In attendance were CCSF Board members Immediate Past President Rodel E. Rodis, Dr. Anita Grier, Julio Ramos, Lawrence Wong and Student Trustee Veronica Lawrence. Berg and Carter were elected unanimously at the Board's January 26 meeting. Other elected officials present included City Treasurer José Cisneros, City Assessor-Recorder Phil Ting, Supervisors Sean Elsbernd and Bevan Dufty. Dr. Berg also served the Board as its president during 1997 and 2001. Prior to being elected to the Board, Dr. Berg served City College in several faculty and administrative posts over a 30 year period. Carter was appointed to the Board in 2001 and elected to a full four-year term in 2002. He also served as Vice President during 2002.

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Dance Team Performs in the Chinese New Year's Parade

Appearing for the first time in the 2006 Chinese New Year's Parade, a team of 29 students from the Folk Dance Production Class and the Intermediate Waltz class was joined by PE & Dance Department faculty **Kathe Burick** and **Marguerite Fishman** and ESL instructor **Linda Milhoan**.

Gail Barton devised a Waltz choreography to music by **Jia Peng Fang** specifically for the parade with dancers starting in four long rows. Patterns were created by blending elements from Chinese dance, American square dance, and even an Israeli grapevine step.

Gail's father, **Roy Didier**, a CCSF student in 1938, drove his truck which carried the sound equipment. "It was an amazing

experience, with unusually beautiful weather bringing out an estimated crowd of 500,000 spectators who cheered, took our pictures, and shouted out for us to dance for them, even though the marshals were telling us to hurry up!" Gail said of the parade.

The 32 performers were in a variety of costumes from Austria, Bulgaria, Finland, Poland, Romania, Greece, Russia, France, Taiwan, Tibet, and China. Most of the costumes worn were replicas of authentic costumes and were constructed by the folk dance production students; others were purchased by the

individual performers and some were donated to the college dance program.

Coming from many countries and backgrounds, with ages ranging from 20 to 60, the student performers represented the diversity in the dance program at City College, where all are welcome to learn and those with a deep interest and dedication can share their love of dance in performance. Students should apply now for Nutrition Assistant Program

Please let your students know about City College's Nutrition Assistant (NA) Program if they are looking for a career that is exciting, challenging, and allows them to succeed, excel, and feel good about what they do. The NA Program is a two-semester certificate program designed to develop competency in the delivery of nutrition-related services for paraprofessionals. The program consists of an integrated curriculum of course work (15 units) and field experience (2 units, 160 hours). Classes are offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays during daytime hours at the John Adams Campus starting this Fall 2006 semester. For 10 weeks during the second semester, students are placed at one of a variety of field experience sites in the Bay Area, such as public health nutrition programs or health care settings, where they gain hands-on experience to acquire marketable, job-specific skills under the supervision of a registered dietitian.

Health care trends toward preventative care in community settings, cost containment, as well as the growing ethnically diverse and aging population have created an increased demand for well-trained, bilingual nutrition paraprofessionals. These changes and trends mean increased opportunities for the nutrition assistant. Many of our graduates are gainfully employed at WIC Supplemental Nutrition Programs, senior nutrition programs, public health agencies, University of California Cooperative Extension, hospitals, and long-term care facilities.

The Nutrition Assistant Program is only offered every other year, and is limited to a maximum of 30 students. Spring 2006 English Eligibility Exam scheduled for April 3 through 6

College Advisory Council minutes

February 2, 2006 meeting

I. Reports from the Committee Chairs

A. College Diversity Committee (Dr. Day)

The College Diversity Committee did not meet, yet. However, Dr Day pointed out, the Equity and Diversity Project will be on the agenda for the Committee.

B. Information Technology Policies Committee (David Yee)

David Yee, the chair of the ITPC gave the following update.

- The telephone software upgrade will be taking place in early March, but will not be noticed by the end users.
- The Banner 7 upgrade will take place between April 9 and 12.
- The ITPC supports the idea of a student I.D. card, even for the noncredit students. However, members of College Advisory Council would like to have further discussion on the topic of providing non-credit students with student I.D. card.
- The idea of using District-Wide Emails as a form of notification instead of flyers was proposed by the ITPC. This idea too warrants further discussion and it was opposed by some members of the council.

C. Communication Committee (Francine Podenski)

Francine Podenski, the chair of the Communication Committee gave a presentation. The committee was asked to look into the issue of inappropriate flyers being posted in classrooms. The Communication Committee is going to ask the college community, through an article published in the *City Currents*, to help remove flyers from classrooms after the enrollment period is over.

