Dean Elizabeth Brent passes away

Longtime City College of San Francisco faculty member and Dean of Outreach and Recruitment Services **Elizabeth Brent** passed away on December 25, 2005. She had worked for 26 years at CCSF in a number of teaching and administrative positions, becoming Dean of Outreach and Recruitment Services in Fall 2000. Funeral services were held January 3 at the Bryant Mortuary, San Francisco. The funeral was preceded by a visitation.

Born August 8, 1942 in Martinez, California, to the union of **Elizabeth Brent Gobby** and **James Gobby**, Ms. Brent's family was the first African American family to settle in the Pittsburg, California area. Ms. Brent received her kindergarten through 12th grade education in Pittsburg, and after graduation at the age of 17 years, she moved to San Francisco.

Ms. Brent earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from Lone Mountain College, San Francisco, and a Masters in Social Work degree (MSW) from the University of California at Berkeley, where she graduated Magna Cum Laude.

She enjoyed reading, cooking, decorating, seeing movies and most of all, gift giving. Her greatest pride was in mentoring and guiding and educating young people. During her tenure at CCSF, she counseled in the San Francisco Assessment Center, the Extended Opportunity Program and Services (EOPS) Department, the Women's Re-entry to Education Program (WREP), the Women's Resource Center (WRC) and the Career Development and Placement Center. In EOPS, where she began as an outreach recruiter and later

became the Department's Coordinator of Outreach, she developed a comprehensive outreach plan, including public service announcements, public transit messages and posters, high school and comprehensive community outreach, and parent nights.

"I see my charge as Dean of Outreach and Recruitment Services as seeking to enhance the image of City College so that we will be a student's first choice for higher education, rather than a second or third option," she told *City Currents* at the time of her appointment.

Brent also taught Child Development and College Readiness Courses at CCSF and San Francisco State University (SFSU). She was Instructor/Coordinator for the Safe Start Program, a violence intervention program, in cooperation with City College's Child Development and Family Studies Department, SFSU, and five other Bay Area community colleges. Her instructional and counseling

experiences have always included designing original curricula and other informational materials. In 1998 she was selected for inclusion in *Who's Who Among Community College Teachers*.

For two years, she was CCSF's Coordinator of Diversity Relations where she developed and disseminated diversity education resources and coordinated the College's diversity and anti-discrimination programs and Flex activities. Always an innovator for student support programs, she developed and implemented California's first program to address both the instructional and counseling needs of African American students — the African American Achievement Program (AAP) — and served as its coordinator for five years. AAP was selected by the State Chancellor's Office as an Exemplary Program. Ms. Brent also assisted in writing proposals for the Summer Bridge, the Transfer Opportunity (TOPS) and the Math Bridge Programs and the Transfer Center. Early in her career at CCSF, she served as the Gender Equity Coordinator. In addition, she created logos, stationary and brochures for the programs in which she was involved.

Ms. Brent also has served in the capacity of Acting Chairperson for the Departments of General Counseling and African American Studies. For six years, she was the Site Supervisor for the Southeast Campus, 1800 Oakdale Ave.

She is survived by two sons: **Brent Anthony Gobby** and **Christian Brent**; two nephews: **Victor** and **Vincent Jackson**; two god daughters **Meredith Hope** and **Carla Warmlesley**; as well as a host of other relatives and many dear friends and colleagues.

Terrell Anderson

Terrell Anderson, 23, a standout forward at City College of San Francisco who had earned a scholarship to play for USF next year, was shot and killed December 26, 2005 during an argument outside the Velvet Lounge dance club in North Beach.

Anderson, who is survived by his mother, **Cassandra Hughes** of Oakland, and his two-year-old daughter, **Sequira Williams-Anderson**, passed away just two days after his father, **James Anderson**, succumbed to complications of diabetes.

Anderson averaged 10 points and 10 rebounds per game in 2003-04 and thanks to Terrell's efforts the Rams won 80 percent of their games the past two years, his coach, **Justin Labagh**, told the *San Francisco Chronicle*.

A funeral service for Terrell Anderson was held January 7 at the San Francisco Christian Center. Actions taken at December 19 meeting

At its December 19, 2005 meeting, the Board of Trustees of City College of San Francisco took the following actions (items are listed in the order in which they were discussed):

- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B3 — Authorization for three (3) Contract Modifications totaling \$47,266 for Special Services Contracts and Construction Contracts: A) Williams Scotsman, increase amount by \$32,156 to \$672,098 for additional cost for crane and more foundation material, and credit for flooring labor; B) Structural Design Engineers, increase amount by \$15,110 to \$80,110 for adding various structural detailing to scope of work, additional cost due to State Architect review time; and C) Ninyo & Moore, no additional amount for adding John Adams Main Building Modernization Project to Scope of Work.
- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B5 — Authorization to Renew Special Services Contract with Merle E. Cannon at a Cost Not To Exceed \$30,000 to assist the District in the preparation of a Five-Year Capital Outlay Construction Plan, a Space Inventory and consultation for Initial and Final Project Proposals for the period January 1, 2006 through December 31, 2006.
- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B7 — Authorization to augment the subcontract with the University of California, San Francisco, to support the Stem Cell Research Technician Certificate program in the amount not to exceed \$53,620.93 and extend the full amount of the contract through March 31, 2007. The total amount of the contract is not to exceed \$98,620.93.
- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B8 — Training Contract with San Francisco International Airport for an amount not to exceed \$256,300 for the term of February 1, 2006 to June 30, 2007. The Office of Contract Education will provide a “Problem Solving and Decision Making” training program for approxi-

mately 280 supervisors and managers. This training is highly specialized. Contract Education needs to depend on outside consultants to deliver the training.

- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B9 — Special Services Contract with Kepner-Tregoe, Inc., for an amount not to exceed \$233,000 for the term of February 1, 2006 to June 30, 2007 for airport workers. The training will be provided to approximately 280 Airport supervisors and managers in 14 training sessions.
- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B10 — Authorization to Conduct a Fall 2006 Study Abroad Program in Paris, France, and to Contract with ACCENT International Consortium for Academic Programs Abroad, Ltd.
- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B11 — Authorization to Conduct a Study Abroad Program to Florence, Italy, Fall 2006 – Spring 2007 and to Contract with ACCENT International Consortium for Academic Programs Abroad, Ltd.
- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B12 — Authorization to Conduct a Study Abroad Program to Madrid, Spain, Spring 2007 and to Contract with ACCENT International Consortium for Academic Programs Abroad, Ltd.
- Approved Resolution No. 051219-B13 — Authorization to approve the Child Development and Family Studies Department, State Preschool/Center-Based programs’ participation in the SB701 San Francisco Child Care Subsidy Pilot Plan for the fiscal year, July 1, 2005 to June 30, 2006. Participating in SB701 will enable City College of San Francisco, Child Development & Family Studies Department, State Preschool & Center-Based programs to receive new eligibility threshold and fee schedules for families with income above 75% of the State Median Income (SMI).
