sexual behavior disorders, compulsive gambling, kleptomania, pyromania, or psychoactive substance use disorders resulting from the current unlawful use of controlled substances or other drugs.<sup>2</sup>

<sup>2</sup>If the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 definitions would result in broader protection of the civil rights of individuals with a mental or physical disability, or would include any medical condition not included within these definitions, then that broader protection or coverage shall be deemed incorporated by reference into, and shall prevail over conflicting provisions of the definitions in Government Code section 12926 and should be included in District policy. (Gov. Code, Section 12926(1).)

• “Physical disability” includes, but is not limited to, all of the following:

(1) Having any physiological disease, disorder, condition, cosmetic disfigurement, or anatomical loss that does both of the following:

(A) Affects one or more of the following body systems: neurological, immunological, musculoskeletal, special sense organs, respiratory, including speech organs, cardiovascular, reproductive, digestive, genitourinary, hemic and lymphatic, skin, and endocrine.

(B) Limits a major life activity. For purposes of this section:

(i) “Limits” shall be determined without regard to mitigating measures such as medications, assistive devices, prosthetics, or reasonable accommodations, unless the mitigating measure itself limits a major life activity.

(ii) A physiological disease, disorder, condition, cosmetic disfigurement, or anatomical loss limits a major life activity if it make the achievement of the major life activity difficult.

(iii) “Major life activities” shall be broadly construed and includes physical, mental, and social activities and working.

(2) Any other health impairment not described in paragraph (1) that requires specialized supportive services.

(3) Having a record or history of a disease, disorder, condition, cosmetic disfigurement, anatomical loss, or health impairment described in paragraph (1) or (2), which is known to the District.

(4) Being regarded or treated by the District as having, or having had, any physical condition that makes achievement of a major life activity difficult.

(5) Being regarded or treated by the District as having, or having had, a disease, disorder, condition, cosmetic disfigurement, anatomical loss, or health impairment that has no present disabling effect but may become a physical disability as described in paragraph (1) or (2).

(6) Physical disability” does not include sexual behavior disorders, compulsive gambling, kleptomania, pyromania, or psychoactive substance use disorders resulting from the current unlawful use of controlled substances or other drugs.<sup>3</sup>

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• “District” means the San Francisco Community College District or any District program or activity that is funded directly by the state or receives financial assistance from the state. This includes any organization associated with the District or its college(s) that receives state funding or financial assistance through the District.

• “Responsible District Officer” means the officer identified by the District to the State Chancellor’s Office as the person responsible for receiving complaints filed pursuant to Title 5, section 59328, and coordinating their investigation.

• “Sexual harassment” is unlawful discrimination in the form of unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal, visual, or physical conduct of a sexual nature, made by someone from or in the workplace or in the educational setting, and includes but is not limited to:

(1) Making unsolicited written, verbal, physical, and/or visual contacts with sexual overtones. (Examples of possible sexual harassment that appear in a written form include, but are not limited to: suggestive or obscene letters, notes, invitations. Examples of possible verbal sexual harassment include, but are not limited to: leering, gestures, display of sexually aggressive objects or pictures, cartoons, or posters.)

(2) Continuing to express sexual interest after being informed that the interest is unwelcomed.

(3) Making reprisals, threats of reprisal, or implied threats of reprisal following a rebuff of harassing behavior. The following are examples of conduct in an academic environment that might be found to be sexual harassment: implying or actually

withholding grades earned or deserved; suggesting a poor performance evaluation will be prepared; or suggesting a scholarship recommendation or college application will be denied.

(4) Engaging in explicit or implicit coercive sexual behavior within the work environment which is used to control, influence, or affect the employee’s career, salary, and/or work environment.

(5) Engaging in explicit or implicit coercive sexual behavior within the educational environment that is used to control, influence, or affect the educational opportunities, grades, and/or learning environment of a student.

(6) Offering favors or educational or employment benefits, such as grades or promotions, favorable performance evaluations, favorable assignments, favorable duties or shifts, recommendations, reclassifications, etc., in exchange for sexual favors.

• “Unlawful discrimination” means any complaint of unlawful discrimination based on a category protected under Title 5, section 59300, including sexual harassment, harassment based on a protected group status as set forth in this Policy, and retaliation.

## Retaliation

It is unlawful for anyone to retaliate against someone who files an unlawful discrimination complaint, who refers a matter for investigation or complaint, who participates in an investigation of a complaint, who represents or serves as an advocate for an alleged victim or alleged offender, or who otherwise furthers the principles of this unlawful discrimination policy.

The compliance officer/coordinator for purposes of this policy is the District Affirmative Action Officer, 31 Gough Street, San Francisco, CA 94103, (415) 241-2281. Information concerning the provisions of the applicable laws and complaint procedures is available from the District Affirmative Action Officer.

