Cupcake L. Brown, an attorney with Bingham McCutchen, one of the 25 largest law firms in the nation, will deliver the commencement address to the 2006 graduates of CCSF on **Saturday, May 27**. The ceremony will begin at 11 A.M. in Nob Hill Masonic Center, 1111 California Street.

An Associate at this law firm, Cupcake, yes that is her first name, specializes in litigation, with an emphasis on antitrust and trade regulation, securities and corporate governance, and white collar crime. Ms. Brown received her Juris Doctorate in 2001 from the University of San Francisco School of Law. Haley Award for Exceptional Distinction in Scholarship, Character and Activities; the McAuliffe Honor Society; the National Law School Dean's List; and San Diego State University's Donald Leiffer Outstanding Alumni Award for Distinguished Service.

As an author and advocate, Brown speaks all over the country using her own life's experiences to illustrate how the hopes and dreams of anyone really can come true. She is the author of *The New York Times'* best-selling memoir, *A Piece of Cake*, which can be purchased online, in local bookstores including City College's own bookstore. She has been featured on National Public Radio, on television shows ranging from CNN and PBS to CBS's "The Early Show," in newspapers from *The San Francisco Chronicle* to Florida's *Palm Beach Post*, and numerous magazines, including *California Lawyer*, *Guideposts*, *Essence*, *Ebony*, *Marie Claire* and *JET*. *Glamour Magazine* named her its "Hero of the Month," and Oprah's *O Magazine* profiled her as a "Phenomenal Woman."

Student graduation speakers named Frances Lai Kathrin Spoeck

Frances Lai was born in Hong Kong, and came to the United States in 1970. She came from a Chinese family culture and attended a Catholic school in Hong Kong under the British system run by Italian nuns. As a child growing up in metropolitan Hong Kong, she was very interested in languages, and learned German, French and Russian outside of the school curriculum. Her first stop in the US was Wisconsin, a huge contrast from Hong Kong in terms of climate and open space. She obtained her BS degree in Chemistry amidst the snow from the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, and later her MS degree in Chemistry from Iowa State University. Following that, she decided to postpone starting a career and instead, indulged herself in pursuing her other interest in the study of Linguistics and earned an MA from Southern Illinois University. She has now worked as a chemist for 25 years, during which time she also developed a passion in classical singing and took private voice lessons. Two years ago, she decided to pursue music academically and started working on an AA degree at City College. She accomplished that and will continue to work on vocal performance and teaching.



KATHRIN SPOECK

Kathrin Spoeck was born May 20, 1983 in Steyr, Austria, a thousand year old city where two rivers intersect in the north of Austria. This is where she spent the first 20 years of her life and where she received a solid educational foundation.

Kathrin says she caught the travel bug when she was 16 and since then has visited Asia, Africa, North America, and most of Europe. Her most profound journey was a trip to India when she volunteered to work in an orphanage, introducing her to a culture that was almost the opposite of her own. She met her husband while traveling, and in order to be with him, moved to San Francisco almost three years ago. Two months after arriving she started attending CCSF. "CCSF has given me the opportunity to gain work experience by hiring me to work at the Transfer Center which I used as a stepping-stone for gaining employment at my present job in an Interior Design firm," she says.

Last January, Kathrin transferred to SFSU where she plans to earn a B.S. in Interior Design and a minor in Small Business Management. "My long-term goal is to run my very own interior design firm one day, and to continue going to school for personal development," she says.

Students docents for Coulter exhibit

Eight students from the Art History courses of **Diana Scott** and **Maria Cheremeteff** are training as docents for an exhibition of work by **W.A. Coulter** at the San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park. The image of San Francisco burning was painted on a 5' x 10' window shade that Coulter found on the street after the Earthquake.

Coulter's story is one that is inspiring to our students in Art, for Coulter was never trained to be a painter. He was an able bodied sailor who, after breaking his ankle in the 1860's decided that he wanted to be a musician. Not being very good at the violin he decided to be an artist. He painted from 1869 to 1934, and he became the greatest marine painter of the San Francisco Bay Area. His paintings recorded the history of the change from sail power to steam in the San Francisco Bay. He lived in Sausalito and sketched the city burning while rowing and sailing survivors to Sausalito. He worked at the San Francisco Call Bulletin and was illustrating events of the Spanish American war from information over the telegraph. In his painting of the San Francisco Earthquake and Fire, he moved the Call Bulletin building 1/2 mile so it could be in the center of the painting. The Call Bulletin was the largest stone-steel framed building in the US at the time.