Francine Podenski summarized the presentation given by Vice Chancellor Bob Gabriner to the Communication Committee. Bob Gabriner and Kathleen Murphy presented the Office of Institutional Advancement's plan to

develop brochures and other literature for outreach and to cultivate relationships with philanthropic individuals and/or communities. Individual brochures will highlight thirty educational programs. The goal is to have thirty brochures completed by the end of 2006. The brochures may showcase students and/or faculty. One concern that came up was the idea of the college using students to make money. Another issue discussed was the need for release forms when using images and quotes from students and faculty.

Another project will involve developing a database of stories that demonstrate how the college has transformed students and faculty and how individual faculty members have transformed students. The Office of Institutional Advancement would also like to develop a comprehensive listing of alumni going back 10 years, and an annual giving initiative.

II. Institutional Annual Plan

Dr. Day distributed a copy of the Institutional Annual Plan as a FYI item.

III. Budget Review and Recommendation Process

Dr. Day informed the council that because of the decreased enrollment, even with all the savings the district implemented this academic year, by the end of the fiscal year the district is still going to be in negative.

IV. Other Business and Announcements

Dr. Day inquired about the status of the Committee on Information and Public Records. Attila Gabor, the district shared governance coordinator, informed the Council that the Administrators' Association and the SEUI 790 submitted the appointments last semester. However, the Academic Senate and Associated Students still did not make any appointments.

Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements, and the arming of the CCSF police. The DCC Advisory Council has asked Chief Koehler to address the DCC. The DCC discussed the possibility of canceling classes to hold a special plenary to vote on the issue; this hasn't happened in 30 years.

D. Secretary Jane Sneed brought up the issue about summer Faculty Travel for part-time instructors. This will be discussed at a later Travel Committee meeting. (The Executive Council is the committee; Ophelia Clark is the chair.)

V. Committee Appointments

Resolution 2006.02.15.01: Shared Governance Committee Appointments

Resolved, that the Academic Senate Executive Council approve the shared governance committee appointment, as recommended by the Committee on Committees.

Moved: Lisa Romano; seconded: Chris Cox; Monica Bosson abstained; motion carried.

It was suggested that in order to augment the announcements for Committee participation in City Currents, the DCC also announce vacancies.

VI. Unfinished Business

Preparation for the Spring 2006 Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements

Chavaria drew attention to Area E and Area H. The Academic Senate discussed concerns, interpretations, and past practice.

A. General Discussion: One issue of difficulty is that Area E requires the inclusion of different cultures in the course outline (they often list many) while Area H requires no more than four "relevant groups". It was suggested that the Curriculum Committee add a new strand to the optional technical review where course outlines could be scrutinized for

graduation requirements. Council members suggested the possibility of amending Area H for the future. Building on that, Council as a collegial body may wish to revisit the entire subject of graduation requirements. This may be a major goal for the Council next year.

B. Area E (Humanities): Title 5 requires that the course address issues "throughout the ages and in different cultures". Council discussed the meaning of "throughout the ages"; Council decided that "throughout the ages" was indeterminate and could be interpreted as "in some historical context".

C. Area H (Multi-Cultural): Some departments applying for Area H have not followed the guidelines requiring Area H proposals to identify two of the four listed learning outcomes evinced in the course outline. Council advised President Teti to tell the department chairs in advance of the Bipartite to be prepared.

D. G1 and G2 are not clearly distinguished in the Catalog. G1 is considered to be Health Knowledge while G2 covers Physical Skills. Some Area G courses may be misplaced.

E. Course outlines should be no older than 6 years. Some departments' course outlines are older than 6 years, and Council advised President Teti to inform the department chairs of this.

VII. New Business

Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) Team Visit Update
The WASC Team has received and reviewed the CCSF Accreditation Self Study report.

VIII. Adjournment

Council adjourned with thoughts for Madeline Mueller's mother.

Candidates should be aware of the following provisions of the Constitution.

ART III (Constitution): The Council shall consist of 29 members elected at large, subject to the following provision: that no more than three Senate members from a department, as defined in the Bylaws, shall serve on the Senate at one time, except ESL, which shall have no more than six.

ART IV (Constitution): A candidate for membership on the Council must be nominated by written petition of three Senate members and must accept the nomination in writing on the petition. For public information, petitions will be posted at the Academic Senate office on the day they are received. The balloting must be completed at least four weeks before the end of the semester.
