## I. Call to Order

Council came to order at 2:40 P.M.

## II. Adoption of Agenda

Council adopted the agenda with two additions:

A. Board resolution on Noncredit Funding (under New Business)

B. Equivalency (under Open Forum)

## III. Approval of Minutes

Council approved Minutes of 3/29/06 as corrected.

## IV. Officers' Reports

President Teti distributed a written report listing various issues, events, and announcements.

A. Chancellor Day has consulted with Teti about the request for lenient attendance and testing policies on May 1, the day set aside for a walk-out to raise awareness about immigration issues.

B. Dr. Day conducted the Student Services Program Profile Review. Outcomes included possibly reorganizing Matriculation and eliminating the Office of Outreach and Recruitment.

C. Police Chief Koehler has proposed planned emergency drills on the Ocean Avenue Campus.

D. Teti pointed out that the ASCCC Plenary session is next week, drawing attention to proposed resolutions, including courses for math anxiety, disciplines list changes, and the 60% part-time ceiling.

## V. Special Order of Business: Vice President of the Board of Trustees Johnnie Carter, Jr.

Council engaged Trustee Carter in a lively discussion. Trustee Carter asserted that he is working to achieve Board solidarity. He emphasized that members of the Board are sincerely committed to the College. Carter was instrumental in creating "work sessions" for Board committees to address issues before they come before the full Board. He has concerns about the Project Labor Agreement, specifically that CCSF should contract with local businesses and support local apprenticeships. Another important issue is working with legislators in Sacramento for improved noncredit funding; he expressed his commitment to noncredit programs and students.

## VI. Unfinished Business

A. Senate Shared Governance Representation Policy Resolution

Council discussed a proposal that would allow fully-reassigned faculty to occupy administrator seats on Shared Governance committees. Council gave approval for Teti to begin discussing the proposal with the College Advisory Council and the Administrator Association.

B. Approval: Study Abroad in Costa Rica and Nicaragua

Council returned to the Study Abroad proposal for Costa Rica and Nicaragua and discussed many issues, including the selection and approval of study abroad courses, financial aid for students, the calculation of workload units, ensuring academic rigor, articulation with CSU and/or UC, developing Special Topics courses for study abroad, and the role of the depart-

ment chair. Council showed interest in discussing these matters in the future.

## Resolution 2006.4.19.01: Study Abroad in Costa Rica and Nicaragua

Resolved: That the CCSF Academic Senate approve the Study Abroad program proposal for LALS 1 and LALS 70 during the Winter Break in Costa Rica and Nicaragua.

Motion carries, 11 to 10.

C. Approval: Broad Support for Basic Skills Recommendations

Council discussed the recommendations with Nadine Rosenthal and Hal Huntsman, and then voted.

## Resolution 2006.04.19.02: Basic Skills Subcommittee Recommendations

Resolved: that the Academic Senate support the intent of the three recommendations of the Basic Skills Subcommittee as proposed in "Basic Skills Subcommittee Recommendations to the Academic Policies Committee Collaborative for Teaching, Learning and Student Success in Basic Skills, October/November 2005."

Recommendation 1: Create and foster a permanent professional development program in support of students with basic skills needs.

Recommendation 2: Create coordinated programs and services for students with basic skills needs.

Recommendation 3: Create a Collaborative for Teaching, Learning and Student Success in Basic Skills.

Teti distributed copies including information about the ASCCC draft resolutions, the most important of which were already discussed during the previous agenda item.

**D. Support for Proposed Health Science Minimum Qualifications**

Council voted on a proposed revision to Health Science Minimum Qualification.

RESOLVED that the CCSF Academic Senate approve adding a Masters in Public Health to the Health Science section of the Disciplines List.

**E. Authorization to contract with California Strategies with BMWL Associates for special services and advice related to CCSF's efforts to seek improved state funding for Noncredit Instruction.**

Council discusses the importance of supporting the College's efforts to bring about improved noncredit funding.

RESOLVED that the Academic Senate supports Board Resolution 060427- B14, Authorization to contract with California Strategies with BMWL Associates for spe-

## Academic Policies Committee

Minutes of April 24, 2006

**I. Adoption of Agenda**

The Committee adopted the agenda.

**II. Approval of Minutes**

The Committee approved the minutes of 2006 March 27 as corrected.

**III. Members' Reports**

A. Chair Fred Teti reported that the CCSF Academic Senate may discuss the equivalency policy and the process used to select courses for study abroad. Some of these items may get referred to Academic Policies.

B. Dr. Gabriner reported that the Chancellor has received the WASC visiting team's official report. It lists eight recommendations, all of which were already mentioned in Dr. Carroll's exit speech.

C. Dean Leyba-Frank produced sample transcripts showing that official majors (i.e., majors approved by the Curriculum Committee) appear on transcripts.

**IV. Unfinished Business**

**A. Discussion of the CCSF Associate Degrees**

1. Committee discussed how CCSF awards Option B (Transfer) Degree credit for Advanced Placement courses.

(a) The original ESS records do not address whether we award Advanced Placement credit based on the same scheme as for the Option A (regular CCSF Associate) Degree or according to the CSU scheme. (Larry Damato distributed handouts displaying schemes.)