# Reflective Teaching Project aids student learning

To better understand the factors that help or hinder student learning, groups of CCSF teachers have been meeting monthly to explore the challenges we all share. These groups, which are not unique to CCSF, go by many names across the country: teachers' circles, inquiry groups, action research, reflective practice. Many educators, from K-12 to universities, are finding that the most effective professional growth programs are conducted by groups of colleagues, working together to address their mutual concerns.

The Reflective Teaching Project (RTP) here at CCSF is going into its third year. We have based the project on the work of the Teacher Knowledge Project, which originated at the School for International Training (SIT). In this model, 6-8 instructors form a group and bring in topics they feel are most relevant to them. Each month, the group focuses on one teaching or learning issue in a facilitated and systematic process.

At CCSF, these groups were originally formed in the ESL Department to look at the issues that promoted or hindered second language acquisition. In response to a recommendation from the Basic Skills Committee, instructors from Math, ESL, English and Transitional Studies are forming groups to look at the learning issues and best practices that affect basic skills students.

The interest in RTP groups has grown and on August 27, teachers from several Bay Area schools and colleges met at the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center for a day of training in this model of professional development. Several CCSF instructors were training as 'inquiry group' facilitators. The workshop was conducted by **Loren Edwardson**, **Maria Rosales-Uribe**, **Bophany Huot** and project coordinator, **Curt Sanford** with the assistance of campus facilitators, **Lia**

**Smith, Ruth Goode, Shama Hasib, Jennifer Abel and Christa Lewis.**

What we hope to achieve with this project is to offer CCSF instructors a way to re-energize their hearts and minds. Teaching can be very isolating. Ideally, RTP groups help instructors work together to find their own solutions to what seem like intractable problems. The groups provide a supportive forum for instructors to question their own assumptions about what they do and how students learn.

In the future, we would like to see the RTP groups at CCSF become inter-disciplinary, for example, a group that includ-

ed instructors from Political Science, P.E., Art, English, Hotel and Restaurant Management, and Asian American Studies. An inter-disciplinary group naturally has limited information about each other and will go beyond "group-think" and look at classroom issues from a variety of perspectives.

# Russian Film Festival begins Sept. 26

Professor **Krista Hanson** of the CCSF Foreign Language Department will be hosting a Russian Film Festival this fall on the Ocean Avenue Campus. All films will be shown on in the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center. Admission is free. All films are in Russian with English subtitles.

*War and Peace (Voyna i mir)*, 1967, will be shown on two consecutive Monday evenings, **September 26**, 5-9:30 P.M., Rosenberg 301, and **October 3**, 6-9:30 P.M., Rosenberg 304. This brilliant, epic version of **Leo Tolstoy's** masterpiece about Russia during the Napoleonic wars won the Academy Award for Best Foreign Film in 1968 and is a feat of cinematography and casting. Directed by the distinguished actor **Sergei Bondarchuk**, who also plays the role of Pierre, this film ranges from the brilliant ballrooms of St. Petersburg to the deadly battlefields of Borodino, following the fortunes, loves, and sorrows of the Rostov and Bolkonsky families. The burning of Moscow after **Napoleon's** occupation and his winter retreat, which less than 10% of his army survived, are depicted in unforgettable sequences. "A film of this magnitude could only be made with the full support of a government like that of the USSR, which chose to meet the extraordinary expense of the production and deployed the Soviet army to reenact the major battles. Because of its length, this film is shown very rarely. Don't miss this opportunity!" says Hanson.

*Moscow Does Not Believe in Tears*, 1979, will be shown **Thursday, October 27**, 7-9:30 P.M., Rosenberg 304. This funny and very human film tells the story of three young women who come to Moscow in the 1960s seeking love and new opportunities in life. It was immensely popular in Russia and worldwide, winning the Academy Award for Best Foreign Film in 1980. It stars **Vera Alentova** and **Aleksei Batalov**. It was directed by **Vladimir Menshov**.

*Irony of Fate or, Have a Good Steam! (Ironiya sudby, ili s lyogkim parom!)*, 1975, will be shown **Monday, November 28**, 6:30-9:30 P.M., Rosenberg 304. Back by popular demand is this classic New Year's romantic comedy which is widely shown during the holidays in Russia. A reluctant groom returns home from drinking with his friends in the bathhouse to propose to his girlfriend on New Year's Eve, but passes out. Aroused from his stupor by an angry woman, he discovers he is not in Moscow, but in Leningrad, in an identical apartment. The film pokes fun at the cookie-cutter construction of new high-rises around city centers and weaves a funny and delightfully unlikely romance.