Commissioned by many of the steam ship companies to paint their ships he always surrounded them with sailing vessels. His favorite view to paint was looking out the gate, and always depicted St. John's Cove; which is now Fort Mason. He used to exhibit up to 100 paintings at a time and what did not sell at the exhibition he would auction off on the last day of the show. He had a studio in SF, and lived near the Valhalla in Sausalito. Coulter died before the Golden Gate Bridge was ever completed. In this six month exhibition W.A. Coulter will finally receive the recognition that he never had in his life time.

"Please come and join us in celebrating W.A. Coulter and our students' involvement in this wonderful exhibition. April 18th was an exciting day for students and educators alike as there were many earthquake re-enactments happening all over the city," says **Rick Rodrigues** of the CCSF Art Department.

COA names Maurice Purify athlete of month

The California Community Colleges Commission on Athletics (COA), in partnership with the California Community College Sports Information Association (CCCSIA) has named **Maurice Purify** (City College of San Francisco, men's basketball) the COA/U.S. Bank Student Athlete of the Month for March.

Purify, a two sport standout, helped lead the Rams to the semi-finals of the 2006 California Community Colleges Commission of Athletics Men's Basketball Championship, presented by U.S. Bank in Fresno. During the State Championship playoffs (2 games), the sophomore forward scored 25 points and had 16 rebounds.

The Nebraska-bound star is also one of the top wide receivers in community college football, and led the Rams to the 2005 State Championship game. He was named first team all-state in both sports.

Tatyana Borhkvich first in her division at US judo open

Tatyana Borhkvich won first place in the Female 70 Kilogram Division of the U.S.A. Judo National Championship games held in Houston, Texas, April 22-23. Her coach **Mitchell Palacio**, praised her commitment to getting into competitive condition for winning a national open meet. Tatyana, a sophomore, is part of the CCSF women's intercollegiate judo team. She lives in San Jose.

Minutes of the Academic Policies Committee

Monday, 2006 March 27

I. Adoption of Agenda

The Committee adopted the agenda.

II. Approval of Minutes

The Committee approved the minutes of 2006 February 27.

III. Members' Reports

A. Chair Fred Teti reported that the State Academic Senate is preparing for its Spring 2006 session. Important topics to be discussed there include noncredit issues and proposed changes in the 60% rule (for part-time load).

B. Articulation Officer Deanna Abma brought copies of pages of the latest draft of the 2006–2007 Catalog that included changes made based on our recommendations. Abma mentioned explicitly new GPA advisories for non-resident students (p. 53 and p. 58), and the three-fold Major requirement (pp. 57–58).

C. Dean Leyba-Frank was not available to report on majors appearing on transcripts, etc. The Grading Policies Subcommittee is still considering the C versus D issue.

IV Unfinished Business

A. Accreditation Update

Bonnie Gratch-Lindauer reported that the visiting team's exit report was mostly favorable. There were three "over-arching" recommendations to continue our work on SLOs, integrating planning into the budgeting cycle, and addressing the fiscal health of the College.

B. Clarification of Study Abroad Proposal for Costa Rica and Nicaragua

The CCSF Academic Senate referred this item (recommended at our last meeting for Senate consideration) back to committee for clarification on the number of units earned. Students earn 5 units total, for 87.5 hours of academic work. The two-week trip provides time for only 80 of those hours. The balance is provided by class meetings before the trip, and by work spent on a term paper. The

Committee re-affirmed its recommendation.

C. Discussion of the CCSF Associate Degrees

Committee continued to review Larry Damato's list of concerns.

1. When CCSF certifies the CSU G.E. for Option B degrees, we require Cs (or better) Areas A1, A2, A3, and B4. However, for many CCSF G. E. areas, we require only Ds (or better). This difference between the degrees should be made more explicit.

