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Minutes of the CCSF Academic Policies Committee

Monday, 2006 February 27

I. Adoption of Agenda

The Committee adopted the agenda.

II. Approval of Minutes

The Committee approved the minutes of 2005 November 28.

III. Members' Reports

A. Chair Fred Teti reported these items.

1. The Academic Senate approved awarding up to 400 CalWORKS students per semester registration priority equal to that of EOPS students, as recommended by A.P.

2. The Academic Senate approved the 2005–2006 CalWORKs Program Plan, as recommended by A.P.

3. Upon recommendation from the Chancellor, the CCSF Academic Senate decided not to bring a resolution to the State Academic Senate regarding course repetition policy. We agreed to maintain our current policy until there is significant pressure to change from the CCC System Office.

B. Mueller reported that the Department Chairs had received a call for interest in the (recently renamed) Student Civic Engagement Partnership. The Committee discussed the Partnership and the results of meetings Teti had attended at the Carnegie Institute and at SFSU. There was sufficient interest that Teti agreed to put the Partnership on the next agenda for further discussion.

IV. Unfinished Business

A. Accreditation Update

Gratch-Lindauer reported that the visiting team will be at CCSF during the third week of March. Their early impression of the Accreditation Self Study report has been very favorable.

B. Information Competency Requirement (ICR) Update

Gratch-Lindauer reported that the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements approved her work group's

new proposal and implementation scheme (as recommended by A.P.) for the Information Competency Requirement. It will appear in the 2006–2007 Catalog.

C. Academic Majors

Mueller reminded the Committee that Enhanced Self Study recommendation "CLL8", as approved by the Senate, gave students three ways to earn an 18-unit major: (1) by using G. E. requirements for CSU, for IGETC, or for UCB's College of Letters and Science, (2) by completing a delineated major in departments which have such, and (3) completing any 18 units in departments without such delineated majors.

1. In the Catalog, the last two ways are combined into a single, compound item. A.P. felt this presentation is confusing. The Committee asked Teti to pursue a better presentation with the Office of Instruction.

2. Other community colleges give their majors more publicity than we do; this is partially because we have so many awards of achievement competing for attention. A.P. members agreed to try thinking of ways to increase visibility of CCSF "major" offerings.

3. It seems that no earned majors of any kind appear on degrees, diplomas, and transcripts. Member Leyba-Frank agreed to ask the Registrar why this might be so.

V. New Business

A. Discussion of the CCSF Associate Degrees

The Committee discussed various concerns brought by Damato from the Transfer Student Counseling Department. Many of these concerns addressed clarity in the Catalog description of the degree requirements, the nature of the Option B ("Transfer") degree, and how best to communicate these to our students. Smith and Mueller reminded the Committee that the Option

B degree was not intended as a transfer vehicle, but as an option for students who were transferring but might not otherwise get an associate degree.

1. Damato noted that CSU allows students to have Ds in nine out of the thirty-nine G.E. units. The CCSF policy on Ds is less prescriptive. A.P. felt that the Catalog should say which college's policy applies to the Option B degree. If we decide to use the CSU policy, the CCSF Catalog should include it explicitly. The Committee referred this issue to the Grading Policies Subcommittee.

2. CSU requires nonresident students to have a 2.4 GPA. The CCSF Option B degree requires a 2.0 GPA of all students (as does Option A). A.P. felt that the Catalog should explicitly warn nonresident students that meeting the CCSF Option B degree GPA requirement does not necessarily qualify them for transfer to CSU. The Committee charged Teti with asking the Office of Instruction to insert into the Option B degree GPA section a sentence to this effect. (The Transfer Counselors may choose to pursue a change in the Option B GPA requirement.)

The Committee will continue considering other concerns (e.g., second degrees, waivers, Advanced Placement1 credit) in future meetings.

B. Study Abroad Proposal from International Education Advisory Subcommittee

The International Education Advisory Subcommittee recommends that CCSF offer two proposed new Study Abroad programs:

1. Winter Break in Costa Rica and Nicaragua. The courses offered during the program will be LALS 15 and LALS 70, taught by LALS Department member Dr. Greg Landau,.

Minutes of the Planning and Budgeting Council

2006 March 7

1. Approval of Minutes

The PBC approved the 2006 February 21 minutes.

2. Budget Update

Vice Chancellor Goldstein reminded us that he has reported to the Board the need to transfer \$2M out of the reserve (this figure includes \$800K already moved).

- According to this year's First Principal Apportionment report, CCSF will get \$900K of the redirected Basic Skills funds.
- Even with no unforeseen increases in expenditures, the District will still be operating with a ~\$3.5M "structural deficit".

3.A. Budget Review Process: Short-Term Cuts

Vice Chancellor Goldstein reported on the status of some proposed savings areas.

- Eliminating grade mailers: A&R has begun to do so. The District will see some savings this year.
- Outreach & Recruitment and legal/consulting fees: The District will see savings next year.
- Reduced administrator work calendar: There is interest, but the savings will occur next year.
- Classified supervisory management: One has left the District.
- Child-care and Cafeteria deficits: Discussions are ongoing.

Goldstein remarked also that

- CCSF may receive ~\$200K more in sales tax revenues, and
- We may be relieved from paying \$600K to the County-wide College Allocation Plan.

3.B. Budget Review Process: Data Elements Discussion

Chancellor Day affirmed that campus, administrative, instructional, and student-service programs would all be under scrutiny during the review process, and that reduction in services does not necessarily mean reduction in personnel. He asked the PBC members to share information about the process widely.

Dr. Day distributed a draft of Supplemental Data Elements for the Administrative and the Student Development Services Profile Reviews. The proposed new Elements include capacity to incorporate new technologies, and degrees of interdependency and redundancy. Some members asked for data on administrator and supervisory management salaries.

The PBC discussed possible duplication/redundancies within individual review areas and among different

review areas. We are generally pleased that the College is conducting this Review "in-house" and not by outside consultants.

4. Budget Planning for Fiscal Year 2006-2007

Dr. Day distributed copies of a memo he has sent to the Major Cost Center Managers advising them of the College's 2006-07 budget assumptions and expenditure priorities. Former CCSF employee James Kendrix will return part-time to assist Vice Chancellor's Goldstein's office with the Major Cost Center Managers' budgets.

5. 2004-2005 College Performance Indicators (CPI) Report

Dr. Gabriner distributed copies of the CPI. The PBC briefly discussed aspects of the data, tables, and pagination.

- (Item V.B) We approved the Study Abroad programs in Costa Rica and Nicaragua, and in South Africa, for consideration by the Academic Senate.