(b) It seems Admissions and Records is using the same scheme as for the Option A Degree.

(c) After some discussion, the Committee felt that we should be using the CSU scheme. Doing so is favorable for the students, and seems closer to spirit of the Option B degree.

(d) Damato and Bruce Smith agreed to draft a resolution recommending the Senate bring this change to the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements.

2. The question arose also about how CCSF distinguishes between an Associate of Arts and an Associate of Sciences. Teti agreed to investigate.

# Teaching and Learning Technology Roundtable

Minutes of April 3, 2006

## Presentation on Instructionally Related Bond Projects by Doug Re and Nicholar Chang.

Three proposed ITS projects were discussed: 1) a document imaging system for the use by the entire college, 2) a student email system and 3) a Web portal for students.

Pierre Thiry shared a description of an ICT Literacy Assessment available from ETS. CCSF beta-tested the assessment test last year. CSU is using this test; implementation varies among the campuses. Thiry drew attention to the list of Technology Tools used; it includes many items not covered by the new Information Competency requirement, nor covered by the California High School Exit Exam.

Thiry proposed that CCSF use the ETS ICT Literacy Assessment as an intake test, and to require students who don't pass to do coursework instead. The Committee suggested that Thiry proceed by:

- (1) Collecting data on our incoming students' ICT literacy status.
- (2) Consulting with the Matriculation Testing Office about having to conduct another assessment for incoming students.

### Summary of Outcomes

- (Item IV.A.1.(d)) Larry Damato and Bruce Smith agreed to draft a resolution recommending the Senate bring this change to the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements.
- (Item IV.A.2) Fred Teti will investigate the AA/AS distinction.

Doug Re began by discussing a proposed document imaging system. The system would allow CCSF to scan, store, catalog and retrieve various types of paper documents. The current idea envisions integration with Banner as well as access through a stand-alone database.

The implementation of a document imaging system would require rollouts of scanners, modifications to Banner, and the ability to attach documents to Banner elements among other requirements.

A pilot project involving the Payroll Department is under consideration. Admissions and Records would likely be a major user of a document imaging system, for example, for storing and retrieving "add" and "drop" forms.

Doug Re has examined various document imaging systems at other schools. He feels that a decentralized system where individual departments do their own scanning is more cost effective than a centralized system.

Julia Bergman noted that many library documents of a historical nature could be scanned and added to the system. Michael Malachowski noted that in order to be able to do text searches, an optical character recognition system would need to be in place.

Next, Doug Re discussed a proposed student email system. With this system, each student would be given a CCSF email address. Since CCSF has 106,000 students enrolled per year, a robust system capable of handling many users and a large amount of email would be necessary. An RFI is planned for later this year. The IT staff plans to vet the proposed solutions and then prepare an RFP.

Doug Re and Nicholar Chang discussed preliminary plans for a Web portal. The Web portal is envisioned to be a comprehensive student centered online environ-

ment where students could—among many other things—register for classes, check their CCSF email accounts, look up their grades, and monitor their academic status. The portal could also be the gateway to students' online distance education courses.

One advantage of a portal for CCSF is that the college would be able to "push" content onto the page that it wished to bring to the attention of students.

At previous TLTR meetings, Nicholar Chang has raised the topic of Web portals and has discussed in detail their use at other colleges.

The question of staffing was raised. It was noted that it might be necessary to have someone on staff with responsibility for resetting passwords. Also a content person—someone to develop material for the site—might be needed.

Doug Re indicated that current plans are for an RFI to be developed for fall 2006 for the Web portal.

### Summer Report from the Technology Learning Center (TLC)

Carol Reitan discussed the upcoming summer schedule for the TLC. Workshops will be offered in June. Some workshop topics include: iTunes U and Podcasting for educational purposes; Macintosh and Dreamweaver to be presented by Tom Boegel; Contribute, WebCT and PowerPoint.

### Items for Future Meetings

Student representative Leonard Arnold suggested a topic. He would like to see CCSF offer short term computer workshops for students. Members discussed the topic briefly, and will discuss it further at the next meeting.

# Works of Art Subcommittee

## Minutes of March 10, 2006

### 1. Galleries/Exhibition Space

Anna Asebedo of the Art Department, who serves on the Performing Arts Building Committee, described the current status of the project; it is likely that it will be reduced by as much as 50% and the proposed 1,300 sq. ft art gallery, with an additional 975 sq ft support space, is very vulnerable. Some previously included programs might be relocated to the Joint Use Building; a remodeled Creative Arts Complex might house Film, Broadcasting & Multi Media. Anna requested information about the planned gallery space in the Center for Pan American Unity. Tobin's schematic drawing shows gallery space, with an outside entrance. It will be well placed, next to the mural room, with a kitchen adjacent. The group felt that the Art Department could be the primary users of the new gallery space. The Exhibition Task Force would continue to plan and collaborate on exhibitions everywhere. If the CPAU Gallery becomes the primary gallery for the Art Department, the existing City Arts Gallery could be used by the faculty and students in a gallery preparation course, something that is planned by the Department.