2. It is also unclear what rules or guidelines CCSF follows when awarding multiple associate degrees, be they multiple Option A degrees or an Option A and an Option B degree to one student.

Teti agreed to draft a letter to the Office of Admissions and Records requesting clarification on these points. Various Committee members felt that we may be trying to accomplish too much with the Option B degree.

V. New Business

A. Proposed Academic Freedom Statement

Brian Ellison, Dean of Instruction, Curriculum, and Tenure Review, asked that we consider broad statements expressing academic freedom (i.e., not just for faculty, but consistent with the

faculty academic freedom sections of the AFT2121 contract). The Committee is currently considering the following statement, modified from the Strategic Plan:

"The City College of San Francisco values academic freedom and respects the right of individuals to their opinions. The College encourages a lively, ongoing interchange of views among students, faculty, staff, and administration, and a tolerance of differences."

Teti will inform Dean Ellison of the Committee's discussion thus far, and encourage him to discuss the matter with other such bodies as the Associated Students Council.

Summary of Outcomes

- (Item III.C) Teti will ask Dean Leyba-Frank and the chair of Grading Policies for the status of their charges.
- (Item IV.B) We re-affirmed our recommendation on the Study Abroad Proposal for Costa Rica and Nicaragua.
- (Item IV.C.) Teti will write a letter to the Office of Admissions and Records asking for clarification of how CSU G.E. is certified, and of rules or guidelines for multiple degrees.
- (Item V.A) Teti will inform Dean Ellison of our draft of the broad academic freedom statement. A.P. will continue its consideration next meeting.

Downtown Campus will demolish some areas on the 5th floor to provide lecture rooms in the computer lab for technology hands-on learning.

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VII. Unfinished Business

A. Discussion of Basic Skills

Recommendation 2: Create coordinated programs and services for basic skills students

Nadine Rosenthal presented The Basic Skills Subcommittee Recommendation. Teti reminded us of the suggestion by Council that "basic skills students" be replaced by "students with basic skills needs." He distributed a commentary by the Student Prep/Success Committee.

Rosenthal updated the Council on the committee's progress since May 2005 when the recommendations were first presented. The Basic Skills Subcommittee continues to work, offering professional development opportunities and creating a Basic Skills website that is funded by Title 3 grant. Rosenthal expressed that the Prep/Success comments might be too prescriptive. Council suggested, and Rosenthal agreed, to meet with Prep/Success members to draft language that is more open to interpretation (e.g., inserting "generally" in front of "defined as").

B. By-Laws Article I Proposed Amendment

Romano led a discussion about the proposal to change the By-Laws in order to allow each of the Counseling departments to have separate representation on Council. Council discussed the By-laws and the potential benefits or difficulties that could arise from the proposed change. Ideas included re-aligning Council representation by Schools and/or by the Curriculum Committee membership structure. Council agreed to reconvene the Bi-Laws subcommittee to discuss this issue as it relates not only to Counseling but to other departments as well.

C. Study Abroad Proposal: Costa Rica and Nicaragua

Teti reported on the answers to the question brought up regarding class units.

Council heard concerns about courses offered abroad, especially Special Topics courses. The Study Abroad Proposal for Program in Costa Rica and Nicaragua to Academic Policies was tabled until next Council meeting.

D. General Education Requirements Work Group

Chavaria asked Council to contact him in order to participate in the work group. The group will be preparing for the Fall 2006 Bipartite.

VIII. New Business

A. The Proposed Change to the Discipline List from Health Science Department was distributed. Council tabled the approval vote until next meeting.

B. Administrator evaluations are complete. Teti remarked that a later deadline

would be a good idea because the formal process was still going on past this year's deadline.

C. Council Nominations

Teti explained the numbers of vacancies (17) and the number who were willing to run (12). He hopes that the numbers indicate that faculty are pleased with how things are running. There will be at most 24 members on Council next year. Some Senate members have asked about write-in candidates. There is no provision for write-ins in the Constitution, and historically we interpret the election rules strictly. If the Senate so wishes, the Council may consider amending the election rules.

IX. Adjournment

Council adjourned with gratitude to the Organic Coffee Company and the Educated Palate for their delicious coffee.