Julia sent an email to: Architecture, Photography, Multi Media & Graphic Communications suggesting that faculty & student work be showcased in existing and new exhibition space. The Architecture Department is possibly interested in the space at the Downtown Campus.

A W/A Task Force is needed to thoroughly inventory all District exhibition space, with dimensions and photographs (tackable surfaces, security, lighting, etc). This will be a fall semester project.

### 2. Exhibitions Update

Mary distributed "Color on Campus: Art Faculty Show [Off!]" a flyer describing the new exhibition at John Adams. The Tapa

Cloth show on Level 2 of the Atrium will be celebrated on April 5, 1:00-4:30 with poetry readings & a variety of Pacific Islander dancers. Mine will distribute information about the upcoming juried student ceramics show.

### 3. Diego Rivera Update

Julia and Will are scheduled to lecture at the San Francisco Public Library, Hispanic/Latin Room, on "Rivera and the Pan American Unity Mural" on Saturday, March 11, 4:00pm. German art historians are visiting CCSF; they have recently published a book about Guillermo Kahlo, Frida's father (Frida's Vater. Der Fotograf Guillermo Kahlo. Von Pforzheim nach Mexiko.). They revealed that Guillermo Kahlo was neither Hungarian nor Jewish, he was Bavarian and Lutheran (they have seen his baptism certificate). Frida has always been described as half Jewish and her "Jewishness" has been recently lauded by an Israeli art historian who curated an exhibition in New York about Jewish themes in Frida's paintings, etc.

### 4. Restoration Projects

Jacques Overhoff is in San Francisco working on a new project – a tunnel (as a work of art) for the Doyle Drive project; a meeting will be scheduled with him in the next week or so.

We need to compile a thorough list of art restoration projects and develop criteria to be used to prioritize projects. We have a long list now; (don't forget the gnomon on the sundial !)

### 5. Art Guide/Brochure/Map

The contract for printing is with CCSF Purchasing. 5,000 copies will be printed and delivered to R519. We will sell the guide for \$3.00; Stephen Herman has indicated that an accommodation account can be created for the proceeds, to be used for W/A recommended projects.

### 6. Business Cards/Greeting Cards

Julia has let this project slip a little but will take it to the College Advisory Council. Patricia is still working on the greeting card project.

### 7. Evans Campus Mural

There is no new information about their request for a mural. Tobin wants to investigate the possibility of installing the prismatic glass sculpture in the stairwell there.

### 8. Olmec Head Lighting

Will has built a clamp for the temporary installation of a light fixture, to be in place for the Elena Duran concert in April.

### 9. Whale Sculpture

Tobin will contact Rommel Taylor of the S.F. Art Commission regarding the whales and a tour of the S.F. A.C. works on the Ocean Campus, several of which need restoration. Ann Clark stated that the Performing Arts Building Committee is still interested in having the whales in their proposed plaza. The final location of the whale sculpture TBD.

# Planning and Budgeting Council

Minutes of March 28, 2006

## Approval of Minutes

The PBC approved the 2006 March 7 minutes as corrected.

## 1. Budget Update

Chancellor Day summarized the Friday, March 24 meeting of the Budget Change Proposal Task Force, which he attended with Governmental Relations Dean Leslie Smith.

- CCSF may be eligible for ~\$1.7M in credit equalization.
- We may receive slightly more than the expected \$900K in Basic skills funding.
- However, the State Chancellor's Office intends to distribute the redirected growth funds (of which we expected ~\$4.5M) in the 2006-2007 academic year, too late for our current budget year.

Vice Chancellor Goldstein re-confirmed that the District will have to transfer a total of about \$2M from the reserve in June, and will have a ~\$3.5M structural deficit heading into 2006-07.

## 2. Instructional Program Profile Review Meeting Report

Dr. Day distributed meeting notes from the March 14 Instructional Program profile Review meeting and drew attention to the five programs recommended for further review. He charged Vice Chancellor Gabriner with drafting the structure for that further review, noting that the State Preschools may need a separate review structure. Asked about the future of the Transitional Studies Department, Dr. Day said he wants more information about CAHSEE and its possible effect on CCSF enrollment.

## 3. Student Services and Administrative Program Profile Review Plans

The Chancellor and Vice Chancellors agreed tentatively to schedule the Student Services Program Profile Review for Tuesday, April 4, 8 a.m.-12 p.m. Vice

Chancellor Goldstein hopes to have his units' profiles ready by April 7. Dr. Day hopes to have the remaining units' profiles done by May 1.

## 4. Public Policy Partners Resolution

Dr. Day distributed copies of draft Board resolution 060330-B9, contracting the services of Public Policy Partners LLP (Trey Barnes and Rachel Woods, principals) from March 30, 2006 to June 30, 2007 (15 months) for \$120,000, (~\$8000/mo) to represent the college at

the state and federal levels. Dr. Day asserted that this firm has helped secure for us ~\$350K for nursing and health-care equipment and ~\$375K for equipping the new Student Health Services building. (An addendum listing the firm's credentials is included with the Board resolution.)
